BESTOWED ON

MR. JULIUS ROSENWALD:

HARMON AWARD. A gold medal. Details of the award are contained in the clipping attached.

Awarded in March 1928.

GOLD TABLET FROM THE PEOPLE OF SAN FRANCISCO. Awarded 1917.

Inscribed as follows: "We of San Francisco rejoice to pay our tribute of admiration and gratitude to the man whose bountiful munificence raises multitudes from the depths of undeserved privation and distress, whose noble example is an inspiration leading the Jews of America to a deeper knowledge and a better fulfillment of their duty to their suffering brothers."

GOLD LOWING CUP

Awarded 1918. Inscribed as follows: "To the Honorable Julius Rosenwald, patriotic American, faithful Jew and far-seeing philanthropist, from the members of the American Jewish Committee, the Central and the People's Relief Committees and the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Welfare Board as a mark of their love and esteem and in token of their grateful recognition of his munificent generosity and his compelling initiative, which brought to a triumphant issue the project unique in Jewish history, of obtaining during the year 1917 the unprecedented sum of ten million dollars toward Jewish war relief and welfare work among Jewish soldiers and sailors.

New York, April 1918."
The cup, a graceful work of art, was made in England in 1792, and Jacob H. Schiff who presided, said it was decided to get an English cup as a mank of appreciation of American Jews for England's interest in the welfare of Jewry.

A DECORATION FROM THE AUSTRIAN GOVERNMENT, - a
white enamel design of a cross, on
a red-and-white ribbon. Mrs.Rosenwald
has the cross in her safe, but we have
no details about the award, and there
is no inscription.

CHICAGO DENTAL SOCIETY. A bound volume of an inscribed resolution of thanks for support of its work. dated 1924.

DEUTSCHES EHRENRING. Awarded by Herr von Mueller, the head of the Deutsches Museum.
Only about four people in the world possess this decoration. Mrs. Stern can give full details.

HINDENBURG AWARD. A large porcelain vase, the gift
of the German people in recognition
of the aid which he extended to the
German war widows and orphans and the
endowments which he contributed to
German cultural works. The vase was
presented at a luncheon at the Union
League Club by Dr. Hugo F. Simon,
German consul. It was accompanied
by a letter from General von Hindenburg
dated, Berlin, February 18, 1930, translated
as follows:

"Dear Mr.Rosenwald: I have noted with deep appreciation the many magnanimous gifts hich you made to German war widows and orphans, as well as to German prisoners of war before America's entry into the World War. Since the war you have made large donations for the benefit of the German children and have contributed liberally to endowments established for German cultural purposes in Germany and the United States. May I assure you not only in my own behalf but also in behalf of the German people of my sincerest gratitude.

As an outward token of this appreciation, I have taken great pleasure in having forwarded to you a vase, the product of the Porcelain Works of the Reich. This will be presented to you by the German Consul General at Chicago.

"I sincerely trust that there may be granted to you many years of unalloyed happiness in your work as a benefactor to mankind.

ROTARY CLUB AWARD. Merit award for distinguished service to mankind. Details are contained in attached clipping.

TESTIMONIAL ADOPTED BY THE SOUTH PARK COMMISSIONERS, July 15, 1931: Inscribed and framed, and

reading as follows:

"Whereas the exterior of the Fine Arts Building in Jackson Park, Chicago, erected temporarily for the World's Columbian Exposition of 1893, has now been permanently restored, and the reconstruction of the interior of the building for the Museum of Science and Industry founded by Julius Rosenwald is about to be undertaken, and thereby an edifice of rare architectural beauty has been preserved to the City of Chicago and a great public educational project housed therein has been established for the benefit of the people;

Whereas the public funds voted for the restoration and reconstruction of the building have been supplemented for this purpose by the munificent contribution of Julius Rosenwald whose generosity has also made possible the

founding of this Museum;

Whereas the South Park Commissioners desire to express to Mr. Rosenwald and record upon their minutes their appreciation of these gifts:

BE IT RESOLVED that the South Park Commissioners are keenly sensible of the public spirited action of Julius Rosenwald and genuinely grateful for his civic leadership in beautifying the parks and the city through the preservation of this architectural gem and in enriching Chicago and the nation through the creation of the first Museum of Sc/ience and Industry in the United States.

There is also a sumptuous-looking decoration, but entirely of imitation diamonds and emeralds, with a ribbon inscribed "Rex 1910." Together with a lavish gilt paper-cutter in a leather box with a crown and "Rex 1910" inscribed on it. We have no details of this, and Mrs. Stern knows nothing about it.



CHICAGO, Jan. 22.(A.P.). Humanity may benefit from the philauthropies of Julius Rosenwald for generations to come, but the actual expenditure of his millions will be ended in fifteen years - ten less than the maximum specified by the merchant prince.

Thus will the cardinal principle of the great philauthropist, who was militantly opposed to the "dead hand in philanthropy," be carried out.

This was disclosed today by Edwin R. Embree, president of the \$30,000,000 Julius Rosenwald fund.

Embree also made public a list of Mr. Rosenwald's gifts since 1910. These total in excess of \$70,000,000 and include a number not heretofore made public.

Based on estimates of the estate, Rebree figured that the late Chicago merchant gave away four times as much to humanity as he left his heirs.

Benefactions that knew no bounds of race, religion or origin were listed. The generous hand that gave millions to erect schools for Negroes in the South was just as quick to aid institutions of other races. Among these were the University of Chicago, the American University at Beirut, Syria, and Kobe College in Japan.

The Chicagoan gave \$5,000,000 to a Russian colonization project, a Soviet enterprise for the removal of Jews from the cities to farms. Hall House, in Chicago, and other American institutions in which foreigners found a haven knew his philanthropy as did also Protestant, Chtholic and Jewish charities.

The Mooney-Billings and the Sacco-Vanzetti defense funds received contributions from Mr. Rosenwald.

Embree characterized Rosenwald as not only a liberal giver but a careful and courageous giver.

"Strange though it may sound," the foundation president said, "it takes courage to give away money in large amounts."

He also disclosed that the work for which the Rosenwald foundation is probably best known - that of building schools in the South for Negroes - is nearing an end. Fewer than 100 counties in the South are now without a Bosenwald school, he said.
