I am sure that you received the letter that I returned to you. You asked me to be confidential and I thot that the best way to treat your confidential communication, was to return it to you. I shall say that only three persons know about it, you, God and myself.

Whatever is my plight I shall be satisfied. I feel that I have done a great deal of work here in myk modest way but I have got a very little credit for it. Perhaps it was because I did not have the proper salesmanship. At any rate I know that I have a few prominent men, both white and Colored, including you at the top of the list, who are interested inx me and my career and I feel that my time is a short way off. Unfortunately, I have a sick wife, who is about blind, but I am sticking with her for she stuck with me when I bagan my work here in thã great city.

If I do not get accepted this time I shall apply again. Many white persons get all types of awards to do further study and we get only a few. Since I finished Howard I have given two awards of \$10.00 each to stimulate study there. I am sorry that I am unable to get some help that I need to further my study.. Please keep this little letter off the record.
