To The Honorable, The Regents, University System of Georgia State Capitol, Atlanta, Georgia. Attention, Chancellor S.V.Sanford

Sirs:

A proposed budget for the Fort Valley State College, for the year ending June

30, 1941, is hereby respectfully submitted.

In support of this budget there is also attached a study of prospective income and expenditures for the years 1939-1940, 1940-1941, 1941-1942, 1942-1943, 1943-1944, 1944-1945, based on a proposed annual increase in University System support calculated to meet (a) building needs here, and (b) withdrawal in 1943-1944 of Rosenwald support.

The Julius Rosemwald Fund grant to this institution expires in 1943-1944.

Grateful as we are for this gift, we cannot help looking forward to the year 1944-1945, when this aid will not be available. Nor can we believe, without a gradual approach to the point, that the State of Georgia, through its University

System, would be prepared immediately to take up the slack.

For permenence, a gradual increase in appropriations from the State seems imperative. All will agree that the present discrepancy between State aid and

philanthropic aid is extremely unhealthy, and fundamentally unsound.

Faculty salaries and other increases in the proposed budget are based on standards of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. To meet those standards we are obliged to build an organization that could as easily care for 500 as for 250 students. Our dormitory space limits our enrollment, in this small town, to 250. In 1944-1945, at our present rate, this institution, without philanthropic support, is going to be weighed in the balance of the economy with which it does a good educational job for Negro boys and girls; and found wanting.

To make the Rosenwald grant of permanent value to this State, if this institution could receive, for maintenance and for buildings as shown herein, \$21,250 in 1939-1940; \$38,000 in 1940-1941; \$47,400 in 1941-1942; \$46,100 in 1942-1943; \$53,840 in 1943-1944; and \$75,840.00 in 1944-1945, a Class A, Southern Association

college for Negroes might, by then, be established.

Without such gradual increases, what is done here may be valuable as a domon-

stration; but its abiding value is doubtful.

What is said here recognizes, - the immense difficulties in which the University System, through lack of finance, is involved; the trials and tribulations attendant upon bringing Fort Valley even this far; the excellent and justifiable claims of the other two Negro units in the System.

We believe our prospectus sets forth a minimum for any state higher institution

that wishes to be accredited.

This is the second of five annual budgets toward which the Rosenwald Fund is expected to contribute \$50,000. To put off until another year even a start toward taking up the slack that is coming in 1944-1945 seems, to me, inadvisable.

I therefore, with all respectfulness and humility, but also with all conviction, earnestly beseech the Regents to give due consideration to the possibility of squeezing a little more money out for Fort Valley, as the institution must look toward the year 1944-1945 when the Resemwald grant will be no more.





My dear Miss Elvidge:

In reply to your letter of March 20th, 1940, let me say that the University System of Georgia has so far appropriated and paid to our institution the sum of \$16,191.42. On the basis of sixty per cent payment for the remaining months of the fiscal year, we expect another \$5100.00 thus expecting to realize a total of \$21,291.42 during this current fiscal year.

It occurs to me that for your files you might wish to know, completely, the destination of the \$1,000.00 which we have charged, in the next quarterly budget, to the professional improvement of teachers. The seminar course granting credit at the Atlanta University to more than thirty members of our staff has been conducted here during the past year. This grant is expected to pay for the professional services of the Atlanta University staff as well as for the tuition of the prospective teachers. It is also expected to cover six weeks of planning together, of the members on the Elementary school staff, on curriculum problems under the supervision of the State Department of Education during the summer with the aid of Mr. Lester and Mrs. Whiting of the State Department of Education and again with graduate credit from the Atlanta University. I might add that, for expected compensation from Atlanta University, I have rendered services there in addition to my services here as President of this college. These have consisted of professional service rendered to regular graduate students of that institution in the Department of Education.

My dear Mr. Embree:

Thank you for your letter of March 22nd.

