FELLOWSHIPS, SCHOLARSHIPS, GRANTS-IN-AID, AND LOAN FUNDS  
OPEN TO LIBRARIANS AND PROSPECTIVE LIBRARIANS

In an effort to increase the opportunities for study to which librarians are eligible, the Board of Education for Librarianship has secured from the organizations listed below the statement that preparation for librarianship will be considered within the scope of their grants. Before making application, candidates are urged to investigate carefully all requirements of each scholarship or fellowship, and its purpose. Few funds are available for the first year of study in a library school. The majority are for advanced study of library science, which pre-supposes a year of study in a library school and at least a year of successful library experience.

Detailed information, instructions for application and conditions of acceptance should be obtained in each case from the organization which makes the awards. When possible, addresses have been included.

In addition to the sources listed, there are available in many colleges and universities maintaining accredited library schools, scholarships and loan funds to which students in the library school are eligible in common with other students.

ALABAMA LIBRARY ASSOCIATION has established the Thomas M. Owen Scholarship Fund from which a loan is made from time to time to an Alabama student for study in the Emory University Library School. The Association also offers the Marie Bankhead Owen Summer School Scholarship which provides \$100 for each of three successive summers of study at Emory University. AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF UNIVERSITY WOMEN Committee on Fellowship Awards, 1634 I Street, N.W., Washington, D.C., awards fellowships in general to candidates who have completed two years of residence work for the Ph.D. degree or who have received the degree. Applications and supporting materials must reach the office in Washington by December 15. For detailed information concerning these fellowships, instructions for applying, and the conditions of acceptance, address the Secretary, Committee on Fellowship Awards.

AMERICAN-SCANDINAVIAN FOUNDATION FELLOWSHIPS for persons born in the United States to study in Denmark, Iceland, Norway and Sweden will be resumed as soon as conditions permit, possibly for the academic year 1946-47. Announcements will be sent to the universities and the press as soon as applications can be considered. Applications from persons of Scandinavian birth to study in the United States are being received by Danmarks Amerikanske Selskab, Copenhagen, Denmark; Islenszk-Ameriska Felagid, Reykjavik, Iceland; Norge-Amerika Fondet, Oslo, Norway; and Sverige-Amerika Stiftelsen, Stockholm, Sweden.

BROOKINGS INSTITUTION Training Division, 722 Jackson Place, Washington 6, D.C., offers research training fellowships as a part of the provision for advanced research training and for research opportunities. The research training fellowships are of two classes: (1) Cooperative fellowships, the expense of which is borne jointly by Brookings Institution and the cooperating university which

nominates the fellow; (2) independent fellowships, the expense of which is borne entirely by the Institution. These fellowships enable students to gain experience by working in Washington on projects of their own choosing under guidance of mature investigators. Ordinarily the fellowship stipend provides \$30 in cash per month, free tuition, and free board and room at the Residence of the Institution, and other residence facilities. Applications should be submitted by March 15.

Those eligible for fellowships are:

1. Persons who have completed the work for or have taken the Ph.D. degree.
2. Students in the later stages of their graduate work, who have completed all or practically all of the residence and course-work requirements for the Ph.D. degree and who wish to do thesis work in Washington. Since the Institution supplements the graduate work of universities, it does not confer graduate degrees. Students will presumably take their degrees at the universities where they did their postgraduate work.
3. Mature persons without extensive academic training who show evidence of competence to do research work under informal guidance.

BROOKLYN (N.Y.) PUBLIC LIBRARY has a scholarship fund to assist members of the staff to study in advancement of their professional standing. Contributions to the fund have been made by the staff, the Board of Trustees and the Friends of the Brooklyn Public Library.

UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA SCHOOL OF LIBRARIANSHIP ALUMNI ASSOCIATION has established a loan fund for students who have completed one semester's work in the School.

CARNEGIE INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY, CARNEGIE LIBRARY SCHOOL, Pittsburgh, Penn., awards the Trustees Scholarship, providing for the remission of tuition for one semester, to a student who presents high scholarship, satisfactory qualities of leadership, acceptable personality, practical ability and promise of future development; the Nina C. Brotherton Scholarship, \$60.00 at the end of the first semester on the basis of scholarship, leadership, personal qualifications and financial need; in 1945-46 several scholarships of \$300 each as well as half-tuition scholarships will be awarded. Recommendations from librarians in behalf of college graduates will be given especial attention.

