Dear Mr. Bennett: When the trustees of the Fund first voted an appropriation for the salary of the principal of the school in the Pine Mountain Valley Rural Community Project, there were at least two reasons for doing so. They were that:

1. We were initiating our program in rural education and were getting information wherever we could find it, and
2. We wished to help - in so far as we could - in the launching of a new type rural community and rural school.

The first reason for our cooperation continued for the first year. After this period, approach to our problem through the normal school was clearly indicated. This eliminated the need for further use of situations like Pine Mountain.

In spite of this, however, we renewed our grant for 1936-37 under Mr. Thomas and again for 1937-38, the present year. This was done in order that we might assist in bridging the first few years of planning and adjustment.

It seems to us now that the Valley Community - and therefore the school in the Community - is taking on permanency of form and character and that the reasons for our grant to the school no longer exist.

On October 20 of last fall, we wrote you that we did not expect to renew our grant for the school year 1938-39. This letter is a confirmation of that notice and our last payment on this commitment will be the check for Mr. Boggs' salary for the month of June, 1938.

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The whole Valley project - and the school as part of it - is important and deserving of all consideration and our withdrawal in no way minimizes this value. You will, I am sure, be able to tap sources of support to replace what you have been receiving from the Rosenwald Fund.

Assuring you of our appreciation of your co-operation and wishing for you continued success in your direction of the project, I am

Dear Mr. Dixon:

On March 15 I paid a visit to the Pine Mountain Valley Resettlement Project to study the school situation there which we have discussed together. At the Project I interviewed Mr. Bennett, Project Manager, Mr. Boggs, Principal of the school, and Mr. Wisdom, County Superintendent. Dr. Paul R. Morrow accompanied me on the trip. I visited each of the teachers and examined rather carefully the work of the entire Resettlement Project.

The first two or three years of such undertakings, I suppose, are filled with considerable amount of change and counter-change as the Project develops and stabilizes. A number of the original settlers have left and others have been brought in to take their places. It is my information that the general level of the settlers has been brought up with the recent additions. Mr. Bennett as Project Manager, in my judgment, is doing an excellent job and seems to have a vision for the undertaking which is practical and tenable. He has the confidence of the settlers and also of the employees of the Project. He also seems to be developing a real worthwhile understanding with the citizens outside the Project. This lack of understanding was one of the first problems with which the Project was confronted.

Mr. Boggs seems to be giving the school excellent leadership. He is in love with his job and wants to continue. He is endeavoring to carry too heavy a load. He is teaching at Hamilton in the morning, supervising the Project in the afternoon and teaching adult classes each evening. Next year he is to be relieved from his work at Hamilton. The teachers on the whole are considerably above average and evidence great interest and enthusiasm for their job.

Mr. Wisdom has real and vital interest in the work of the Project and I believe is more than willing now to aid in the development of a school program in a proper way. We discussed the early differences which existed between the County Board of Education and the local district regarding the school on the Project. I am inclined to believe


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that the situation has improved materially. There is considerable evidence now that all those connected with the undertaking are visualizing a real school program and have plans which, if successfully carried out, should make a real contribution to the usefulness of the school in the development of community life. This undertaking offers almost limitless possibilities for such a development. The State Department of Education through its curriculum program, as well as through its regular work, has evinced a growing interest in this program and I believe will show an even greater interest as the school develops. The school has been selected as one of the demonstration centers for the statewide program. The school authorities have requested some unit of the University System to aid it in its undertaking through providing supervision and special assistance. It is my understanding that such assistance will be forthcoming.

It is my belief that up to now the Rosenwald Fund has not secured too much return for the money it has invested. Probably this was to be expected. The complexities of the situation and the uncertainties which always exist during the formative period of a Project have made it difficult, if not impossible, to secure constructive results up to the present time. I am convinced, however, that the future is much more hopeful and if the present authorities continue in their positions, and if the program as outlined is carried out, very worthwhile results will be forthcoming which will be beneficial not only to this Project but to similiar undertakings elsewhere. As the Rosenwald Fund has already evidence its interest in the undertaking and has already placed some money in it for its support over a period of time, I believe that a continuance of your support will not only make a more constructive program but will be the means of getting value from the money the Fund has already invested. At least that is my best judgment after a careful study of the situation.

