Dear Mr. Harned:

The plan for the distribution of aid by the Fund on schoolhouse construction for the year 1931-32 will be to allocate such aid to the various states only on applications submitted to this office and approved for each individual school project. The schedule of type allotments for the various phases of aid is included on the attached sheets. The basis for aid on libraries will be the same as for 1930-31. The usual allotment of \$100 for expenses of the Rosenwald School Day program is available for 1931-32.

In order that we may not have any allotments tied up in applications for buildings which may not be erected, we hope that no application will be filed until a careful study has been made by your Department to determine the needs and educational program of the community, as well as to see that ample financial provisions for the building, including new modern equipment, have been made so that the work of construction may start within thirty days after an application has been returned approved. Further details of the requirements for aid will follow soon, including application blanks for 1931-32.

We have carefully revised and enlarged our Community School Plans, which will be ready for distribution soon. These will be furnished to your Department for use in any school - white or colored - on request. We hope that your State Director of Schoolhouse Construction will find time to cooperate with the State Agent in visiting each school on which the Fund gives aid a sufficient number of times to insure the high type of construction which your Department and the Fund desire. This form of cooperation is already in use in several of the states and has proven most satisfactory.

Thanking you and your Department for the fine spirit of cooperation in all phases of our work and trusting that this may be continued in the same fine way in the future, I am

Dear Mr. Tanner: I wish to give you a brief summary concerning the 1931-32 budget.

1. Our appropriation this year is on a six months' basis. We have a limited amount for this half-year period in the construction budget, and the fall docket for the second half of the year will depend to some degree on the number of satisfactory applications on file at that time in excess of the present appropriation. You can see the importance of sending in applications for aid on projects, the construction of which will be begun at an early date. If there are no communities in your state that will be ready to begin building by the late fall, you should advise us promptly, so that we may aid those communities that are now ready to erect buildings.
2. We are mailing you today a copy of Community School Plans, Revised 1931. A supply sufficient for you to send one to every county or city superintendent and to important school architects will go forward next week. More will be gladly furnished on request.
3. Aid for school libraries will be on the same basis as that of the past year. We are prepared to serve you promptly.
4. Application blanks for new transportation aid (1931-32) will be mailed you Monday. These give the necessary information as to requirements. Commitments are set up to take care of the second and third year obligations and application blanks for these will be sent later on.
5. Use only the revised plans for Rosenwald schools. Blueprints of the old plans will still be available for buildings not to be aided by the Fund.
6. If you have not made out detailed report for the year 1930-31 on the blanks sent you, please do so at once. The auditors are now checking our records and will need the information.

We assume that you are more or less familiar with the status of the Bernard School building in Fayette County which we understand is to receive the benefits when completed, inspected and approved, of \$2000 00 from the Rosenwald fund and \$1000 00 from the State.

This work which it was contemplated would be finished last summer has been dragging along with not much doing and in fact we have removed some of the materials which were being damaged by the weather.

They seem very anxious indeed to go ahead with it now but in our opinion they can not make much progress without some additional financial assistance.

We think they should let the contract for the completion of the building to some responsible person for it does not appear that they have any competent workmen among their local forces.

We are today writing Mr. Tanner to see if it is possible to get a meeting of those interested in order to work out some plan to push the work, and will appreciate your conferring with him about it, and advising us as to what you think can be done about it.

In addition to the above allotments, lump sum appropriations have been made by the Fund for (1) school-houses from seven-teacher to twelve-teacher types and (2) teachers' homes, specific allocations to be made to states by approved applications, after a careful study of each individual project.

The Fund will also consider giving for the year 1930-31, one and one-half times the regular allotment to the first Rosenwald school constructed in any county having 10% or more Negro population. There are now 101 such counties in the South with Negro populations ranging from 10% to 72%, which have not built a single school by aid of the Fund. This special offer is made with the hope of stimulating a large number of these counties to erect schools of three-teacher type or larger the current year.

The attached plan for distribution of aid shows for the year 1930-31 the schedule of allotments for all types of construction and some general requirements.

Dear Mrs. Rose: Mr. Credle and I dropped by the new Bernard school in your county late last Friday afternoon to see how they were getting along. The contractor told us that everything seemed to be in readiness to go ahead now and complete the building by June 1. I hope that you will give particular attention to this and see that it is in good shape and can arrange to equip it properly so that the Fund may be able to make payment by June 1 or earlier if the building is completed before that time. They seem to be doing a good job and this certainly will be a most interesting building out in a black section of your county and will be the only brick Rosenwald school in the county so far as I know. I certainly hope that you and the Board will stand by them and help see them through on this during these depressed and trying times.

Such building as they are erecting there ought to serve well for at least a half century, and judged on this basis the annual cost will be very little divided over this long period of time.

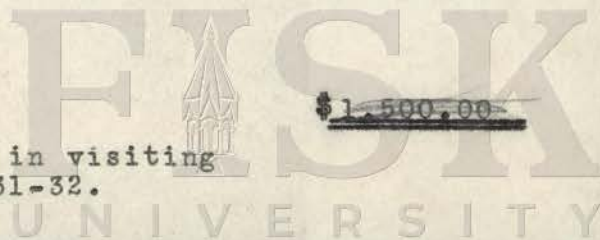
