

Dear Doctor Bond: You received a short letter from me a day or two ago, which I had meant to rewrite before mailing. In it I said that the trustees had directed the officers to continue for another year their work in rural education in Georgia and that we stood ready to help you in the amount of \$34,000 for current expenses during the year 1942-43.

In this letter I do not wish to withdraw assurance of our support for the coming year. I would, however, like to explore a little the problem of our continued interest.

In March, 1941, the trustees had in mind the sum of \$150,000 for Fort Valley, to be spent over a four or five year period. During the past year we have approved for Fort Valley the following:

This leaves a balance of approximately \$111,000.



Should we continue in Georgia after the summer of 1943, this sum undoubtedly represents the total amount that will be made available to Fort Valley during the remaining life of the Fund. Therefore, it seems to us that the important question for you is how best to conserve this grant, using it in such a way as to release an annual increase of state funds. If you agree with us, then the less you draw upon this reservoir this year, the more there will be left for negotiating with the state for appropriations on a matching basis.





FINANCIAL CONDITION

The Fort Valley State College (collored) at Fort Valley ended the year with a current deficit of \$938.86.

FUNDS AVAILABLE FOR OPERATIONS

Allotment to this College by the Regents for the year amounted to \$37 000 00. The State Department of Education transferred \$10 309 86 to be expended for Vocational Education. The Rosenwald Fund donated for regular maintenance \$34 000 00, for outlay \$5 851 28 and for teacher training \$400 00. The earnings consisted of students fees and tuition in the amount of \$24 174 37, board charges of \$32 869 07, room rent of \$5 814 37, athletic fees of \$2 375 15, farm and dairy sales of \$1 746 42, rents of \$1 119 91, miscellaneous of \$876 88 and transfer from endowment income of \$560 00. The total of the above receipts was \$157 097 31 which together with cash balance at July 1, 1941 of \$4 906 49, made \$162 003 80 available for operations for the year as approved on the budget.

DISPOSITION OF OPERATING FUNDS

From the \$162 003 80 available funds \$444 90 was transferred to the Supervisor of Purchases as the pro rate share of the cost of the operations of that office. \$148 490 66 was expended for maintenance of College and \$8 457 72 for capital outlay, leaving a cash balance at June 30, 1942 of \$4 610 52.

PUBLIC TRUST FUND

The endowment fund of this College acquired by the Regents from the old (privately operated) Fort Valley Normal and Industrial School in 1941 for the use and benefit of the College under its new status and under the name of Fort Valley State College, is Carried at its

Dear Mr. Noyes:

In accordance with your request, we are inclosing detail showing comparative salaries as listed in the 1941-1942 budget, and as proposed in the 1942-1943 budget.

We would like to call to your attention that there are several instances of apparent increases that are not in fact so. You will remember that in several instances last year our budget was corrected by request when several members of the faculty desired to have their contracts corrected so as to make their entire salary come within the fiscal year, July 1, 1941-June 30,1942. Before the budget had carried some "carry-over" salaries for July and August with contracts reading from September 1st to August 31st, thus over-lapping the fiscal year.

Our new budget completely eliminates such carry-over items, and all salaries stand complete and adjusted to fall, with contractual services, within the fiscal year July 1, 1942, to June 30, 1943. In several cases, as mentioned above, either for this cause or because the cases were those of teachers on leave for the year 1940-1941 who began services anew on September 1st, 1941, the listed difference then is not an increase, but placing these salaries on the new fiscal year basis.

Sirs:

We respectfully submit herewith our budget for the fiscal year 1942-1943.

We estimate a surplus of \$247.10, and have included an unallocated amount of \$1,750.00 to care for contingencies and emergencies.

You will note that we have not reduced our estimate of income to be derived from fees. We feel justified in doing this because our experience has been during the last three years that our applications doubled our capacity.

Even with a normal shrinkage in college enrollments, the fact that in any of these years we could have enrolled twice as many students, if we had the space, will for the next year at least, we believe, leave our enrollment as it has been.

As example, we refer to the fact that during the Spring quarter of this year, when practically all of the other institutions in the System showed a sharp decrease, our enrollment was the same as that for the Spring quarter of 1941.

It is also true that with an enrollment made up of 75% females, current decreases of college enrollments due to the draft and to employment will not strike us as hard as other institutions where a greater percentage of students are males.