Dear Mr. Boggs: All of us appreciate the very excellent job you did at Pine Mountain last year, and even more do we appreciate the proposals for future development which you set forth in the application you recently sent to us for further financial aid. We have no doubt whatsoever that the community and the school are both very important projects in the rural life of Georgia, and we have been happy to be connected even in a very limited way during the last two or three years.

It now appears to us, however, that for reasons which I think we have stated several times, it is inadvisable for us to continue cooperation with individual projects like Pine Mountain. In other words, the development of our program is such that our logical activity seems to be with the normal school and its own agencies, such as its rural experimental or practice schools. For this reason, as I have already written Mr. Bennett, we feel that we must discontinue our financial cooperation with Pine Mountain as of June 30 of this year, and this letter is an official notification of the fact that we will do so.

Dear Mr. Bennett: Mr. Embree and I both realize that the Pine Mountain Valley project is a very interesting and worth while one, and that the school is a very important part of it. There are two aspects of it, however, which occur to us, and I think will occur to you, both of which make it seem valid for us to stop our cooperation after this year.

In the first place, the Valley will ultimately have to support the school itself without any outside assistance. In the second place, our only basis for cooperation has been that we were learning and getting information on actual rural situations which we thought we in turn could pass on to those normal schools which were training teachers for these situations.

As we have indicated in the discussions we have had in the past, our cooperation with Pine Mountain Valley, with Red Oak, and with the Fair Play community in Georgia, and with similar projects in Louisiana and Arkansas was a preliminary stage of our program. This cooperation logically brought us into our work in the normal schools, and it is in these now that we believe we are going to be able to render our most effective cooperation. As I told you when we talked about it last, we have already withdrawn from the projects in Arkansas and Louisiana, and from some of those in Georgia.

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Because of the nature of the thing we are doing and the basis upon which we have to cooperate, it is necessary for us to follow some semblance of a general policy. This policy at the present time is confining our activities largely to the normal schools and their related efforts.

We appreciate the way in which the planning for Pine Mountain has been done for next year, and I wish that there were some way in which we could continue to cooperate. It seems to us quite clear, however, that we have now reached the point where we can not further validate cooperation with Pine Mountain, so I am forced to reiterate our notification that we will discontinue our cooperation as of June 30, 1938.

Dear Mr. Dixon:

When I was visiting Pine Mountain Valley School last Wednesday, Principal C.E. Boggs and County Superintendent W.B. Wisdom told me that they had made application to you for an appropriation from the Rosenwald Fund to aid this school program for the next three years.

This school has been designated by the State Department of Education, through Mr. M.E. Thompson, as one of a group of schools in the state as a visiting center. Mr. Boggs and Mr. Wisdom both think that the school program, at present, is not rich and varied enough to offer much to visiting teachers, neither does it now meet the needs of the community as it should do. They think the program can be vitalized and can be made to serve the community much better than it is doing now. To do this it will necessitate more money than Harris County can afford to spend there without neglecting, financially, the other schools in the county. For that reason, and because you have previously rendered assistance to this project, they are asking the continuation of aid from the Rosenwald Fund.

As State School Supervisor in this territory, I shall be glad to assist in any way possible in reorganizing the school program and in helping to carry it out. I believe, in three years time, this school can be made to function in such a way as to merit your continued support.

I assure you that the State Department will be glad to cooperate in any progressive school program that meets the needs of the community. Any assistance rendered this school will be appreciated.

Dear Dr. Cocking: We appreciate the interest you have expressed in the Pine Mountain Valley school, and I agree with you in many of the statements you have made. I suspect that you know the situation there as well as I do. For that reason I am going to be very frank.

When we first began cooperation with the Valley school we did so for two reasons. In the first place, we were in the early stages of our program, and as you have sat on our Rural School Council you know how we approached this whole problem of rural education through a few individual projects actually in rural areas, projects which we called "explorations" for want of a better term. Pine Mountain was one of these. In the second place the whole resettlement project there was a new venture and represented a very frank effort on the part of a governing agency to affect for the better the social and economic life of a fairly destitute and depleted rural section. This effort seemed to us to be so worthy that it merited some little stimulation and cooperation on our part. This we felt we could give and did give through the rural school.