Under separate cover I am sending you a copy of our 1940-1941 budget which has just been submitted to the Chancellor. You will note that I have prefaced the former formal budget with ten pages of prospectus for the years, including the years after the Rosenwald Grant expires. You will note also that percentages of estimated income on the basis of a proposed annual increase from the Regents have been included in the graft. Of course I have no expectation that this money will be made available for next year but thought it wise to at least bring it to the attention of the Regents. I understood from Miss Elvidge that she wished to know the exact amount that we had received from the Regents this year. To date we have received \$16,191.42 with the expectation of receiving, within this fiscal year expiring on June 30th, the sum of \$5100.00. This then would make a total of \$21,291.42.

With reference to the kindness with which you took time to answer my extensive remarks with reference to a proposed scholarship dan for younger persons, I really am a believer of a method of selection in the use of standardized intelligence tests. I know that at Fisk they were almost infallible in spotting among the graduate students there those of outstanding ability who came from the smaller colleges. Of course the whole question of character is after all a question of intelligence - in a large degree. At least it is a question of adaptability. I hope you do not believe that I have all at once become an Anthony Comstock or some such person. I rather think it is that with advancing age and responsibility here, I have become acutely responsible of anything that might injure the reputation of the institution or effect its progress; and have therefore become extremely sensitive to such details of erratic behaviour in which I must confess I freely indulge myself perforce to the discomfiture of various college administrators in various places where I have before worked.

Dear Dr. Bond: I am sorry there has been such a long delay in answering your letter of May 21. I waited at first until I had had an opportunity to talk with Mr. Embree and Mr. Wale, and then had to be out of the office for a few days.

The funds which we are holding are not available for salary; this appropriation was made for "capital and extraordinary expenses" and must be used for that purpose; but we had expected July and August salaries to be met from our appropriation for current expenses for next year, 1940-41. Maybe we had better go back to the beginning and review the financial set-up.

Our first budget from you covered the year ending June 30, 1940, and showed expected income from the Fund of \$34,000 for current expenses and \$15,000 for capital items. Our appropriations for this same period were \$34,000 for current items and \$16,000 for capital expenditures. The \$1,000 difference we have discussed in earlier correspondence.

The \$54,000 appropriation has been paid in full. On the \$16,000 appropriation, we have sent you payments totalling \$4,500, leaving a balance of \$11,500 which may be called on for payment (for capital expenditures) at any time that funds are needed. This appropriation does not necessarily have to be paid within your 1939-40 fiscal year. Your budget for 1939-40, pages 52-a and 52-b, outlined in general how you proposed to use this grant. However, the funds do not have to be expended for the exact items listed there. We are willing to have you use this grant for whatever you feel are your most urgent needs within the realm of capital expenditures. Mr. Wale mentioned on his return from Fort Valley that with a small sum of money for the purchase of materials you could begin building one of the student homes. Such an expense as this naturally falls under this \$16,000 grant, and we stand ready to make payment on request.

Now to go on to your budget for the year ending June 30, 1941. This budget shows again \$34,000 for current expenses and \$16,000 for capital and extraordinary items. However, in the

UNIVERSII

proposed expenditures you seem to have estimated that you will spend \$40,000 for current expenses and only \$10,000 for capital improvements. So far no definite appropriation has been made to the Regents for this fiscal year, but the officers will make funds available before June 30. I just wanted to draw your attention to the fact that if the same division is made on our grant this year as was made last year, namely, the \$34,000-\$16,000 split, the expenditures will have to follow that same plan. I notice that this budget shows an estimated deficit of \$13,667. Have you any ideas as to how this deficit will be met?

My experience with other teacher-training institutions in Georgia has been that the regular audit report done by state auditors doesn't give one a clear picture as to how actual expenditures compare with the budget submitted to the Regents. If you are required to file with the Regents, at the end of the fiscal year, a statement of income and expenditures somewhat in the form of your annual budget to them, I should like very much to have an extra copy made for our files. However, if no such report is made, I think we can work out a much more condensed form that would give all the information we need.

I heartily agree with your suggestion of sending payments on our annual grants for current expenses in equal monthly installments, and I shall see that this plan is followed in the coming fiscal year.

This letter is long and involved. I shall be glad to translate any portion of it that is not clear.



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This report covers an examination of the books and records of the Fort Valley State College, for the year ended June 30, 1940, the first year's operation of this College as a State institution.

