Dear Mr. Smith:

I am sending you herewith a summary of the reports received after the Rosenwald Day Program March 1. If this does not contain all the items you desire let me know and I will add others. I sent out 400 programs to that many principals not considering the hundred that I sent to county superintendents and others. You will observe that I received 175 reports. I do not know if this is a fairly good percentage or not. Neither can I explain why everyone did not report to me. You will also observe that only 103 of these houses were reported insured. I am not sure that the negro reporting knows every time as to whether the house is insured but it is my intention to take the matter up in each case where there is no insurance reported with the county superintendent. I think the amount for equipment is a little exaggerated but the collection, I believe to be correct. As to the condition of the buildings every one might have been reported excellent, for every one reported good. It is difficult to decide where good leaves off and excellent begins or vice versa, but I believe every Rosenwald building in our State is in good condition. If you will multiply these totals by two I really believe you will just about reach the absolute results of the Rosenwald Day in our State. It certainly was far reaching in its influence.

A school in Smith County, known as Rabbit, reported perfect on every point considered and in addition the collection amounted to \$2.00 per capita for every one who attended the meeting. This one item alone put it ahead of several others that scored perfect on other points. I have notified the teacher of the community whose name is Mrs. Schuyler and whose address is Overton, Texas. I have also notified the County Superintendent; I notified him in person while with him a few days ago and I also had him to verify the report before I notified the principal. I thought this was best.

Again, I say if this report is not exactly what you desire or if you wish to ask questions do so. I have all the reports on file.

The Superintendent of Bowie County took personal supervision of the Rosenwald School Day Program, wrote a personal letter to every principal in Bowie County teaching in a Rosenwald school building and assisted in other ways to put it over.

The program is prepared and mailed from this office with the aid of the county and city Superintendents at a considerable cost of time and money. It merely seems there should be a hearty, spontaneous and complete response from all principals. The attendance reported is encouraging. The collections are fair. This collection is for the benefit of the local school and I think should be liberal.

Dear Mr. Smith:

We have Mrs. Smith's letter of July 18, in which she asks for the report of the Rosenwald School Day Program in Texas. A copy of this report is enclosed and also a copy of other Rosenwald Activities.

I note that you have to offer several high school library sets. I was at a conference of vocational teachers in Prairie View last week and at that conference I took occasion to call their attention to the availability of 35 or 40 high school libraries, and I advised them to look into their financial situations to see if money could not be acquired to secure one of these. I hope within the near future we may have a call for some of these sets of books.

I also note that you will have a statement to make concerning elementary school libraries soon. I am very much interested in this proposition and feel that this is a field in which very much work should be done. My observation is that the elementary school libraries of the larger communities are very poor, and I hope we may be able to do something to bring them out of the condition in which they are now.

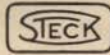
