My dear Mr. Rosenwald:

I understand that there is soon to come before you a proposal which might make possible the service of Dr. Wilfred Rankin on the Faculty of one of our leading Negro colleges. I have been asked to write you a word in Dr. Rankin's behalf, and I am very happy to do so.

Dr. Rankin's period of study at Union Theological Seminary came just before I joined its faculty, so that my personal knowledge of him is limited. However, I have made a very thorough study of all of the material in his folder, and it is an impressive record. I assume that you know that Dr. Rankin is 46 years of age, a graduate of the College of the City of New York in 1924, with a master of Arts from Columbia University in 1925. He took the B.D. degree in this Seminary in 1927 magna cum laude, with an academic average for three years of 92.6. His B.D. thesis on the subject, "The rise and development of Caesar worship in Rome in the first century and its significance and import for Christianity," received the grade of "A" with a special commendation of "magna".

These facts sufficiently indicate his distinguished abilities as a scholar and student. He was awarded the Philadelphia Travelling Fellowship by the Seminary, which means almost certaintly that he graduated as the first student in his class, and spent the twoo following years at the University of Aberdeen where he received the Doctor of Philosophy degree in 1929; the subject of his dissertation was "Tertullian the Jurist". His folder contains a notable body of testimonies from some of the foremost theological scholars in Great Britain indicating the very high opinion which they formed of his abilities and character. I should be glad to make this information available to you if desired. I believe Dr. Rankin studied also in Paris, Oxford, and Berlin.

On his return to this country in 1929, Dr. Rankin resumed the position which he had held during his student days here as a teacher in the New York City high schools. At that time, the members of our



faculty regarded it as a most regrettable that his outstanding scholarly and teaching abilities should not be more fully utilised. My predecessor, President Coffin, wrote "It would seem most wasteful that a man with his special theological training and brilliant record should have to confine himself to such teaching." At that time the Seminary tried to open for him a position in one of the Northern Negro colleges or seminaries. However, a suitable opening did not appear and he remained in the New York Sschools until about three years ago when he undertook for a three year period the position of Director of Education of Grenada, one of the British West Indian Islands. On accepting this position, Dr. Rankin was led to believe that it would lead to a professor's appointment in the University of the British West Indies which was then projected. Because of financial difficulties in Great Britain, there seems no likelihood that the university will begin to function before 1949 and then only with a pre-medical staff. It is for this reason that he has returned to the United States.

In summary, Dr. Rankin is a classical student of the highest qualifications, thoroughly equipped in the ancient languages, with distinguished achievement in original and creative scholarship, and with well proven abilities as a teacher. In appointing him, any Negro college or university would be assured of adding notable strength to the scholarly distinction of its faculty. I believe he is eminently qualified for the type of position for which I understand he is to be suggested to you.



Dear Lessing: I am just back from a very exciting trip to
Liberia with some side visits to parts of French
West Africa. I am much impressed by the proposals of the Liberia
Company and by the need of preparing the people of West Africa,
especially of Liberia, for the impact of the western world which
seems likely to hit them with brutal speed.

Coming back to problems nearer home; we are considering proper means of closing out the Fund as of June 30 and yet providing for certain payments that will need to be made for several months following that closing date. I have talked with Leonard Rieser and Nathan Levin. Our joint wisdom is that the best thing to do would be to turn over to some other foundation these remaining funds with the understanding that that foundation would dispense the funds from month to month in accordance with explicit instructions from us and with the further provision that any small balances remaining should become the property of the custodian foundation to be expended in accordance with the general interests of the Fund. I think this would not involve any great amount of money but certain payments should not be made until conditions have been met and there will almost certainly be a number of little bills coming in from verious sources that will need to be paid. Yet if we are to close our books on June 30 we must have paid the last penny of our assets to some agency. The most appropriate organization to handle these remaining payments seems to us to be the Lessing J. Rosenwald Foundation, Would you be willing for your foundation to serve in this capacity? If so, Leonard and Bathan and I will work out the details. Nathan assures me it will be a very simple operation as far as his office is concerned.

Dear Miss Wellens: Unfortunately, we cannot send additional Julius Rosenwald Fund stationery, for our supply is exhausted. Since the Fund is to close in a few days we did not want to re-order, and we are writing our own final letters on this kind of stationery. Perhaps the best you can do is type the additional letters on Mr. Rosenwald's own stationery simply adding under "Chairman of the Board" the words "Julius Rosenwald Fund".

I am returning the enclosed letter with Mr. Rosenwald's notation. The Armand S. Deutsch who was a trustee of the Rosenwald Fund, is not Mrs. Levy's son but her former husband. Mr. Rosenwald has probably forgotten his services but his name appears as a trustee in the original charter and by-laws filed with the State when the Fund was established in 1917 and in the minutes of the early meetings of the Board.
