Dear Mr. Simon:

I am enclosing a tentative plan for the Teacherage that we hope to build. After discussing it with the people of the community, I have decided that we can build a frame building cheaper than the log-cabin type. I have about half of the trees promised that will be needed in the framing and weather-boarding. It is my plan to use rough weather-boarding and use a creosote stain instead of paint. I have the bill of materials worked out also. Both of these will need checking. I do not have my drawing instruments with me, hence I was not able to draw the plan to scale as accurately as I should, but I think that you will find it very nearly correct. I used my fountain pen in inking it, but I believe that you will be able to make it out all right.

The sight of some tangible contribution on the part of the Fund will be of great help to us. I think that we will be able to obtain a site for the house that will be near to the school grounds but not on the campus proper. I believe that I shall have to buy the land, but it should be at a rate of ten dollars an acre, and I plan to use one-fourth of an acre. The owner is not willing to give it, but he is to tell me on Monday next, just what his price will be.

We have had very heavy rains during the week that have hampered our efforts to get in tough with the people of the community. I have about five other people whom I think will give the remainder of the timber needed. I believe that if we buy the millwork and roofing and the hardware from Sears Roebuck, we can get by for about three hundred and fifty dollars. We will be able to get the labor gratis.

I shall be glad to hear from you in regard to this matter. I shall keep you advised concerning the progress that I am able to make. Remember me to Mrs. Simon, and don't forget the Barbecue.

Dear Mr. Simon:

The local sawmill will saw the logs for us at the rate of five dollars a thousand feet. This price is about two dollars and fifty cents lower than the usual cost. I have the promise of five logs from the owner of the sawmill. We cannot get any lumber sawn before the middle of October. I am of the opinion that it will be better to wait until the end of the "gathering" season to begin any active work toward the teacherage. After that time, we shall be able to get both timber and labor. In that case, it will be about the 15th of November, but if we began work at that time, we should be able to complete it during the present year and have it ready for occupancy January 1.

If we can get the millwork from Sears, it should be possible to build the house for three hundred dollars in cash in addition to the lumber we can secure in the community.

We have not, as yet, had any information concerning our project. I believe that it will be approved in Washington, provided it has been sent in as we were informed. If it moves as slowly as other W. P. A. projects are moving, I think we can expect it to be completed about July 1. I hope to be able to speed the work along as soon as the beginning is made.

I have received the material, journals and books. I appreciate your kindness in sending them.

I shall be glad to give what time I can to the Negro school. I expect to see Miss Cheney during the present week. There is little that I can do in the time that I have, but I may be of some help.

I shall be glad to hear from you again concerning the teacherage, and I shall keep you informed concerning the project and the teacherage.

He proposes to build this teacherage from donated lumber, plus \$350 for mill work, roofing, and hardware, the labor to be supplied free. In scaling off the size of the rooms, the kitchen appears to be 6' x 8'. To me this seems to be entirely too small.

Do you have an architect in Nashville who could draw a plan of which the arrangement would be superior to this one without increasing the cost of construction? If you have, I would appreciate your having him draw up a blueprint as was done for the Red Oak Teacherage.

I am sorry I did not have an opportunity to see more of you at the trustees' meeting but I am still promising myself a visit to Nashville one of these days.

Thank you for taking care of Bud Junker. I have just received a letter from him singing your praises.

Under separate cover I am mailing you today four Dear Ralph: copies of a blueprint of the proposed plan for the Fair Play teacherage. The only revision we have made in this plan is to increase the size of the kitchen. This, it seems to me, is highly important as this room will need to be reasonably large if the teachers hope to carry on any sort of food preservation for their own use or for the education of the community.

The foundation plan calls for a native stone solid foundation. This would be very nice except that it demands a tremendous amount of labor as well as running up the cost of materials by adding somewhere around 125 bags of cement. I should think that with a double floor you ought to be able to keep reasonably warm with pier foundations - at least temporarily. Then at some time in the future, if you are still there, or whoever is there, you could fill in the intervening space between the piers.

The bill of materials which you submitted is about the same as the bill worked out by the Nashville architect. I have pencilled in figures on a copy of your bill of materials: the cost of various items which have to be purchased. These costs are based on Sears Roebuck prices f.o.b. the mill. You might make up a list of materials that can be purchased through Sears and submit it to their Atlanta office for an estimate on detailed prices.

Look this plan over and let me know what you think of the vision. Also, check your costs and see if you can actually build this place for the amount of money you estimate.



