

He wants to remain at the University through the summer quarter, that is, through August instead of through May. We could, of course, not advise him what to do, for we felt that his plans should be determined in large part (1) by whether or not you wanted him to return to Fort Valley, and (2) by whether you wanted him there for the

summer or were willing for him to report in September.

When we discussed a fellowship for him you suggested that we give him \$1,800. For reasons we explained at the time we gave him only \$1,600. If he stays here through August he will need the difference between these two figures or he will have to borrow funds to meet his needs.

We gave him no assurance that we could provide the additional amount he has requested but, if you think it advisable to do so, we'll do what we can about it.

There is no desire or intention on our part to get assurance of a job for Mr. Brown at Fort Valley. We simply want to know your judgment and wishes in the matter before we make further commitments to him.

Dear Mr. Dixon:

I have just written Mr. Embree, last week, with reference to the scholarship situation here for next year. I am sending you a copy of that letter.

I should not like to say anything definite to Mr. Brown until I can find out what is to be done about Mr. Troup. I do hope a scholarship can be given to Mr. Troup, and if at all possible, to one of the other persons mentioned. Regarding Mr. Brown's financial needs, let me say that he was given an opportunity, last summer, to earn some extra money through student solicitation which he did excellent(well. At the present time, let me say that I shall be very glad to have Mr. Brown back.

I may be frank with you in saying that one little matter has come up to cause me some discomfiture. It was in the matter of a Hunt Memorial Fund of which Mr. Brown was serving as Treasurer last year. It has developed through correspondence that Mr. Brown, if not actually putting me in a position, (with a slightly psychopathic leader of Colored Women's Clubs in the State) of prosecuting this endeavor zealously, of at least slightly aiding and abetting in this impression.

If Mr. Troup can be given a fellowship we can insert Mr. Brown right into his place. We can then easily use both of them the year after as the program of the College expands. Right now, we are in danger, with only a fourth year coming up, of becoming top-heavy with persons trained for educational administration.

In short, let me express again the hearty wish that Mr. Troup might be given a fellowship and that Mr. Brown may return to us in the Fall or Summer. If you can give Mr. Troup an extra stipend to cover the cost of the Summer and Fall sessions we would be very happy to have Mr. Brown come back during the Summer. Please let me know what possibilities there are in this direction.







Brown is a graduate student at the University of Chicago working toward the Doctor's degree in the Department of Education. The Department, on the recommendation of Mr. Brown's advisory committee, has approved his proposal for a Doctoral dissertation dealing with the problem of Negro high schools. As chairman of Mr. Brown's advisory committee I may say that we think his investigation is significant and likely to throw important light on the general problem of secondary education for Negroes. To pursue the investigation he has planned, Mr. Brown should visit a number of Negro high schools. On the advice of his committee he has laid out a plan to visit some twenty schools to collect certain information at first hand and to check on the reliability of the data he is obtaining from other sources. Mr. Brown informs me that he has applied to the Rosenwald Fund for a grant to cover his extra expenses in doing this field work. Those of us in the Department of Education who know him and the plans he is making are of the opinion that the contribution resulting from his dissertation will be well worth the investment of as much as \$200, the approximate amount which would be required to finance his expenses in the field of investigation. 




