✓ Charles Henry Alston: for creative work in painting and the graphic arts, with special emphasis on the Negro in the South. (Reappointment)

Born 1907, Charlotte, North Carolina. Columbia College, B. A., 1929; Teachers College, Columbia University, M. A., 1931. Work in sculpture and the graphic arts with Mr. Ahron Ben-Shmuel and Mr. Harry Sternberg, 1933-35.

Mr. Alston's ability has developed to an unexpected degree during his 1941 fellowship and the art jury enthusiastically recommended his reappointment.

Thomas Henry Bembry: for studies in chemistry, at Columbia University.

Born 1907, Hawkinsville, Georgia. Howard University, B. S., 1929; Columbia University, M. A., 1932, 1937-38, 1939-41. Head of the Department of Chemistry, Livingstone College, North Carolina.

Cleo Walter Blackburn: for a study of the social disorganization among Negroes in the North caused by the impact of the cultural pattern of urban communities on the simple pattern of village and rural life brought from the South. Work to be done at Indiana University.

Born 1909, Port Gibson, Mississippi. Butler University, A. B., 1932; Pendle Hill School, 1933-34; Fisk University, M. A., 1936; Indiana University, 1939-40. Superintendent of Flanner House, Indianapolis, Indiana.

David Harold Blackwell: for studies in mathematics, at the Institute for Advanced Study, Princeton, New Jersey, and the University of Illinois.

Born 1919, Centralia, Illinois. University of Illinois, A. B., 1938, A. M., 1939, 1940-41.
