when Mr. Hill and I visited the school a few months ago I did not get to see you. but I did have the opportunity of looking over some of your new buildings which seemed to be very fine. Just how much of the building program has been completed?

How is the plan progressing for the new county training school in Peach county? I know you and Mr. Hill have been working on this since the new county was formed.

Dear Mr. Sterns

Subject: Fort Valley High & Industrial School Georgia

You wrote me to find out about the Fort Valley High and Industrial School, Georgia. I took the matter up with Mr. Hunt, one among the best colored men that I have known in all of my experience, and am enclosing a long letter from him, giving full details. I sent you a copy of my letter to Mr. Hunt, which you have on file. The information was gotten in such way that I am sure he does not even suspect that Mr. Rosenwald requested it.

His total building program calls for \$270,000, but the G. E. B. grant of \$100,000 was conditioned on a supplement of \$100,000 by the college. Still they had in hand insurance money and other funds possibly sufficient to make up the additional \$70,000 required.

You will note that he has already had subscribed \$45,000, all of which has been paid in except \$7,000 or \$8,000. He states that a New York friend agrees to give \$10,000 toward an endowment as soon as the building program is completed. He feels optimistic over raising the balance of the \$100,000 in spite of the fact that both the cotton and peach crop in Peach county and that section the State is far below normal.

Mr. Hill and Mr. Hunt have been working for sometime to get a county training school in the new Peach county, and Mr. Hunt has agreed to deed to the county several acres of land for this purpose. I note that they were to have \$25,000 out of a bond issue, but there seems to be a little doubt about their getting the full amount. I am taking this up with Mr. Hill, hoping that he may be able to help them.

It is interesting to note that Miss Anna T. Jeanes made her first contribution to the Fort Valley Migh and Industrial School and that it was through Mr. Hunt that she possibly became interested in the whole field which has resulted in the most excellent work being done by Dr. Dillard and the Jeanes Agents.

Mr. Hunt, Principal of Fort Valley High and Industrial School called to discuss with Mr. Embree some problems affecting the progress of Negroes in his section of Georgia and through the South generally.

He pointed out that though Houston and Peach Counties (until recently one county) had some 14 or 16 Rosenwald Schools, the services of Farm and Home Demonstration Agents, a Jeanes Teacher and a Community Nurse, there is a marked restlessness among the people. They seem to long for something they may have heard about, but have not seen. Their lives are made up pretty largely of hard work with little hope for betterment. He suggested that he would like to see something done concerning the prob-His thought was that a play program might center lem of recreation. around the Rosenwald Schools, or around a school like Fort Valley. The need is for a worker who could teach both adults and children to play, directing their activities and helping them to make their lives a little less drab. Mr. Embree pointed out that the Julius Rosenwald Fund had given its attention principally to education and that though the same or similar suggestions had come from other quarters, he did not see the way clear to take an active interest in a recreation project.

Mr. Hunt then took up the paucity of libraries, especially at Fort Valley. He says the school has a Carnegie Building and about 5000 books, more or less suitable. The need is for more books, and modern ones specially selected for the people who are to use them. Mr. Embree told him that the Julius Rosenwald Fund was beginning to help with libraries for Rosenwald Schools, and that a few library offers had been made to schools of a different type. Fort Valley might be discussed for a possible gift of books.

Mr. Hunt's third point was with reference to the distressing state of the Negro farmer. In spite of all the reports about large Negro populations in Chicago and New York, the majority of American Negroes are still on the land in the South and will probably always remain so. Their condition at present savors of peonage. They are mostly tenant farmers and croppers, with little chance of getting ahead. Some years ago a few had acquired land, but having the old southern idea of large plantations, they took on too great a burden and land ownership ended disastrously for most of them. In cases where the father had obtained the land, the younger folks, when grown sought other occupations than farming. With the work of the Farm Demonstration Agents, methods are improving, but Mr. Hunt feels the great need is for some emphasis to be placed on the Negroes owning the land. They need to be taught to acquire and work a small farm.

Mr. Embree reported that conversations had been held with a number of people interested in seeing an experiment similar to Fairway Farms carried out in the South. The probability being that Tuskegee and Auburn would co-operate in a demonstration of farm ownership for both white and colored farmers in Alabama. Mr. Embree said the Fund was investigating the possibility and might invest a sum of money in the project, if success seemed assured. This enterprise was to be operated on a business basis entirely.

Mr. Hunt urged that Georgia and her large Negro population be kept in mind in the working out of these problems.

My dear Mr. Rosenwald:

As I stated to you at the annual meeting of the Tuskegee Normal & Industrial Institute board of trustees in New York City on October 25th, on my last trip up from Tuskegee (in August) I stopped over at Fort Valley, Georgia for two weeks.

