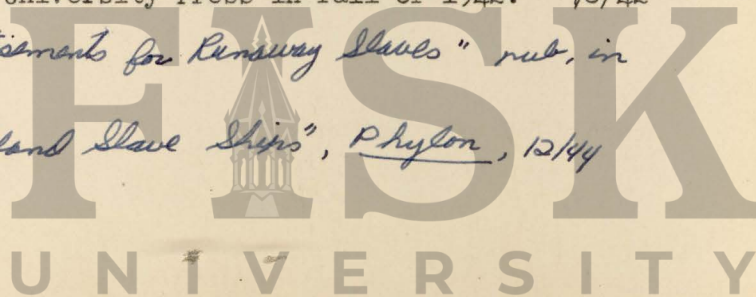

The treatment would trace the beginning, development, and abolition of the slave trade.

Will seek the advice of Doctors Krout, Greene and Carmon of Columbia and Doctors Merk, Morison and Schlesinger of Harvard. Probable duration of study one year, beginning September, 1940. Will return to present position.
