# Carroll County Workshop

Dear Doctor Bond: I have just written to Miss Sanders and said I hoped that we could do something to help her so that her workshop plans would not fall through this summer. I have also telephoned Mr. Gomillion of Tuskegee, asking him if he could lend us a capable person to work with Miss Sanders, and we are thinking of a possible third person in music and recreation, whom she wanted to bring from Jackson College. I have indicated that I would be willing to help bring these people and pay their expenses in order to make the workshop go. The reason for this letter therefore is to ask you whether you would be willing to approve these people when they are finally engaged so that the workshop can have standing and its participants, the necessary credits from a state institution. Perhaps you can only affirm this in the general, and specifically when you hear who the individuals are. I am hoping that the young woman from Tuskegee will be Miss Minnie Woods, whom you may remember. Max brought her from Atlanta University some years ago to spearhead some of his country school programs.

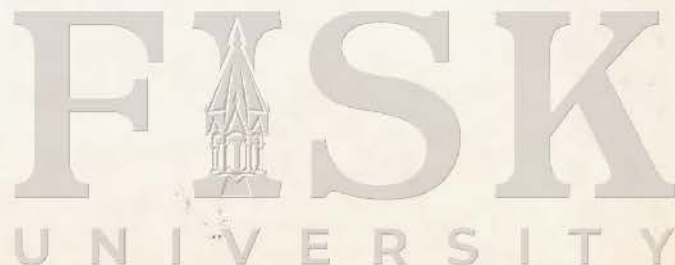
I hope you will hear more of this later either from Mr. Gomillion or Miss Sanders directly.

# Carroll County Workshop

May 9, 1945

Dear Miss Sanders: I received a copy of the letter that Doctor Bond wrote you on May 3 and I was quite disappointed, particularly since he seemed to be rather optimistic in his earlier letter to you. I am wondering what might be done about it that would be practical and helpful to you. Do you know anyone you could ask to come and spend the workshop period with you whom Doctor Bond would "approve" as a member of his faculty in the event any of your teachers should need college credits? This leadership, that is, you, this additional person, and a third person whom you hope might come from Jackson College in music and recreation, would be quite adequate unless you were swamped with numbers. That would be adequate leadership up to twenty, don't you think? Particularly this would be true if you could get Miss Tietje or others from the college to spend a stated number of hours during the period with you.

Of course, the problem is to try to find the person. Everyone who is interested is concerned with his own problem. Tuskegee, for example. Able leadership there is somewhat fastened on the spot. However, there are one or two people whom we might be able to interest.

I have just talked with Mr. Gomillion on the telephone and he tells me that Mrs. Maggie Young Forte is coming over to Carrollton to visit with you in a short time. She is going to get the details from you and suggest to Mr. Gomillion who might be suitable. If Tuskegee can make the arrangements, I would hope that Miss Minnie Woods can join you. She is an able person and would do a grand job. I have told Mr. Gomillion that I will help with the expenses of anyone who can come over.

Dear Mr Wale:

Regarding the proposed workshop in Carroll county, I had already told Miss Sanders when I saw her in Atlanta last Tuesday, May 8, that I feared we could not operate this enterprise this summer.

This is for two reasons: the first is, the difficulty of personnel. The state Committee on Teacher Education, with which you are familiar, has set up certain requirements for standardizing workshops, and among these that it lists, two members of the regular faculty of an institution should be assured with any workshop. We already have three to operate this summer, and with a very large summer school in prospect for our campus, the great difficulty of getting personnel for this makes an additional undertaking seem inadvisable.

The second is, the before mentioned Committee on Teacher Education makes a considerable point of careful planning for these enterprises. A meeting is being held in Atlanta today by representatives of the different institutions concerned with workshop opportunities. It is partially with the advice of Mr Lester that I was led to tell Miss Sanders that we would be unable to participate in her enterprise.