Loans to students are available on application to the Associate Director from the Carnegie Library School Association. A special emergency loan fund for small amounts is also available to students during the school year.

UNIVERSITY OF CHICAGO GRADUATE LIBRARY SCHOOL offers three fellowships of \$1,000 each, preferably to candidates for the Ph.D. degree. A limited number of scholarships equal to tuition or half-tuition fees are also available. Applications should be made by March 1. Awards are made on a competitive basis and are granted for a period of three quarters.

The School administers the La Verne Noyes Foundation Scholarship of part-tuition fees for those of its students who served in the Army or Navy of the United States, 1917-18, or are descendants of those who served in that period.

The scholarships are awarded for one quarter at a time. Students not in residence must submit written application not less than two weeks in advance of the opening of the quarter in which they wish to receive tuition assistance from the fund.

Two full-tuition and two half-tuition scholarships are available to candidates for the Bachelor of Library Science degree.

CHICAGO WOMAN'S CLUB LOAN FUND FOR STUDENT LIBRARIANS is administered by the Chicago Library Club for the benefit of residents of the Chicago metropolitan area. Loans may not exceed the amount needed for essential expenses for one term at an accredited library school. The recipient of the loan is expected to return to a position in a library in the Chicago area. Application blanks may be obtained from Miss Gertrude Gscheidle, Chairman of the Loan Committee, Chicago Public Library, Chicago, Illinois.

COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF LIBRARY SERVICE provides loan funds in limited amount for the assistance of students. Application should be filed well in advance of registration with the Bursar of the University.

The School has a few scholarships, covering part of the tuition fee for the first-year students, granted only on the basis of high scholarship and exceptional qualifications for library service as evidenced by college records, previous experience and the recommendation of well-known librarians.

The School administers the following scholarships provided by alumni organizations: Mary Wright Plummer Scholarship, about \$250, of the Alumni Association of the Library School of the New York Public Library, preferably given to a candidate for the Master's degree who took the first year's work at the Library School of the New York Public Library. Application should be filed with the Dean of the School of Library Service before May 1; three alumni scholarships, \$300 each, of the New York State Library School Association from the Henrietta Church bequest, Florence Woodworth Scholarship, James I. Wyer Scholarship and Edna M. Sanderson Scholarship, for candidates for the Master's degree, preferably those who took the first year's work in the New York State Library School at Albany. If no suitable application is received from second-year students, these scholarships may be assigned to a B.S. candidate with exceptional qualifications.

Students in the School of Library Service who are graduates of any college or university of recognized rank in the state of Vermont are eligible for two George W. Ellis fellowships of about \$1600 each. Those who were born in the state of Iowa and graduated from a college or university located in Iowa are eligible for the Lydia C. Roberts Graduate Fellowships of \$750-\$1100 each. Before accepting the award the candidate must have stated his purpose to return to Iowa for a period of at least two years upon completion of his studies in the School. Incumbents are eligible for re-appointment, but each fellow will receive, in addition to the

stipend, only once, cost of transportation from his residence in Iowa to New York City and return. The Frank L. Polk Library Fellowships are made available by the Russian Student Fund, Inc., to outstanding Library Service students of Russian origin permanently residing in the United States. Application may be made to the Russian Student Fund, Inc., 215 West 23rd Street, New York 11, N.Y. Acceptance for admission to the School of Library Service is a requisite for eligibility.

UNIVERSITY OF DENVER offers several university scholarships, covering half-tuition, which are available to students in the library school. Applications should be sent to the school before June 1. Loan funds are also available for students after completion of the first quarter of study.

DREXEL INSTITUTE LIBRARY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION founded the Alice B. Kroeger Scholarship covering tuition fees for a graduate of an approved college or university who is in need of financial assistance. Application should be made to the Dean of the School.

The Drexel Scholarship, carrying with it from \$100 to \$200 in tuition fees, is awarded on the basis of scholarship and financial need. This scholarship is not permanently assigned to the Library School, but is awarded each year at the discretion of the Scholarship Committee.

The Institute has several loan funds from which students may borrow an amount not to exceed \$200 in any one year. Notes in the form of instalment contracts bearing interest at the rate of 6% are required. Notes are payable at the rate of not less than \$10.00 monthly, payments to begin on April 1 after graduation.

