Dear Mr. Embree: I am glad to have your letter of December 27, commenting on the State Contest, and agree with the suggestions offered by you. We shall go ahead with the original program as planned, stimulating as many counties and schools to enter the Contest as possible this year, and try to have a satisfactory report of progress for the May Meeting of the Trustees, and a long-time program for continuous upkeep and beautification of school plants. Experiences this year will be helpful to the Committee in charting a future program. We will also encourage, through state departments, as many counties as possible to offer county premiums to the winning schools this year. We hope to have a large number of schools plan their programs, setting up goals to be reached each year for a period of four or five, until their buildings, grounds and equipment are in first class condition.

You will be interested to know that the county demonstrations are starting off in a very satisfactory manner. Much interest is being manifested both by school officials and communities, and several schools in these counties have already been rehabilitated. Coahoma County leads the other two, so far. It is interesting in this county to see the white skilled and unskilled laborers and the Negroes of the community working together on the same school plant under the general supervision of the trained Negro director in the County.

Dear Mr. Andrews: As requested by you and Mr. Stillman, in our conference last week at the Stahlman Building, I am giving you, very briefly some suggestions which may be helpful in working out worth while projects among country schools.

1. The State Administrator should cooperate closely with the State Departments of Education, particularly with the State Supervisors of School Buildings, in working out worthy projects among the schools of the various counties in each state: (a) in rehabilitating and beautifying existing school plants which are too good to be replaced; and (b) in erecting new modern school-houses with emphasis on consolidation, based on careful studies of the community needs.
2. The School Plant Committee of the Julius Rosenwald Fund is tremendously interested in promoting a general program for school plant rehabilitation in the South, for both white and colored. The Committee has set up three county wide demonstrations over a three- or four-year period: (a) Montgomery County, Clarkeville, Tennessee, about sixty miles from Nashville; (b) Coahoma County, Clarksdale, Mississippi, in the delta section; and (c) Nash County, Nashville, North Carolina, in the Piedmont section.

While these demonstrations were set up in October and November of the present school year, much has already been accomplished in Coahoma County, Mississippi by aid of relief labor and materials that had been bought under the CEA and stored there, but in the other two counties it is my understanding that they have been able to secure very little, if any, aid from relief rolls in improving the rural school plants. We are trying to make these model counties by (1) getting all the satisfactory buildings and grounds in good condition, and (2) setting up proper organization and administration for keeping the school plants in continuous good repair. In each of these counties there is employed a county mechanic with a repair truck equipped with the necessary tools, paid jointly by the County Board of Education and the Julius Rosenwald Fund over the three- or four-year period. Anything the FERA, or other government funds can do to aid in carrying on these demonstrations will be

helpful to more than 1,500 counties in the South, and to other sections of the country as well. The State Supervisor of Buildings in Tennessee is Mr. J. B. Calhoun of Nashville, and the County Superintendent of Montgomery County is Mr. Norfleet Carney of Clarksville, Tennessee. I am sure they will appreciate the full cooperation of both you and the new Administrator for Tennessee.

If the new works program, when it is set up, could include some money for materials as well as for labor it would greatly encourage a number of the rural communities to replace existing shacks, and would put many hungry people to work in their own communities, making a dole unnecessary. In many sections of the South there is ample timber which could be cut, sawed, hauled and prepared by the people of the community, under proper supervision. In the case of repairing existing buildings, it would not require a large amount of aid for materials. In some communities the school boards might be able to furnish a part, or all of this, but in many of the most needy communities they would be unable to provide any money for materials.

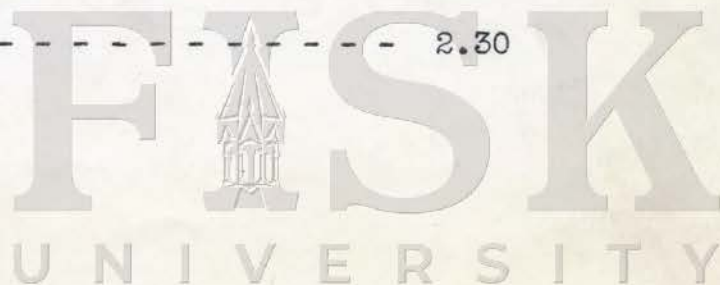

My dear Senator Harrison:

Under separate cover I am sending you today some facts concerning the school housing situation in Mississippi.

