REMARKS: In going over the field as it looks for the year 1925-26 we think we are making a conservative request. It is true that we have used but \$7000 during the closing year but the indications are favorable for a much better year approaching. If Jefferson County is successful in consolidating her districts and issuing bonds for school building purposes and the programme of negro school building as contemplated by the superintendent is carried out, it will require more than \$10,000 to meet the Rosenwald part of this programme. At this time we have buildings under contemplation that will have to be provided for in the July budget of the county boards sufficient to absorb a large part of the amount asked for. We assure the Fund of our appreciation of past aid and respectfully submit this estimate.

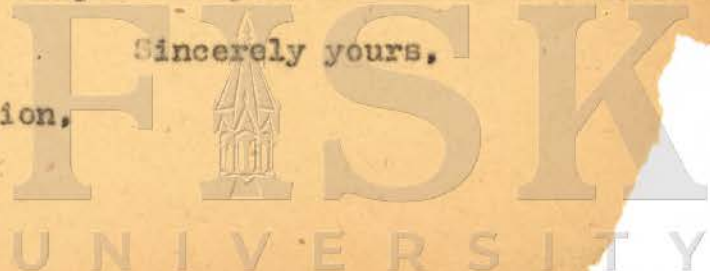

Subject: Florida Budget

On December the 5th I wrote you relative to the Florida budget, stating that Mr. Williams has used up his budget with the exception of \$900. and has applications on file amounting to \$6,800. - \$5,900 - in excess of his 1927-28 budget. He is very much disturbed over this situation and I am wondering just what can be done at this time to help him out.

It will interest you to know that the total budget allotments from July the 1, 1920, to June 30, 1927 (7 years) was \$83,600, while the total amount used on 39 completed buildings for the 7 years was \$39,550, leaving \$44,050 to revert (more than one-half). The 1927-28 budget recommendation of \$11,100 was made on a basis of accomplishments the past 7 years. But as Mr. Brinson was dropped from the roll, beginning July the 1st, and Mr. D. E. Williams, a most excellent young gentleman, was selected to take his place, there has been a marked interest in the work because of his untiring efforts which doubtless accounts for the fact that Florida is exceeding the budget allotment.

In view of the fact that Florida has been so backward in the past, allowing more than one-half of the money to revert but is now waking up to her opportunities even at a time when there seems to be some general depression in other lines, I feel that it would be wise to take care of them if possible. The only way this could be done would be for the Fund to authorize me to approve the excess applications in Florida, just as has been done in other states in previous years. Judging from experience of previous years, there will be a sufficient amount reverting from certain states to take care of the excess in others. There has never been a year since July 1920 that any of the states have been deprived of building as many schools as they could raise money for and supervise properly.

Practically all the buildings for the excess amount are completed and inspection reports can be made as soon as I am authorized to approve them. Mr. Williams is so enthusiastic over his work and we are all so happy to see the work going forward so well that I hope he will not be "penalized" for the slow work of his predecessor.

Although he has been in office a little over five months, he has filed applications for 20 buildings - amounting to \$5,900 in excess of his construction budget this year. Five of the applications approved (15) are fully completed and paid for and it is my understanding that all the others are under construction.

Mr. Williams has also submitted inspection reports on the three-teacher building (\$700), the five-teacher (\$1,200), and one six-teacher (\$1,400), but we can approve these inspections until he has sufficient funds to take care of the applications. Since Florida has gone so slowly in former years, but is moving along so well the present year, I hope that we can take care of the excess in that State at present in order that the work may continue without any retardation. As has been the case each year I believe there will be enough to revert from other states to take care of any excess that Florida may have, but naturally no state would be willing to release any part of its budget at this particular time. What shall we do with Florida?

You will notice also that Mr. Williams has taken up his full quota of 10 libraries. He has been working hard in a new position, trying to bring up Florida's average in all phases of Negro education, and most particularly in our work.

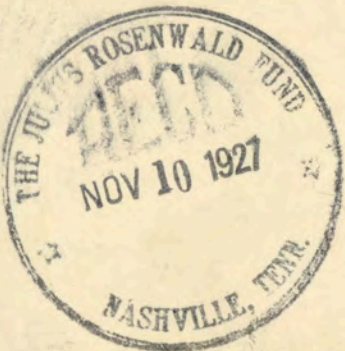
Dear Mr. Smith:

I am enclosing triplicate inspection blank on the Apopka negro school building in Orange County, accompanied with Kodak pictures of front and rear view. The pictures are very poor and too small. In the future, I plan to equip myself with a Kodak for taking larger pictures. The Apopka building is really very nice though it was not built according to the exact Rosenwald specifications and plans.

I had hoped to send you at this time, several inspections. However, the superintendents were not quite ready regarding equipment, furniture and insurance. Therefore, they will be coming in some time during the month of November. No doubt, you have been wondering why so few inspections after such a desirable number of applications.

I am also enclosing eight applications for Rosenwald libraries. Please note that application No. 3 is missing. I am waiting to get final word from the county superintendent as I have filled out the application on the request from a county training school that one be reserved for them. Application No. 10 has not been received but I anticipate receiving it within the next ten days.

I have been doing considerable traveling during the past two months making a kind of general survey of the negro schools in all the counties in the state of Florida. Up to date, I have missed only four counties which I shall cover in time. Beginning next Tuesday after our staff meeting on Monday, I shall start making a detail survey of each county, visiting negro schools and communities in the counties where there are Rosenwald schools, county training schools and county Jeanes
