I am authorized to announce that the Julius Rosenwald Fund on May 5, 1927, made the following appropriation for your State to aid in the construction of Negro schoolhouses, teachers' homes, classroom additions, and shops, for the year beginning July 1, 1927 and ending June 30, 1928:

The aid for schools and additions above a six-teacher type - seven-teacher to ten-teacher, inclusive - is for county training schools or county high schools striving to meet state requirements for high school standardization. Copies of the detailed plan for distribution of aid will be mailed within a few days.

Beginning July 1, 1927, the Fund agrees to give aid for shops on condition that (a) the building be erected according to plans and specifications furnished or approved by the Fund, (b) an ample supply of tools be purchased, and (c) a trained teacher be provided to take charge of the work.

On behalf of the Trustees of the Fund I wish to thank you and your staff for the cordial cooperation in the administration of the work in your State. We shall appreciate having any suggestions from time to time which you feel will be helpful in securing the greatest benefits with the amount of money available.

Dear Mr. Smith:-

Our final applications for Rosenwald aid on the 1927-28 Budget have gone forward for your approval. Including shops and additions, we have filed forty-two applications, taking up \$27,900 of our \$38,000 Budget, leaving an unexpended balance of \$10,100. Considering the fact that only two of our total number of applications for aid are for one-teacher schools our Rosenwald building program for the year is almost as large as that for the previous year. Had we been permitted to include applications for one-teacher schools that should have been erected very little of our budget would revert. According to our records we will have to revert of Tennessee's allotment \$10,100.

It is with reference particularly to the one-teacher school that I wish to make an appeal. It has been the policy of the State Department of Education to discourage even to the extent of forbidding, as far as we could, the multiplication of school buildings. On the contrary the State has encouraged the consolidation and abandonment of schools for the colored people wherever at all practical, but there are isolated rural sections in which the negro population is very sparse, that must have school privileges. They are too far removed from centers to be accommodated in two or three-teacher schools, therefore, in justice to the negro children of these localities it is but right that they should have a comfortable and well equipped building, though it is of the one-teacher type. Some ten or twelve, possibly more, of this type of building have been erected independently of Rosenwald aid during the present year. Most of these buildings have been erected according to the Rosenwald building designs. Some of them have not been fully

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completed. They need to be painted inside and out. Others need equipment. It is for such communities and children residing in these places that we are making an appeal for aid.


Tennessee has many splendid new buildings erected in accordance with the Rosenwald building plans for both white and colored children. Buildings have been erected of the larger types yet they have been made to conform in the fundamental principles of construction and design to those incorporated in the Rosenwald plans. The funds for the erection of practically all of our school buildings both white and colored have been contributed locally. As a result our buildings have been erected in the more favored communities. Because of this condition, Tennessee has made available for new buildings and repairs one million dollars to be used in erecting new buildings in the neglected, isolated communities of the State. We want to use a part of this fund in co-operation with the Rosenwald Fund. The colored people in many of these isolated communities are not financially able to contribute cash, but can furnish some labor and material. The buildings of this type erected during the present year have been erected largely on this basis. Now, since \$10,000 of the funds allotted to Tennessee for 1927-28 must revert I am asking that we be permitted to apply \$200.00 on each of these one-teacher buildings, conditioned upon the amount of grounds required, the completion of the building in detail, its equipment, etc., meeting requirements. If we are permitted to do this the buildings under way will be personally inspected and none except those meeting full requirements will be aided.

To deny these communities aid from this fund will have a tendency to drive the colored people from the remote rural sections to the more favored. They will reside where opportunities are the most favorable. The rural agricultural sections of the State will suffer should they lose these people, and the colored people themselves will sustain a loss because they can do well along agricultural and industrial lines in many of these remote sections.

Tennessee owes a debt of gratitude to Mr. Rosenwald for the wonderful assistance rendered in her educational work. For this we are deeply grateful

and assure you if consideration can be given us in the interest of the one-teacher school at this time, it will not be misplaced.

