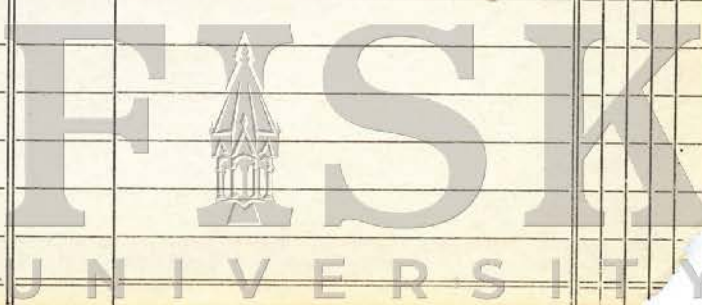

I have just been notified by President Cox that I have been awarded a traveling fellowship for the year 1931-32 by the Julius Rosenwald Fund. It gives me very great pleasure to accept the award as well as to thank you personally for the part you had in making it. Dear Mr. Baker: Thank you for your courteous letter of April 7. We feel it an honor to cooperate in further enriching the excellent faculty of Emory University. I hope you will enjoy to the full your study abroad.

I have been out of touch with academic conditions in Europe for several years. I fear, therefore, that I cannot be of much direct help to you in your plans. The Rockefeller Foundation maintains a European office. The men there are in close and continuous contact with European universities. My suggestion is that you address Dr. Gunn, the head of that office, explaining that you have this fellowship, asking specific suggestions, and stating that you are doing so on my advice. In addition to any recommendations that Gunn may make, this will put you in touch with that office, which may be of service to you in the course of your stay in Europe. The address is, Dr. Selskar M. My dear Mr. Levin:

In a conversation with Mr. Clark Foreman, I find that Mr. Embree is on his vacation. Mr. Foreman suggested that I write to you in his place.

On March 20, 1931, Mr. Embree wrote me as follows concerning the fellowships of the Julius Rosenwald Fund which were awarded to three of our professors:

"The awards are made with the understanding that the University will continue at least half salary during the fellowship period in each of the cases. We stand ready to make payment in such way as may be most convenient to the University and to the individuals concerned."

I failed to write to either Mr. Embree or you with reference to this matter before I left for my vacation some weeks ago, and upon my return I find that two of our men are planning to leave for Europe in the near future. If it meets with the approval of the Julius Rosenwald Fund, we should like to have one half, or one third, of the awards to Dr. W. B. Baker and Mr. J. P. Corry given them before they leave. The balance could be appropriated in two equal installments during the year. If this plan is not satisfactory, any arrangement which may be made will be entirely agreeable with us.

I have received and cashed the draft sent me on January 6th. Please accept my thanks for it. I cabled you only after having exhausted what funds I had on hand and through fear that my letter to you had been lost in transit.

The expenses of our stay in Europe have been greater than we anticipated and as a result I have not been able to visit as many of the institutions as I had planned to see, nor have I been able to accomplish some of the things I had hoped to do. Perhaps I undertook too expensive a project in bringing my family with me but there seemed to be no other satisfactory solution of my problem. As a matter of fact however, except for

If such an arrangement can be made and if it is desirable that I do so, I will submit a specific program for which I wish to use the money.

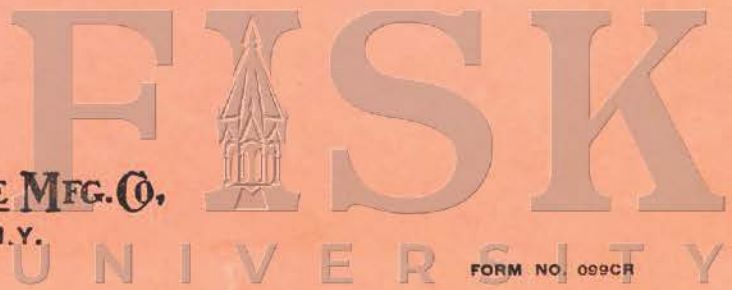

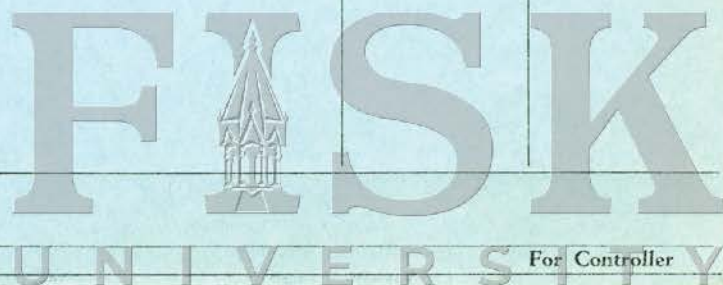

Dear Miss Elvidge:

I am inclosing check for \$30 to cover interest due on my note to the Julius Rosenwald Fund. I had planned to write you earlier in the fall regarding this note as seen as our financial difficulties at Emory had been adjusted and the program for the year 1932-33 had been announced. We anticipated some reduction in salary for the year and the first one of 10% was announced for September. We adjusted our plans to this reduction as best we could, but another reduction of 10% came in April. As a result of these reductions it will be impossible for me to reduce the face of my note at this time. We do not anticipate further reductions but conditions are so unsettled at present that they may have to be made. In case our originally low salaries continue to be reduced we do not see how the barest necessities can be purchased.