In conclusion, let me say that we are now negotiating with the State Department of Vocational Education for an additional allocation of funds from them to employ additional teaching personnel in Agriculture.



Dear Doctor Sanford: You will recall that a few days ago we discussed together the financial assistance the Rosenwald Fund is giving the University System. We recognized the need we must soon face of increasing the state support as the Fund support decreases. I think we both endorsed this principle, realizing fully that we must enter into some agreement during the remaining life of the Fund in order that the gains at a number of centers may be lasting. Some time later in the fall I should like to continue this discussion so that we may work out a common understanding.





As you will understand, we are expecting to receive in the next few days the third monthly payment due on our first quarter's allotment from the Rosenwald Fund.

If further decisions remain to be made regarding our status, you would greatly favor me by informing me of them at your earliest convenience. In any case we will still have the problem of adjusting our budget or faculty to make all necessary adjustments. There are several replacements due which need not be made, but which should be - if they are to be made - this week. It would be fatal to an honorable or satisfactory adjustment of our position to delay beyond this week in assurance as to what we may expect.

May I also call to your attention the problem we face in our Dr. W. A. Mason, who is assigned to us by the United States Public Health Service. I wrote to Surgeon Coffee in June regarding a renewal, writing also to Dr. Roscoe Brown and to Dr. Abercrombie. I have had no word from the Public Health people. Dr. Mason tells me, however, that he understands he is to remain with us for the next two or three months, and is then to be transferred in all probability to some other public health area.

I do not know if you are yet subsidizing Dr. W. A. Mason's salary here. The failure to hear from the Public Health people arouses in me what I hope is the quite unjustifiable presumption that they are intending to grab him when convenient to them. There are other circumstances which have recently arisem which suggest to us that we would be very happy if Dr. Mason could be transferred right now. These are circumstances which do not involve me, directly, but they do point directly to the fact that we would probably be better off in many ways if Dr. Mason were immediately transferred elsewhere. He would be practically little good anyway if he was to be here for a short time, and in that short time might do more harm than good.

Dear Doctor Bond: Your airmail special of September Whas just come to my desk along with the news that Mr. Arnall is considerably out in front and undoubtedly the governor of Georgia for the next four years. In view of this I think I need not answer the question you raise in the second paragraph of your letter. I am planning to arrive in Atlanta tomorrow and carry on my talks with Doctor Sanford concerning a continued program of work in the state. I shall urge him to direct his attention to considering with me the matter of a matching program whereby the state will take over in the next few years all of the responsibility for the work at Fort Valley State College and West Georgia College. Following my visit with him I have an engagement to attend a conference in north Georgia with the West Georgia College faculty and plan at the close of this conference to drive by Fort Valley. This will probably be during the first part of the week of the 21st.

Concerning the case of Doctor Mason, it may not be fully clear what aur hopes were with regard to his presence at Fort Valley, or the financial arrangements we had with him. We have only paid Doctor Mason \$300, which went to him last summer for a period of study in Washington. From this study you will recall he came directly to you and since then has been on the payroll of the USPHS. Doctor Bousfield and I hoped that Doctor Mason would be able to develop some program of health education which could be used as methods of directional value to be adopted at a number of different localities. It is my feeling this has not been forthcoming and in view of this I see nothing to be gained in carrying Doctor Mason on any budget that I may help with. Not that anyone has asked me to, but I thought you would be interested in knowing my feeling. We will talk about this when we visit together.



I had some very good conversations with Mr. M. A. Lee, who told me in some detail of the work he did with the Greene and Carroll County workshops. I hope we can have some talk of him and his work and your evaluation.

I shall look forward to seeing you, therefore, later in the month.





Dear Mr Wale:

When you visited Fort Valley recently I had occasion to mention to you the possibility of developing here a center for the teaching of the natural sciences, which would make a unique contribution to the advancement of the education of teachers for rural schools for Negroes in the South. This letter is to place this project directly before you.

Some years ago, as you may know, the Farm Security Administration cooperated with the Negro citizens of Georgia in the development of what is now Camp John Hope, a center for the recreation and camping of Negroes in the state. The property includes a large assembly hall, equipped for dining and cooking for large groups; a number of cabins for campers, and a care taker's residence. There is also a large lake which provides facilities for swimming. At the same time, this lake provides examples of the typical inland fresh water flora and fauna of this region. The property itself covers several hundred acres of woodland, in which may also be found representative flora and fauna of the area.