Dear Mr. Simon:

I have checked the blueprint of the Teacherage and I think that the change is an excellent one. In my drawing, I made the kitchen rather small osing to the fact that the need of two bedrooms and the large living room made it difficult for me to keep the cost down. I am returning my drawing to you as you requested.

I have submitted the bill of materials to the Atlanta office of Sears, but I have not received their quotations as yet. I feel sure that we should be able to build the house for about \$300. Mr. Brown has promised the land. As soon as we can say definitely what we can do, I believe that there will be no trouble in getting the deed to the lot.

I shall send you Sears bid on the bill of materials as soon as I receive it and check it.

In my opinion, we made a mistake in not putting a door from the kitchen to the outside. I have marked it on my plan, and would like to know what you think of it. It would be undesirable to be carrying garbage through the living room every day. It would not be necessary to make and changes In the blueprint, and it would not raise the cost of the building.



Dear Margot:

I have at last completed negotiations with Sears for the material needed in the construction of the Teacherage. They had badly misinformed me concerning certain items, namely windows and roofing. Their bid on 15 squares of roofing was quoted as for 15 bundles whereas 30 bundles were needed. Their bid on windows was for windows alone, and I had asked for a bid on windows, frames and hardware. That upset my plan to hold the building to \$300 or \$350.

Inasmuch as most of this correspondence has been with Jim, and he is not in Chicago at the present time I am taking the liberty of troubling you with a few of my ideas. I find that I can omit the plumbing items and substitute pine flooring (for finishing) for oak flooring. That will let me out for about \$300, or \$350. Now it seems to me that if this house is to be sort of a model home toward which people of the community can work, it should have a bath tub at least to say nothing of a kitchen sink. We can use hardwood paint on the floor and make it very attractive. Could we raise the amount Somewhat? You realize what it will be worth to the house to spend just a little more.

The canning plant is proving very satisfactory. It has been a very poor season for garden crops, or any sort for that matter. I have a connection with nne wholesale house that will handle our goods after this year. They would take them this year, but the quality is very poor on account of the drouth. We are now in the midst of a tropical storm that is giving us our first general rain since April!

I am enclosing a letter from Mr. Glass concerning the project on the school house. I went over to Athens July 27th, and made the guy very angry with me, and this is the letter I get in reply. Why didn't It happen some time ago? I never thought of making a fellow angry to get something from him. That is another one for the book.

The logs are being carried to the saw mill. I am sure that we shall have the lumber ready by the end of next week. We shall also get the foundation ready next week. I am going ahead with the plans to build the house if I have nothing but a shell. I think, however, that we can get a fairly complete house. The main trouble is that we have called on these people for a great deal of money and materials recently and in addition there will have to be about \$500 shelled out to start this project. They put up \$65 for the cannery, and we are getting about 6000 ft. of lumber for the teacherage. Oh yes, the Womans club put up an additional \$25 for the canning plant, which brings the total for the canning plant up to \$90. I think I am going to get more too.

I suppose you saw in the papers that we are to have free text books in Georgia next year. Talmadge is using that for ammunition in his losing battle for the Senate. The Beer law which was carried in an election two mears ago provided the funds, and he takes the credit for it. At any rate pupils through the sixth grades will be furnished heading, Writing, Arithmetic, and spelling books. I think however that Talmadge is about to die an awfub political death about September 9th.

I believe that covers the things of interest in Fair Play at the moment. I can do a fair job on the teacherage for the \$350, but I can do a much better job for \$425. It will be complete in almost every detail. I shall leave out the oak floors and make the pine substitution regardless of an addition to the Fund's contribution.

P. S. I am enclosing a copy of the blue print as I have changed it to make it both more convenient, and liveable. You will notice that Lockman's room will have a private entrance, and can be locked from the rest of the house. I shall enclose a copy of the other one for comparison. The change has not made the cost of the house any higher.



I have not received a reply from Sears so that I can not give you a definite sum for that part of our expense in building this teacherage. It will be in the neighborhood of \$300 including freight. This order covers the materials checked on the enclosed order blanks.

\$350.00 was set up by the Fund for the purpose of aiding in the construction of the Teacherage. As you remember I had obtained a bid from Sears on the materials the would be able to furnish us and they made a mistake of #83.60 in their estimate. This mistake was made as I explained to you Wednesday. They quoted 15 squares of Shingles at the price of 15 bundles. They also quoted window sets at the price of windows. I am enclosing each bid so that you may make the comparison. This mistake of Seats caused me to make my estimate just that amount lower than we can actually get by with. I should have made an error of about \$50.00 but we could have handled that amount by advancing the rent for one year.

