THOMAS PAYNE GOVAN of Nashville, for historical study of the banking and credit systems of the ante-bellum South, \$1,500.

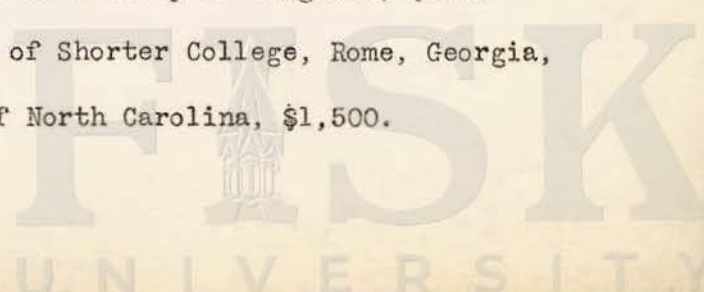
