During the year of study he practically completed a study on Judicial Interpretation and Legislation Affecting Negroes. The publication of this work is undesirable at the present time because of a recent book by Charles Mangum entitled "The Legal Status of the Negro", which covers the same ground that Mr. Turner reported in his work.
