Dear Supt. Cook:

After the announcement of the budget on May 3, 1928, which includes an additional allowance of \$50. per classroom for permanent construction of rural schoolhouses, it was brought to the attention of the officers of the Fund that this same consideration should be given on shops and teachers' homes since they are an important part of the school plant. The number of one-teacher schools is the maximum on which the Fund will give aid the next budget year, and the number of two-teacher schools cannot be exceeded without special authorization by the officers of the Fund. In keeping with modern trends of education the Fund desires to concentrate more and more in the larger consolidated schools.

In order to stimulate the construction of more permanent buildings the Fund has increased its allotment \$50.00 per classroom for brick veneer, solid brick, or satisfactory concrete construction, as shown above in the last column, the maximum for a ten-teacher or larger being \$2,600. We now have a complete set of plans worked out in detail for brick veneer construction from a three-teacher to a ten-teacher type, which will be furnished the State Department as needed.

Dear Mr. Smith:

I am enclosing application for aid on school house construction for next year, as well as on libraries. Just as soon as I can secure data on transportation, etc., I shall submit these data to you. May I urgently request that you intercede for us with the Fund not to cut us down on one and two-teacher schools. I appreciate fully the Fund's attitude toward larger buildings, but if we are cut down on the small schools just now, it simply means that in all probability we will have a number of negro schools constructed which are not suitable for the instruction of children. The \$200, of course, is a very small item toward the cost of a one-teacher school, since most of ~~small~~ schools cost from \$1500 to \$2200, yet it is of tremendous importance in enabling us to secure certain standards in school house construction which are for the welfare of the negro children of the counties of this State. I have had already requests for aid on seven one-teacher schools next year, and I know of two or three others which are likely to be built.

In regard to library aid for Morgan College and Princess Anne Academy, I have just talked with Dr. John O. Spencer, the President of Morgan College. He has decided to request a \$1500 library, with the understanding that the Fund puts up \$500 and the college \$1000 for the next budget year, not this present one. I am not including this request on the sheet for library aid, as I assume you want requests for public schools only on that particular sheet.

I thank you sincerely for allowing me some extra time in order to get in requests for transportation.

Let me say that the matter of transportation of colored children will have to be worked up in this State in the way of sentiment for it; hence, I do not expect to have many requests for

aid in this regard for next year, but next year we shall undertake to arouse sentiment for it and I believe we shall be able to do so, because we will be in a position to tell the counties definitely what they can expect from the Rosenwald Fund in the way of aid.