Camp John Hope is but seven miles distant from our campus. Recently, we have added to our faculty Dr. Booker T. Griffith, whose training at the University of Pittsburgh in research and whose experience in the conduct of such work in connection with his work at Clark College in the Atlanta University system eminently qualifies him for the direction and teaching of enterprises having to do with the Biological Sciences.

In addition, Dr. Griffith has, for the last three years, been a member of our summer school faculty, and has shown a distinguished ability to teach interestingly numbers of teachers with poor technical background in the sciences.

As you may know, the trend for summer schools seems to lie increasingly in the direction of the workshop form of organization. In planning for this future, we feel that the resources of Camp John Hope will permit us, in future years, to organize a workshop, both for teachers of sience in the small rural high schools of the south, and indeed for teachers of elementary rural schools who might wish to give, during the summer, special attention to this area. The fact that the facilities are already available, so close to us, means that this project could be operated with little additional expense, if any, and at such a minimum cost that we could doubtless attract a large and distinguished representation, not only from the schools of this state, but from all of the south.

You know, of course, of the work done at Woods Hole, and at the more recently established station for Biological Research at Highlands, North Carolina, in which Vanderbilt is interested. Of course, we are not bent on developing a Woods Hole; our interest is in adding to the facilities of our summer offerings, and providing a unique program in the teaching of the Biological Sciences, and related health fields to Negro teachers in small rural high and elementary schools.

In connection with this project, I am submitting to you a list of materials and equipment in the field of Biology which would not only serve the purpose of the special project, but would also fully equip our department of Biology for work with our regular students during the regular session. As you may remember, our equipment here in the sciences is yet limited almost entirely to that possessed by the school when it was a Junior College, with little more than 100 students. The growth of our student boyd and the advancement of our program for our regular students would make such equipment necessary.

Hoping that it may be possible to consider the allocation of funds to the purchase of these materials from capital appropriations, I am

Dear Doctor Bond: I have your letter of October 7 before me, asking for help in the purchase of equipment for your science program. Before it came I had already talked with Mr. Embree about the wisdom of returning to our practice of last year of approving certain funds to you for capital expenditures. We agreed that before any definite answer were made to this it would be best for you and for us to think together of the soundest procedure for matching state funds with our fast diminishing allocation. Let me review that a moment.

The balance of the Rosenwald Fund allocation to Fort Valley as recorded on our books July 1, 1942, was \$115,015. We have made commitments amounting to \$34,000 for the year 1942-43. This leaves a balance for any future programs of \$81,015. Two years at the present level would eat this up, and I don't believe this would be sound. When I return to Georgia in Movember we must plan the proposal the Fund should make to the Chancellor after January 1, 1943. Let's hold the matter of capital expenditure in abeyance, therefore, until that time.

The above consideration is only part of the answer to your specific request for \$3,649.50 for the immediate purchase of biology equipment. This request compels us to ask ourselves once more just how far our interests go in southern education, just exactly what it is we believe we should give strength to. This is not really difficult to answer. The trouble arises only in that in every quarter we are continually in danger of being pulled off the simple direction. During the next few years, and with the few remaining dollars, we must stick to the job of helping young people prepare for the rural elementary school. We think this means,



first of all, an investment in people.— young people who will do the job and others who will help them get ready to do it. Occasionally it also means the purchase of materials. An example of this is the building of your co-op houses. A hundred dollars to Mrs. Welch to be matched with a hundred dollars from the county and another hundred from the communities, making a total of \$300 from which the schools of Greene County may buy poster paints, paint brushes, newsprint paper, work books, etc., is another example. It may mean a few dollars to help Mrs. Welch get a health clinic started in Greene County. But when it does mean money for things as contrasted with people, we feel they should be things very much in line with the problem of our major concern. They should be homely articles, not too far removed from the life the young person will face when she gets out in the country.

I do not mean, of course, that Fort Valley is making a mistake in purchasing \$1800 worth of microscopes. I am saying, though, that we feel this is not within the scope of our major concern, primarily because we believe that the young person getting ready to be a rural teacher will not have her eyes opened best to see the world of nature around her by spying through a microscope. It does not seem to us to be looking in the right direction. It's a little too high powered. But I will say no more because I am confident you will agree with me.
