Dear Mr. Wale:

There are a number of things that I ought to review, as I notice my correspondence has been very poorly kept up with you.

- 1. In the matter of the Floyd and Polk county folks, the Polk people have somewhat petered out, their supervisor being elsewhere. I have just written to Superintendent Cook, saying that as a result of a conversation with the Supervisor. Mrs. White, we have made such arrangements as need to be raised, and expect fifteen teachers from that county.
- 2. This will mean that among special groups, we shall be dealing with the Bibb county teachers; the Peach county group; and the Floyd county group. These will be cared for by a Miss Ella Tackwood, downstate supervisor, a girl who has been active in the preparation of materials here in the State similar to those done by Mrs. Knox (of course not as good, but still intelligent). We plan for her and for Mathis and Wynn, out agriculture teachers, to work this summer with the Peach county group. The Bibb county group with headquarters in Macon is to be taught at Ballard; Mrs. Duncan is in charge, with the aid of Miss Tommie Calhoun, a teacher and supervisor from Wlkinson, and R. O. Johnson, a good fellow now at Morris Brown, who has been for the last years connected with the Greenville, S. Ca., county council.
- 3. I notice that in a recent letter Mr. Cousins said that our expenses were not listed in our catalogue. He was in error on this. I am inclosing a copy of that bulletin in which you will find it stated on pages 12-13.
- 4. Incidentally and irrelevantly, you may be interested to know that W. H. Pipes, one of the fellows off in school, received his Ph.D. at Michigan this Spring. His thesis was based on recordings of Negro folk sermons. done here. Pipes is being offered all sorts of other jobs, and I misdoubt but that he will leave us.
- 5. In the matter of study out of the special fund: I am now negotiating with a Miss Hermese Johnson, now here substituting for Mrs. Duncan, to come back to help work on this special program, in connection with the local schools. She will have to teach social science courses as well as education, as Miss Forrest is going off for study. If at all possible, I would like to put in a request for a grant for her to do a little study in sociology for a brief term - three weeks or six weeks - at Chicago, toward the end of the Summer. This would be for \$100-\$150, depending on length. In addition, I would like to make the similar request for Mrs. Murphy. dean of women, concerning whom I spoke to you. She would be studying a full quarter. We have yet another person, Miss Douglass, for whom I would like to solicit aid for two quarters next year; this is in reading and remedial work. This would be for from \$500 to \$600.00. She has done a very interesting job this year in serving as a sort of specialist to correct english errors in all papers (excepting those written by the President).

I would also like to remind you of Miss Susie Gertrude Warren, the young woman who graduates this year, who did the weaving course at Tuskegee some two years ago. You remember we spoke of Cranbrook in connection with her

6. Mr. Cousins was here the other day and we talked over the matter of Mrs. Lucille Stone Welch. We have made arrangements with the county superintendent to take over

one two room and one-one room building in the county; we also are to locate senior students at one two-room school for the balance of the year, six students rotating each three months.

We would like to have Mrs. Welch take the principalship of a two-room school at Byron. This is a hamlet twelve miles from Fort Valley, located on the road from Fort Valley to Macon. We have offered her \$330.00 from our own funds, - our special budget on page 28 - and expect her to get \$675.00 on her certificate from the State. In addition, she would be employed in our summer school for a term, which would add \$157.50 for the full ten months. I have written her but have not yet heard from her.

7. I think I told you that I have been trying to get Mrs. Maggie Young Forte to come up to see me. I have heard from her, and now expect her either June 2nd or June 5th; she may even get here May 30th; it appears she is in a really out of the way place, and she has been trying to catch one of those fast trains that come every three days.

I think this brings us up pretty much to date with all of our schemes, prospects, and the like. Our problems include:

- a. The fact that Blanchet, O'Daniel, and Harrison (crafts) may be drafted next week.
- b. The fact that the Lord only knows what our enrollment will be next year. In fact, the Chancellor has just issued a startling statement permitting the extension people to operate during the Summer, which will cramp our summer school style and budget.
- c. Our secretaries are quitting us daily; we have four; mine has quit, and good riddance; but the Registrar's Troup has also just quit. We cannot compete with the Government, and the town is too small to have any native typists. If only the circumstances would permit, I would yearn either for Issei or Nissei. (I fear they won't, as excited farm wives here have already reported one of our local Negro barbers to the police several times, as a Japanese spy.)
- d. We need a good person in Music, and we need a good person in Physical Education. Come to think about it, could you review the Rosenwald applications on file there in these two fields? The hell of it is that all the good young ones are in the Army, and those left with encumbrances want a million dollars. The coach and physical educator at Morris Brown wants greatly to come here, but I am afraid of arcusing the ire of the African Methodists if I take him away.

