

FELLOWSHIPS, SCHOLARSHIPS, GRANTS-IN-AID, AND LOAN FUNDS
OPEN TO LIBRARIANS AND PROSPECTIVE LIBRARIANS

PART II, TO AID FOREIGN STUDENTS TO STUDY LIBRARY SCIENCE IN THE UNITED STATES.

The AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF UNIVERSITY WOMEN FELLOWSHIPS are granted in general to candidates who have completed two years of residence work for the Ph.D. degree or who have already received the degree. The greatest importance is attached to the project on which the candidate wishes to work,-- its significance, and the evidence of the candidate's ability to pursue it.

One application may be made to serve for all the fellowships for which the applicant is eligible, if she so designates. Eight copies of the application, one for each member of the Committee, must be submitted on the forms which will be furnished by the secretary of the Committee on request. Applications and recommendations for these fellowships must reach the secretary of the Committee on Fellowship Awards, 1634 I Street N.W., Washington, D.C., not later than December 1.

AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF UNIVERSITY WOMEN Fellowship Crusade International Fellowship, \$1500, is offered to enable the holder to carry on a year's research in some country other than her own. The fellowship will be awarded by the International Fellowships Award Committee.

Applications for the fellowship must be made through the national Associations or Federations on the forms issued by the Headquarters Office. They must reach the Secretary of the International Federation of University Women, Crosby Hall, Cheyne Walk, London, S.W.3, not later than March 1.

The tenure of the fellowship shall be from August 1, and the stipend shall be paid half-yearly in advance, provided that the Fellow's first report satisfies the committee that she is pursuing the research indicated in her application.

Candidates for this fellowship must have published the results of independent research work. The latest work should have been produced within the past five years. Each candidate shall submit copies of her published works. If these works are in a language other than English, French, or German, a resume in one of these languages shall be supplied by the candidate.

Each National Association or Federation may send in a list of not more than three selected applicants, who shall have been interviewed by a member or representative of the selecting committee which guarantees their suitability for an international fellowship.



AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF UNIVERSITY WOMEN FELLOWSHIPS - (Continued)

International Fellowship, \$1500, is offered to enable the holder to carry on a year's research in some country other than her own.

Each candidate shall describe a scheme of research and shall submit a dissertation or published work in addition to any other evidence which she may desire to offer of her fitness to undertake the proposed research.

The tenure of the fellowship shall be from July 1, and the stipend shall be paid half-yearly in advance, provided that the Fellow has forwarded a statement before the second instalment is paid satisfying the committee that she is pursuing the research indicated in her application.

The fellowship will be tenable at any approved university or institution in a country other than that in which the Fellow has received her previous education or habitually resides. Candidates should ascertain in advance whether the university or institution in which they propose to carry on research can provide suitable facilities for their special subject.

Application should be sent in the first instance to the secretary of the national Association or Federation of University Women to which the candidate belongs and should be forwarded by her to the secretary of the Committee on Fellowship Awards of the American Association of University Women, to reach her not later than December 1. Applications from the members of the American Association of University Women should be sent directly to the secretary of the Committee on Fellowship Awards.

Latin-American Fellowship, \$1500, is offered to further friendly relations with women students of the Latin-American republics, and to assist them to prepare for public service in their communities, through the field of education, including scientific investigation, teaching, library work or other professions.

The fellowship is to be used for advanced study in some educational institution of the United States, chosen by the successful candidate with the approval of the Committee on Fellowships Awards of the American Association of University Women.

Candidates must be nationals of the Latin-American republics, be at least twenty-one years of age, have a sufficient knowledge of English to enable them to understand and profit by lectures, to use English textbooks, to take part in class discussions and to take examinations, and have the equivalent of a college education in the universities or the best normal schools of their countries. In general the Committee on Fellowship Awards will give preference to the applicants already prepared to carry on graduate or professional work.

Margaret E. Maltby Fellowship, \$1500, is open to those women who show promise of distinction and have a degree in Arts, Science or Literature.

Rose Sidgwick Memorial Fellowship, ^{\$2000,} has been established by Americans and the American Association of University Women in memory of Rose Sidgwick, a member of the British Educational Mission which visited the United States in 1918, and in recognition of her services to the cause of Anglo-American friendship.

The fellowship is open to British women of graduate standing and is to be held for the purpose of graduate study in American colleges or universities.

The award of this fellowship will be made biennially by a committee of the British Federation of University Women. Further information may be obtained from the Secretary of the International Federation of University Women, Crosby Hall, Cheyne Walk, London, S.W.3, England.

The AMERICAN COUNCIL OF LEARNED SOCIETIES GRANTS up to \$500 in aid of research are made to mature scholars for definite projects already under way in research in the humanistic sciences. Applicants for grants must be citizens or permanent residents of the United States or Canada. The receipt of applications closes in December of each year. All inquiries for information and for application blanks should be addressed to 907 Fifteenth Street, Washington, D.C.

The AMERICAN LIBRARY ASSOCIATION, under the provisions of a grant from the Carnegie Corporation of New York, offers a limited number of grants-in-aid for the study of librarianship to residents of the United States and Canada. The purpose of the grants is to encourage and aid persons whose proposed study or research seems likely to prove valuable to the library profession, by enabling them to seek further education in librarianship. It is expected that the results of the studies of successful candidates will be made available to the profession. Candidates should be graduates of approved colleges or universities. Also they should have completed successfully at least one year of work in a library school and have had satisfactory experience in library work. Furthermore, they should present evidence that they are competent to pursue effectively their proposed studies. Under exceptional circumstances, either library training or experience may be waived. The work of candidates who are given awards must be done under the auspices of an educational institution recognized as appropriate for the supervision of their studies, but need not necessarily be done in residence. It is intended that recipients shall give full time to their studies.