Last year we made a detailed study of the physical plant facilities of every public school in the state. The results of this survey show unmistakably that Mississippi is very deficient in school plant facilities. The average investment in the school plant per child enrolled in school is only \$69.00 for Mississippi. This is the lowest average investment of all the states of the Nation. This average for the United States is \$250.00. A copy of the general summary of the survey is in the package I am sending you. I invite your attention especially to pages 23 to 26.

Of course our negro schools are much more deficient than are the white schools. The investment in plant facilities per enrolled child for the white schools of Mississippi is less than one-half the average for all races in the United States.

Recently the city and county superintendents of education were requested to make up an inventory of needed school plant improvements which, under favorable conditions, they would make in a one year program. A tabulation of the estimated cost of these improvements by counties is enclosed. As you will see, these estimates total \$16,276,722.34, of which some \$13,000,000 is for white schools and the remainder for negro schools.

To make substantial improvement to our deplorable school plant situation, we will have to have Federal aid on a very liberal grant basis. Only a pitiful few of our school districts have been able to build school buildings under the PWA program. We appreciate this aid, but we know that these communities were most able to get needed improvements without outside aid.

While Mississippi's investment in the school plant is lowest in the Nation, we are almost 50 per cent above the national average in the per cent of taxable wealth invested in the school plant with 0.58 per cent as compared with the 0.40 per cent, the average of the Nation.

We appeal to you, Senator Bilbo, and our Congressmen to give us your active support in getting Federal aid which will permit us to provide reasonable plant facilities for the school boys and girls of the state. While it would take a total of \$100,000,000 to bring Mississippi up to the national average investment per child, we ask for only \$20,000,000 for a two year program. We are convinced that if this aid is made available on a liberal enough basis, we could provide facilities where they are most needed. Such a public works program would offer advantages not to be found in any other program.

1. The efficiency of the schools would be greatly increased.
2. The spread of employment would be ideal, reaching all sections of the state.
3. A high per cent of the money expended would be for labor.
4. The facilities secured would serve a large group of people for a number of years.
5. A great saving in local tax money would result, because local communities will have to bear the whole burden unless Federal aid is secured.

May we not depend upon you to help us in this program?

Should you care to have additional information, we will be glad to supply you with it.

Dear Dr. Smith:

The trip to Montgomery County last Saturday with you and Mr. Calhoun was very pleasant and instructive. I was very much impressed by the school exhibits which indicated the splendid work being done in the Montgomery County Negro schools and by the inter-racial school program which showed a fine spirit of cooperation between the white and Negroes.

I was especially interested in school-plant maintenance program in Montgomery County which is under the cooperative direction of the County Board of Education, the State Department of Education and the Julius Rosenwald Fund's Plant Rehabilitation Committee. I believe we were fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Walker as County School Mechanic. He seems to be a good general workman and also has the ability to organize and supervise the fourteen relief workers assigned to him for three days per week. Under the stimulation of this maintenance program and the Rosenwald-Day Improvement Program, the pupils, teachers and patrons of many of the schools have made material plant improvements without cost to the County.

I visited five schools where improvement work was going on. The items which impressed me most were: Grading and planting of school grounds, repairing of windows, exterior painting, installation of stove jackets and the installation of a rather clever arrangement for drinking and washing.


It seems to me that at least three very important things are being accomplished by our maintenance program in Montgomery County: (1) Taxpayers are being saved money by prolonging the service period of schoolhouses, (2) the physical environment is being improved to an extent that it will most certainly be reflected in the educational program and the lives of the boys and girls, and (3) stimulation of community interest in the school by enlisting the patrons in the improvement programs.

The program has only commenced and there is much more to do than has been done. I was impressed by the fact, however, that the program is proceeding for Negro as well as white schools.

Mr. Walker's work shop and storage facilities are being furnished free in the garage of the brother of the County Superintendent. Although all concerned are thankful to Mr. Carney for this service, I believe that the quarters are entirely too crowded. I hope that more adequate work shop and storage facilities may be provided within the near future.





Dear Miss Elvidge: We find that two of the winning state schools in the Improvement and Beautification Contest already have the elementary library and the state departments of education have asked that we give the amount of the library \$36 - in money or in other books. 