Well, I will say no more at this time, and I hope that I have covered everything in this letter and brought you up todate.

Dear Doctor Bond: I note your request for assistance for a number of people from Fort Valley to go to school this summer and next fall. I rely, of course, entirely on your good judgment that the recipients will return and play deeply into your program to better the rural schools of your immediate area. With this assurance from you we will help those whom you recommend. You have spoken of Miss Johnson, Mrs. Murphy, Miss Douglass and Miss Warren, but with not enough specific detail for me to make the official statement at this time. When you are more sure, will you write me further?

Without seeming to withdraw any of our interest in your personnel development program, might I suggest a plan that Tuskegee is considering on these matters. A faculty committee there reasons that if a given amount is offered as a grant for in-service education, this will go twice as far if the individuals fortunate enough to go to study supplement it with an equal amount of their own money. In some cases this is possible, in others, conceivably not. Each case must of course be determined individually. I am wondering whether in the future you as the President, or a faculty committee with major concern on this matter, can determine exactly how much assistance is needed by the individual to supplement her own contribution. Tuskegee also feels that this is a better way to do it, since the individual, theoretically at least, will get more from her work if she puts some of her own expenses into it.

I was disappointed to hear that you thought Mr. Pipes would not be returning to Fort Valley. I am sure the pressure on such an individual is very great, and any help he has received from you or the Fund is not lost in the long run, but it is, of course, lost to our immediate goal. We cannot tell Mr. Pipes that he shall or shall not turn down an offer that takes him elsewhere. We can only say, I suppose, that we are

disappointed that he is not challenged to stay and work with those who have given him the opportunity to prepare himself better for the task. We can also say, I think, that rural education funds are being misspent if in the spending, we lost sight of the contribution the individual will make back on the job after the period of preparation has ended. Collecting rural sermons may be a fruitful pursuit as a sociological study. Frankly, I am not able to gear it to the singleness of purpose, the betterment of the rural school, but maybe I am getting hipped on the subject.

I think you are long-suffering with me.
I am sure you know how sincerely I mean it.

I wish to advise that the Faculty Fellowship Committee, the function of which is to study the total institutional program and in the light of its findings make recommendations for improvement in terms of the improvement of faculty personnel through periodic study, has been constituted with the following membership:

C.V. Troup, Registrar
T.B.O'Daniel
Allee James Green
L.Y. Adkins
W.W. E. Blanch et, Administrative Dean, Chairman
H.M. Bond, President, Member Ex-Officio

In reviewing the total institutional program we found that that aspect of our program which has to do with personnel work involving our advisory program and guidance program needs both strengthening and broadening. In the light of our findings we are recommending C.V.Troup,Registrar of the College for a grant of not less than \$300.00 to pursue work along these lines at the University of Minnesota during the Winter Quarter of this year. Teachers in the rural schools of Peach County and other nearby counties are sadly lacking in any knowledge of the implications of personality problems in their students; and it is the plan through Mr. Troup to give some direction to this type of work with the rural teachers in the hope that through such a program the teachers may help to functionalize their programs in terms of meeting some of the critical personality problems of youth, rather than merely imparting information.

Since Mr. Troup is desirous of entering upon his period of study during this winter quarter it would facilitate matters greatly were we to have a reply to this letter of recommendation at your earliest possible convenience.

In the next few weeks, certainly near the beginning of the second quarter, we shall send to you a full plan of our program of faculty study.





I write you regarding a matter that is giving me some concern. Mr. C. V. Troup has been offered the possibility of employment with the American Red Cross, for service overseas with soldiers.

Troup is now at Minnesota, and is at 1017 Fifth Street, South. We are agreed, of course, that should he take the work, he would repay the amount advanced to hom for the current quarterly scolarship grant.

Mr. Troup has been a great advantage to us here. In many ways he has done the work that a Dean should do. However, Mr. Blanchet also has his values. I do not know, as a matter of fact, if Troup is concerned over the fact that as Registrar he seems stuck while Blanchet continues as Dean. Troup does handle the summer school and we have arranged his salary so that he gets as much as Blanchet, both now getting approximately \$3,100.00 a year.

