These grants are available to mature scholars, without reference to age, whose capacity for productive research has been effectively demonstrated by published work. They are offered by the Council especially with a view to assisting members of the staffs of institutions which cannot at present provide adequate funds for social science research, and are designed to aid in completing rather than in initiating projects.

The purposes for which the grants may be expended include the investigator's living expenses while in the field, travel involved in the investigation, stenographic, clerical or statistical assistance, printing, stationery, and photostating; but ordinarily they may not be used for travel to attend scientific meetings, or to purchase books, manuscript materials, or laboratory apparatus. They are not open to candidates for a degree. Grants may not be given to aid in the publication of manuscripts.

Before applying to the Council, the applicant should have canvassed other possible sources of support, especially the institution to which he is attached.

The maximum amount granted by the Council will ordinarily not exceed \$1,000.

I. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO ALL FELLOWS

A. Period of Study. Appointments usually are for twelve months' study. Post-Doctoral Research Training Fellows may apply for reappointment for a second year or for brief extensions for a shorter period. Applications for reappointments or extensions will not be received from Pre-Doctoral Field Fellows.

Post-Doctoral applications for reappointments or extensions will be considered in two groups, the first at the regular meeting of the Committee during the third week in April, 1937, and the second at a meeting scheduled for the first week in the following July.

Such applications must be on file not less than one month before the time of the meeting at which they are to be considered. They should be in the form of six copies of a typewritten letter four to five pages in length containing (a) a brief statement of the work already accomplished on the 1936-37 Fellowship program, (b) a brief outline of the work which remains to be done, and (c) a more detailed description of the proposed program of study. The names of three or four individuals who are in a position to give the Committee an estimate of the candidate's progress made on the 1936-37 program and the value of the new program must be included. If any of these men are in Europe, the Fellows are themselves requested to ask them to write directly to the Council.

It is required that Fellows devote full time to their approved programs of study and engage in no other remunerative activities without the explicit consent of the Committee. Each change of address should be reported immediately. The Council should also be notified in case of serious illness or accident.

B. Changes in Program and Place of Study. Since fellowship appointments are made on the basis of definite programs of study submitted by the applicant, any deviations from the original plan require Committee approval in advance.

C. Publications. FELLOWS ARE REQUESTED NOT TO USE ANY PORTION OF THEIR TIME IN PREPARING MANUSCRIPTS FOR PUBLICATION. It is more important that they take advantage of the opportunity to make firsthand observations and to acquire techniques, information and materials available only through

direct contacts with sources, as provided for in specifically approved programs. Fellows are not under obligation to publish anything as a result of their studies, but if any publication arises out of work done under a fellowship, appropriate acknowledgement to the Council is to be made in the preface or in a footnote. It is requested that two copies of all such publications be sent to the Council's office for its library.

D. Reports

(1) Quarterly Progress Reports. The Committee requires each Fellow to submit three quarterly reports of not more than three or four typewritten pages on the progress of his study, summarizing: (a) the places and institutions visited (with approximate dates); (b) the personal contacts made in connection with his work; (c) progress in the accomplishment of fellowship training objectives, including a brief summary of the chief information secured and of tentative conclusions with special reference to the training value involved in his work; and (d) plans for the subsequent quarter. He is also invited to raise questions regarding his work on which he may wish advice.

(2) Final Report. At the expiration of the fellowship, a final report of from five to eight typewritten pages is required. It is suggested that this report cover the following items:

- (a) Complete itinerary with approximate dates;
- (b) Comments on the environmental conditions under which the Fellow's program of study was carried on;
- (c) A concise statement of what was accomplished during the fellowship period. This should emphasize the chief information secured and the value of the research training;
- (d) Comments and suggestions relative to the administration of the fellowship;
- (e) A statement giving approximately, in percentages, the major items of expenditure, i.e., travel, board and room, books and pamphlets, assistance, laundry and clothing, and recreation;
- (f) Some indication of plans for the immediate future, i.e., position, research activity, etc.