EMORY UNIVERSITY LIBRARY SCHOOL GRADUATES ASSOCIATION has created a loan fund which is available in limited amount for students on the recommendation of the School. The loan funds of the University are also available to the students of the Library School under the same conditions that govern loans to students in other divisions of the University.

FEILD CO-OPERATIVE ASSOCIATION, INC., PERMANENT STUDENT LOAN FUND, 406 Lamar Life Building, Jackson, Miss., aids students who are residents of Mississippi to complete a college course or to undertake study in a particular subject. Applications should be submitted well in advance of need.

JOHN SIMON GUGGENHEIM MEMORIAL FOUNDATION, 551 Fifth Avenue, New York 17, N.Y., awards fellowships of about \$2,000 each to candidates, usually between 25 and 40 years of age, who have shown unusual attainments in research as evidenced by previous publications or exceptional creative ability in the fine arts. Applications should be submitted before October 15.

Latin American Fellowships of about \$2,000 each for twelve months of study are open to men and women, without distinction of race, color or creed, who are citizens of the United States, including Puerto Rico, and of the Argentine Republic, Brazil, Chile, Cuba, Mexico, Peru and Uruguay for independent research and creative work in any field of knowledge or any of the fine arts. It is expected that candidates will be graduates of universities or professional schools, or persons who in other respects have taken advantage of the educational facilities available in their own countries in their special fields of study.

In addition to the usual Fellowships, the Foundation will grant post-Service Fellowships upon the same basis as the other Fellowships. They may be granted while the recipients are still in service and will be made available for their use whenever they are discharged from service. Applications should be addressed to Henry Allen Moe, Secretary General of the Foundation.

DOROTHEA HEINS LOAN FUND is available to a librarian or prospective librarian of South Dakota for professional training. The loan is to be repaid without interest to the South Dakota Library Association in five annual instalments after the applicant has finished his library school training. Applications should be sent to Lora Crouch, Chairman, Certification Committee, South Dakota Library Association, Carnegie Library, Sioux Falls, S.D.

CAROLINE M. HEWINS SCHOLARSHIP FUND, Public Library, Hartford, Conn., awards about \$300 annually to young women to prepare for library work with children. Preference is given to residents of Connecticut. Application should be made before February 1.

LOUISE GRAHAM HINSDALE SCHOLARSHIP amounts to the interest on \$2500, given in memory of Louise Graham Hinsdale, formerly librarian of the East Orange (N.J.) Free Public Library, by Lena D. Appleton as a contribution to the library profession of the state of New Jersey. The Scholarship is awarded annually to a member of the East Orange Free Public Library staff selected by the Librarian. If no application is received from that library, the Scholarship is awarded by the New Jersey Library Association to a New Jersey librarian.

HUTCHINSON SCHOLARSHIP, awarded by the Trustees of Scoville Institute, Oak Park, Ill., is available to undergraduate women residents of Oak Park who wish to prepare for librarianship.

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS LIBRARY SCHOOL, Urbana, Ill., awards the Katharine L. Sharp Scholarship, \$300, plus exemption from tuition fees, to candidates for the M.S. degree. Applications should be submitted before February 15.

Candidates for the M.S. degree in library science are also eligible for University Scholarships, which carry a stipend of \$350 and exemption from tuition fees. Candidates must not be over thirty years of age at the time the appointment is made. Applications should be submitted before February 15.

INDIANA LIBRARY ASSOCIATION Loan Fund Committee, c/o Ruth A. Bean, Chairman, Evansville Public Library, Evansville, Ind., grants loans up to \$500 for members to obtain professional training.

INSTITUTE OF INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION, 2 West 45th Street, New York 19, N.Y., with the cooperation of American colleges and universities and its representatives abroad, the Division of Cultural Cooperation of the Department of State, and civic organizations and women's clubs, arranges for fellowships usually covering board, lodging and tuition.

KAPPA KAPPA GAMMA FRATERNITY Fellowship Committee, c/o Mrs. Bernard Lillieberg, P.O. Box 924, Lamar, Colo., Chairman, awards three Graduate Fellowships of \$500 each to women not over thirty years of age who are graduates of institutions in which chapters of the fraternity are located.

ANNETTE PHELPS LINCOLN LOAN SCHOLARSHIP FUND aids young women of Ohio to prepare for librarianship or other professions. Applications should be submitted to the President of the Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs, who will refer applicants to the State Chairman of Loan Scholarships (President in 1945, Mrs. C. J. Goldthorpe, 4321 Chester Drive, Youngstown 7, Ohio.)