Troup has felt badly, although he has not told me so, over the fact that when the election was held for the presidency of the school at Albany, Aaron Brown and not he got it. This was made worse by the fact that the newspapers published the fact that Troup was almost elected, but the Chancellor turned the scales against him by the meretricious plea to the Regents that "Troup was such an asset to Fort Valley they did not want to hurt Fort Valley by taking him away."

This Red Cross job will probably pay around \$4500.00 a year, plus allowances for family support and living expenses; considerably more than he would be getting here. It would also probably provide Troup, after the war, either through savings or through the subsidies that will probably be extended to soldiers and people in associated war work like the Red Cross, with an opportunity for the full year of study he would need to get his doctorate. He has three boys, as you may know.

Although Troup is perfectly hale and hearty and probably good for another thirty years of vigorous service, it was also a source of disappointment to him last year to be turned down by the General Education Board for a fellowship on the basis that he was past forty - he is 41.

In these circumstances, I have hesitated to suggest to Mr. Troup what he should do. I have written him that when he goes to Washington to interview the Red Cross people, which is to be early in February, he should stop by Chicago and seek an opportunity to talk to you.

In the recent draft reclassifications, Mr. Blanchet was reclassified 2-A; Mr. O'Daniel, English teacher who is also a great administrative aid, 1-A; Mr. Harrison, our shop teacher, 1-A. The Board here has been pretty nice to us and I have no kick in particular, since they are really scraping the barrell While this sort of thing hurts few schools, what with decreased enrollment, it is ruinous to us - we now have more students than ever before. Since 1941 we have lost 90 boys in our total, but picked up 100 girls.

Dear Mr. Wale:

After reviewing the question of our future finances, I wish to make of the Fund a formal request that the sum of \$3,000.00 be allocated to us for immediate use in improving the physical plant through repairs, painting and otherwise.

This request is made with due consideration. You will have noted that on my original request to the Chancellor for the 1944-45 session, I asked for \$19,000.00, including an item of \$5,820.00 for physical purposes. Instead of specifying the increase, they gave us the blanket sum of \$10,000.00. I feel that it is the part of wisdom to put practically all of this money into salaries. You know, historically, it is much easier for colleges to get money for physical improvements than for salary increases and additions to the faculty. This is especially so in the case of money from public sources. Once a salary and faculty budget is established, there is every prospect of getting this continued. In the long run, I think it would be healthier for us to use the new money from the Regents in this way, although various physical renovations must be made in other years.





Excerpt from a letter written to the Faculty-Fellowship Committee by Mr. Boyd.

I assume that the Committee is aware of the fact that I am not beginning a study but trying to bring to an end a study dealing with those Federal agencies and instrumentalities at the seat of the national government which have been entrusted with the administrative supervision and control of the Territories and Island Possessions of the United States.

The study is being pursued at the University of Michigan. The assistance is needed to defray the expenses connected with the further prosecution of the project. The amount is itemized as follows: \$150.00 for tuition and fees and \$150.00 for clerical assistance with the manuscript. Should the reaction of the committee be favorable, the expenses so defrayed would partially pay for the work being done in absentia.

At the outset may I say that a study in colonial administration has no direct bearing on rural education. The successful prosecution of the project does, however, have an indirect connection with it. Since work is being offered in the College in rural education, and since rural education apparently plays a major role in the total institutional program, the effectuation of the end result of the study would not only appreciably improve the teaching personnel of the College, but would add prestige to the institution offering such courses, cause work done by such students to have a wider audience of acceptance and recognition, and perhaps enrich the experience of those in rural education who would take courses under me.

I trust that this statement will meet the request of the Committee.

Statement of a plan of Study for the Summer Quarter of 1944

Because of the growing importance of synthetic rubber, plastics, and resins in American life, and because of the implications that these have for the farm population particularly as they relate to the use of farm and forest products, I plan to do special work in the more effective use of our farm and forest products. Our farmers need an industrial market. Rural teachers who know the possibilities of new avenues for agricultural and forest products can play an important role in helping to increase the income of rural people and to elevate their standard of living through instructing them in the utilization of these materials. They could not only teach the children but also they could inform the adults of the community as well. In view of the fact that a large part of our students are perspective rural teachers, I plan to study that phase of chemistry which is related to the more effective use of our farm and forest products with emphasis on how they may be used for instructional improvement.



