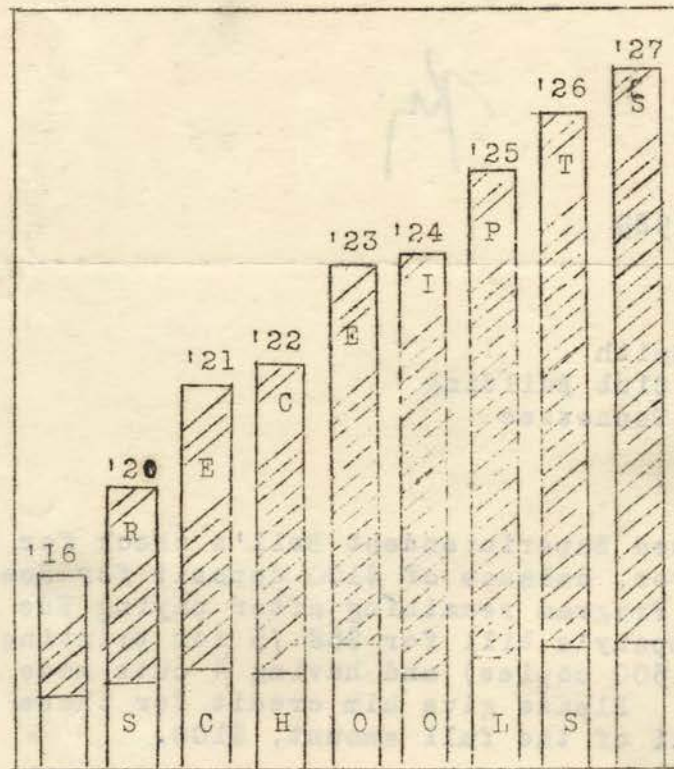

Dear Sir:

Reports of principals and teachers observing Rosenwald Day March 1, 1929, have come in from 41 counties. In some instances all the colored schools of the county participated in joint or several meetings. There are several counties in Kentucky that have no negro population. In fact about half the negro population of the State is found in fifteen counties.

The School

These Rosenwald Day meetings are reported from 69 schools, at which they were held, and by 195 teachers. Those schools report an aggregate enrollment of 6,099, and an aggregate average attendance of 4,561 pupils.

The Building

They report 205 class rooms. Fifty-two of these 69 school buildings are painted on the outside, and 13 are not so painted. Two buildings are reported as being constructed of brick. Forty-nine are painted on the inside, and 18 are not. Thirty-one of these buildings were erected with aid from the Julius Rosenwald Fund and 36 were erected without such aid. Forty-eight are reported as in good condition, and 28 are reported as insured to the aggregate of \$111,400. Twenty-five have sanitary toilets. Eleven are heated by furnaces, and 11 have jacketed stoves. All but 2 are furnished with desks for the students, there being a total of 3284 single desks and of 2378 double desks, affording satisfactory seating facilities for 8,040, which is more than the reported enrollment in these schools. They report a total of 5,047 linear feet of black board, practically every school having some blackboard, which is an average of 201 linear feet for every 25 children enrolled in these schools.

The Community

Reports as^{to} the number of colored people in these school dis-

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tracts are unreliable, in some instances in error, in others reports omitted. The aggregate reported is only 18,419. We advised against raising a collection at these meetings except where it was with popular approval and definite school benefit. Yet in 19 meetings a little money was raised for some local purposes. They reported P. T. A. organizations in 53 of these schools with an aggregate of \$4,373.31 raised during the school session to aid the schools, and \$32.63 collected at the meetings. The attendance reported at these meetings is a small, unreliable report because the question was variously interpreted. In a few instances, it was interpreted to include the school children attending school, though it seems generally to have been otherwise interpreted. The total reported was 3,527. The expression of sentiment is unanimous for a repetition of the observance of such a day. I question in my mind as to whether it should be designated every year as Rosenwald School Day or varied as School Building Day, Abraham Lincoln Day, George Washington Day, Booker T. Washington Day, Julius Rosenwald Day, and so on.

Most of the reports indicate need of consolidation of from three to five schools. One says "eight", which is the total number of that county.

This is in answer to your letter of April 14 concerning
 Rosenwald School Day Program.

I have tabulated returns from the schools reported. Some
 are large schools and others are small ones. The reports
 have come straggling in, some of them delayed several
 weeks. Probably many meetings were held that were not
 reported.

We desired the meeting to be an occasion for promoting
 cooperation and good will rather than the collection of
 money, and we advised against the collection of any moneys
 at these meetings except where they were collected for
 definite purposes in which the people were generally
 interested.

Numerous letters accompanied the reports, indicating
 appreciation of the Rosenwald Fund's contributions toward
 the promotion of buildings, transportation, libraries and
 other forms of service.

Dear Sir:

With delay and embarrassment I am inclosing summary of the reports received from schools observing Rosenwald School Day and carrying out the Building Day program.

