REPORT

My dear Mr. Reynolds:

I know Mr. Cornelius V. Troup very well. I served as his advisor on his thesis when he worked for his Master's degree at Atlanta University and worked with him on his study of State Adopted Text Books of Georgia. He is a very bright young man, very alert to the problems of education and he writes with a degree of facility. He has been a very valuable person in his profession in his State. He could profit greatly by an opportunity to study and would use it honestly and well. He is highly regarded by his fellow teachers and is rising in his profession.

His plan of work is interesting and I think he would learn a great deal from attempting it. Whether or not he has at hand materials for his project, he does not say. If he does not, I believe he would not be able to collect them and

test them out in a situation so far removed from the children of this region.

As to the project itself, I do not consider it either practical or educationally sound. I think that there is already a paucity of educational Materials in text books and that the attempt to use a single text book would seriously limit the use of materials. The problem he is attempting to solve is a real one but, in my opinion, the solution is not so much in what we may do to text books as in what we must do to teachers. Nor do I feel that the purpose of economy whether of money or time justifies the idea.

May I conclude this statement by saying that I highly approve of Mr. Troup, although I do not approve of his plan.

Are we to assume that the organization of the material

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is to be in conformity with that as given in the Rugg texts in Social Sciences (a fusion course) or with that of Unified Mathematics by Schorling and others? Mr. Troup does not make clear just what type of material is to be included or the type of organization ^{which} is to be used. Even if the object is to make one basic text cover many subjects, it seems to me that there would still be need of supplementary material in order to give sufficient variety of reading material even in the lower grades.

DETAILED PLAN OF WORK

PLEASE RETURN

(1) A prevailing custom among the elementary schools of the country is to use a separate textbook for each subject taught, such as Reading, Health, Spelling, Arithmetic, etc. Such a practice means that there must be rigid schedules designed to provide a certain amount of time for each subject, thereby giving to the child the impression that each subject is an end in itself, having no relation whatever to the others.

I propose, therefore, to write at least two textbooks (for the first and second grades) which would include materials now contained in several separate texts. I do not propose to rewrite that which is now contained in the separate textbooks referred to, but to develop a body of material which would facilitate life-related teaching.

Educationally, such books should be of tremendous value, in that our elementary schools, through the use of such texts, would be freed from the narrow limitations which a schedule necessarily imposes. The use of a single textbook, instead of many, would solve the problem of correlation of elementary school offerings. From an economic point of view, a single textbook would mean a great saving of money on the part of State, County and City Boards of Education, as well as to parents or guardians who find it a financial burden to purchase all of the textbooks now required for use in our elementary schools.

(2) In 1937 I made a study of the State-adopted textbooks of Georgia. Among other things, this study has enabled me to understand the nature of the work I shall undertake. To date, no further work has been done. The estimated time for the completion of this work is two years.

(3) I plan to study at Stanford University under the direction of Dr. G. N. Kefauver.

(4) Upon completion, I hope to have these textbooks published and adopted for use in the elementary schools throughout the country.

(5) My chief interest is in the supervisory and administrative phases of Education. I should like to continue in this field with sufficient time for more creative writing.

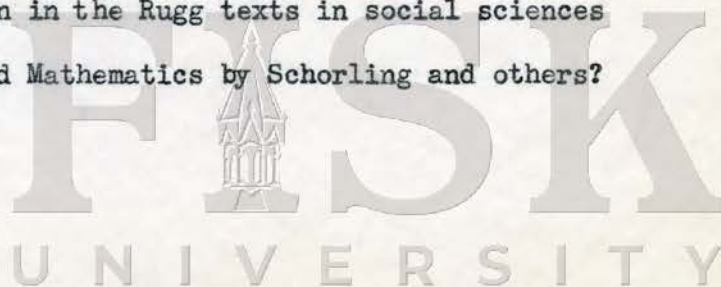
