JULIUS ROSENWALD FUND FELLOWS - 1943Negroes

- Thelma D. Ackiss: for a social-psychological study of six all-Negro communities in the State of Oklahoma, in conjunction with Mozell C. Hill.  
\$ 750
- Born 1906, Wagner, Oklahoma. Howard University, A. B., 1925, A. M., 1936, LL. B., 1931. Teacher of history and co-ordinator of social research, Langston University, Oklahoma.
- Mrs. Ackiss and Mr. Hill are analyzing the patterns of thought and behavior existing among Negroes who are completely isolated from white communities, which they feel differ from those of Negroes in racially-mixed communities.
- Mildred E. Blount: to make a set of miniature period hats to be used as an aid in costume designing, and for historical value.

- Born 1907, Edenton, North Carolina. Milliner, John-Frederics, Inc., Beverly Hills, California.
- Miss Blount has been a designer for John-Frederics, Inc., for twelve years, and has designed the hats for many period movies, her most important assignment being for the film Gone with the Wind.
- Ralph Bunche: for a study of colonial administration in the Far East, in co-operation with the Institute of Pacific Relations.

- Jeremiah Certaine: for studies in mathematics, at Harvard University. Reappointment.

- Jeremiah Certaine: Mr. Certaine's outstanding record in mathematics at Harvard University led the Committee on Fellowships to award a final grant to enable him to complete his work for the doctorate.

- Maenelle Dixon Dempsey: for a study of teacher education, especially as applied in Negro schools and colleges, at Atlanta University and the University of California.  
\$1,500 Born 1912, Newnan, Georgia. Spelman College, A. B., 1933. Jeanes supervising teacher, Bulloch County Department of Education, Georgia.
- Anna Louise de Ramus: for studies in music, especially piano, at the Juilliard School of Music.  
\$1,500 Born 1923, Montgomery, Alabama. Northwestern University, B. Mus., 1943.  
Despite her youth - she is 20 - Miss De Ramus was recommended by the music critic who served as Music Jury for the Committee on Fellowships this year as "enormously good and already a long way on the road to success".
- Alma Forrest: for a study of the conservatives and their part in the secession period of southern history, at the University of Chicago.

Mr. Lewis' able writing and direction of The Negro in Virginia, forecasts a highly interesting history of living ex-slaves.

Clinton F. Oliver: for a study of the Negro novel, at Harvard University. Reappointment.

Born 1916, Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania. College of the City of New York, A. B., 1940; Harvard University, 1940-43.

Mr. Oliver's work has so impressed his professors at Harvard University that he recently held a term appointment as a teaching assistant in the Department of English at Harvard, the first such appointment to be given to a Negro student.

Roi Ottley: for a reportorial account of colored peoples in the war.

Born 1906, New York City. University of Michigan, 1927-29; St. John's Law School, 1929-31. Free-lance writer and publicity director for the National C. I. O. Committee for American and Allied War Relief, Washington, D. C.

Mr. Ottley's recent book, New World A-Coming, was awarded Houghton Mifflin's Life-in-America prize, and is fast approaching best-seller status. He has recently been accredited by the War Department and has left for overseas to begin work under his fellowship.

Julius Henry Taylor: for studies in physics, at the University of Pennsylvania.

Charles W. White: for a series of paintings and drawings on the role of the Negro in the war, at the Art Students League of New York. Reappointment.

Born 1918, Chicago, Illinois. Art Institute of Chicago, 1937-38, and private study with Edward Millman, Briggs Dyer, and Edgar Britton.

Mr. White's continued growth as an artist was noted by the Art Jury. His Hampton mural, painted on last year's Rosenwald grant, was formally unveiled and presented to the Institute in June of 1942.

Theodore W. Winchester: for studies in labor economics, at the University of Chicago.

Hale A. Woodruff: for a group of paintings on the southern Negro.

Mr. Woodruff is characterized in Modern Negro Art as "one of the true geniuses of American painting". He is known both for his murals and for his smaller compositions. The Art Jury chose Mr. Woodruff as their Number 1 candidate for an award.

Leon E. Wright: for studies in religion, at Harvard University. Reappointment.
