# Social Work Fellowships and Scholarships

THIS list is compiled annually by the AASW as a method of bringing scholarship opportunities to the attention of those who might be interested and qualified to apply for them. Information in regard to scholarship offerings in the member schools of the Association of Schools will be found in the list, together with some which are offered elsewhere.

The schools report that the number of applicants is always greatly in excess of the available scholarships and that an exceptionally good academic record as an undergraduate, plus evidence of the applicant's qualifications for the field of social work is essential in securing a scholarship. An undergraduate major in one of the social sciences is required in some instances and when experience is required for certain scholarships, this must have been of superior quality. There are ordinarily no geographical limitations in applying for scholarships and the schools report wide distribution in applications received and scholarships awarded.

## I. AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF SCHOOLS OF SOCIAL WORK

### 1—Atlanta School of Social Work, Atlanta, Ga.

#### SCHOLARSHIPS AND FELLOWSHIPS 1938-39

Several tuition scholarships available to qualified students offered by the School.

One tuition scholarship offered by Alumni Association of School. (This is really a loan fund which the recipient repays after graduation.)

### 2—Bryn Mawr College, Bryn Mawr, Pa. Carola Woerishoffer Graduate Department of Social Economy and Social Research.

#### RESIDENT RESEARCH ASSISTANTSHIP 1938-39

A Susan M. Kingsbury Research Assistantship in Social Economy and Social Research, comprising a stipend of \$800 and a remission of tuition, is awarded annually on the recommendation of the Director of the Carola Woerishoffer Graduate Department of Social Economy and Social Research. It is open to graduates of any college of good standing, preferably students of advanced standing and candidates for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy, who, from either training or experience, have knowledge of methods and techniques in social investigation.

#### FELLOWSHIPS 1938-39

Two Carola Woerishoffer Memorial Fellowships of the value of \$860 each are awarded annually on the ground of excellence in scholarship to candidates who have completed at least one year of graduate work at some college of good standing after obtaining their first degree.

#### SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39

Two Carola Woerishoffer Memorial Scholarships of the value of \$400 each are offered annually and are open for competition to graduates of Bryn Mawr College or of any other college of good standing.

The Susan M. Kingsbury Research Scholarship of the value of \$300 is open to graduates of Bryn Mawr College or of any other college of good standing.

#### APPLICATION

Application for scholarships and fellowships should be made by March 1, 1938, to the Dean of the Graduate School, Bryn Mawr College. Application forms sent on request.

### 3—Buffalo, University of, Buffalo, New York. School of Social Work.

#### SCHOLARSHIPS AND ASSISTANTSHIPS 1938-39

Working Assistantship in social work open to college graduates on a competitive basis. Provides \$250.00 in tuition and \$250.00 in cash.

Compensation arranged in special cases by cooperating agencies for students doing field work.

In addition, the income from a \$1,000.00 fund is

available to pre-social work students taking their B.A. in the Department of Sociology.

### 4—California, University of, Berkeley, Calif.

#### SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39

James Denman Scholarship is open to women students, graduate or undergraduate, of the University of California preparing to enter upon some municipal or quasi-public employment having in view the systematic regulation, care, and fostering of the recreation of young people in large cities.

### 5—Carnegie Institute of Technology, Pittsburgh, Pa. Margaret Morrison Carnegie College.

#### SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39

No scholarships are offered in the Graduate Department of Social Work.

General scholarships offered in the undergraduate curriculum are listed on pages 26 to 28 of Margaret Morrison Carnegie College Bulletin and are open to any qualifying student pursuing the pre-professional course.

### 6—Catholic University of America, Washington, D. C. School of Social Work.

#### SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39

Two of the twenty-five full scholarships established by the Knights of Columbus at the Catholic University of America are available to students in the School of Social Work. One of these scholarships will be available in the spring of 1938.

The following scholarships are available to students who meet the qualifications for admission to the School of Social Work, and who are selected with the cooperation of the local agency. One of the two full scholarships offered by the Society of St. Vincent de Paul in St. Louis will be available in the spring of 1938. One scholarship each, offered by the Society of St. Vincent de Paul in Baltimore, and New York City, will be available in the spring of 1938.