This was at the request of Mr. H. A. Hunt, principal of the Fort Valley Wigh & Industrial School, and upon the recommendation of Dr. Moton and Treasurer Carter.

The enclosed report of audit and that of the accompanying survey then made tell a story in figures that I would very much like to bring before you in the shape of a plea. And while I have told Professor Hunt I intended trying to interest a very charitable man in his problem, I did not -- nor will I--tell him I am approaching you.

At present they have a very fine looking plant, with the best of their buildings—the Academic—just coming into use this fall, and another about to be started. The enclosed five photographs, taken by my assistant, show these structures; as also the principal's home.

From correspondence I saw in the office of George Foster Peabody you made a contribution some years ago to their building fund as then contemplated. They have, however, seemingly always—or nearly so—been burdened with an overhanging floating indebteaness that has kept their noses too close to the grindstone for them to see beyond.

There appears to be a great opportunity there for good work, and in my humble opinion they have a most sensible and efficient man at the head in the person of Professor Hunt, who will from now on do everything humanly possible to correct the lapses set forth in our report. And if what would ostensibly be a loan-perhaps actually a gift-could be arranged so as to lift this incubus of \$15,000.00 from their should resumuch good might be aone.

As mentioned above you have "dipped into this pot" before, and you may have such a knowledge of their affairs -- fer transcending mine--as not to warrant your doing anything at this time. I hope not, however, for I feel the need is great.

If my firm is continued as the School's auditors, you may depend upon my personal oversight each time, and the most careful scrutiny of all their transactions. I believe that our reports speak for themselves, but if there is anything further I can add in the way of explanation, from knowledge gained in going over the year's transactions and through our contact with their personnel while at Fort Valley, please command me.

Under all the attendant circumstances and having in mind my purpose I do not consider I am committing any breach of faith in submitting the enclosures for your attention. I would be glad, however, if they were returned to our files.

My dear Mr. Embree:

For a little more than three years we have been raising money for the purpose of improving our school plant here at Fort Valley. The total amount secured from all sources for that purpose is upwards of \$300,000. Less than \$30,000 of the pledges toward this amount remain unpaid and by far the greater part of the unpaid pledges we look upon as absolutely certain. Included in the total is a little more than \$25,000 for our Rosenwald Training School Building and equipment, toward which the Rosenwald Fund made an appropriation of \$2100.00.

During the period , when it was necessary for me to devote so much of my time to raising funds for building and equipment, it was impossible to give as much time as usual to raising funds for current expenses with the result that while we have been improving our plant very greatly we have run behind somewhat with our annual subscriptions while our current expenses have increased . This unfortunate situation is made worse by the fact that whereas several years ago the General Education Board gave us an appropriation of \$7500 for current expenses, some four years ago they decreased the appropriation from year to year until last year, when it ceased entirely. Under some other conditions this situation might be remedied materially by the American Church Institute for Negroes under whose direction our school is operated, but just now the director of that organization is devoting his energy to raising funds for buildings and equipment for other schools under his care and for that reason is unable to make but little increase in appropriations for current expenses. This condition will probably be changed within the next five years as during that time he will probably be able to get the other schools reasonably well equipped and can devote more time to raising money for maintenance. In the meantime, we are really facing quite a difficult situation and I fear shall be obliged to curtail to the extent of crippling our work seriously unless we can receive substantial assistance from some source for about five years.

I have made this explanation as a basis for asking for appropriations from the Rosenwald School Fund as follows: 1929 ,\$7500; 1930,\$7500; 1931, \$5000; 1932 \$3000; 1933, \$3000; 1934,\$2000.

I have not thought it necessary to burden you with details as to the need for work of this kind in Georgia nor a long letter setting forth the merits of our school. On this line I can do nothing better than to call attention to the fact that toward the fund for Buildings and Improvements referred to above, the General Education Board appropriated \$125,000 and to let you know that we are privileged to give as references our State Department of Education, the Phelps-Stokes Fund and any number of men and women well informed on the educational needs of Negroes.

I earnestly hope that the Directors of the Rosenwald Fund will find it possible to give favorable consideration to our application and I want not only to invite, but to urge, you to visit our school at the very first opportunity and learn at first hand something of its needs and possibilities.

Dear Mr. Hunt: Your note of February 28 was handed to me by President Hubert when I visited him in Savannah. The question of support to private institutions centering their attention upon work of secondary school grade is receiving a good deal of attention from us. It is, as you will realize, a very difficult matter because we must take into account not only the merits of one institution, but general policies which will be applicable to a number of schools throughout the country. The matter is coming before our trustees at the meeting in May. If a general policy is adopted, we should be in a position to consider specific applications. If we should do anything, I think we should be inclined to limit our support to a three-year rather than to a fiveyear period, and I feel that we should have to make contributions of smaller amounts than those suggested in your letter.

