

NEGRO HOME-MAKING IN GEORGIA - A MURAL

by

Lawrence A. Jones

The Fort Valley State College is for Negro young men and women. Because of the nature of its enrollment, if for no other reason, it is not an ordinary college. What it hopes to do, its program its every thought, should keep constantly in mind this fundamental fact.

Negroes are Americans. They are Americans who originally had their home in Africa, as other Americans had their homes, originally, in different parts of Europe.

The Americans who came to America from Europe had very little to give to the new world, aside from their brawn, their brain, and their hearts. Some Americans who came from Africa came as bound servants or as slaves.

America is the land of Opportunity. The Americans who came from Europe seized this opportunity to become free men and to make a great country. The American who came from Africa also seized this opportunity to become free men and to make a great country.

All of this cannot be done quickly. It takes a very long time in the doing. It is not all done yet. To make a great country takes time, and a lot of blood and sweat and suffering. Not all of the blood and sweat and suffering is over. It has to go on in order to make something, not only big and grand, but also full of human love and sacrifice and yearning.

The Negro is a part of this picture. To it he has given brawn, and brain, and heart. To it he has given blood and sweat and suffering.

The Mural

of

The Mural, "Negro Home-Making in Georgia," the work/Lawrence A. Jones, depicts the history of Negro home life in Georgia against the African background. It is located in the Home Economics Building, and consists of four panels.

First Panel: The first panel portrays an African home. A singer plucks the strings of a native instrument. A craftsman carries on the manufacture of household implements. The compound lies beyond, with the life of the community suggested in this tribal world. In the distance a slave coffel wends its weary way toward the Sea, to a slave ship, to the dreadful middle passage, and to America.

Second Panel: The second panel shows slave labor with the quarters in the background. An overseer dominates the scene. Heavily muscled slaves pick cotton in the foreground, while a second great plantation crop, depending on "gang", slave labor - tobacco - is suggested. A small group of slaves sits in a circle, near the quarters, listening to an exhorter, perhaps singing plaintive spirituals. The quarters are the authentic cabins at the Hermitage, old plantation near Savannah.

Third Panel: The third panel is connected with the second by a chain, broken at the end to symbolize the transition from slavery to freedom. The third panel illustrates a scene typical of the Reconstruction period, the period of transition from slavery to freedom. The setting here is the home of the Honorable Alexander Stephens, Vice-President of the Confederacy, Governor of Georgia, and Senator in the United States Congress in the latter part of his life, Liberty Hall at Crawfordville.

This panel shows a little known incident in the life of Mr. Stephens. During the Reconstruction period he became interested in a young Negro boy who had been

reared on his brother's plantation in Hancock county. The boy was named Linton Stephens Ingram. Mr. Stephens employed the boy as his valet, and helped educate him at Atlanta University while Governor of the State of Georgia.

The panel shows Ingram reading to the great statesman, as he did frequently when the eye-sight of his employer and patron began to grow dim. In the nearby kitchen a mother lays her sleeping child on a pallet on the floor, alongside the sleeping form of the father.

Fourth Panel: The last panel shows the possibilities, already being achieved in many portions of the State, of Georgia Negro rural homemakers today. The panel expresses hope, and shows a goal. The setting has as its background the Flint River Farm Resettlement Project in Georgia, thirty-four miles distant from Fort Valley. The panel portrays the simple and necessary items for a healthy farm life, and for the building of a happy and contented home in a rural section, in a modern world.

Acknowledgements

Much research, and many suggestions, have aided the artist in developing the theme as described above. Easically, the idea, it may be repeated, is consistent with the program of the Fort Valley State College, which is designed to train teachers for the rural schools of the State of Georgia.

Miss Allee W. James, of the Department of Home Making, has labored well and effectively in collaboration with the artist. Dr. Horace M. Bond, President of the

Institution, with Miss James has made frequent and helpful suggestions.

Mr. Lawrence A. Jones, the artist, is one of the most promising of the younger Negro artists. He has won wide attention by his forceful etchings and water colors, and bids fair to achieve national distinction.