The officials of the old Fort Valley Normal and Industrial School, by agreement with the Board of Regents of the University System of the State, transferred all physical property of the school, free of any and all debts, to the Board of Regents, to be owned and operated by them as a unit of the University System of the State. The Julius Rosenwald Fund had agreed to give the Fort Valley Normal and Industrial School the sum of \$50 000 00 to settle all claims and debts against the School, in order that it could be transferred to the State, free of all debts, except \$15 000 00 of this fund was to be used to construct a religious center near the school!

The transfer of the physical property was made as of July 1, 1939, but the summer school then in session was to be operated and expenses paid by the old School. An audit was made to determine the status of the Fort Valley Normal and Industrial School, and this audit covered the summer session through the month of July. The Fort Valley State College account was opened in July but transaction in this account were not included in the audit of the old school.

It was ordered by the Superior Court of Peach County that out of the \$50 000 00 Rosenwald Fund, the deficit of the Fort Valley Normal and Industrial School should be paid, a stipulated sum to be paid to the widow of the late president of the school, a claim for attorneys fees was to be settled and paid, \$15 000 00 to be used in the construction of a religious center near the school, the cost of certain investigations by the Board of Regents was to be paid, and any balance was

to be transferred to the Board of Regents to be added to the endowment fund of the new college, the income from which is to be used to pay pensions to certain named employees, with the provision that if the income is sufficient to pay these pensions, an amount over that could be used for other purposes.

This \$50 000 00 fund was not handled by the Fort Valley State College, but a copy of the final report on this fund is on file at the College. A \$2 000 00 fund left by Felix M Walburg, to the Fort Valley Normal and Industrial School had been used for operating expenses; this was restored to the endowment fund as a debt of the old school, and the balance of \$6 502 53 from this \$50 000 00 fund was received by the Board of Regents and added to the endowment fund.

made in the old School's account, and there is a balance of \$78.85 in the Bank of Fort Valley to the credit of the Fort Valley Normal and Industrial School, which should be transferred to the endowment fund, also if a \$75.00 item that was charged back to this account in August 1939 is collected, it should be placed in the endowment fund.

The Fort Valley State College received \$1 125 43 from the \$50 000 00 fund as agent, to pay the balance due students by the old School.

The State Teachers & Agricultural College at Forsyth was merged into the new institution at Fort Valley.

The Regents transferred it's first funds to this College about mid-July, 1939 and this examination began with the receipt of this sheck and ended at June 30, 1940. No part of the 1939 summer achool session is included in this report, for as etated store this summer

session was operated by the old Fort Valley Normal and Industrial School.

CURRENT FUND BALANCE SHEET

This statement, page 1, reflects the financial position of this college after it's first years operation as a State institution, and shows a cash surplus of \$54 23.

The amount due from the Regents represents the balance of the allotment made to this College for the year ended June 30, 1940 and was received by the College in July 1940.

The amount due from students and faculty for room and board, was for the regular term, and the amount shown was reported by the treasurer to have been collected since July 1, 1940.

The amount due from Clinch and Walton County groups represents room board and fees for these groups for a special summer course. sponsored by the Rosenwald Fund, through Dr Cocking at the University of Georgia. As this was half completed at June 30, only the amount actually earned was included as an asset in this statement.

Accounts payable are shown in detail on pages 12 and 13; this information was furnished by the Treasurer. The reserves shown are self explanatory. A detail statement of the stocks and bonds held in the endowment fund is shown on page 5.

\$8 50 paid for floral offerings are unauthorized payments, and such items should be paid from private or personal funds of those desiring the flowers sent. Gifts in any form from State funds are prohibited by law.

The Rosenwald Fund purchased fifty acres of land for the College at a cost of \$3 075 00, which included \$75 00 attorney fee and court cost. This fund was paid direct to the Grantor, through the attorney who handled the transaction for the Rosenwald Fund, and the deed was made to the Board of Regents for the use of the Fol. Valley State College. This deed is properly recorded in the deed records of Peach County. This transaction was not entered on the books of the College.

GENERAL

President H M Bond and Treasurer L R Bywaters are under bond of \$7 500 00 each, bond Number F 39617.