I have received the requested data from only twenty-one schools. These, as it happens, represent twenty-one counties. We made no provision in our program for raising money in these meetings and did not call for report on the moneys raised. We sought rather in these meetings to develop a school improvement program with at least one definite project and an organization to carry on that project. The raising of money would come about only as an incident to the program.

I am inclosing a few of the reports sent in on the form that you furnished us and two or three samples of reports on form printed with our program.

The Rosenwald School Day program was published in our February issue of the K.N.E.A. Journal which should have reached the teachers about the first day of February. It happened, however, that the machinery broke down in the process of printing, and the issue was delayed two or three weeks. We had booked our program for February 12, anniversary of Lincoln's birthday. Most of our schools close before March. As it turned out, however, most of the programs were not actually carried out until March 6.

Dear Mr. Smith:

I have just tabulated data reported by teachers and principals observing Rosenwald Day this year. Unfortunately the data is not all reported on the same form and is not all commensurate. I have, however, the following data listed by counties.

This shows reports from 50 schools in 35 counties. These schools have 163 teachers with total enrollment of 5773 children. Attendance at these meetings was reported as 6881. 35 of the 50 schools report good buildings. 12 report distinctly poor buildings. 28 of the buildings are on grounds that have trees and shrubbery. 18 report need of new buildings. 24 report need of consolidations. More would report need of consolidations except that they fear consolidation without transportation.

You will understand that the reports are a mere scattering of the schools that observed Rosenwald Day. Teachers and principals have told me of their observance of the day and their neglect to report it. I don't think that nearly half the schools that observed the day sent in their reports. Our local form did not provide for reporting the amount of money raised at these meetings and some of those that used your form of report left that item blank. I see before me one report showing \$50. raised. Another, \$17.10. One \$75., one \$105., one \$5., another \$12.50, another \$8., another \$65., one \$76.13. One school of three teachers reports \$175. raised. Another, a one-teacher school, \$2.45. A four-teacher school \$55. But the majority of the reports were made on the form that did not provide space for that data.

We urged that they select some definite project for P.-T. activity but advised against making it a money raising enterprise unless the definite purpose for which the money was raised was distinctly announced.

Dear Mr. Smith:

Many of our schools closed before Rosenwald Day, March third. Most of our rural schools begin in July or August and close in the middle of the winter. This accounts in part for the small number of reports received of Rosenwald Day meetings this year. I am inclosing a brief summary of these reports, giving in vertical columns the following data:

1. The county.
 2. The school reporting the meeting.
 3. The number of teachers in that school.
 4. The enrollment in the school.
 5. The average attendance in the school.
 6. The highest grade taught in the school.
 7. The condition of the school building as rated by the teacher making the report.
 8. Whether the school grounds are attractive, with plantings and walks.
 9. Whether consolidation is needed.
 10. How many schools should be consolidated.
 11. The number of pupils present at the meeting.
 12. The number of visitors present at the meeting.
- And, finally, whether there is a Parent-Teacher Association.

Only 21 counties are represented in the reports sent in. Only 22 schools sent in reports. These 22 schools have 95 teachers, 3,163 pupils, 2,530 in average attendance, 2,557 present on Rosenwald Day and 780 visitors present that day.

You will observe that all but four of the schools reporting observance of the Day have from two to four years of high school. The greater number have four years.

If history repeats itself, straggling reports will be coming in yet for some months.

I am disappointed that no more reports of meetings have been received. Yet, I can account for it without completely discrediting myself. I don't know whether you can or not.

In addition to this there is an item of \$5 for travel expense for Mary M. Butler, Jeanes teacher in Bourbon county, who served on committee that prepared the program for the printer. The other members of the committee were the Jeanes teacher and Douglas school principal in Fayette county. Miss Butler did the traveling for the committee, meeting the others on their own ground.

Mr. Wilson, secretary of the K. N. E. A., writes me under date of February 24: "I have mailed out nearly 1600 copies of the Journal to colored teachers and friends of education. I mailed the copies on February 21, and judge that practically all teachers have them at least one week before Rosenwald Day". Mr. Wilson had this printing done at Bowling Green. He wrote me that bids in Louisville were about 40% higher than in Bowling Green.

I trust you will not find the cost to involve any excessive or objectionable items. The total is \$53.30.

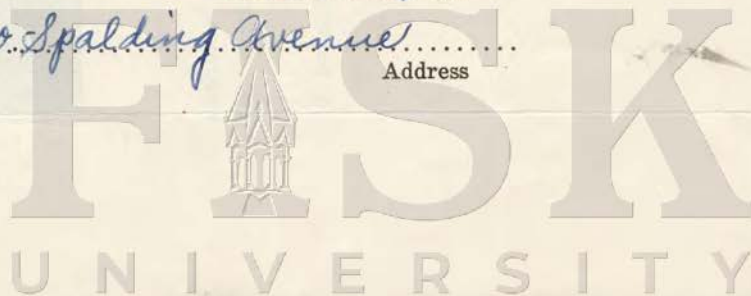