We have contracted to spend about \$300.00 of our budget for this job. With the amount left and the advance on the rent, we shall cut the above figure about \$100.00, and

as you will notice we shall still be about \$100.00 short of the required amount.

I have completed the task of hauling logs to the mill and we have all but about one thousand feet of the lumber on the ground. The remainedr will be hauled tomorrow. We are to begin the work Monday morning. These logs have been given by the people representing ten homes in the community. I was able to get all but two people who have pines to contribute. The Herren's did not put anything in, but it was the general concensus of opinion that we should not ask them for logs, hence I didn't. I have only one negative answer, and that from the Honorable Harry Brown, Esquire, general pain in the neck. To say the least, the lumber is ready, and the community is ready to see something happen. Work begins Monday.

Mr. Peacock, of the W. P. A., came out last night and practically begged me to let him begin our project. I, of course, welcomed him into the fold and we promptly made the plans for work to begin on or about Sept. 5th. He promised to put three or four carpenters, and about nine intermediate and unskilled men on the job. He says that we do not have to put any labor on the job. After threatening, begging, and the like, we get something like this. All that I have to do is get the bill of materials ready, have the blue prints made, and tell him what I want done, and he will be glad to do it, so he says. We shall see.

This brings up a point that is very pertinent at this time. The people of this community, and others, have promised some \$700 for this project. It is very easy, of course, to say that somewhere in the dim, distant future, you will give, let's say, \$25, for you doubt seriously whether or not you will ever have to pay it. Now that the time has come. I am a bit shaky on the reaction that is sure to come from some of these kindly, dollar-loving, Talmadge-supporting residents of Fair Play. I had not part in taking this subscription but upon me will probably fall the task of collecting it. That is a particularly bad point, because I have been begging money for the canning plant, and logs for the Teacherage all summer. Some of the people feel that they have given all they can give, although they are benefiting themselves, and really haven't given much actual cash. I feel perfectly sure that the possibility of raising an additional hundred dollars is indeed very slim. Also, it is planned to build this canning plant during the fall, and that will call for additional donations by or from the Rascobs and Duponts of this community. Now the question is, will they take this large dose at one swallow? It seems almost incredible that we have been able to go along as well as we have. Yet, it is done, and I am still in perfect safety and in no danger of being chased out. I'd much

rather have seen this W. P. A. project fail to get through. That may be a peculiar statement, and I guess it is, but it certainly is coming at a very bad time in my opinion. It is another iron that I am afraid will put out the fire. I was keeping the others hot. If, however, it is possible for the Fund to make this additional contribution to the Teacherage, it may be that I shall have no trouble in getting all of the work completed and still be in good favor locally. I think it was a very nice gesture of appreciation that the community appreciated too, when the Fund agreed to put \$350.00 into the house, but now that we are falling short by about \$100.00 owing to Sears midtake, I wonder what the reaction of the community would be if we asked them to add this money. I may get around it, but it would be very comforting to know that I dimn't have to raise the money.

This letter is much longer than I expected it to be, but I believe that I have completely stated the case. I shall deeply appreciate the additional help if it can be given.

Mr. Owen calmly announced this week that school will open August 31st, but it is the plan of the community to defer the opening of Fair Play until about one month later.

Tomorrow I am running away for a day. I plan to spend about a half-day trying to tease some of the large-mouth, black bass onto my line. I must be back ready for work Monday after my vacation, most of which will be spent on the road. There is too much work ahead for me to be away longer at this time.

I'll try to have all facts in hand when I receive your reply.



Dear Mr. Owen: The plans for the Fairplay teacherage have gone forward far enough so that we feel it necessary to check with you on several matters concerning it. It is a rule with us not to furnish monies for buildings of any sort unless these buildings are held in fee simple by the county board of education. Will you kindly inform us whether this is true in the case of the Fairplay teacherage?

In order to maintain the teacherage it is understood that the teachers will pay a rental of \$5 per month. This should be the entire cost for living in the teacherage. That is to say, if one teacher uses the teacherage the rental is \$5. if two teachers use it the rental will also be \$5. as we believe that \$60 a year is a sum sufficient to carry the maintenance and repairs on the building. In order to be certain that the monies collected for rental will not be used for any purpose other than the maintenance of the teacherage, it will be advisable for the county board of education to pass a resolution to that effect, also to keep these funds in a separate bank account. This may seem to you to be unnecessary. However, we cannot be sure that either you or the present county board will be in power indefinitely and in order to protect our interest in the enterprise we feel this to be the proper procedure. We are already using this method at the Red Oak school in Henry County, Georgia.