Enclosed herewith you will find a list of Negro school building projects in Georgia approved by the National Emergency Council under the first allotment in the work relief program under the W.P.A. You will be interested to know that the projects at Warrenton and Americus will be constructed by Rosenwald Plan number 12. The building project at Vidalia is considerable larger.

As you scan this list you will note that the project at Warm Springs is not included. I visited Warm Springs last Friday and everything is in readiness. I think a project will be written up and I see no reason why construction should not be started soon. It is planned to build a brick veneered building according to Rosenwald plan number 4. In the course of time we hope to have a vocational shop and a teachers' home also erected. I think we will certainly have this building ready for occupancy by the first of November.

I am today writing school officials in Georgia in regard to about one hundred (100) building projects we have had some contact about for several years. I expect to send to each of the eight (8) district W.P.A. engineers in our state a list of all the proposed projects in their territory.

Tonight the executive committee from the Negro teachers' association will meet in our office to work out plans to stir up interest among the Negroes over the state in bringing pressure to bear on getting projects approved.

Dear Mr. Embree: Favrot spent Thursday of this week with us in Nashville. While he was here he, Hamon and I had a special meeting of the School Plant Rehabilitation Committee, discussing the results of the Improvement and Beautification Contest and making plans for an early start in the stimulation of this program for the incoming year. Credle and Eckles, the other two members of the Committee, spent a day with me in June talking over the program.

Growing out of these conferences, there is one important matter that I would like to take up with you before going further. We have had requests from one state superintendent, several of the state supervisors of buildings, and a few of the state agents to extend the Improvement and Beautification Contest the present year to include white schools as well as Negro schools. I was requested by the committee to get in touch with all of the southern state superintendents, telling them that the request had come to us and asking whether they would like to stimulate a similar program for the white schools. I stated to the committee that before doing this I would want to get your reactions and approval.

It has been interesting to note that the Contest among the Negro schools last year, in which around 325 county superintendents took part, has already stimulated interest among the white schools in these counties and in other counties. Most of them have learned about the three demonstrations in school plant rehabilitation which we are carrying on for both white and colored, and are becoming actively interested in inaugurating similar programs. This rehabilitation program has had the same type of wholesome effect on white schools that the Rosenwald building program had in its active period.

It is thought by the committee that greater permanency can be had in this program by extending the project to white schools, since the same superintendents have charge of both groups in the dual system. If you approve of this plan the committee, at its next full meeting, will work it out most carefully to see that the Negro schools would not suffer any neglect because of the dual program.

No doubt you have received the frame for the Certificate which has been mailed from this office. If you can secure good kodak pictures of the winning school and grounds we would be glad to have them for an album we are preparing showing all winning schools in 325 counties.

Within a short time you will receive from your State Department of Education announcement of the Improvement and Beautification Contest for Negro schools in 1935-36. Most likely the counties which set up quickly a satisfactory, constructive program for rehabilitating their school plants (remodeling, repairing and painting the buildings and equipment; landscaping and beautifying the grounds) will be able to receive a large share of the cost from government funds, if applications are made at once with a statement that men from the relief rolls can be put to work immediately. I believe the state and county directors of the WPA relief program will be glad to cooperate with state and county departments of education in projects of this kind.

Dear Mr. Embree: I was glad to have your letter in which you approve the general plan of the Committee on School Plant Rehabilitation in extending the Improvement and Beautification Contest to white schools as well as colored for 1935-36. It seems that if we are to work out a satisfactory plan for continuous upkeep of school plants we must interest and convince the county superintendents and county boards of education of the economy and necessity of this important phase of the educational program, which can best be done by getting them interested in both groups of schools in the dual system.

It was the thought of the Committee that we would offer as first prize the elementary library to the white school winning in each of the southern states which would call for 30 instead of 15 if all states take part. The plan is not far enough developed to determine whether the \$2500 for the Rosenwald School Day program, plus the amount we have to the credit of the School Plant Committee will be sufficient to carry on the program for the dual Contest. However, we shall stretch it just as far as it will go before asking for additional money.

On August 1st I am dropping out until after Labor Day, and will be in a camp where I will fish, swim, recreate and rest, without giving a thought to schools, libraries, or health. The girls in the office will carry the routine work on with the Chicago office and the states without any break during the month.