LOUISIANA STATE UNIVERSITY has working fellowships and a student loan fund available to Library School students.

MARY C. McCANTS MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP, about \$200, was established from funds donated by Mrs. B. F. Bullard, a Board member of the Savannah (Georgia) Public Library, to enable a Georgia librarian or future librarian to complete a year of study in a library school or to take special summer courses in library science. The annual award, usually in April, is determined by a committee of award consisting of the Librarian of the Savannah Public Library and two other members of the Georgia Library Association appointed by the Executive Board.

McGILL UNIVERSITY LIBRARY SCHOOL awards the Ethelwyn M. Crossley Scholarship, founded in honor of a former student of the School, which is available to students who require financial assistance. The amount available annually is about \$60.00.

MAINE LIBRARY ASSOCIATION offers in 1945-46 one or more scholarship loans to assist in the education of properly qualified Maine persons who wish to make library work their career. Persons eligible for admission to an accredited library school will receive first consideration, although no positive rules are set down. One or more loans will be granted as the situation seems to warrant, or, if no proper applicants present themselves, the award will be held over until another year. Repayment of the scholarship loans may be deferred until after the recipients have completed their formal education and are employed. Applications should be sent to any officer of the Association. (Officers, 1945, President Mary D. Herrick, Nason College, Springvale; secretary Mary E. Tobey, Public Library, Waterville.)

MASSACHUSETTS LIBRARY ASSOCIATION Scholarship Committee, c/o Chairman Thurston Taylor, Free Public Library, Worcester, awards a scholarship of \$100-\$200 to assist an especially promising candidate, preferably a resident of Massachusetts, to take or to complete a library school course. Application should be made before May 1.

METHODIST CHURCH BOARD OF EDUCATION, through the Division of Educational Institutions, 310 Broadway, Nashville 2, Tenn., grants loans to members of the church under certain conditions for study in accredited library schools and accredited institutions in general. The General Conference of 1944 made provision for scholarships to be awarded to applicants who qualify.

UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN DEPARTMENT OF LIBRARY SCIENCE awards the Margaret Mann Scholarship, \$75, to a resident student in the second semester who is in need of financial assistance and who, in addition to fulfilling the requirements of the Department, is outstanding in intellectual ability and gives promise of success in library work.

THE NATIONAL FEDERATION OF BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONAL WOMEN'S CLUBS, INC., 1319 Broadway, New York 23, N.Y., through several hundred of its clubs has available scholarships or loan funds, administered under local rules.

NEBRASKA LIBRARY ASSOCIATION has a small loan fund to aid a candidate to attend a library school accredited by the Board of Education for Librarianship of the American Library Association. (President, 1945, Margaret E. Rutledge, University of Nebraska Libraries, Lincoln.)

NEW HAMPSHIRE LIBRARY ASSOCIATION pays the expenses of a member to attend the two weeks' summer library institute given by the Extension Division of the New Hampshire State Library. Apply to the First Vice President, Mrs. John H. Starie, Silver Lake, N.H.

NEW HAMPSHIRE STATE LIBRARY EXTENSION DIVISION awards a few scholarships to New Hampshire librarians which pay approximately two-thirds of the expense of the two weeks' summer library institute conducted by the New Hampshire State Library. Apply to the Assistant State Librarian, Concord, N.H.

NEW JERSEY LIBRARY ASSOCIATION arranges for a competitive examination among its members for two George M. La Monte Scholarships of \$100 each for attendance at a summer school for librarians.

The Sarah B. Askew Scholarship fund for graduate study, established in 1942, has not as yet reached an amount sufficient for the awarding of a scholarship. (See also LOUISE GRAHAM HINSDALE SCHOLARSHIP.)

NEW YORK LIBRARY ASSOCIATION Scholarship and Awards Committee grants loans up to \$300 to a member of the Association for study at an accredited library school. Apply to Wharton Miller, Director, University Library, Syracuse University, Syracuse, N.Y.

NEW YORK (N.Y.) LIBRARY CLUB Board of Scholarships and Awards provides scholarships paying tuition fees for the completion of the first year of professional training to one or two members of the club in positions in libraries in the metropolitan area who have been employed for not less than one year prior to the date of making application. Applications, including a statement of provisional admission to an accredited library school together with satisfactory references, must be presented in person to the Chairman of the Board not later than January 31. (President, 1945-46, Rose E. Bootes, Columbia University Libraries, New York 27, N.Y.)

UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA SCHOOL OF LIBRARY SCIENCE, Chapel Hill, has available a few scholarships covering cost of tuition for the regular session only, on the basis of college record, knowledge of foreign languages and personal qualifications for library work.

NORTH CAROLINA COLLEGE FOR NEGROES SCHOOL OF LIBRARY SCIENCE offers a limited number of scholarships, covering the cost of tuition, available for the academic year 1945-46. These scholarships will be awarded on the basis of qualifications and need of the applicants. They are available to nonresidents as well as to residents of North Carolina. Scholarship applications should be sent to Susan Grey Akers, Dean of the Library School, Durham, N.C.; before August 1, 1945.

PENNSYLVANIA LIBRARY ASSOCIATION provides scholarships for attendance at the summer library school of the Pennsylvania State College. (President, 1945-46, Helen A. Ganser, State Teachers College, Millersville, Pa.)

PI LAMBDA THETA Committee on Studies and Awards makes two annual awards of \$400 each for significant research on some aspect of professional problems of women. Any person, whether or not engaged in educational work, is eligible for consideration. Only unpublished studies may be submitted for the award, and three copies of the final report of the completed research study must be submitted by July 15. Address inquiries to Chairman, May Seago, University of California, Los Angeles 24, Calif.

PRATT INSTITUTE LIBRARY SCHOOL, Brooklyn, N.Y., awards five scholarships established by its Graduates Association. These scholarships pay all third-quarter tuition and fees, and they are awarded by the faculty to the students who have led the class in scholarship and also in contributing to the well-being of the class as a group. The Graduates Association also has provided a loan fund which so far has been adequate to meet all approved requests.

RHODE ISLAND LIBRARY ASSOCIATION awards an annual scholarship of \$50 to a librarian employed in a Rhode Island library for attendance at an accredited library school. Address inquiries to F. P. Allen, Rhode Island State College, Kingston, R.I., (Librarian).

JULIUS ROSENWALD FUND, 4901 Ellis Avenue, Chicago 15, Ill., offers fellowships to men and women under three categories:

- I. To Negroes.
- II. To white Southerners who wish to work on some problem distinctive to the South and who expect to make their careers in the South.
- III. To persons from any part of the United States in the field of race relations.

The fellowships are intended to provide opportunities for special experience or advanced study to individuals who have already given evidence of exceptional ability and who wish to prepare themselves further. It is expected that candidates will be not younger than 24 years nor older than 35 years, though the Committee is willing to consider very exceptional cases on their merits. Persons in library science and certain other professions can be considered only for advanced work beyond the initial professional degree.

The term of the fellowships will normally be one year, and renewals will be considered only in exceptional cases. The amount of the award will be determined in each case on the basis of the expected expenses involved and of all other factors which enter into the given application, including the length of time proposed. It is expected that the awards will average \$1500 for a full year's work.

SOUTH DAKOTA LIBRARY ASSOCIATION (See DOROTHEA HEINS LOAN FUND.)

UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA GRADUATE SCHOOL OF LIBRARY SCIENCE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION AND ITS PREDECESSOR (the Los Angeles Library School Alumni Association) has created a loan fund for the use of students in need of financial aid. Apply to University of Southern California, Graduate School of Library Science, Los Angeles 7, Calif.

HENRY STRONG EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION LOAN FUND, 50 South LaSalle Street, Chicago, Ill., aids students to obtain a practical, literary, scientific, mechanical or business education in western or southern universities or colleges. Juniors and seniors of above-average ability are given preference. Applications for loans should be made to the college student loan counselor or directly to the office of the Foundation. Interest is charged at the rate of 4% a year from date of graduation; payments are spread over a four-year period.

SPECIAL LIBRARIES ASSOCIATION through its Student Loan Fund offers financial assistance to those members who wish to carry on professional study in an accredited library school. An applicant must have been a member of the Special Libraries Association for at least one year prior to the date of application, must maintain membership throughout the duration of the loan and must be endorsed by the president of the local chapter unless he is from a section without a chapter. Preference is given to persons employed in a special library or persons with satisfactory experience in a special library who want to further their education in librarianship or take the first year of study in an accredited library school. Applications must be accompanied by a statement of provisional admission to an accredited library school. Loans vary in amount but do not exceed \$500. No interest is charged if the total amount is repaid within one year of the date of completion of the course; otherwise interest at the rate of 3% per annum is charged on the unpaid balance. Loans must be secured by promissory note and collateral in form of a life insurance policy.