It was recommended to the officials of the College that they request the Board of Regents to have all liability insurance now in force discontinued at expiration. The state is not liable in the first instance and any such insurance gives no protection to the state, and, therefore, the premium paid is a useless expenditure, in fact an illegal payment.

There were a few payments where purchase orders had not been obtained, but a requisition for a confirmation purchase order has been filed with the State Purchasing Department, and these payments were approved temporarily pending the receipt of these orders.

Records presented were neat and in good order, considering that this is the first year any of the officials had had any experience with the state accounting system. My examiner went over the books and records in detail with Treasurer Bywaters and made suggestions and recommendations that should be carried out in the future to insure that the proper records will be kept and in accordance with the state system.



SUBJECT: Transfer of Fort Valley Normal and Industrial Institute to the Regents of the University System of Georgia.

Attached are various documents relating to the transfer of the Fort Valley Normal and Industrial Institute to the state.

Exhibit I gives the assets holding in the endowment fund. Of the total cash of \$8,502.53, the sum of \$7,042.11 came from the balance of our \$50,000 payment. The extra \$1,500 probably represents accumulated income up to December of 1939.

Exhibit II is the court order to the trustees of the Fort Valley Normal and Industrial Institute, outlining the procedure of transfer.

Exhibit III is the report of the chairman of the old board of trustees of Fort Valley, showing that the instructions of the court had been followed.

Exhibit IV is the receipt given by the Board of Regents to the old Fort Valley corporation.

Exhibit V is the receipt given by the Board of Regents for the stocks and bonds originally held by the Fort Valley Normal and Industrial Institute.

Exhibit VI is a list of all of the checks issued against our \$50,000 payment. In general our \$50,000 was expended as follows:

. In Peach Superior Court Petition to transfer assets

Upon considering the petition of The Fort Valley Normal and Industrial School and the evidence in support thereof, it is found and adjudged that the purposes of incorporation of petitioner can best be served by the transfer of the property and assets, as set out in the petition, to the Regents of the University System of Georgia. It further appears that there is no necessity for service upon any person before the consummation of the arrangement with the Regents of the University System of Georgia as set out in the petition.

IT IS, THEREFORE, CONSIDERED, ORDERED AND ADJUDGED:

- 1. That the prayers of the petition be granted.
- 2. That The Fort Valley Normal and Industrial School be and it is hereby authorized and directed to make the transfers and conveyances of the property, real and personal, as set out in the petition, to the Regents of the University System of Georgia, for the purpose of establishing and maintaining as a part of the University System an institution for the education of negro youths in Georgia, the title to the same to pass to and be held by said Regents of the University System of Georgia as fully and completely as if the institution to be conducted by said Regents of the University System of Georgia were one of the branches of the University of Georgia named in Code Section 32-103, and all laws relating to such institutions shall be applicable to said institution, and particularly Sections 32-117, 32-118, and 32-119 of the Code of 1935.

- 3. Ordered further that the Fort Valley Normal and Industrial School transfer to the Fort Valley College Center, Inc., the property described in said petition as being the property to be transferred to that corporation.
- 4. Ordered further that out of the \$50,000.00 from the Julius Rosenwald Fund which shall be turned over to The Fort Valley Normal and Industrial School the following payments be made:

The deficit for the current year, the attorneys' fees including the fee of C. L. Shepard, and expenses of these proceedings, and other debts of The Fort Valley Normal and Industrial School.

Ordered further that the said \$50,000.00 be held until the amount of the fees due C. L. Shepard be passed upon and determined by this court and the sum allowed to him paid.

Then out of the balance shall be paid:

\$15,000.00 To The Fort Valley College Center, Inc.

\$5,000.00 to Florence J. Hunt, in lieu of any pension or other provision for her support and in satisfaction of all her claim.

Ordered further that after all said sums have been paid the balance be turned over to the Regents of the University System of Georgia in trust and the income therefrom be added to the income from the endowment and used as hereinafter provided.

