

Dear Dr. Shepardson:

I am enclosing, herewith, the special report of J. S. Jones, our State Jeanes Supervising and Rosenwald Building Agent.

Jones' greatest value to our department is his ability to organize disrupted communities and to do all kinds of promotion work. He knows all of the Negro preachers in the State and is able better than any other man I know of to get their confidence and direct their efforts in channels that will help the school situation. He has put over some very fine pieces of work during the last few months and Rosenwald buildings are now being erected in several places where it would not have been possible without Jones' work. He has been called two or three times to parishes by the superintendent to assist the Jeanes teacher in making special reports to the superintendent of the real needs of the parish. I think this work also is valuable.

Another report of this kind will be made by Prof. Jones in a month or so.

Possibly Mr. Lewis of Louisiana sent to you a copy of a report written to him on January 10th by J. S. Jones. To make sure that you see one item in it, I am copying it here:

"Longstreet - DeSoto Parish ---- This community enjoys a two-teacher Rosenwald school, the people receiving little financial aid from the Parish. Upon a recent visit there it was disclosed that they were \$1730 in debt. This, of course, was the occasion of considerable worry among the people. After talking with the local bankers, we proceeded to get the creditors to "shove" their bills 10% or more and donate a certain amount as their contribution. In this way we reduced the debt to \$1000. which the banker agreed to carry for two years. All are happy. The Board Members, Dr. Guy Wimberly and the Bankers, also Mr. W. B. Brewer, gave me all the aid necessary."

What do you make of that second sentence? The theory is, is it not, that when we pay our share toward the construction of a building, that building becomes public school property, and it cannot become such property, can it, unless it is free from debt.

It is possible that this represents a local loan made at the bank on paper signed by some of the Negroes. I have noticed one or two cases like this before and some how it does not look just right to me. I mean by that: Mr. Rosenwald plays the game through paying his share on the theory that the others have done the same.

I shall be glad to have your comment on this.

We are happy to announce to you that The Julius Rosenwald Fund on March 23, 1925, appropriated \$475,630, including administrative expenses, to aid in the construction of rural schools and teachers' home through the State Department of Education in the fourteen Southern States for the year beginning July 1, 1925, and ending June 30, 1926.

As Mr. Rosenwald authorized me to make up the budget for schoolhouse construction in the various southern states, keeping the total within the limit of \$450,000. I carefully prepared the budget, being guided largely by (a) the requests from the states (b) the number of projects approved and completed on the present year's budget and (c) the number and size of projects I felt that each state could provide funds for and adequately supervise the construction of for the year beginning July 1, 1925, and ending June 30, 1926.

Applications on the 1925-26 budget may be filed at any time from now until March 1st, 1926, with the understanding that every building on which aid is expected will be completed and paid for by June 15, 1926, at which time any unused balance will revert.

Mr. Reserved and the Trustees of The Fund join us in expressing our appreciation to you and your department for the sympathetic and hearty cooperation you have given us in the past and in hoping for the same helpful cooperation under the 1925-26 budget.

Dear Mr. Smith:

My attention has just been called to the fact that the Rosenwald community school plans are being used in rural communities where funds are limited and where the services of architects are rarely employed for drawing plans and specifications and that these plans are growing in favor and coming into more general use by the parish superintendents.

More than a year ago, I appointed a building plans committee from the members of the staff of the State Department of Education with instructions to examine as thoroughly as possible all plans submitted by architects and submit to me a written report pointing out defects or recommending approval of the plans. This committee was also instructed to prepare stock plans of the various types of small buildings with general specifications to be used by the superintendents of the State without cost.

After some investigation and study, the committee suggested that it could not do better than to recommend the general use of Rosenwald plans when these plans would adequately serve the needs of the community. I accepted the suggestion and issued a circular letter to parish superintendents stating that community plans of the various types would be available for free distribution from the State Department of Education. In response to this announcement, the Rosenwald school plans have been liberally used by superintendents in building white schools and are growing in favor.

I think it is not out of place to state here that the building of modern, well designed, properly lighted and ventilated rural school buildings have not kept pace with the school building development in the towns and cities for the reason that in building small schools it has frequently happened that superintendents proceed without proper plans or specifications, by employing an ordinary carpenter to build some kind of house according to rough sketches agreed upon by himself and the superintendent. The result has frequently been that buildings of improper dimensions, bad design, and poor ventilation as well as poor workmanship have been provided for the children.

The purpose of this letter is to express my appreciation to the Rosenwald Fund through you for the liberal supply of plans the Fund is making available to the State of Louisiana. I believe that this service will, in a general way, stimulate the building of the right kind of rural schoolhouses.

I take great pleasure in announcing to you that The Julius Rosenwald Fund on June 4, 1926, appropriated \$450.000, including administrative expenses, to aid in the construction of rural Negro schools and teachers homes through the State Departments of Education in the fourteen Southern States for the year beginning July 1, 1926, and ending June 30, 1927.

The total amount for construction is \$422.000. a little less than that of last year but more than we have spent in the fourteen states for construction in any budget year. The allotment for Louisiana is as follows:

The aid for schools and additions above a six-teacher type- never-teacher to ten-teacher, inclusive - is for county training schools or county high schools striving to meet state requirements for high school standardisation. Copies of the detailed plan for distribution of aid will be mailed within a few days.

Beginning July 1, 1927, the Fund agrees to give aid for shops on condition that (a) the building be erected according to plans and specifications furnished or approved by the Fund. (b) an emple supply of tools be purchased, and (c) a trained teacher be provided to take charge of the work.



Dear Dr. Shepardson:

The story of the Longstreet school in DeSoto Parish, Louisiana, referred to in your letter of the 27th, had been read, as Mr. Lewis sent me a copy of the special report of J. S. Jones. I think there is not a state in the South where public property can be mortgaged and sold, still I am not positive about this in every case. I have written Mr. Lewis asking whether there was a mortgage or lien on the property. Generally the Negroes go together and sign a note for the entire amount and deposit in the bank in order to hasten the construction. They then take ample time to raise the money by small amounts, paying it on the note.

I shall await further report from you in the case of the Longstreet School in DeSoto Parish, Louisiana. I have been revolving in my
mind the ethics of a situation where The Fund pays its proportion on an
inspection report which does not indicate that there is a lien of any
kind on the building. If it should develop that any Louisiana schoolhouse may be mortgaged, I judge it will be necessary for you to scrutinize all inspection reports carefully. I think we should adopt the good
rule of the church, that is, not to allow the formal dedication (calling
our contribution a dedication) as long as there is any debt on the building.