Our Commencement was on Sunday. I saved the cost of a baccalaureate speaker by having the commencement speaker and the baccalaureate address on the program together. I assure you my baccalaureate address - for I did it - was only three minutes by the clock - far shorter than the interminable guff you heard me dish out at Jackson, and, I hope, more sensible. There was also one other important difference; I was able, after the exercises, to gratify the desire I had, and expressed to you, after the Jackson meeting.

I write you particularly about another request for aid-to-study. This is one I mentioned to you at Eackson. Blanchet would be writing you, but he has gone off for a short vacation.

The person is Mrs. Claretta Scott Sampson. Our radio programs have grown to such importance that we feel the need of some one person, who knows something about radio, to take over the general synchronization of these programs.

Mrs. Sampson has the Master's degree in English from Atlanta, where she was a good student of Anne Cooke, now at Hampton, in dramatics, also of John Mack Ross, now at Dillard. She is an intelligent young woman, and she has helped a great deal.

However, no one here has any technical knowledge of radio; for example, none of us know how to use voices with radio, how to do scripts technically, and the like.

New York University is having a radio workshop from July 6 to August 13. The enrollment is limited to 75. It will take in all of the points we need to know. The cost of this workshop, for Mrs. Sampson, we estimate at \$225.00 - \$75.00 for fees, \$5.00 for materials, \$24.00 for room, \$70.00 for food, and \$51.00 for travel.

May I, therefore, request your consideration of a grant to Mrs. Sampson in the amount of \$225.00?



Dear Doctor Bond: This is an answer to your letter and Mr. Blanchet's letter for personnel development grants for individuals to study this coming summer and next year.

I have something on my mind which I would like to say to you, and I am sure you will understand the concern I have which compels me to say it. At the same time you will recognize my confidence in you as one who can bring about the successful operation of almost any program he undertakes.

I have been reviewing the grants made during the past four years and the purposes for the study. At Fort Valley the large majority of the individuals we have helped have been faculty members. Hardly any students have had a boost to help them do a better job in the rural schools. As contrasted with West Georgia College, for example, we have made Fort Valley no grants to rural school teachers. In the past two years we have made five grants to West Georgia College students to prepare for more effective teaching in the rural schools of Carroll County. All but one of these young women are teaching in the county school's and are drawn into the wider college program such as you have read about in their bulletin, A College and a County. Also, during the last two years four grants were made to county teachers people actually teaching in the rural schools. These teachers also come within the wider college program. For the coming year, 1944-45, we have already approved grants to four more such teachers.

I think it is important to note that such recommendations did not come from the committee on teacher education at West Georgia College until West Georgia had



actually been at work in Carroll County for two years. It indicates a concern for the teacher engaged in day-to-day planning and teaching in the rural school. Of course, they are not any old hit-or-miss teachers, but people who though county teachers play an important part in the education of the West Georgia College students.

I say these things to you at the risk of having you tell me that I am hipped on West Georgia or that they can do it for certain reasons which are the very obstacles that you face. Also I do it at the risk of having you tell me that I am not fully aware of the quality of work being done on the Fort Valley campus, that I have never been entirely sympathetic with the necessity that you faced of developing a splendid college.

of course, this is not true. I do appreciate the good stuff that's being done and the splendid progress you have made, but I do not think that the two programs are mutually exclusive; in fact, they are mutually supporting. If you had a vigorous, growing relationship between three or four immediate communities which were by way of being as good as could be found in the south and a cooperative program with 14 or 15 other community schools in which your juniors and seniors were working, I would say that Fort Valley had arrived.

Perhaps I can myself a little clearer by saying that too often the request for grants to aid faculty members are accompanied by such a record of the work to be done as was written by Mr. Boyd on May 11, 1944, in support of his request for \$300. Mr. Boyd says that the grant will be used "to bring to an end a study dealing with those Federal agencies and instrumentalities at the seat of the national government which have been entrusted with the administrative supervision and control of the Territories and Island possessions of the United States". Mr. Boyd recognizes the histus, perhaps even to the point of irony, that exists between his chosen subjects and the needs of the rural schools of Peach County. He adds a paragraph calling attention to the "no direct bearing". He struggles hard, but to me not convincingly, to show how richly he will be able to endow the undergraduates of Fort Valley with

the knowledge he is obtaining from the University of Michigan, to their immediate benefit and the everlasting glory of Mosquito Crossing, Oak Grove, and Key Corner.