You have had a rather strenuous year, and I hope you will take plenty of time to rest and recreate.



Dear Mr. Smith:

I have conferred with Mr. Bond concerning the matter of including both white and negro schools in the next improvement and beautification contest. He heartily approved of that plan. For two reasons I have not written you sooner about this. Mr. Bond was away on a camp resting after the first primary for several days. He came to the office for a day and then left on the Know Mississippi Better Train. Since he left, Mr. Campbell and I have been working night and day in the preparation of a state-wide project for the construction of rural school buildings. We filed that project Saturday. The W.P.A. Administrator advised us not to let the amount run above two and one-half million dollars.

We have filed a project which calls for 1500 classrooms, including forty desks per classroom, water supply, sanitary toilets for each school, grading and landscaping the grounds. We hope very much to get this project approved in Washington. It is our understanding that 50 percent of these classrooms will be built for negro schools. The project has been worked out in such a way that the sponsor or community getting one of these schools would have to pay a very small part of the cost, some \$100 per classroom. The balance of the cost would be paid for out of Federal funds. The project was drawn in this way so as to make it possible for the poorer communities to get buildings.

I hope Mr. Alliston will see fit to send me to Washington to press the approval of this project.

I do not know what situation prevails in other states but not until after the 27th of last month, when we had our second primary election, would our W.P.A. receive projects on anything like a liberal enough man-year cost basis to make it possible

to get construction work without the sponsor's financing a very substantial part of the cost. Since that time our Mississippi W.P.A. Administrator has been encouraging the filing of all classes of projects on almost any basis. The state office has been literally deluged with applications. In my opinion, a great many of these are not so desirable. However, we have them to compete with before the allotment board in Washington.

I have not been able to ascertain the aggregate amount of Federal W.P.A. funds applied for in projects for individual schools. I have an idea that this will amount to approximately \$2,000,000.

In addition to these W.P.A. projects we have applications totaling approximately \$5,000,000 pending with the P.W.A. These projects are desirable.

Our state-wide project includes a number of classrooms in every county in the state. It would require 14 percent of the male relief case load of the state as of August 15 and for a period of one year to complete the program set up in this project.

I am enclosing a copy of the general summary of the project filed in Washington. It is our understanding with the W.P.A. in Mississippi that we may make some shifts as between counties and sizes of school buildings from the schedule set up in the application in order to make the program more effective. It is my plan to reduce the number of one-room buildings and increase the number of larger buildings after the project is approved.

We may need a little outside help to get an allotment made for this project. If we do I will communicate with you.

I hope very much that you will be able to come to Mississippi within the next two or three weeks so that we may discuss our county maintenance experiment program.

If or when you go to Washington with Mr. Alliston I suggest that if possible you see Dr. W. W. Alexander who is working with Tugwell and Dr. Clark Foreman of the Department of The Interior. They may be able to help you in getting your projects approved if you have some difficulty.



On Sunday, November 3rd at 3 p. m., we are to hold a meeting of the School Plant Committee at the Washington Hotel, Washington, D. C. Mr. Favrot and all other members of the committee will be present. If you can be in Washington at that time I hope you will join us. I will be at the Washington Hotel through Thursday attending the conference of the National Council on Schoolhouse Construction, where I am to present a paper on the progress of schoolhouse construction for the past two years on the 6th. I will go directly from Washington to Chicago, arriving on Friday, November 8 to attend the board meeting.

COMMITTEE ON SCHOOL PLANT REHABILITATION

Minutes of Eighth Meeting, November 3, 1935

The committee met at 3:00 P.M., November 3, 1935, in room 630 of the Hotel Washington, Washington, D. C. Those present were: S. L. Smith, Leo M. Favrot, W. F. Credle, W. G. Eckles and Ray L. Hamon.

(1) Mr. Eckles reported that he had not been successful in persuading Miss Pitts to continue the Rehabilitation Project in Coahoma County, Mississippi. Mr. Fete Williams, however, will make an effort to have the board of education provide funds for carrying on the Project under the incoming administration. Mr. Eckles read a letter from Mr. Williams stating that he and Mr. Heidelberg would do all they could to assure the continuation of the Project after January 1. Mr. Eckles presented a final report of the first year of the Project in Coahoma County. (See Exhibit D.) Mr. Eckles recommended that the Committee allow the Project to rest during the remainder of Miss Pitts' term of office, subject to continuation after January 1.