At any rate, you may be assured that we will give this whole matter careful attention and when a decision is reached we will write you further.

Dear Mr. Hunt :

I would be willing to recommend to our officers that they give your college the same consideration that we have given the State Colleges in helping to providing a library, or additional books for your library. We have contributed one-third the cost of books up to \$2,500 for the Fund's part. On this bassis of one dollar for each two from other sources how much would like to have appropriated for your college library we have not contributed toward equipment in any of the state schools. If I can have your application within the next few days it will likely be in time to be passed on at the next meeting of the Trustees, the second week of May.

Mr.Foreman or I, possibly both of us, will try to be present at your 25th Anniversary exercises. On closer observation I am inclined to believe that your exercises are to be in May, although I am not quite clear about this. You probably gave the month in the telegram which Miss Carney sent on to Mr. Foreman. This is Saturday afternoon and my office force are not in.

I might say that the only conditions in the aid for college libraries are (1) a suitable place to take care of the books, (2) that a trained librarian be incharge, and (3) that the books to be purchased be approved by Miss Florence Curtis of Hampton Library school. She has been most helpful to all the state schools in this particular phase of the work. She has prepared a list of books which was published as Hampton Leaflet No.120. This will be furnished you, if desired.

Your letter of the 27th brought us good news. We are greatly pleased to think that you and Mr. Foreman will be with us for our 25th Anniversary Exercises and we are glad indeed to find that we may secure some assistance from the Rosenwald Fund for books.

I have just looked up the copy of my letter to you and can't understand how I have been so careless as not to mention the month -May- as the one in which we are to hold our exercises. I think I did however, mention it in the telegram.

With the hope that we may be able to raise the two-thirds of the limit, \$2500, for books, I shall be glad if you will put us on the list for that amount. We shall make an earnest effort to raise the full amount but I am supposing that if we should raise, say, only \$1000 that the Rosenwald Fund would be willing to give its share for this lesser amount. If the Fund requires applicants to raise the full amount for which they apply we might do well to "play safe" and make application for a little smaller amount but we are really so anxious to make our library what it should be that we shall do our best to secure the larger amount if possible.

You will remember of course that we have a good building and I am glad to state that we have a trained librarian recommended to us by Miss Curtis of the Hampton Library School. You may be interested to know that Miss Curtis seemed very much pleased with what we had in the way of a library and the young woman she recommended was one of the best in her class. We shall not only be willing but very glad indeed to have Miss Curtis approve the list of books which we will purchase.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE CHURCHMAN:

SPECIAL challenge just made through A SPECIAL change just have a me is the particular occasion for my writing this for your publication. My friend, Julius Rosenwald, of Chicago, writes me he will give the last \$10,000 as soon as the remaining \$90,000 is completed, to secure the \$100,000 offered by the General Board. Mr. Rosenwald knows the need for such work as the Fort Valley School is doing in preparing teachers for the public schools of the South, and also knows, as few men do, the quality of the work done by the different schoois. He is a trustee of Tuskegee Institute, to whose recent campaign for funds he gave largely, and secured additional sums from Chicago thereby. Mr. Rosenwald has, through one of the wisest funds ever established, procured and supervised the building of over 3,400 Rosenwald public schools for Negroes throughout all the Southern States. These schools cost about twelve million dol-lars, of which he provided about one-fourth. Negroes and whites of the South individually gave a less sum, and by reason of the incentives thus given and their knowledge of the wisdom, efficiency and economy shown in the construction of these school buildings, the public funds of the South contributed more than one-half-probably many years in advance of what they would otherwise have given, with the result that schools were provided probably 50 per cent better than otherwise.

This action of an eminent Jew emphasizes the quality and importance of the constructive work being carried on through The American Church Institute for Negroes, organized in 1905, under the presidency of Bishop Greer with the cooperation of the then Board of Missions of our Episcopal Church.

The purpose was to coordinate, make more efficient, more fully known to the Church, and thereby secure the necessary increased funds for the work being carried on by Industrial High Schools in Southern Dioceses, under the direction of trustees from the dioceses, St. Paul's in Virginia and St. Augustines in North Carolina being the most prominent, Bishop Tucker and Bishop Cheshire being actively interested in the work as presidents of the Boards of Trustees. The charter was granted by Virginia, thus emphasizing the complete cooperation of the South, which was poverty-stricken following the Civil War, and the North, through members of the Church, which was one throughout the whole country. This was the endeavor to have a worth-while part in the more complete restoration of the Union through the prayers, gifts and work of Northern and Southern men and women.