Two scholarships, which include tuition and partial living expenses for Catholic laymen from Cincinnati, made available by Rt. Rev. Msgr. R. M. Wagner, Director of Catholic Charities of Cincinnati, will be open in the spring of 1938.

Several of the scholarships offering maintenance in institutions in the District of Columbia for a prescribed number of hours of work will be available beginning the fall term 1938-39.

In addition to the above, a number of scholarships established by Catholic dioceses are available for priest students in the School of Social Work.

The School of Social Work has the privilege of referring qualified students to a national foundation which provides non-interest-bearing loans to graduate students within one year of the degree.

Applications for scholarships must be submitted to the Dean on or before April 1, 1938.

**7—Chicago, University of, School of Social Service Administration.**

**FELLOWSHIPS 1938-39**

Two university fellowships carry stipends of \$600 and \$750 from which tuition fees must be paid. They are available for students who have completed at least two years of graduate work in social service and have had experience in social work.

A special fellowship fund founded by the alumni of the Chicago School of Civics and Philanthropy yields approximately \$700 biennially and is usually awarded to a candidate who has already had experience in social work, and who has completed part of the School's program.

*The Leila Houghteling Fellowships and Scholarships* range from tuition fees to the sum of \$600 a year, depending upon the student's assignment. They are available only to those candidates who have completed a substantial amount of professional work (including field work) in the School of Social Service Administration.

*The Commonwealth Fund Fellowships.* The Commonwealth Fund has granted a fund to the School to be used for special fellowships in psychiatric social work. These fellowships will be granted only to students who have completed a year of graduate study in a school of social work and have had some social work experience.

**SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39**

A few graduate service scholarships and half scholarships are available, carrying stipends which cover only tuition or half tuition and carry a service obligation of ten (or five) hours a week.

The La Verne Noyes Foundation provides tuition scholarships for deserving students who have served in the Army or Navy, or who are descendants of any one who served in the Great War.

The Helen M. Crittenden Loan Fund, the Leila Houghteling Loan Fund, the Sidney Teller Loan Fund and the Alumni Loan Fund are available for small loans to students who have already completed one or more quarters of work.

All fellowships and scholarships are available only to graduate students with good scholarship records in the colleges or universities attended and when experience is required, this must be experience of superior quality indicating promise of further development and a future contribution to the field.

**8—Cincinnati, University of, Cincinnati, Ohio. Division of Training for Public Welfare Administration.**

**SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39**

A few tuition scholarships are available. These are awarded to applicants for admission to the Division whose college record is excellent and who would be unable to enter upon the training without such help.

Cooperating social agencies offer a limited number of opportunities on their staffs for half-time service under supervision with pay, for promising students selected by the Division, thus providing extended practice as part of the training. Students are chosen for these assignments on the basis of scholarship as attested by their college records, preparation in the social sciences, and personal fitness for a social welfare career as determined by references and interview.

**9—Denver, University of, Denver, Colorado. Department of Social Work.**

**SCHOLARSHIPS AND ASSISTANTSHIPS 1938-39**

The loan scholarship of the Denver Chapter of the American Association of Social Workers is open to an

advanced graduate student. There are also several student assistantships paying half tuition for students who serve as clerical assistants in the department. Some assistance is available through the National Youth Administration to individuals under twenty-five years of age.

All loan scholarships and assistantships are granted on a basis of scholarship and need. Preference is given to students who have had one quarter of work in the department.

**10—Fordham University, New York. School of Social Service.**

**SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39**

The *Margaret Cummings Haney Scholarship* and the *Adelaide McNamara Scholarship* provide part tuition for students who have completed at least one semester of work in the School. The *Elizabeth Cady Memorial Loan Fund* is available for small loans to students who may need supplementary aid. No fellowships are offered by the School. Awards for scholarships and student aid are based on the applicant's school record and financial circumstances. Applications close on May 1, 1938. Scholarships begin the semester following their award and appointments are for one year only. Communications should be addressed to The Dean, Room 805, Woolworth Building, New York, N. Y.