A motion was made by Mr. Credle and seconded by Mr. Favrot: "That Mr. Eckles be authorized to make the necessary arrangements with the local school officials and the superintendent-elect of Coahoma County for carrying on the Rosenwald Project after January 1, and that the selection of the mechanic

be left to the local officials." The motion was unanimously carried and Mr. Eckles was complimented for his services in arranging for the continuation of the Rehabilitation Project in Coahoma County.

~~* Clipping from the October 31 issue of the Jackson Daily News on "Coahoma Negro School Improvement Reported," is entered in these minutes as Exhibit E.~~

Mr. Eckles reported that Sunflower County, Mississippi, will probably set up an independent rehabilitation project similar to the Committee's Project in Coahoma County. The Committee was well pleased by this statement and expressed a willingness to cooperate with Sunflower County in every way possible without accepting any financial obligation.

(2). Mr. Smith presented copies of the proof of (a) plans for contest and beautification of school-plants, (b) application forms, ^{and (d) bulletin on suggestions for improvement of B. D. School Plant in sufficient numbers for all schools in each state} and (c) ^{and} report forms. (See Exhibits A, B and C. ^{and D}) These forms will have the headings reset for each state. It is estimated that there will be a demand for approximately 5,000 sets of these forms for each state entering the contest.

Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Maryland ^{and} Louisiana have indicated that they will continue the contest this year for Negro schools only. The other ¹¹ ten Southern states have signified their intention of entering the contest for both white and Negro schools.

The Committee approved (on motion of Mr. Favrot and seconded by Mr. Eckles) the forms presented by Mr. Smith, complimenting him on the forms, ordered the printing of the necessary number, and requested Mr. Smith to write letters

to the various state superintendents transmitting these forms and suggesting that they supplement the instructions to the county superintendents. The motion was carried.

(3) There was considerable discussion as to the advisability of admitting private schools to the Improvement and Beautification contest. It was decided, however, that the contest would be restricted to public schools.

(4) The Committee had considerable discussion as to the size of schools which would be allowed to enter the contest. The question was raised as to whether or not city, town, and village schools would be included in the contest, as well as rural schools. The Committee decided to leave this matter to the school officials in the various states.

(5) Mr. Smith read his report to the Julius Rosenwald Fund on the activities of the committee during the past year and his request for an additional \$5,000.00 (See Exhibit ^E_A) Mr. Smith also exhibited a letter from Mr. Embree acknowledging receipt of the report and complimenting ^{him on its} ~~Mr. Smith on the~~ form and content.

(6) Mr. Credle presented a report on the Rehabilitation Project in Nash County, North Carolina. (See Exhibit ^E_A) The Committee was delighted with Mr. Credle's report. The work already accomplished in Nash County more than justifies the Committee's sponsorship of this project.

(7) Mr. Smith reported that he had contacted the Negro educational journals regarding publicity on the contests, and that they were cooperating.

He also reported that large daily papers, such as the Dallas News, and the Jackson Democrat have published contest stories of the last year.

(8) Mr. Smith reported that, as a member of the Good Roads Association, he had presented a resolution to the women's division of that organization ^{asking} ~~to the effect~~ that they

sponsor the beautification of school grounds along the highways, ^{and they expressed much interest in the project and agreed to do whatever they could to stimulate it.}

(9) Mr. Favrot moved and Mr. Credles seconded a motion: "That our Committee publish a bulletin on the three county Rehabilitation Projects during the first year." The motion was carried unanimously.

(10) The Committee recessed at 6:00 P.M.

(11) The committee reconvened in room 630 of the Hotel Washington at 4:00 P.M., November 6, with the following state directors of schoolhouse planning: W. F. Credle of North Carolina, W. G. Eckles of Mississippi, S. P. Clemons of South Carolina, J. L. Graham of Florida, J. O. Baker of Arkansas, J. B. Calhoun of Tennessee, J. F. Horne of Texas, and N. E. Viles of Missouri. Mr. Smith presented to this group the plans for administering the 1936 School-Plant Improvement and Beautification Contest. ^{calling attention to} ~~This group was very much interested in the contest and pledged their support of the program.~~ *the possibilities of receiving assistance from the WPA for*
