**Purpose of Fellowships.** To afford professional training in the field of public fiscal management—the conduct of investigations and audits, preparation of analytical reports, and administration of budgetary units with particular emphasis on state and local governments; to provide the background for an informed appreciation of the relationships between governmental fiscal policy and the welfare of the citizenry.

**Academic prerequisites.** To be eligible for a fellowship the candidate must have at least a bachelor's degree from a fully accredited college. He must have completed a year's course in each of the following fields: political science, economics, and accounting; and at least an elementary course in statistics.\*

**Stipend.** The maximum fellowship stipend per twelve-month period is \$1,200 for single persons and \$1,800 for married men. The amount determined in each case will depend upon the age, qualifications and personal needs of the candidate. Additional allowances are made for transportation expense incurred in field work. Holders of fellowships pay the regular graduate tuition fee of \$75.00 per quarter, in each of the six quarters.

**Applications must be filed not later than March 15, 1939.** Application forms, together with a description of the fellowship training program, may be obtained from the Department of Government Management, School of Commerce, University of Denver, Denver, Colorado. Fellowship awards will be announced May 15, 1939.

\*In exceptional cases candidates with an otherwise outstanding record may be accepted with a temporary deficiency in one of these fields, provided that the required courses to eliminate the deficiency will have been completed prior to the fall quarter in 1939.