**11—Graduate School for Jewish Social Work, 71 West 47th Street, New York.**

**FELLOWSHIPS AND SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39**

The Graduate School awards each year between ten and twenty scholarships and fellowships ranging in size from \$150 to \$500. These awards are made to people who have the requisite qualifications of: adequate personality; suitable educational background (social sciences); interest in Jewish life and its problems; satisfactory life and work experience; and scholastic record in undergraduate work.

Applications are received from seniors and graduates from the colleges and universities throughout the country, as well as qualified social workers who have not had professional training. Approximately three hundred applications are examined for these awards each year. April 29, 1938, is the last day for filing applications for the awards.

The \$500 and \$350 fellowships will be awarded on the basis of a competitive examination held in various parts of the country in the spring of 1938. Fellowships of \$250 and tuition scholarships of \$150 do not require an examination. However, the Committee on Admissions and Awards reserves the right to consider for these awards the candidates who took the examination but did not rank high enough for the larger awards.

Fellowships and scholarships of similar size are also available for second year students. These are awarded on the basis of the student's record while in the School. All awards are made in June and July.

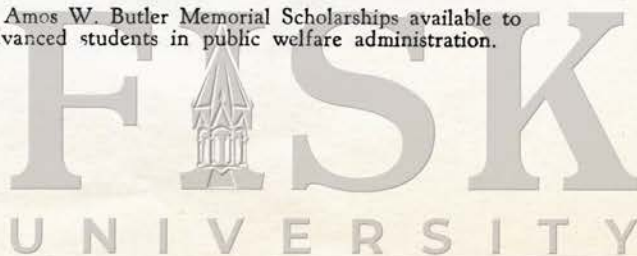
In addition to the above, several community fellowships are available each year for students who will pledge themselves to work in those communities for a limited period of time after graduation. For specific information regarding these fellowships, see the catalogue of the School, which will be sent upon request.

The School has a Students' Aid and a Students' Loan Fund for the purpose of helping students who may need financial assistance to take the course in the School.

**12—Indiana University, Indianapolis, Ind. Training Course for Social Work.**

**SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39**

Amos W. Butler Memorial Scholarships available to advanced students in public welfare administration.



Katharine Holliday Daniels Memorial Loan Fund, loans without interest to advanced students preparing for group work or allied fields.

Institutional Maintenance Scholarships for advanced students in selected state institutions.

**13—Louisville, University of, Louisville, Ky. Graduate Division of Social Administration.**

**SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39**

Two scholarships available on a basis of joint placement in one of the local agencies.

Two tuition scholarships offered by the local chapter of the AASW.

**14—Loyola University, Chicago, Ill. School of Social Work.**

**SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39**

Five scholarships established in the School of Social Work by the Alumnae Association of Loyola University are available to graduate students. Three scholarships provide \$250 and two provide \$125.

**15—(a) Michigan, University of, Ann Arbor. Curriculum in Social Work.**

**FELLOWSHIPS 1938-39**

Graduate students in social work are eligible to apply for regular university fellowships of \$500 each which are awarded on competitive basis to students in different fields. Applications for these fellowships should be received not later than May 1, 1938.

**15—(b) Michigan, University of, Institute of Public & Social Administration, Detroit, Michigan. Curriculum in Social Work.**

**FELLOWSHIPS AND SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-1939**

Graduate students in social work eligible to apply for university fellowships and scholarships open to graduate students generally in the University.

A number of field scholarships provided by cooperating agencies and paying \$60 to \$80 a month for students who would not otherwise be able to carry field work.

**16—Minnesota, University of, Minneapolis. Graduate Course in Social Work.**

**FELLOWSHIPS AND SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39**

Several fellowships in medical social work and one in social work, special line not stated, are available for graduate students who have been enrolled in the Graduate Course in Social Work for at least one quarter. These fellowships amount to \$150 a quarter. They are awarded to promising students who would be unable to continue their professional education unless financial assistance could be procured. No other special scholarships are available for students in social work. Thirteen general academic scholarships ranging from \$50 to \$300 are open to undergraduate, pre-social work students if qualified.

Applications for such fellowships must be made not later than March 1, 1938.