The stipend may vary from \$750 to \$1500 or more, according to the requirements and qualifications of the recipient. Present employment conditions and the need for restraint in recruiting incline the Committee to devote the larger part of these funds to the larger grants. When warranted, the stipend may be renewed for a second year, but a renewal should not be anticipated by any applicant. Grants will be conditional upon the acceptance of the applicant by the institution chosen to administer the work.

Application should be filed before February 1 with the Chairman of the American Library Association Committee on Fellowships and Scholarships, Charles E. Rush, Yale University Library, New Haven, Conn.

The AMERICAN SCANDINAVIAN FOUNDATION FELLOWSHIP, \$1000, is open to Scandinavians for study in the United States. Candidates must be of Scandinavian birth with at least one year of university study and have a knowledge of English. Applications should be submitted before December 1 to the following agent in the applicant's own country: Sverige-Amerika Stiftelsen, Stockholm, Sweden; Norge-Amerika Fondet, Oslo, Norway; Danmarks-Amerikansko Selskab, Copenhagen, Denmark.

The C.R.B. (COMMISSION FOR RELIEF IN BELGIUM) EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION, INC., ADVANCED FELLOWSHIPS, about \$225 monthly, plus necessary travelling expenses. About six fellowships are awarded annually for a fellowship period of four months in the United States, for study in American universities, research institutes or technical schools. Candidates must be Belgian citizens, members of the faculties of Belgian Universities or approved higher institutions and have sufficient knowledge of English and definite plans for proposed study in the United States. Applications should be submitted not later than January 15 to the Director, Fondation Universitaire, 11 rue d'Egmont, Brussels, Belgium.

C.R.B. EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION GRADUATE FELLOWSHIPS, minimum \$130 monthly, plus travelling expenses. About eight fellowships are awarded annually, exclusive of renewals, for study in American universities, research institutes or technical schools. Candidates must be Belgian citizens of high character and intellectual capacity, graduates of Belgian universities or approved higher institutions, must speak and write English and must return to Belgium after expiration of the fellowship. Applications must be submitted not later than January 15 to the Director, Fondation Universitaire, 11 rue d'Egmont, Brussels, Belgium.

The COMMONWEALTH FUND FELLOWSHIP, \$3000 a year, on an average, for two years; 24 fellowships open to unmarried men not over thirty years of age, graduates of recognized British universities; 2 fellowships open to unmarried men not over thirty years of age, graduates of recognized Dominion universities, studying at British universities; 5 fellowships open to men not over thirty-five years of age, holding an appointment in the British Colonial Service (minimum tenure of these fellowships fifteen months, maximum two years). Fellows are required to travel for three months in the United States at the end of the first academic year. At the expiration of their fellowships, Fellows must return to Great Britain or some other part of the British Empire for a period of residence of not less than two years. Applications should be submitted before February 1 through the applicant's college authorities to Richard H. Simpson, Secretary, Committee of Award, 35 Portman Square, London, W. 1, England.

The JOHN SIMON GUGGENHEIM MEMORIAL FOUNDATION LATIN AMERICAN FELLOWSHIPS are open to men and women, without distinction of race, color or creed, who are citizens of the United States, including Puerto Rico, and of the Argentine Republic, Chile, Mexico and Cuba for independent research and creative work in the arts.

It is expected that candidates will be graduates of universities or professional schools, or persons who in other respects have taken advantage of the educational facilities available in their own countries in their special fields of study.

The stipend will normally be \$2,000 for twelve months plus a travel allowance proportionate to the distance which the Fellows have to travel to the places of their study. The fellowships will be awarded in the first instance for one year, but with the possibility of renewal. The INSTITUTE OF INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE FELLOWSHIPS, usually covering board, lodging and tuition, (although some offer cash stipends and others tuition only), are arranged in American universities and colleges by the Institute of International Education on recommendation of its representatives: In Argentina (Instituto Cultural Argentino - Norte Americano, Cordoba 931, Buenos Aires); in Austria (Dr. Paul Dengler, Austro-American Institute of Education, Elisabethstrasse 9, Vienna); in Czechoslovakia (Ministry of Education, Maltezske nam. c. 1, Prague); in France (Monsieur A. V. Desclos, Office National des Universités et Ecoles Françaises, 96 Boulevard Raspail, Paris); in Germany (Deutscher Akademischer Austauschdienst, Kronprinzenufer 13, Berlin N.W. 40); in Hungary (Ministry of Education, Bathory utca/2, Budapest); in Italy (Dr. Piero Parini, Ministero degli Esteri, Diretto Generale, delle Scuole Italiane all' Estero, Rome); in Spain (Professor José Castillejo, Junta para Ampliación de Estudios); in Switzerland (Dr. Arthur Rohn, Eidgenössische Technische Hochschule, Zurich.)

The TSING HUA FELLOWSHIPS, partial tuition and fees \$100 per month, for living expenses and travelling expenses from and return to China, are open to men and women graduates of Chinese colleges and universities of recognized standing, and advanced students who are fully prepared to undertake work in certain special fields in American universities. Candidates are selected by competitive examinations conducted by National Tsing Hua University, Peiping, China.
