Dear Dr. Holder: Your letter of January 29 to Dr. Michael M. Davis has come to me for reply. As I remember it, when I talked with you before, you were not interested in going South to work.

I regret that our scholarships in the field of medicine are generally based upon a particular job to be done in some of the institutions in which we are especially interested. In other words, we simply cannot offer scholarships to men who desire merely to improve their training. We have to tie them up to projects. We have chosen very largely to work in the South because of the greater need there, and when scholarships are granted we expect a commitment from the recipient to do his work in a field in which he can make what seems to us a greater contribution.

I am interested in you and your work, but I cannot do other than express regret that the situation is unchanged since I last talked with you.
