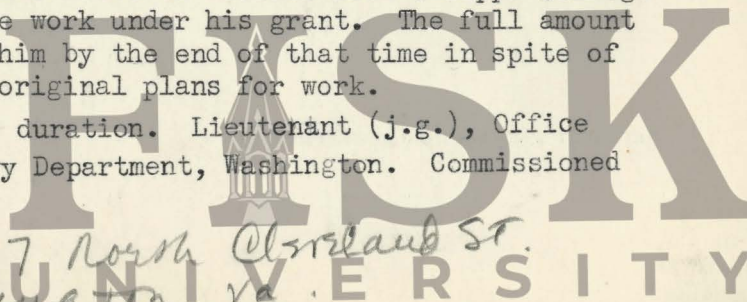

12/2/40 With the approval of the Fund officers, Mr. Woodward accepted the post (July, '40) of Associate Professor of History and Biography on the Nathaniel Wright Stephenson Foundation at Scripps College, Claremont, California. He worked on his fellowship during the summer of 1940 and will have leave of absence from Scripps College from February 1 to September 1 to continue work under his grant. The full amount of his fellowship will have been made to him by the end of that time in spite of the period being two months short of his original plans for work.