Let me come to the point. I am writing to you and Mr. Blanchet approving grants of \$300 each to Miss Alma W. Stone, Mr. Boyd, and Mr. Yokely; a grant of \$225 to Miss Claretta Scott Sampson; and a grant of \$1500 to Mr. Troup, with the understanding that the monies for these funds will come from the budget which is earmarked here in our office for the use of Fort Valley State College which I reported on to you in a letter not long ago.

will recall that after our allocation to you 1944-45 expenses of the sum of \$23,000, which I am doing today in a letter to the Chancellor, you will have remaining a total of \$32,000 which is not earmarked. This, in our thinking, might have been divided into two equal amounts for current expenses 1945-46, 1946-47. Now I am saying to you, however, that it seems to me best to pay these grants for personnel development from this balance of \$32,000. This we will do as soon as we have your confirmation.

Also, out of this balance we approve to you the request you have made for \$3,000 to be used to improve your physical plant. Please let us know when you might be drawing on this in order that we may notify the Chancellor before we make payments.

Let me repeat finally that I am sure you understand the good will with which I write you of these things. I wish it were possible to face you across the table rather than at this long distance. When are you planning to be here? I hope I may see you sometime this summer when we can both be leisurely.

This is one of the most rem rkable and exciting places I have ever seen or known of. The college in itself is unusual in the degree of informality, responsibility, and genuine love of learning. The Music Institute that it is sponsoring offers amazing opportunities for studying, performing, and listening to fine music. The list of courses gives just a bare outline of the kind of instruction we receive, but I believe you will nevertheless be interested in knowing what they are. I am taking almost the full curriculum and only wish that I had time to take a course in the history of art as well.

- 1. Style in Music meets once a week and is a discussion of what the lements of good and poor music are. Connected with this is the A Capella Chorus, in which we sing music by Monteverdi, Josquin de Pres, Arcadelt, and others of the Renaissance period.
- 2. Piano-Cello Sonatas. Here we play after preparing the sonatas ourselves. Our work is criticized and the Grandano, Nicolai and Joanna,
 play the same sonata for the class. We have
 done the first two Beethoven sonatas, and I have
 played parts of both. I was very much pleased
 last week when Mrs Grandano told me that my
 playing was the best of the group.

Democratic Principles in Ensemble Playing. This
is an excellent course in which many different
combinations of instruments play chamber music
of Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven, Brahms, Schumann,
and others under the criticism of Rudolf Kolisch,
founder of the Kolisch quartet. I play the
Mozert trio in G next week.

4. Musicianship for Singers. Here advanced singers perform with Lotte Leonard assiting them in interpretation. They do arias, excerpts from the "St Matthews Passion", lieder by Brahms, Wolf, Schubert, and others. We pianists accompany.

UNIVERSITY

I rather astonished them all by reading at sight a very quick Schubert song that none of the other pianists would attempt. Of course, I didn't do it especially well, but somehow they were still surprised.

- 5. Means of Expression in Harpsichord Music. This course has met only once, but promises to be an interesting one that will make us familiar with music for harpsichord written in the 16th, 17th, and 18th centuries. This is taught, of course, by Yella Ressl.
- 6. New Road in Music Education. Another fine course that has dealt, so far, with piano instruction and in connection with which Edward Lovensky, the teacher, is giving lessons to two of the community children with us as spectators and critics.
- 7. Rehearsal of the Schoenberg Quartet this is an open rehearsal that I attend whenever possible.
- 8. Piano lessons. This is extra, and I have the very good fortune to study with Joanna Grandana, with whom I am doing the Italian Concert, several Chopin Etudes, and Brahms Rhapsody, the Kinderscenes, and technical exercises. She is an excellent pianist and teacher and I can see improvement in my playing already.

There are many other wonderful things about the Institute—the Saturday evening concerts where we hear fine music exquisitely played, the opportunities to play at almost any time with students who love music and enjoy creating it, the wonderful conversations with musicians of ability at the table, at ten, and at any other time, the stimulating atmosphere that makes you enjoy working and listening to music, the opportunities to learn about art, literature, and languages.