The chief end in developing these vocational secondary schools was to provide ca-pable and religious teachers for the Negro public schools throughout the South. Aid to this end from Northern citizens is peculiarly fitting and an obligation as well. The public school supported by local and state taxa-tion can be no more efficient than the wealth of its own section will provide. Therefore the dire poverty of the South, following the devastation of the war, and the wiping out of a great part of its supposed wealth by the freeing of the Negro slaves, prevented its soon attaining even partial efficiency in its schools even for the whites, who control government. The many schools and colleges like Hampton, Spelman, Fisk and others, started by Northern friends of the Negro, em-phasized the interest immediately shown; but, as the generation thus interested passed, the newer interests of the coming generation precluded the starting of more such schools to provide for the increasing population.



In 1904 my wife and I were influenced by officers of the General Education Board to come to Fort Valley for the purpose of building a school to serve the great masses of Negroes in the Black Belt section of Georgia.

The field agents of this organization have visited the school regularly and watched its progress during all of these years. A little over three years ago, at the suggestion of one of these officials, we set out to raise a fund of \$300,000 for buildings and equipment. The General Education Board appropriated \$100,000 toward this fund in addition to \$25,000 which it had given us a short while before. Mr. Rosenwald also contributed toward this fund.

As we neared the completion of this fund and the larger items of the building and equipment program had been completed, we saw the need for a few other things, as the installation of a Sewage Disposal Plant, additional Bire Protection and the erection of a building to be used as an Infirmary. There is no hospital anywhere near us and both students and teachers, when ill, must be kept in crowded dormitories. An Infirmary would serve emergency cases in the community also. In addition to supplying these needs such a building would furnish a suitable place for our classes in Home Nursing conducted for school girls in advanced classes and the women of the community and midwives for miles around.

These improvements are estimated to cost \$25,000 and we decided that we would attempt to raise this amount as an Anniversary Fund, commemorating twenty five years of service which Mrs. Hunt and I have given to Fort Valley. We have succeeded to the extent that \$20,000 now will complete the total of

\$325,000 for both of these funds.

We are deeply grateful for assistance given by Mr. Rosenwald in other years and I am making a special plea for this balance needed now to round out a plant which will enable us to work more effectively.

My dear Mr. Harrell:

Please allow me to apologize for having waited so long before sending a line to thank you for kindness shown me when I called at your office sometime ago.

As you will probably recall, officers of the Julius Rosenwald Fund kindly agreed to give us some assistance for the purchase of books for our library. While we hope to raise \$2000 or more, it will probably take us some little time to do this. In the meantime there are some books which we need badly and I am writing to ask if we must raise the whole amount and keep it in hand in order to secure a gift from the fund, or if you are willing to match smaller sums- 50ϕ for each dollar we raise- and allow us to spend this for the books which we need most?

I should like also to know if your fund will match the cost of new books approved by Miss Curtis. We sometimes have friends to send us good books directly from the publishers. Only recently we had copies of Dr. Moton's book: "What the Negro Thinks" and "Lost Spirituals" by Lily Young Cohen. COMMENT

PREPAID INSURANCE-\$ 2,759.80:

Fire insurance in the sum of \$ 310,600.00 is carried on the Buildings and Equipment and the premium paid to June 15, 1934 and the prepaid premium for the next two years has been set up as a prepaid item, since the full amount is not applicable to the current year. The policies covering this insurance are carried by the American Church Institute for Negroes in New York.

PLANT AND EQUIPMENT ASSETS

MOVABLE EQUIPMENT-\$ 30,479.18:

The inventories of movable equipment were taken by your teachers and employees and the extensions and additions only proven by us. Proper depreciation for the period under review has been written off by us. For details by Departments, see Schedule "2".

BUILDINGS AND SHRUBBERY-\$312,817.72:

On Schedule "4" will be found the details of all buildings and fixed equipment which totals the sum of \$ 345,117.88 and from this sum we have deducted accrued depreciation to May 31, 1932 in the sum of \$32,300.16, leaving a depreciated value as shown above of \$ 312,817.72.

CONDUITS - \$ 8,918.99:

We find no recorded changes in this account during the period covered by this report.

LANDS - \$ 9.765.00:

No changes appear of record in this account during the current fiscal year.

ENDOWMENT ASSETS

ENDOWMENT SECURITIES \$ 35,000.00:

The securities purchased with Endowment Funds are held by the American Church Institute for Negroes in New York and only the income from these securities pass thru your records. The purchase price of these securities was \$ 35,064.00; the \$ 64.00 being paid out of Current Funds and carried in the Current Assets and deducted here, leaving a net amount of \$ 35,000.00, this being the amount of the gifts for Endowment purposes.