I regret very much having to postpone repayments on this note since I am under such obligations to the Rosenwald Fund for the Fellowship granted me last year. As I look back over the year I feel more grateful than ever for the opportunity the Fellowship afforded me. However, had I been able to foresee financial conditions as they now exist I think I should have had to decline or at least postpone the privilege of the year of travel and study in Europe.

I shall do my best to make a semi-annual reduction of the principal of the note in October and will write you before that time in case we have further salary reductions and I find it impossible to make the payment.

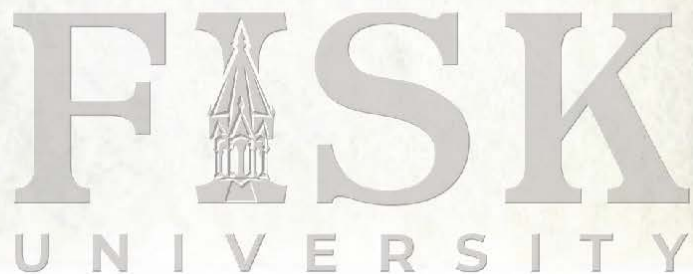

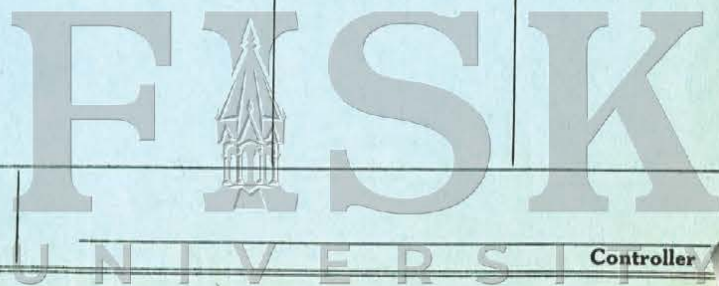

Dear Dr. Baker: You will remember that early in 1932, in addition to an outright fellowship of \$2000 granted to you for European study, at your request we made a loan of \$500. This loan was to be repaid three years from its date, April 8, 1932, together with interest at the rate of five per cent per annum. Interest payments totaling \$55 were made but no payments whatever on the face of the note have been received.


Such a situation represents a great deal of embarrassment to us. We realize the financial difficulties under which professors are living these days. We have, therefore, not been importunate in the matter. On the other hand, the loan having been made at your urgent request and having been handled entirely as a business transaction, I, as president of the Fund, am in a very awkward position before my trustees and their auditors. I should like very much to clear up the matter. It is probably fully as great a distress to you as it is to us. I think a compromise could be arranged that might be satisfactory to both parties. Would it, for example, be at all possible for you to pay half of the face of the note if this were regarded as a full discharge of the obligation? Or have you any other suggestion in the matter? My own position is the more difficult because the outright grant was larger than we customarily make and the loan was a somewhat unusual procedure authorized by me solely for the sake of enabling you to get the most out of European study already begun. Will you not let me have your suggestions as to procedure so that this matter may be closed and thus add substantially to the satisfaction of us both?

My dear Mr. Embree:

Your generous offer regarding payment of my note due the Rosenwald Fund has been read with interest. As I stated in a previous letter, our financial situation at Emory, since my return from Europe, has made it impossible for us to meet many of the obligations contracted prior to 1930. Needless to say this fact has caused us much personal embarrassment. I particularly regret that you have been embarrassed by my inability to repay the loan you so graciously extended me while I was in Europe, and especially because of your generosity in making it possible for me to have the opportunity of the year's study in the first place. I am embarrassed now that you feel it necessary to suggest a compromise settlement of the note which I could have paid without serious difficulty as agreed upon, had my base salary not been reduced 20% and my extension division income entirely eliminated.

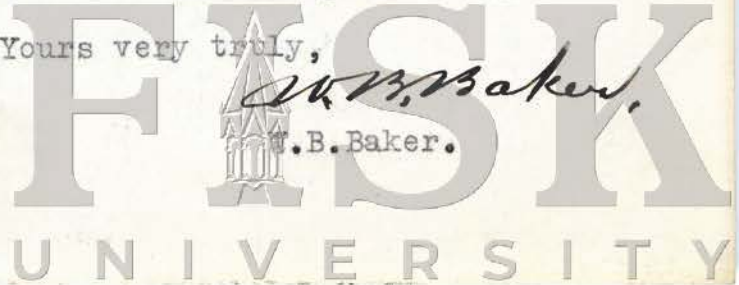
I sincerely appreciate your offer and if I saw any prospects of being able to meet the obligation in full within the near future I would not accept the compromise. Under the circumstances I am more than willing to try to pay the note as you suggest but cannot raise but \$150 this month. I can send you a check for \$50 January 15th, and a like amount on February 15th, provided such an arrangement meets with your approval. I am inclosing the check for \$150.

I built a rather modest home in 1930 and have had great difficulty in meeting the payments on the mortgage during the depression, in order to prevent foreclosure. I have used up all my reserves in insurance and a few small investments in order to do this hence I am unable to get together \$250 in cash at this time.

Again I wish to express to you personally, my sincere appreciation for the original grant from the Rosenwald Fund. I consider the year in Europe one of the most profitable I have ever spent. I feel that my viewpoint regarding present day affairs and problems has been much broadened and my teaching greatly enriched.