E. Printed Use of the Council's name. A general letter of introduction, with the Council's seal affixed thereto, will be given to each Fellow. The Council's name may be used on the Fellow's professional card, but not on his stationery. It is requested that the following formula be strictly adhered to:

"Fellow of the Social Science Research Council, 1936-37."

No other printed use of the Council's name is authorized.

F. Contact with our Council Fellows: In order that Fellows studying in the same region may get in touch with one another if so desired, a mimeographed list of the entire group of 1936-37 Fellows will be sent to each Fellow prior to June 1, 1936.

II: SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS TO FELLOWS STUDYING IN EUROPE

In order to insure the most effective use of the facilities offered by The Rockefeller Foundation Staff, SSRC Fellows who plan to study in England, France, and German-speaking countries, are requested to consult one of the men listed below concerning their European work as soon as reasonably convenient. This request also applies to all Fellows studying in other European countries if it is practicable for them to travel by way of Paris, London, or Berlin, even though it may involve some deviation from the most direct route to their destinations.

It is also requested that all Fellows in Europe keep Mr. Kittredge informed of their current addresses, as well as of the development of their study plans. A convenient way to do this is to send a carbon copy of each quarterly report, supplemented, if need be, by letter during the intervening periods.

It has been found that the rulings concerning the liability of SSRC Fellows studying in England for the payment of a British income tax on their stipends from the Council are obscure. All Council Fellows studying in England are consequently instructed to send to Mr. N. F. Hall immediately upon receipt any communications that may be addressed to them by the British income tax authorities.

III. METHOD OF PAYING STIPENDS

1. To Fellows Studying in the United States. The stipend will be paid by check quarterly in advance, unless otherwise requested. The date of first payment will be definitely determined after notification has been received of the date on which the Fellow will arrive at his first place of study.



2. To Fellows Studying Abroad. Experience has shown that the most convenient form of paying stipends to Fellows abroad is ordinarily by means of a special revocable letter of credit issued prior to the Fellow's departure from this country. The Council has arranged with the Chemical Bank and Trust Company of New York for the issuance of such credits.

Each letter of credit is limited in two ways:

(a) It is payable at a maximum of five correspondent banks in European centers, that is, only at specified banks in specified cities. However, other cities in which there are branches of the banks named in the credits may be added by the correspondent banks at the request of the Fellow. For example: If a Bank in Berlin is the only one specified in Germany, the Fellow may request the Berlin bank to add the name of its branch, say, in Munich, in case the Fellow should find it necessary to go there in the course of his study and to remain over one or more payment dates.

(b) Stated amounts become available at stated intervals. On or after the first of each month, the Fellow may withdraw one month's stipend. Although these designated amounts cannot be exceeded, the Fellow may withdraw sums as needed and carry forward balances from month to month as he desires, within the fixed limits. Thus it will not be necessary to open a bank account, or to carry about large sums in cash. Instructions relative to the dates when sums are available, the amounts that are available, and the correspondent banks will be found on the letter of credit itself.

The Council ordinarily will send to each Fellow before he leaves the United States a check to cover half the amount granted for travel and incidentals, plus the first month's stipend. The remainder of the total award will become available in eleven equal installments on the first of each month.

In case of loss or theft, the Fellow must immediately notify all the correspondent banks on which the credit was originally drawn, and also cable the Council office (cable address: SOCSCIENCE NEWYORK), so that payment may be stopped at once.

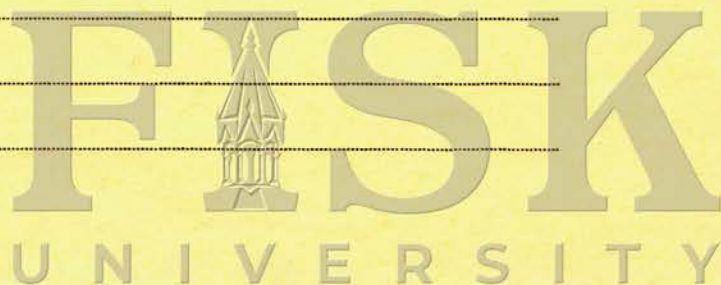