Dear Doctor Bond: Theodore Dreier of Black Mountain College was down last week, and we have been talking about the possibility of Miss Stone's returning to the music program there this summer. Mr. Dreier was a little afraid that Miss Stone might have felt critical of the administration of Black Mountain because he thinks she might have been thrown into close association with some of the so-called "radicals" last summer. He is eager that she know that Black Mountain intends to move forward not only in its professional work but also in its conviction that faculty and students should not be restricted in the matter of race, creed or color. To that end, this summer he is hoping to have two or three Negro students and two or three Negro faculty people if arrangements can be made.

They have invited a Miss Carol Brice of Sedalia, North Carolina, whose father, I believe, is the chaplain of Palmer Institute. Miss Brice has a splendid record as singer and teacher and, as you probably know, won the Naumberg Foundation award. The hope is that Miss Brice will come for the whole summer and teach singing. I think they are also asking Roland Hayes to spend some time with them.

In addition, of course, there will be a number of top artists, but I think it only fair to report to you that because of some difficulty experienced at the College last year, Mr. Cohn, a former member of the Black Mountain faculty, has persuaded many of the visiting artists of last summer's institute to go with him to Kenyon College this summer.

At Mr. Dreier's request, I am writing you this note to say that if Miss Stone enjoyed the work at Black Mountain last year and felt that she could with profit return there this summer, Black Mountain would like very much to have



her and we would be glad to follow the same financial arrangement we had with you and with her last year. Perhaps, however, it is a matter which will need some further correspondence with Mr. Dreier of Black Mountain College.

I am wondering if the special fund still exists so far as the possibility for helping him to study. Please let me know.

Dear Mr. Wale:

I am writing to you concerning a matter that is quite delicate indeed and one that I wish to write you about in strict confidence. It involves my own future and that is why I write you.

Naturally Dr. Bond's acceptance of the presidency of Lincoln University came to me as quite a surprise and a shock, for I had not been given the faintest indication by suggestion or otherwise of his intention of leaving until I read the news release that appeared in the Negro press. This puts me in a very precarious situation especially in view of the fact that my agreement with Dr. Bond is that I shall have a year's leave, 1945-1946, for study at the University of Michigan, during which time I am to complete my dissertation.

My situation is this that I have served The Fort Valley State College for six years being responsible for organizing the instructional program of the College and injecting, wherever it was possible to do so, such progressive yet sound ideas as the faculty was willing to develop. During these six years, I have not had the privilege of an extended period of uninterrupted study in order to complete a piece of work that was projected two or three years ago. I have always deferred my study in favor of others so that they might have a year off for study, with financial assistance through the fund over which you have oversight; in one instance a person on our faculty had two years of study under this arrangement.

If I may, I would like to outline to you what the arrangement is or was to be for my period of study next year and I will also indicate what the total situation is. A person is to be hired to perform teaching duties and is to be paid a salary of \$1800.00. I am to get the difference between what my annual salary is for this year and what this person is to be paid. This means that I am to receive \$2100.00 as my annual salary is now \$3900.00. My original request of Dr. Bond was \$2400.00 for the year, but he suggested this arrangement rather than requesting the money from your fund and as a result of this I am to receive \$2100.00.

Last year when Mr. Troup was away he received assistance through your fund and additional money was given him from his salary here and the balance was used to hire a person to perform his duties. The responsibility of his duties fell on my shoulders which I was willing to bear in the best interest of the College because the person who in name was to perform them just was unable to do so other than such routine duties as a secretary would perform. As I have said before this was the arrangement of last year with me performing the duties of my office, plus those of the Registrar's office, plus teaching duties, and supervising the work in practice teaching of the science majors. The arrangement for this year was that Dr. Bond and Mr. Troup would take over the duties of my office, a person would be hired to teach, and I would have the year off. I was to organize the work for the year and make put a master schedule for the full year and everything that goes along with that.

You see the situation that I am in now with Dr. Bond's acceptance of the presidency of Lincoln University. Although I was unselfish enough to perform Mr. Troup's duties this past year, I doubt whether he would be willing to do that much for me this year, especially in view of the fact that Dr. Bond is to leave. As a matter of fact there have been passing comments to the effect that there was not this disposition to return what was given. I ask for no sympathy for the situation in which I find myself; I will merely credit that as perhaps a mistake or as resulting from confidence in the persistence of the present administration which I had no reason to believe would end at this time. Had I known of any possibility of a change in administration, I would have tried to effect a different agreement.

