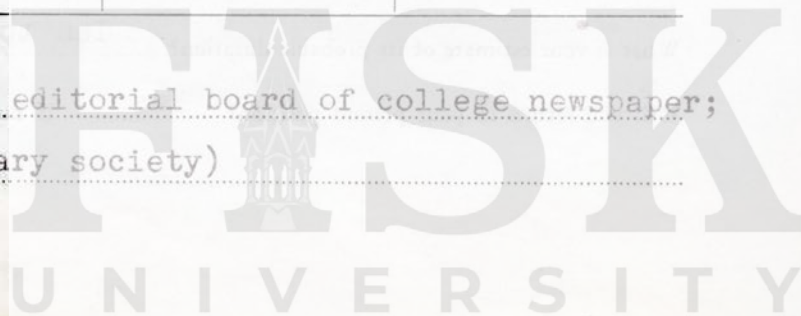

Statement of Plan of Work
