Dear Miss Jaxon: Dr. F. D. Patterson has just left Chicago. During his visit here, we talked over many things, among which is your desire to take further training.

I write to say to you, again, that I have not forgotten this wish on your part, but that the situation is unchanged. If you must depend upon money from the Julius Rosenwald Fund for this training, it will have to be delayed until such time as additional funds are in my hands for use at Tuskegee, or until we have developed our project there to the point where our objectives are well set out and more nearly perfected. As I said to you before, I think you will occupy at some time a key position in this whole set-up and that under those circumstances I should be favorably inclined toward seeing that you are well prepared to do whatever job fits into the whole scheme. Truth is, I am not contemplating such a big program, but I am having to look at it with a very small amount of available funds.