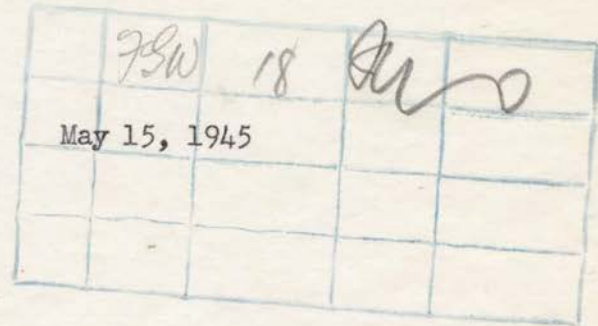

Dear Marvin: A note from Horace Mann Bond tells of some difficulties that he experiences in "sponsoring" a workshop that might be set up this summer at Carroll County. When I was in Carrollton about three months ago, Mrs. Sanders asked me if I thought Doctor Bond would lend his support to such a plan, and I said perhaps if she wrote him and I wrote him also, we might win his interest. We did, and at first he thought it was possible. Recently, because of lack of people to put there and for other reasons, he has turned it down.

I have a feeling that Miss Sanders thinks we have shown considerable interest in the white schools in Carroll County and not much interest in helping Negro school teachers and children there. In part I think there is some justification for this. Miss Tietje and Miss Pennington are helping Miss Sanders with the work now, however, and I think there is more chance of its being developed under Miss Sanders' direction than formerly. An important part of her interest is the development of an in-service program there, and I wish it were possible for us to capitalize on this interest this summer.

When Doctor Bond wrote a week ago that he could not find people, I made some inquiries of Mr. Gomillion at Tuskegee, asking him if he could spare a top-notch person to work with Miss Sanders. I believe also that a well-qualified person in music and recreation may come to her from Jackson College through her former connection with that institution. I wrote Doctor Bond about this possibility and asked him if he thought, with three such leaders (that is, Miss Sanders, a qualified person from Tuskegee, and another from Jackson College), he would be able to give some accreditation to the young women who enrolled

in the Carroll County workshop. Today, however, I have a note from him which indicates that he does not think it can go through. One reason he suggests is that the Committee on Teacher Education makes a considerable point of careful planning in these enterprises. He states that a meeting was held in Atlanta a few days ago concerning workshops and that probably any planning for the Carroll County workshop should have come into the picture at that time. Do you think this means that it is too late to help Miss Sanders?

Perhaps I should have written you and Bob about it at the same time that I dropped a note to Doctor Bond. I knew, of course, about the planning you and John were making on workshops for white teachers but had not heard of any similar planning for Negro teachers at the county level. I did not mean to commit an oversight; I guess I thought that calling Doctor Bond's attention to it was the most direct and simplest thing to do.

I think you know me well enough to know that I do not intend to get out of line or make suggestions that do not go through the regular channels. I think the important thing here is that Miss Sanders is very eager to build up her staff, and it probably needs it very much. I hope we can capitalize on this eagerness. If it is not too late to put her into the summer workshop planning, I do not think I need to say that I am ready to underwrite any expenses involved on the grounds that we have a responsibility to put some help into the Carroll County Negro schools as well as into the white. I did tell Doctor Bond and Miss Sanders that if funds were needed to bring the other two people to the workshop, I was ready to give that support.

I am writing you this note because Doctor Bond mentioned you in his letter. Will you share it with Bob?

I believe the dates of the workshop will be from June 11 on, for four or five weeks, but by now you may already have heard from Miss Sanders.

We were able to find only one person in home economics - Miss E. Doreen Jolly, Clark College, S. W., Atlanta 3, Georgia - and two people in economics. They are Mr. Abraham L. Harris, 1820 California Street, N. W., Washington 9, D. C., and Miss Phyllis Annie Wallace, 1919 Third Street, N. W., Washington, D. C.