Ordered further that the endowment, except that expressly excepted in the petition, be conveyed and transferred to the Regents of the University System of Georgia in trust for the following uses and purposes, to-wit: the income thereof, together with the income from the balance of the Julius Rosenwald Fund turned over to the Regents, shall be used, first,

for the purpose of paying pensions to the following persons and in the following manner when and if they are no longer employed and on active duty with the institution to be established by the Regents of the University System of Georgia, to-wit:

The teacher, Sophia O. Moore, the amount of whose pension is designated as \$35.00 per month. Timothy R. Roberts, cook, the amount of whose pension is designated as \$20.00 per month. Henry Davis, night watchman, the amount of whose pension is designated as \$22.50 per month.

W. S. Stamps, chef, the amount of whose pension is designated as \$25.00 per month.

But it is ordered that the pensions for the four persons last mentioned shall be paid only out of the income from the two sources mentioned, and that the said pensions shall abate pro rata in the event the Regents shall not receive an income from said sources sufficient to pay them all in full.

If the income from the two sources above set out shall be more than enough for the payment of the pensions hereinbefore provided for, then the Regents of the University System of Georgia shall apply such excess of income for the benefit of the institution to be established and maintained as a part of the University System and for the education of negro youths therein.

- 5. Ordered further that the transfers and conveyances to the Regents of the University System of Georgia be made immediately save and except that the transfer of the \$50,000.00 from the Julius Rosenwald Fund, be held until the determination of the claim of C. L. Shepard.
- 6. Ordered further that C. L. Shepard do present his claim to this court at 3 P.M. EST on the 7th day of June 1939, when the same shall be

passed on and judgment rendered by the court. Jurisdiction to pass on and determine said claim is hereby reserved.

- 7. Ordered further that a copy of this petition and this order be served on said C. L. Shepard.
- 8. Ordered further that a copy of this order be entered upon the minutes of this court.

Exhibit III: Statement to Trustees of the Fort Valley Normal and Industrial School by Its Chairman, The Right Reverend H. J. Mikell, D. D.

November 29, 1939

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE FORT VALLEY
NORMAL AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL. INC.:

Pursuant to the resolution of the Board adopted March 20, 1939, I beg to report that the school has been turned over to the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia, and that all of the duties imposed upon me by the resolution have been performed.

An order of Honorable M. D. Jones, Judge of the Superior Court of Peach County, was entered on June 5, 1939, authorizing the transfer, and supplemental orders have been taken, all of which will appear from the court records.

Pursuant to said court order, the real estate and physical properties of the school were delivered to the Board of Regents on June 28, 1939, deed executed, and receipt hereto attached, marked "Exhibit A", was received from the Board of Regents. Said deed conveyed said properties pursuant to the court order and subject to the same uses and trusts as provided in Sections 32-117, 32-118 and 32-119 of the Code of Georgia.

On June 23, 1939, all of the assets and securities of the endowment fund were turned over to the Board of Regents, and their receipt hereto attached marked "Exhibit B", was received. These securities were accepted by the Board of Regents for the use and benefit of this particular institution, as provided in the court order.

Under the resolution of March 20, 1939, I was vested with broad powers with reference to the consummation of many details, particularly with reference to the following matters which have been consummated:

- (a) The sum of \$5,000.00 was paid to Mrs. Hunt in lieu of her interest in the principal's home, and in lieu of any pension to her.
- (b) As shown by the court order, the grave lot of Dr. Hunt was accepted by the University with proper provision as to care, protection, and so forth.
- (c) Pensions for those now pensioned and certain present employees are provided for in the court order, by the consent of parties at interest.
- (d) As provided in a supplemental resolution of March 20, 1939, three cottages on the west side of the Marshallville Road were included in the transfer and deed to the Board of Regents, as required and demanded by them.
- (e) As provided in said resolution, deed was made by me on behalf of this corporation to Fort Valley College Center, Inc., to the described tract of land on the West side of the Marshallville Road, described in said resolution as containing two and one-half acres, more or less, and being approximately opposite the present main entrance to the school. A chapel and other buildings are now being erected upon this lot and religious instruction will be continued there under the direction of the Episcopal Church.