In the case of Fairplay it will be necessary for us to advance the first year's rental to Mr. Gaskins in order that he may finish the teacherage since the funds allowed for its construction will not cover the cost. We, therefore, will deduct from Mr. Gaskins' monthly salary the sum of \$5 until this \$60 amount is returned to us. After this sum has been returned the rental should be paid to the county through your office. The first rental due the county will be paid October 1, 1937.

I am sorry that I did not have an opportunity to get down to Madison to discuss these things with you. We are anxious to have these technicalities cleared up before we pay anything for construction costs. We hope to get down to Georgia sometime late in September and will plan on seeing you at that time. With best regards to Mrs. Owen and your daughter.

Dear Ralph: This is in reply to your letter of August 14th. As I look over the expenses for building the teacherage as you have them outlined, it appears that you have spent or are about to spend a total of \$500.68; this without any sort of plumbing. The Fund agreed originally to provide \$350 which, with a year's rent at \$5 a month, makes available a total of \$410 for the teacherage. I have talked with Mr. Embree and he has agreed to supply an additional \$100 providing the teacherage can be completed for this sum.

It is too bad that you cannot arrange for some kind of plumbing. However, the Fund does not feel that it can put any more into the project. I can't figure out how you can have exceeded the original budget by \$150. Sears made a mistake of \$83.60, which leaves an amount of some \$70 unaccounted for. Was this a failure on your part to account for all necessary materials?

In looking over the plan for the teacherage more carefully than I did at Fair Play I am amazed to discover that there is not a single flue in the bedrooms or kitchen. I have no idea how you expect to keep warm during the winter and I don't believe it can be done. Also, although you now possess an oil stove, someone in the future may much prefer to have a wood or coal range. Maybe you have figured on these outlets but I'll be hanged if I can see them on the plan. It is possible that you may work a triple flue through the fireplace chimney, which would handle a fireplace, the bedroom immediately behind it and the kitchen. At any rate it is important that you come to a decision on this matter before the house is built.

I have written Mr. Owen concerning the ownership of the teacherage and I expect that he will be out to see you and the women's club within a short time. Our position in the matter is this: the Fund has never given any money toward the construction of buildings unless they were to be held in fee simple by the county. Therefore, it seems advisable for Mr. Owen to approach the women's club and tell them the circumstances upon which we are permitted to contribute funds, without your being involved in the matter. It was clearly understood

by the people of the community at the time we discussed the construction of the teacherage that we would not build a teacherage or contribute towards one unless the land was held by the county as a part of the public school system. I have put my letter to Mr. Owen in the form of a question so that you will not be held responsible for telling me that the women's club is joint owner of the property. We all feel here that it is important to place the responsibility for the maintenance of the teacherage in the hands of a single party and it is logical that the county superintendent should be this person.

I have also explained to Mr. Owen that it would be necessary for us to use the first year's rent for the completion of the teacherage and that it was up to him to have passed by the county board of education a resolution to the effect that any monies paid in as rental shall be used only for the maintenance of the teacherage, and by teacherage I do not mean new windows for the school or a new fence for the school or anything else for the school. This money also should be controlled by the county superintendent and the county board of education.


What you are going to do about collecting the money for the alterations to the school is a point upon which I can offer very little advice. As previously stated, we are prepared to add an additional \$100 to the teacherage which will take that off of your mind and not out of the community's pocketbook. It is exceedingly important that you have the money for the repairs to the school before any work is done. If you do not, it is very apt to put us in an awkward position; for the people from whom you purchase materials will naturally assume that the Rosenwald Fund will protect them and we will not. The repairs to the school are a community proposition in which we take merely a fatherly interest. I believe that it will probably be most advisable to place the collection of this money in the hands of a committee of local people. They agreed to raise the money, now let them go out and get it.

I trust you got some fish last weekend. My best regards to the family.

Dear Jim:

It is certainly a relief to know that an additional hundred dollars is available for the Teacherage. I cannot say just how or why the mistake of about \$150.00. The first estimate was made in haste, and without considering the cost of screens, tar paper, and ceiling. The latter was not included, because the local saw mill operator said that he could cut the ceiling, but since that time, he has decided that perhaps his planer is not in shape to properly cut it.

It is too bad that plumbing cannot be included in the original plan, but I think that it will be possible to add the plumbing with the second years rent, or by funds of the woman's club. I shall certainly keep that in the minds of the members of the club.

The flues for the bed rooms were not put on the plan, but a flw will be placed in each room. I plan a separate flue for the kitchen and the spare room, and our room will have a flue in the main chimney. I think that if I can get a circulating heater, I shall be able to heat the place satisfactorily from the living room. Certainly the kitchen will need aflue to take care of cooking if and when we change from oil to coal or wood.