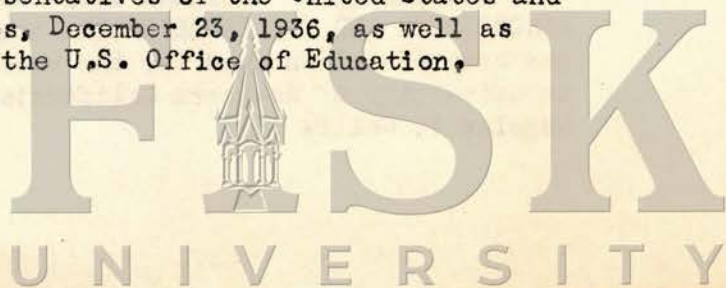
Applications should be sent to the Chairman, Committee on Student Loan Fund, Special Libraries Association, 31 East 10th Street, New York, N.Y., at least three months before the beginning of an academic session, preferably by March 1, June 1, or November 1 of each year.

SYRACUSE UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF LIBRARY SCIENCE, Syracuse, N.Y., awards eight annual grants-in-aid at the beginning of the second semester on consideration of the student's need, achievement and aptitude for library work.

Alumni Loan Fund supplies loans annually to students of high scholastic ability and general qualifications. Applications should be made in writing to the Director of the School before January 1.

TORONTO PUBLIC LIBRARY STAFF ASSOCIATION has established the George H. Locke Memorial Scholarship in the University of Toronto Library School, not less than \$100 to be awarded annually or otherwise to persons holding the degree of Bachelor of Library Science of the University of Toronto or the diploma in Librarianship of the University, who by their academic record, personality and library experience have shown themselves capable of advancing their profession by further study. Applications should be submitted to the University Registrar on or before March 1.

UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF STATE, DIVISION OF CULTURAL RELATIONS, with the cooperation of the U.S. Office of Education, Federal Security Agency, Washington, administers the program of Exchange Professorships and Graduate Student or Teacher Exchanges under the convention signed by representatives of the United States and twenty other American republics at Buenos Aires, December 23, 1936, as well as other similar programs. WESTERN RESERVE UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF LIBRARY SCIENCE, Cleveland, Ohio, has available several scholarships and loan funds as follows:

For 1945-46 eight scholarships, \$150 each, offered by the University.

William Howard Brett Scholarship, provided by the Greater Cleveland Chapter of the Alumni Association, to be awarded preferably to residents of Greater Cleveland, the amount of the awards depending upon funds available.

Edith L. Eastman Scholarship, created as a memorial by Miss Alice Stoeltzing in 1924, to be awarded to a woman student, the amount of the award depending upon funds available.

Alice S. Tyler Scholarship, created by the Alumni, to offer \$50 annually.

In general, awards will be based upon scholarship, adaptability for library work, and financial need.

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION has provided a Loan Fund from which a limited number of students may arrange for tuition loans for the spring session. Loans will not exceed \$150, the amount of tuition for the session.

WISCONSIN EDUCATION ASSOCIATION, School Library Section, has available a scholarship of \$50 for a student attending the University of Wisconsin Library School. Preference will be given a student primarily interested in school library work. Apply to the Library School.

WISCONSIN LIBRARY ASSOCIATION has made available a scholarship of \$250 to be awarded a resident of Wisconsin attending the University of Wisconsin Library School. The award is made on a basis of need and merit.

WISCONSIN LIBRARY SCHOOL ALUMNI ASSOCIATION has made available the Mary Emogene Hazeltine Scholarship, \$300, to a student attending the University of Wisconsin Library School. Apply to George C. Allez, Director, Library School, University of Wisconsin, 811 State Street, Madison 5, before August 15.

The Association also maintains a loan fund for students in need of financial assistance, available after two months in residence. Loans do not exceed \$100.

Library School students from other states than Wisconsin may apply for Non-Resident Scholarships awarded by the University of Wisconsin. Applications should be in the hands of the Chairman of the Committee on Loans and Undergraduate Scholarships of the University before July first.