The sum of \$50,000.00 appropriated by the Rosenwald Fund was delivered to the corporation on the date the physical properties were turned over to the Board of Regents, to which is added \$257.06, less 63 cents exchange, received from the School, and these amounts were deposited in the

name of the corporation at the main office of the Citizens and Southern

National Bank, Atlanta, Georgia, subject to my signature as President. An

itemized statement marked "Exhibit C", showing the disposition of this fund

is hereto attached. All of these items were withdrawn from said bank Account

by separate checks after I had been satisfied that the amounts were due.

The current deficit of the school amounted to \$11,999.97.

Prior to the time this money was available, certain pressing demands were made upon the school, and payment of those demands was made out of a donation of \$2,000.00 from Felix Warburg.

This amount has been restored from the Rosenwald Fund and under court order is to be paid over to the Board of Regents as a part of the Endowment Fund.

Payment of expenses, attorneys fees and other debts of the corporation have been made insofar as any such obligations of the school have come to my knowledge, and all of the items, whether under this head or otherwise, are shown by said "Exhibit C".

The \$15,000.00 for use of the Episcopal Church was paid to the Fort Valley College Center, Inc.

A demand was made upon the corporation by C. L. Shepard, Attorney, of Fort Valley, for previous services rendered to the corporation. He claimed that he had rendered valuable service to it of the value of \$15,000.00, which amount I refused to pay, and at first refused to concede his legal right to any compensation whatever out of this fund.

We had been informed by the members of the Board of Regents that they would not leave their proposal open, pending litigation over the transfer, and it was considered that if there should be litigation, the

matter might be held up in the courts for an indefinite period on appeal and otherwise and thus prevent the fundamental purposes of the resolution from being accomplished. Accordingly, acting upon the advice of counsel, and in order to consummate the transfer prior to a withdrawal of the Rosenwald donation, or the proposal by the Board of Regents, the matter was submitted to Judge Jones, presiding in Peach Superior Court to fix the amount of the fee to be paid Mr. Shepard. A hearing was had, before Judge Jones, at which much evidence of the value of the service was introduced and at which hearing General Walter A. Harris, Edwin L. Sterne and A. T. Walden appeared in opposition. Judge Jones took the matter under consideration, and finally passed an order awarding Mr. Shepard \$10,000.00. Acting upon the advice of counsel, I did not deem it wise or advisable to appeal this decision, and the \$10,000.00 was paid to Mr. Shepard from the Rosenwald Fund as an attorney's fee under the provisions of the resolution.

There remains unpaid, a small item of court costs. From said Rosenwald Fund the court has ordered \$530.28 as expense for the Board of Regents in examining titles, etc., to be paid out of the fund.

The balance of the \$50,000.00 is the sum of \$7,042.11 and this amount is to be paid to the Board of Regents, after paying therefrom the two items mentioned in the paragraph next preceding, to be held by them as a part of the endowment fund applicable to this particular school.

A report has been made by me to the court and all matters herein set forth have been approved by order thereof.

I wish to acknowledge the very valuable services rendered by General Walter A. Harris, Edwin L. Sterne and A. L. Walden who handled the legal details of this transfer in a very splendid manner.

Mr. William C. Turpin, Jr., was helpful to counsel in the hearing on the fee question. Dr. R. W. Patten, Director of the American Church Institute for Negroes was very helpful at all times, and I received co-operation from members of the Board of Regents, Mr. J. Curtis Dixon, Director of the Rosenwald Fund, and others too numerous to mention. To all of these my thanks are given.

Having thus performed all of the duties and obligations imposed upon me by the resolutions of March 20, 1939, it is proper, upon a reorganization of the Board, for those who have been serving upon the Board under the resolution of November, 1918, to tender their resignations, and when that is done all agreements with the Episcopal Church, or any of its members, officers or agencies will have been fully completed and complied with and future obligations terminated, particularly the obligation to contribute \$10,000.00 per annum or other sums to the operation of the school, and proper resolutions should be passed by the Board absolving any and all of them, including the members of the Board of Trustees from any obligation or liability whatsoever.