**17—National Catholic School of Social Service, 2400 Nineteenth Street, N. W., Washington, D. C.**

**FULL FELLOWSHIPS 1938-39**

Eight fellowships will be awarded. Students are nominated by the following patrons who have created the endowments and are approved by the School on the basis of competitive examinations.

The Queen Isabella Foundation carrying full tuition and maintenance, open to members of the organization. (Two fellowships are available.)

Fellowships carrying part tuition and maintenance, open to residents of the diocese mentioned, are as follows:

1. The Hines Fellowship, donated by Mrs. Loretto Hines of Chicago, Illinois.

2. The Hartford Fellowship, donated by the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, Hartford, Conn.

3. The Mary Gess Schrems Fellowship, donated by the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, Cleveland, Ohio.

4. The Christine Parrott Donohue Fellowship, donated by Mr. Joseph Donohue of San Francisco, Calif.

5. The Anna Clarke Hanna Fellowship, donated by the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, San Francisco, California.

6. The Teresa Molamphy Fellowship, donated by the Pittsburgh Diocesan Council of Catholic Women.

**ANNUAL FELLOWSHIPS 1938-39**

Four annual fellowships will be available to residents of St. Louis, Cincinnati, Milwaukee, members of the Young Ladies Institute on the Pacific Coast, carrying full tuition and maintenance.

**SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39**

A tuition scholarship will be available to a student designated by the Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of New York.

A tuition scholarship will be available for a resident of the District of Columbia, donated by the local court of the Catholic Daughters of America.

All candidates must be holders of the Bachelor's degree from a college of recognized standing. Apart from exceptional reasons, all candidates must be not less than twenty-one nor more than thirty-five years of age.

Application for scholarships must be submitted on or before April 15, 1938. Communications should be addressed to the Director, National Catholic School of Social Service, 2400 Nineteenth Street N. W., Washington, D. C.

**18—The New York School of Social Work, 122 East 22nd Street, New York.**

**FELLOWSHIPS 1938-39**

**Foreign Fellowships**

*Elizabeth Lowe Gamble:*

A fellowship covering tuition and maintenance will be awarded to a foreign student, preferably one from the Orient.

*Willard Straight:*

A fellowship covering tuition and maintenance will be awarded to a foreign student planning to return to his own country and engage in social work. (If the general financial situation should cancel this fellowship, due notice will be given.)

These fellowships become available as of October 1, 1938, and cover approximately half the diploma course. Tuition for the fellowship period must be paid to the School from each of these fellowship grants. The grants do not cover traveling expenses. Applicants should have sufficient knowledge of English to carry the full School program, including lectures, discussion and field work. Application must be made on blanks secured from the School and filed not later than February 1, 1938.

**Commonwealth Fund Fellowships**

A number of Commonwealth Fund fellowships, varying in amount, will be offered to candidates who wish to prepare for psychiatric social work and who have had at least two quarters of graduate training, prefer-

ably with some psychiatric theory, in a professional school of social work. Application must be made on blanks secured from the School and filed *not later than March 1, 1938.*

### **Special Fellowship Announcement**

The New York School of Social Work, in cooperation with a number of New York City institutions, is offering for 1938-39 five work-study fellowships open to men and women living outside of New York City, who are interested in preparing for *group work or public welfare and who can remain at the School for at least nine months.*

The fellowships offer tuition from the School and an opportunity to earn maintenance in an institution in return for 15 to 20 hours of work weekly. Students must cover their own incidental expenses for which not less than \$20 a month should be allowed.

With possible exceptions, appointments will begin with the Fall Quarter of 1938-39 and continue for three or, in some cases four quarters.

Application blanks may be secured from the School and must be returned *not later than March 1, 1938.*

**19—North Carolina, University of, Chapel Hill, N. C. School of Public Administration, Division of Public Welfare and Social Work.**

#### **FELLOWSHIPS AND SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39**

No special scholarships or fellowships offered in the Division of Public Welfare and Social Work. The limited number of scholarships and fellowships offered by the University to graduate students in general are open to social work students as to other graduate students. Application for the following college year must be filed before *March 1, 1938.*

**20—Northwestern University, The University College, Chicago, Ill. Division of Social Work.**

#### **ASSISTANTSHIPS AND FELLOWSHIPS 1938-39**

Five Assistantships in the Division of Social Work, carrying full graduate tuition, are available.

