Please restrict essay to pages five and six.

The advance study of Pathology enables one to have a larger and wider knowledge of diseases. It fits him for advanced work, either in research problems for the study of some particular disease or group of diseases. It also enables him to approach other subjects in the science of medicine with a clearer and broader view, than it would otherwise be ^{possible} to do without such training; whether this be surgery, medicine, Immunology or Röntgenology.

Problems in diseases such as Tuberculosis and the Venereal diseases are still of major importance in our minds. The proper and correct interpretation of these diseases are not quite clear. Therefore there is much that can be done to lessen or even eradicate these existing conditions. It is a well known fact that millions of dollars are being spent ⁵ to take care of individuals

suffering from such ailments. At present I find myself puzzled as to the problem of Tuberculosis in the Negro.

I am half inclined to think that this disease manifests itself in a unique manner among Negroes. I am also aware of the fact that the economical condition of this group play a very important factor; but I am not convinced that this is the only factor. I feel that further investigation

could easily lead to some correction of the present existing condition. Not only is this true of Tuberculosis but may also be applied to other existing diseases.

It may not be possible to find a cure for these ailments but it is more likely that some study would lead to a better understanding of these pathological conditions. The pathogenesis of these diseases is not quite settled.

There are other subjects that may easily be investigated by one who is fortunate enough to be able to spend the time.

The problem of research is not the only factor. Further and more intense training of the younger men must also be looked forward to with keen interest. Time spent under favorable conditions with the proper supervision and ample facilities would lead no doubt to a solution of these unexplained and perplexing problems.