I am sure that we shall be able to handle the ownership of the teacherage without difficulty. You are quite right in saying that the county superintendent should handle the funds.

The W. P. A. engineer was out here this morning. We are hoping to begin the work next week. We are delaying the opening of school for a week to allow a little more time for the teacherage to be completed, and to see just what plans can be made to take care of the school question during the constructing of the work room. I told the engineer that he must make it clear the chairman of the county commissioners that the Fund was not backing the project with any Funds.




Under separate cover, I mailed some bills for materials to be used in the Teacherage.




After waiting for some time, I received from Sears the itemized list of the order recently purchased from them. I am enclosing this bill for your files.





There is a possibility that the teacherage might be used as a community house. If an arrangement of this sort is reached with the community it seems only fair that in keeping with the spirit of the agreement made with the Fund some provision should be made for a yearly rental in order to maintain the building and cover the insurance. Also, some provision in the agreement should be made to protect the Women's Club from pressures brought by individuals to rent the building for domestic purposes, for I'm sure that an attempt would be made to do just that. From what I understand the Women's Club is much less democratic than a truly community organization should be. If this is true, the teacherage, under the control of the Club, might easily become the gathering place of a social clique and lose all its community value. It might even be a contributing factor in further splitting the community. However, you know the local situation much better than I. The above suggestions are merely thrown into the hopper for consideration before you make final disposition of the building.

Mrs. Simon and I are planning on being in Georgia during the latter part of June. I will try to get down to see you sometime during our stay.




clearly understood by the people of the community at the time we discussed the construction of the teacherage that we would not build a teacherage or contribute towards one unless the land was held by the county as a part of the public school system. I have put my letter to Mr. Owen in the form of a question so that you will not be held responsible for telling me that the Women's Club is joint owner of the property. We all feel here that it is important to place the responsibility for the maintenance of the teacherage in the hands of a single party and it is logical that the county superintendent should be this person."

On my next trip to Georgia Mr. Gaskins gave me to understand that the whole question had been discussed with the community group, that they appreciated our position, and that they were prepared to sign over their interest in the teacherage as soon as the papers were made out. I trust that this was done because with the teacherage in the hands of the county I see no way in which any individual can take possession unless the county closes the school and sells the teacherage. If this were to happen I would feel that the county was morally bound to repay us the money we have invested in the teacherage, as well as to repay the Women's Club the \$80 which it has put into the teacherage.

According to our records we made an original grant of \$350 for the construction of the teacherage. Later Mr. Gaskins informed us that this would be insufficient so we made a further grant of \$100. Still later it was apparent that even this additional sum would not cover all of the costs. In my letter of August 18, 1936, I requested you to allow Mr. Gaskins to use the first year's rental for the completion of the teacherage. In addition we advanced a sum of \$139.83, which was to be deducted from future rentals during such time as we maintained our interest in Fairplay. In total we supplied \$543.83, and the Women's Club supplied \$80, making the total cost of the teacherage \$623,83. This amount should be kept in mind if the county board should contemplate selling the property.





Dear Mr. Owen: Mr. Dixon has written me that certain rumors about the teacherage at Fairplay have been going around. He understands that Mr. Tommy Adair has some idea of getting possession of the teacherage. This information was given him by Miss Lockman. He has also told me that you are still undecided as to what you are going to do with the Fairplay school next year. We at the Fund are naturally interested in what is done with the school and in making the best use of the teacherage. I am, therefore, taking the liberty of acquainting you with the entire situation and my views on the matter.

It was my understanding that the original deed to the two acres of property on which the teacherage stands was a joint deed held in the name of the county board of education and the Women's Club at Fairplay. On August 18, 1936, I wrote you as follows:

"The plans for the Fairplay teacherage have gone forward far enough so that we feel it necessary to check with you on several matters concerning it. It is a rule with us not to furnish moneys for buildings of any sort unless these buildings are held in fee simple by the county board of education. Will you kindly inform us whether this is true in the case of the Fairplay teacherage?"

On August 21 I wrote Mr. Gaskins as follows:

"I have written Mr. Owen concerning the ownership of the teacherage and I expect that he will be out to see you and the Women's Club within a short time. Our position in the matter is this: the Fund has never given any money toward the construction of buildings unless they were to be held in fee simple by the county. Therefore, it seems advisable for Mr. Owen to approach the Women's Club and tell them the circumstances upon which we are permitted to contribute funds, without your being involved in the matter. It was

I think there is no chance for the person you mentioned to acquire this property as you indicated.

I shall give this special attention this week and write you again.
