Dear Mrs. Rosenwald: Our Fellowship Committee went very thoroughly into the case of James Theodore Ward. In the end, he was not among those who received the relatively small number of awards. In all cases of creative work, such as music or drama, we have special juries which consider the evidence in the given fields. This jury rated Ward's work as good but not distinguished. In spite of the fact that a play of his is being considered for production, it did not seem to the jury that his work was much above the "popular" level.

One other consideration: our fellowships are intended to give an opportunity to younger people to prove themselves. Mr. Ward is forty-four years old and has been doing work which has already indicated his potentialities. These were among the considerations which kept him from that very small group to whom fellowships were finally awarded.

I am enclosing herewith a list of the awards for this year which I think may be of interest to you. We appreciate very much your having called our attention to this interesting candidate.