In support of this request, I am attaching a statement showing the expenditure of \$9,296.36 for items which we think might be properly credited against the \$16,000.00 of the "capital and extraordinary" fund. You remember that we have received, to date, \$34,000.00 of the current appropriation, and \$4,500.00 of the "capital and extraordinary", or a total of \$38,500.00. This request will bring the total requested for of the 1939-1940 appropriation to \$40,600.00, leaving with you a balance of \$9,400.00. There will still be a question as to how much of this spent has been "capital and extraordinary", and how much "current", for in passing the end of the fiscal year on July 1st, with two months of contracted salaries hanging over, the different funds have been intermingled (as with a special \$1,000.00 from the G.E.B.) We hope to be able to render you a full account in the near future, as the ledger along the lines you suggested is being prepared. Our audit has not yet been made. The problem, of course, as you will note from the inclosed form of contract, is that we contract from September 1st-August 31st, but are budgeting from July 1st to June 30th; but are instructed not to hold over as reserves to pay July and August salaries any funds so budgeted.



Dear Sir:

These are troublous times. The Fort Valley State College was initiated to help make a contribution to the education of rural Negro children. It finds itself developing in a time when all energies, state and Federal, are directed toward the National Defense. Funds that once might have come easily from these sources are not now available for a sorely needed building expansion.

It is at such a time - with every conviction that the cause of National Defense should be forwarded by our governmental agencies - but also with the conviction that the task upon which Fort Valley, as a state college, is embarked, to wit, the education of teachers for rural Negro children, should also go forward - that I direct to your Board a request for consideration of a grant to this institution of the sum of \$135,000.00, to be used, (a), in a building program, and (b), in financing an extended program of education in rural living at this institution.

Fort Valley State College - as a significant area for promised educational experimentation: For many years, as the Fort Valley Normal and Industrial Institute, and under the principalship of the late Henry A. Hunt, this institution rendered a distinguished service in the cause of educating Negroes in Georgia. As such it received frequent grants from the General Education Board.

Following the death of Mr. Hunt in 1938, the institution passed to State control, under the Regents of the University System, in 1939. The transfer was facilitated by initial grants from the Julius Rosenwald Fund; and, in addition to increasing State Aid, has been promised a subsidy of \$50,000.00 each year from the Rosenwald Fund for a five year period, the first of which has already passed.

Under its new auspices, the college has enjoyed steady growth. En-



rollment for the last three years is as follows:

Enrollment now is at its maximum, considering limited dormitory facilities.

The Rosenwald subsidy and other considerations combine to make the College unique in the opportunities it presents for free experimentation directed toward the solution of problems of rural teacher-education; free experimentation impossible in the majority of state-supported institutions for Negroes. In the "Annual Report" of the General Education Board for 1959, it was said of Fort Valley that it "is expected to have special significance for the welfare of the large Negro population of Georgia, because it is developing a program centering upon rural life and education."

Nature of the Experiment Proposed

Numerous innovations have been developed in Negro teacher education institutions in recent years (many of them financed by the General Education Board) which have helped make their endeavors more realistic. Fort Valley plans to utilize these techniques; observation and practice in the field; reorganization of methods and materials in instruction; closer contact by students and teachers with agencies already in the field.

Fort Valley has also inaugaurated a program, to which it invites the attention of the General Education Board, and which makes, it is believed, an even more fundamental assault upon the problem of developing a realistic education for Negroes.

In the first place, one of the basic faults with Negro higher



institutions lies in the imitative and traditional cast of their entire structure. Curricula, Staff, and Physical Structure have been copied from older colleges principally for white persons.

Behind this copying, of course, goes the traditional reliance upon the past of the white institutions; the dormitories harking back to the Mediaeval monastery; lecture rooms and methods harking back to the same period and before.

Recent reforms in certain institutions have recognized the great truth that Education is a way of life, as well as a list of courses; and have begun by a basic reorganization of the physical structure to fit the newer conception; as in the case with the House Plans at Harvard and Yale and elsewhere; the Burton Residence Halls at Chicago; and the new-styled house plans at Bennington.


The typical Negro college student comes from an extremely lowincome family and household, to a modern dormitory in a college in which he
never has an opportunity to develop, through most of his life, any of the
skills or attitudes of living which would be helpful to him as a working,
living citizen. For four years he lives under conditions approximating hotel
life in a big city; conditions which for ease, comparative luxury of appointments, and other facilities he will never experience again.