What I am asking of you is that should there arise any question about providing this \$2100.00 according to my original agreement with Dr. Bond that I could get this amount or the original \$2400.00 that I asked for through the Rosenwald Fund. It is all mixed up as you see. The one definite thing that I have is the letter of agreement from President Bond setting forth that a person would be hired to teach and that I would get the difference between my salary and his salary which would amount to \$2100.00 and that I would have the year's leave.

With a new president coming in who might wish me to serve as dean, there may arise the question of my getting the year's leave; such a situation may reach the point that if I take the year, I will forfit the position as dean. There is the further complication in such a situation of refusal to provide the money, should I forfeit the position as dean.

Should the new president not want me to serve as dean, which is not unlikely because every president reserves the right to select whomever he wants to as dean, he could still make it very inconvenient for me to get the year's leave providing the money according to my orginal agreement.

Maintaining myself in the position as dean is not my concern because I was aware of the indefiniteness of tenure in that position when I accepted Dr. Bond's offer in the spring of 1939, but I am concerned with the year's leave with financial assistance. I have the rank of professor so that carries with it tenure.

I talked with Dr. Bond about the situation in which I am placed when the "news" first came out in the paper and I explained the difficulties of the situation as I have explained them here asking him to arrange it so that if there was any question whatsoever about my getting the money from the College as per our agreement, I could get it from the Rosenwald Fund. He assured me that I did not have anything to worry about that I could hold the College to the letter of contract with his signature. I was not altogether satisfied with that because I can vision the situation as it is likely to develop when I get ready to leave on September 1.

I have served this institution well, both the private junior college for seven years and the state supported institution for six years; whatever progressive developments there are here for which the College has gained nationwide publicity is due in no little measure to the firm foundation which I have helped to build and I am asking, in view of the service that I have rendered here, that I be given the assurance of financial assistance through the Rosenwald Fund to the extent of \$2100.00 or the original \$2400.00 that I asked for for study hext year, should there arise any question about my leave and my getting the money through the College. Just about every member of the original faculty that started in 1939 and certainly the group that was here in 1940 have received financial assistance for study either during the summers or during the quarters of the regular school year when they were away or during the full years that they were off except me. Why I have never been able to understand, except that the president may have relied on my conscientiousness and reliability in the conduct of the school's program and was not willing for me to leave. I have had only one quarter off during the regular school year and that quarter was financed by myself, in spite of my asking for financial assistance; others who were away the same quarter received assistance, but I did not.

I ask that you give favorable consideration to the request that I make, even if it reaches the point of a complete break with the institution which I would hate to have to do, for one does not easily break with something he has helped to build for 13 years and for which one has developed a fond affection because he has stuck to this his first and only job for that period of time.


On the basis of the service that I have rendered to this institution, I ask that if there is any refusal on the part of the new administration to grant me the year's leave with the financial assistance agreed upon from the College, even if it means a complete breaking away from the institution to get what I feel that I deserve, I can depend upon the Rosenwald Fund for assistance for the year of study to the extent of \$2100.00 or the \$2400.00 originally requested.





Dear Mr. Troup: I had a visit this morning from Mr. Lawrence
Jones who came by to talk with me about his
proposed study this spring and summer at the Museum School here
in Chicago. He said that he had seen you in Fort Valley recently
and that you were hoping to enroll him on the staff again this
coming fall.

Mr. Jones said that yesterday he was approved on the G. I. Bill of Rights to attend the Museum School where his tuition and materials would be paid for by the government. He expects, also, to receive a grant of \$75 a month for living expenses. He reported, however, that the Army people with whom he has been dealing expect that it will be over a month before any money will be available to him. He told me that his funds are now very low and that he would like to borrow something from us in order to keep going until the government monthly allewance comes through. I told him that it would be difficult for us to arrange a loan, but I suggested to him that we make a grant of \$100 to tide him over this immediate period. However, I said that I would not want to do this without first stating the case to you in order that you could give your reaction and approval. If you think it the right thing to do, would you be willing to let me know immediately in order that Mr. Jones might get his check by the first of next week.

I am sorry that I have not been able to get to see you, but will write at length on that in a day or two.

Dear Mr. Wale:

I have been considering the possibility of asking the Board of Regents for a leave of absence for the Spring quarter in order that I might return to Ohio State for the purpose of completing my dissertation.

Last summer my adviser was so busy that he found very little time to work directly with me; hence I was assigned to two of his assistants who did the best they could under the circumstances. 