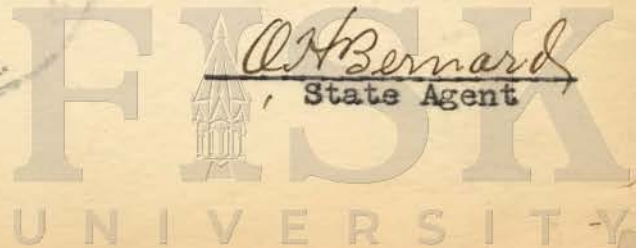

My dear Mr. Smith:

Of course beggars must never be choosers and the State Department of Education is not, but I do want to bring to your attention a matter which is, in my opinion, highly important.

You are perfectly familiar with the general plans of the State Department of Education with reference to making better educational conditions in communities heretofore neglected. Because of natural barriers there are a number of schools whose consolidation is now impossible and will be for years to come. These communities are small and isolated, of course, and what is known as a one-teacher school house is all that will be needed or all for which we can hope. For that reason I regretted the necessity of your withdrawing aid from one-teacher schools. I am advised that about ten more one-teacher Rosenwald school houses could have been erected this year. There were eight or ten such houses built anyway, some of them on State plans, but for lack of money I am informed that some of them are not painted and there may be some not completed. Of course, this Department has no authority over the amount of money a county board of education may put into a school house of this kind, nor has it any means of compelling the board to complete a house. For that reason I am wondering if this question could be reconsidered by you and if you think favorably of it allow Tennessee to use a part of the Rosenwald fund that will revert in July toward completing any of these buildings, provided the plan upon which they are constructed will meet the approval of your agent, and I am wondering too if a part of the donation to Tennessee for next year could not be used in completing projects of this kind.

Let me repeat that I have no inclination to change your plans or the plans of your Board in any way, but am simply suggesting a condition pre-

vailing in this State and also suggesting that your aid would help us to carry forward our plans to improve the schools in communities that have always been neglected by county boards of education and district directors.

I want to repeat my expression of appreciation for what the Julius Rosenwald Fund has done for the negro schools of this State and assure you of the hearty co-operation of this Department in making the Rosenwald-aided school houses according to your standard plans in all cases.

The number of one-teacher schools is the maximum on which the Fund will give aid the next budget year, and the number of two-teacher schools cannot be exceeded without special authorization by the officers of the Fund. In keeping with modern trends of education the Fund desires to concentrate more and more in the larger consolidated schools.

In order to stimulate the construction of more permanent buildings the Fund has increased its allotment \$50.00 per classroom for brick veneer, solid brick, or satisfactory concrete construction, as shown above in the last column, the maximum for a ten-teacher or larger being \$2,600. We now have a complete set of plans worked out in detail for brick veneer construction from a three-teacher to a ten-teacher type, which will be furnished the State Department as needed.

For the present budget year the Fund is giving aid on two types of shops - a one-room (\$200) and a two-room (\$400). Because of urgent demands from some of the states it was thought best to increase this aid for 1928-29 to \$600. for a three-room shop to include facilities for home economics in the larger vocational schools. Plans for a three-room shop have been worked out in tentative form and will be adjusted to suit the needs of the schools to be served.

As the average term of the schools on which the Fund is giving aid the present year is more than six months, it has been decided to increase the minimum requirement for next year from five months to six months.

Please let me take this opportunity in behalf of the officers and Trustees of the Fund to thank you and your staff for your hearty cooperation and to assure you of our interest in every phase of progress in the education system of your State. When we can serve you, command us.

Dear Supt. McGlearen:

My attention has been called to a misunderstanding between the contractor and your county board of education in regard to building privies in connection with some schoolhouses erected on Community School Plans furnished by me through the State Department of Education.

As I stated verbally, the whole matter would depend upon the kind of contract made between the two parties. If the contract calls for carrying out the details of Community School Plans and specifications without any modifications, then the sanitary privies are included, since a statement is placed in the bill of material shown on each blue print requesting the contractor to include material for these (referring to pamphlet 15 which states that privies be built on plans furnished by the State Board of Health, if available, if not, on plans shown in this pamphlet).

If on the other hand the contract calls for building the schoolhouse only, excluding the privies, then the contractor would not be held responsible. The whole matter hinges on the kind of contract made between the two parties. We do not furnish contract forms, only the plans and specifications.