Eighteen university Fellowships of about \$400 and tuition, and a limited number of tutorial fellowships covering tuition and board, are available to graduate students, some of which may be assigned to students in the Division of Social Work.

Applications should be received not later than *March 1, 1938.*

**21—Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio. School of Social Administration.**

#### **FELLOWSHIPS 1938-39**

One graduate fellowship of \$300 in field of public health offered by Ohio Public Health Association.

One graduate fellowship of \$250 open to student specializing in community organization.

One graduate fellowship of \$100 open to student specializing in community organization.

A limited amount of funds for loan without interest are available.

Under certain conditions non-resident fees of \$150 a year are waived for graduate students.

**22—Pennsylvania School of Social Work, Affiliated with the University of Pennsylvania, 311 So. Juniper Street, Philadelphia, Pa.**

#### **FELLOWSHIPS AND SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39**

The Pennsylvania School of Social Work announces that a number of first-year tuition scholarships for \$250 will be available for students entering in the coming school year. A number of second-year fellowships and

several fellowships for work in the Advanced Curriculum will also be awarded in cooperation with social agencies of Philadelphia, offering special educational opportunities in specialized fields.

Both scholarships and fellowships are available only for applicants who have completed a full four-year course in an accredited college or university, and fellowships will be awarded only to persons who have successfully completed at least one year of graduate, professional education, including the substantial equivalent of the first year of the Graduate Course at the Pennsylvania School.

Applications for scholarships and fellowships should be received not later than *May 15, 1938.*

Loan funds, administered by the Alumni Association of the School and by the Rachel Pflaum Memorial Committee, are available to a limited number of students.

**23—Pittsburgh, University of, Pittsburgh, Pa. Division of Social Work.**

#### **FELLOWSHIPS 1938-39**

A number of agency fellowships covering tuition and approximately the cost of maintenance have been made available by social agencies of Allegheny County.

Applications for fellowships should be made not later than *April 1, 1938.*

**24—St. Louis University, St. Louis, Mo. School of Social Service.**

#### **FELLOWSHIPS 1938-39**

Four fellowships in medical social work open to college graduates with a major in sociology or social science. The fellowships cover the cost of tuition and maintenance.

Applications must be filed before *March 1, 1938.*

**25—Simmons College School of Social Work, 18 Somerset Street, Boston, Massachusetts.**

#### **SCHOLARSHIPS AND LOANS 1938-39**

Several full tuition scholarships are available for graduate students. Application should be made by *March 15, 1938.*

A limited number of residence scholarships are available for qualified students.

Tuition loans are available.

**26—Smith College School for Social Work, Northampton, Mass.**

#### **SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39**

Several \$450 scholarships may be awarded to students qualifying for the second and fourth sessions. Fourteen hospital internships paying all maintenance expenses during the second and fourth sessions are available. Eight \$100 tuition scholarships are also available. Applicants for scholarships and internships should be college graduates, but need not have had practical experience in social work. All applications should be made to the Director by letter before *April 15, 1938.*

**27—Southern California, University of, 3551 University Avenue, Los Angeles. School of Social Work.**

#### **FELLOWSHIPS AND SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39**

The School offers four graduate scholarships and one graduate fellowship.

**28—Tulane University, New Orleans, La. School of Social Work.**

#### **SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39**

A limited number of free tuition scholarships available to qualified graduate students. Applications close *May, 1938.*



29—Washington University, St. Louis, Mo. George Warren Brown Department of Social Work.

FELLOWSHIPS AND SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39

The following scholarships are open to students in either the first or second year of their work:

Four Family Welfare Association scholarships of.....	\$375.00 each
One City Advisory Committee scholarship of.....	350.00
Two Social Work Department scholarships of.....	300.00 each
Three Social Work Department scholarships of.....	200.00 each

The Family Welfare scholarships carry with them the obligation to accept employment with the Provident Association of St. Louis for one year after the university work is completed, if offered.

Applications for scholarships should be filed not later than *March 1, 1938*, and awards are made by the first of April for the following academic year.

30—Washington, University of, Seattle, Wash. Graduate School of Social Work.

SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39

The E. C. Neufelder scholarship, established by the will of Lily C. Neufelder, is open to any graduate student who has already completed at least one quarter of graduate work in residence or who has finished his undergraduate work at the University of Washington. Award is made on the basis of excellent scholarship and financial need.

A graduate scholarship is open to a student who assists in the School. Remuneration is tuition exemption and \$15 a month. Available after first or second quarter of work.

LOAN FUND

The Mildred E. Buck Loan Fund is available for small loans to students.

Applications for the E. C. Neufelder scholarship should be made to the Graduate School, 101 Parrington Hall, not later than *February 28, 1938*; the awards for

the following year are announced about May. Application for the Mildred E. Buck Loan Fund should be made to the Graduate School of Social Work. Loans are determined by scholarship, financial need, and prospective placement in a position.

31—Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio. School of Applied Social Sciences.

FELLOWSHIPS AND SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39

Remuneration is provided for a limited number of students in connection with supervised field work given by a number of cooperating agencies in Cleveland. Loans in very limited amounts are occasionally available.

Certain fellowships are available to students in medical social work who are unable to finance professional education without assistance. First-year students who do not reside in Cleveland are eligible for maintenance fellowships. Second-year students are eligible for social service fellowships which consist of a monthly stipend.

Certain fellowships are available to students who qualify for specialization in psychiatric social work.

Eligibility for any of the forms of student assistance is based on certain admission requirements, which include a B.A. degree and a specific amount of pre-professional preparation in the social and biological sciences.

Applications should be made not later than *May 15, 1938*. Application fee \$5; applied on tuition if accepted; otherwise, not refunded.

32—William and Mary, College of, School of Social Work and Public Health, Richmond, Va.

FELLOWSHIPS AND SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39

Fellowships and scholarships varying from \$100 to \$250 are offered each year to college graduates for special work in such fields as family welfare, child welfare, psychiatric social work, recreation, and other branches of social work. One-half of each larger fellowship is a loan, repayable after graduation.

The number of scholarships offered each year varies with the qualifications and needs of the applicants.

## II. OTHER UNIVERSITIES

1—Kentucky, University of, Lexington, Ky. Curriculum in Social Work.

FELLOWSHIPS AND SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39

No special scholarships or fellowships offered in the field of social work. The limited number of scholarships and fellowships offered by the University to graduate students in general are open to social work students as to other graduate students.

2—Nebraska, University of, Lincoln, Neb. Graduate School of Social Work.

*Scholarships:* Five to eight scholarships in the Child Welfare Training unit, open only to Nebraska county and state Child Welfare and Assistance personnel, complete stipend, \$65 to \$90 per month.

*Assistantships:* One assistantship carrying a stipend of \$100 a semester. Eight assistantships carrying stipends of approximately \$50 per month, part-time work required.

*Scholarships:* One Regent's scholarship for each Nebraska college or university, carrying complete tuition for one year, open to graduates of Nebraska colleges.

*Internships:* Eight internships for students who have completed at least a minimum of one year in the Graduate School of Social Work at the University of Nebraska.

*Loans:* To graduates, from University loan funds may be arranged.

3—Notre Dame, University of, Notre Dame, Ind. Curriculum in Social Work.

SCHOLARSHIPS 1938-39

*Group Work:* Ten Knights of Columbus graduate tuition scholarships.

*Case Work:* Five graduate tuition grants involving minor service requirements of an academic nature.

Scholarships are open only to men and the Knights of Columbus scholarships are limited to Catholics. Application should be sent to the University Registrar before *May 1, 1938*.

4—Oklahoma, University of, Norman, Okla., School of Social Work.

RESEARCH FELLOWSHIPS 1938-39

The University of Oklahoma offers ten or more graduate research fellowships and scholarships. Appointments are assigned from year to year to various departments according to the merits of the applicants and the nature of the research problems submitted. Research fellowships carry stipends ranging from \$300 to \$400. Research scholarships carry stipends ranging from \$150 to \$200 and are usually awarded to students who are entering upon graduate study.

Applications for research fellowships and scholarships must be filed with the Dean of the Graduate School on or before *March 15, 1938*.