I have watched the whole project very carefully since its inception, and it seems to me that it has now, after two or three years of varied up and down movement, reached something of a plateau in its development. That is, I feel that it has become fairly well stabilized.





In fact, then, both of the reasons for which we originally began cooperation with Pine Mountain seem now not to exist. We feel that the project is stabilized as I have said, and we feel that such actual rural schools as we are connected with should have very close relationship to teacher training institutions. This the Pine Mountain school does not and can not have, and for these reasons we are discontinuing our grant. There are no other reasons whatever.

I had a nice long talk with Nolen in Memphis, as he probably told you. He had many questions in his mind. I hope he was able to get satisfactory answers to them on the trip to Georgia since then.

If nothing happens in the meantime to prevent, I will be in Georgia in the near future, and when I get there I want to spend a little time with you. I will telephone or write you from Atlanta.

Dear Mr. Burdette: All of us here appreciate your very evident interest in Pine Mountain. We, too, are interested in it just as we have been since its inception, and the fact that we are withdrawing the financial support we have been giving the school there does not in the least indicate that our interest has lessened. It simply indicates that we have reached a next step in a policy which happened to be in application at Pine Mountain.

You understand how foundations operate, I know, and understanding their methods as well as you do, you can see why we had to take the steps at Pine Mountain that we have taken. When we first began cooperating, we did so for two reasons. We were trying to find out everything we could about rural schools, and we wanted to help in whatever way we could in a new venture which we thought had quite a bit of promise. During the three years we have been in cooperation with Pine Mountain, we feel that the Valley project itself has become pretty well stabilized, that it is beyond the experimental period, and that it does not need the little assistance which we have been able to give. From the point of view of our program it has developed beyond the stage where we feel it necessary to use the isolated rural school in our complete project. Our cooperation with projects of the type of the Valley school is now in the actual service area of the normal schools.

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We appreciate the fact that the State Department of Education wants to cooperate with Pine Mountain, and I think it should cooperate there. It seems to me that if anything has been done by the Rosenwald Fund it has been to get the Pine Mountain Valley school over its formative stage and to put it into the position where it can not only render effective service to the community but where it can and should be used by the State Department of Education for study and experimental purposes.

If I have not made myself clear in this letter I shall be glad to talk with you sometime when we are in Atlanta together.

This information is being submitted for the purpose of being more specific with regards to ways by which the Pine Mountain Valley Rural School proposes to carry on a program in the new type of instruction as is being suggested by the State Department of Education of the State of Georgia.

Realizing that the main concern of the school is to educate the children for their life in the community, the importance of providing training in the school to deal with the persistent problems of earning a living, health, and adapting themselves to their local surroundings, is recognized. The school proposes to accept as a part of its responsibility to offer education of such a nature to fit the students so they can more proficiently cope with these problems.

We do not propose to exclude teaching something of the basic "three R's", because we believe that not child is prepared to take his or her place in the world without some knowledge along these lines, especially in reading and arithmetic.

In addition to the "three R's", the school proposes to carry out pupil activities that are usually found in or around homes, Handicrafts, nature study, health, and also propose to intergrate such subjects as geography, history, and civics in such a way that these may be closely associated with the natural surroundings.

The school proposes to secure equipment necessary for each teacher to instill in the students some knowledge of how to do simple jobs, such as: build tables, flower boxes and other simple home conveniences. It is not the aim to secure expensive equipment. It is acknowledged that the less formal and expensive the better, since the aim is to instill into the pupils a creative impulse and to work with materials of such a nature that they may be able to secure them in the immediate environment.

The fact is realized that working with hands and other similar activities should be taught in the school, since much of education consists of learning from carrying out

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such activities.


Each teacher is planning, beginning this spring, to have a small garden, which involves so many variables that it will be almost impossible for this teaching to become routine.


Each student enrolled in the school will be given instruction in handicrafts by a person qualified for this type of instruction.

The school proposes to carry out a complete and practical program of health education with the pupils and with the adults of the community.

During the summer the teachers and principal of the school expect to work out the complete educational program of the school and community at one of the teacher training institutions of the state. The staff will go as a unit to the same institution and work out this program under expert supervision.