Dear Mr. Wale: It is probably the better part of valor to abandon all hope for a workshop here this summer. Saturday I went to Tuskegee, talked at length with Mr. Gomillion and Miss Wood. Both were understanding, considerate and helpful. I believe that we got somewhere in the course of our discussion except that the matter had finally to be passed on by the credit committee, the registrar, the administrative dean, etc. Monday I talked with Mr. Cousins in Atlanta and called Mr. L.M. Lester from Carrollton on Tuesday. They agree that not enough time has been put into planning for the workshop to insure "quality," to guarantee a proper galaxy of visiting consultants, to be able to produce a mimeographed report of the workshop that will reflect sufficient glory on the sponsoring institution. Their stand is unduly flattering to us in view of our simple needs. Their stand is firm enough to indicate that the teachers might meet difficulty in having Tuskegee credits evaluated in Georgia colleges. Both officials spoke of our starting right away to importune Fort Valley to regard us favorably another year. Numerically we could not compare with whole systems or urban centers and Fort Valley may have to consider economics in granting requests. We still might not want the disintegrating effect of a horde of consultants and might look upon publication and circulation of what-went-on as a fairly minor concern. Little teachers and little children are in the trough now while big and spectacular things such as Health and Education for Production and the like ride the crest. There is hope, of course, in this rhythm.

Thank you for having gone all the way with us. When you are here again I'd like to discuss with you some plans for trying to reach the same ends by another approach to the problem. That will likely be in the fall since I'll be leaving the first week in June for vacation. (Not for anything but the workshop would I give up having my ten months with the county consecutive!)

I have written to Mr. Gomillion and to Mr. Reddix stating that we found it advisable to abandon plans for a workshop this summer and expressing appreciation for their cooperation.

Thank you again. We are all wishing you luck in relocating your home. Miss Tietje mentioned that this would prevent your returning here soon.

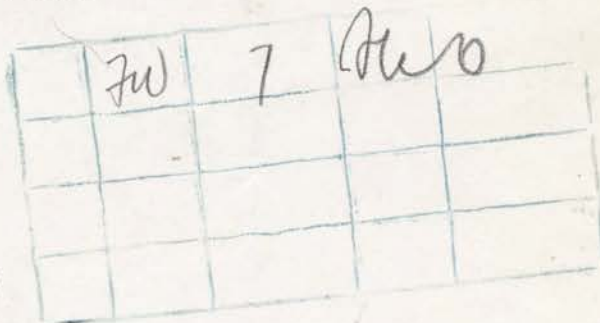

Our schools, at least some of them, are receiving fuel from the county for the first time. The weather has been wretched, too wet for cotton-picking, so attendance is very low, discouragingly so.

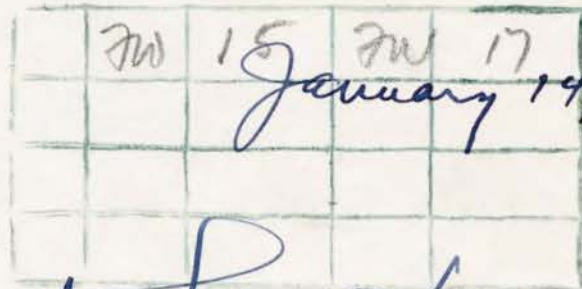

You will probably be interested in the fate of the supervisory program in the Carroll County Negro Schools. The letter inclosed, - a copy of one which I received from Mr. McGiboney in today's mail - tells as much as I know.

I have not asked for more salary, as a statement in the letter might lead you to believe. Mr. McGiboney means that the Board cannot invest \$860 in 23 schools, 40 teachers, 1400+ children. You may or may not know the sources of salary: From State funds 12 x \$153.50 (monthly salary of Ga. Negro teacher holding professional certificate based on 5 years of college

work and having 8 years teaching experience)  
= \$1842.00 From State for supervisor holding  
supervisor's five-year certificate and Master's  
Degree \$576 provided at least \$576 is ~~provided~~ <sup>contributed</sup>  
from local funds. Until last year the supplement  
from the Rosenwald Fund through West Georgia <sup>\$860.</sup>  
filled the requirement from local funds. This  
past year the county paid half of the \$860.  
Now it would have to assume the entire amount.  
The Jeanes Fund contributes \$100.

I do not know what other services  
were expendable. The Regional Library was  
without appropriation when I left Carrollton.  
A graduate chapter of a Negro sorority in  
Atlanta has plans to give us a real  
bookmobile plus \$800 for books. Health  
service seems assured. The County seemed  
about to arrive. I'd rather leave any  
other time than now. Those barracks buildings  
have not been erected and some one will  
have to follow through with the people.