Yet, this is the boy, or girl, whom we expect to go back, after four years of de-ruralizing, to rural and semi-rural communities, and turn the attention of his people to a better way of life.

What Fort Valley Would Like to Do: In at least partial place of the dormitory scheme of living, Fort Valley proposes a structure in physical housing that will accompany its educational plan; the location of its students, for at least half of their life at Fort Valley during a four year program, in a setting where they will live a full life approximating the best of that rural life for which the college is designed.

A full transfer from dormitory life to cottages may not be practicable; but both women's dormitories now in use are in need of replacement; hence the conjoining of a request for one dormitory with the request for aid in constructing small cottages.

Education in Small Rural Housing Units: During the Summer of 1939



They have been allotted an area building of the house with great

such a structure, on the Fort Valley Campus. They have been allotted an area of five acres. These young men worked in the building of the house with great enthusiasm. They are now constructing a poultry house, and have put in a winter garden. They will later develop swine and other projects. Their produce will be bought by the College, or used by themselves; and consequent reductions made in the cost of their education. Organized as a cooperative group, they are studying cooperative methods and principles; they are learning how to build, by building, poultry houses, swine houses; how to garden by gardening; how, in short, to learn the arts of successful rural living by actually performing these duties for a large portion of their waking hours.

This is what Fort Valley proposes to do, if its request for aid be granted, for all of its men students and, in time, for its women students for at least two of their four years of college life; either in small five-room units, as already in operation, or in larger, 15-capacity units; and under skilled and intelligent supervision.

Library Building: A library building is included in the request to replace a small library now grossly inadequate in book space, working space, and reading room space; and to provide for the needs of a growing collection, and an expanding program of service to the College as a teacher education agency, and for its laboratory high and elementary schools.

Teacher's Cottages: Five cottages for teacher's families are provided for in the proposed plan of building expansion; to be located on areas where faculty families may themselves live a full rural life, as with the proposal for students.



Dear Mr. Embree:



I am enclosing a copy of a letter to Dr. Mann, of the General Education Board. You will note that I have asked for \$110,000.00 for building, and \$25,000.00 for a program. You will also notice that I have implied that the money would be matched.

Where? Well, I figure they wouldn't just give it without matching. Couldn't we ask you all for a little bit - say, \$50,000.00 toward the library; and then ask the Regents to raise our appropriation so as to match the salary grants? This is what we would use an increased Regents' appropriation for, anyway, if we could get it - salaries of agricultural people.

Of course, we could use the \$16,000.00 for physical improvements annually to match, if we could get a current raise from the Regents. I think we might, too, - if the GEB will shell out.

Instead of the plans drawn by Mr. Priftmier originally, I clipped out his handsome "fraternity houses" and inserted a new perspective drawn by him that shows a very handsome South Georgia facade; I also included a sketch of the original plan of our cooperative that is now working away.

Are all of these vain pipe dreams, and shall we be at war next week instead of educating rural Negro children? I shouldn't be surprised.

We now have 304 students enrolled - beyond capacity. We had to have a radio announcement on the day before Freshman registration, warning no more Freshman to come who had not sent in room deposits. What do you think of that?

Dear Mr. Bond: I am sorry I have been so long in writing you about last year's statements and your audit report, but I have been waiting for an opportunity to discuss the question with Mr. Embree and Mr. Wale.

I have tried to reconcile your report with the audited statement, but Mr. Bywaters has included certain income and expenditures for July and August not taken into account in the auditor's statements, so there is no way that I can find to tie the two reports together.

What we shall need for our auditor is a statement similar in form to the one you left with me, which I am returning, but including only the income and expenditures which the auditor has included in his report. On pages 2 and 3 of the auditor's report is a statement of receipts and disbursements. Our report should be a reclassification of these same amounts in line with the classification of accounts used in your budget to the Regents. I will need, too, the same form of report of the capital expenditures as you made in the statement I am returning, with the omission of any items paid for after June 30.

If all of this is not clear to Mr. Bywaters, I shall be glad to answer any questions.

I am returning, too, your copy of the quarterly reports to the Regents, which you left with me on your last trip to Chicago.


