Gentlemen:

I am submitting herewith the proposed budget for the Fort Valley State Teachers College for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1940.

Our principal difficulty in the preparation of this budget has come from the necessity of planning for a new institution with no previous record of similar income or expenditures. It has therefore been thought best to set forth a budget taking the most favorable view of possible income; but to provide at the same time in this budget for making no commitments, either for personal service, supplies, or other objects of expenditure, that might not be met either by elimination, or by transfer of available funds appropriated for "capital and extraordinary" purposes from that object to current expenses.

As a result of the lateness of the season, arising from delays of an unavoidable nature in effecting the transfer of the Fort Valley Property to the State, we have not found it possible (a) to receive acceptances from all persons listed in this budgeted statement, or (b) to list definitely other personnel that is yet to be filled.

It will be, we repeat, our policy to clear nominations of personnel, and other commitments, through the Office of the Chancellor, in order to keep our commitments well within the minimum expectations of income this institution may receive.

Dear Doctor Bond: Mr. and Mrs. Simon have talked with me about your proposal for some general publicity in the Negro press concerning Fort Valley as the latest of the state colleges, in connection with the celebration of the sixty-fifth anniversary of the founding of the first state college for Negroes. If the plans which you have in mind can be carried through, we are prepared to contribute six hundred dollars (\$600.00) toward the project which I understand will cost in total about \$2,400.00.

Another proposal has occurred to me, namely, that this anniversary of the first state college and the celebration of the beginning of the latest state college might be celebrated by a conference at Fort Valley of Negro and other educational leaders. This would run into quite a lot of money unless by chance the annual meeting of the Negro A & M group might be arranged at Fort Valley instead of, as it usually is, in connection with the general meeting of A & M college presidents. Whatever the auspices, it seems to me that a conference at Fort Valley that would stress the need of preparing rural teachers might do a good deal both to publicize Fort Valley and to drive home the gospel of rural education.

One occasion for such a meeting might be in connection with the annual meeting of the Fund's Rural Council around January 1. I am not sure that you will be ready for a meeting of this Council at Fort Valley next year. I think we should meet at Fort Valley some time in the near future, but it would be unfortunate to do so until you had your program fairly under way and



until you were sure that you could take care of the living arrangements conveniently and comfortably. Do not take this suggestion too seriously. My guess is that the Council will do better to meet next year either at Tuskegee or in New Orleans, but it is just possible that a meeting at Fort Valley this coming winter would be feasible and "strategic".



I was asked to audit the accounts to ascertain the deficit, since the governing body of the school has agreed to give the school to the Regents free and clear of debt. The transfer to the Regents of all the physical property has already been made. Receipt has already been acknowledged by the Regents of the securities comprising the endowment funds.

There is cash in bank of \$257 06 and accounts payable of \$11 999 97, a deficit of \$11 742 91.

It was ordered by Superior Court, Macon Circuit, June 5, 1939, that out of a fund of \$50 000 00 given by the Julius Rosensald Fund to the Fort Valley Mormal and Industrial School, the deficit for the current year should be paid; then, after payment of certain items mentioned in the court order, any balance remaining in the \$50 000 00 fund, should be transferred to the Regents as an endowment fund, the income to be used for certain purposes.







I am sending to you herewith a revised budget of this institution. The covering letter is self-explanatory. I would like to call your attention to several matters which lend a bit of encouragement to the picture.

In the first place, our enrollment for the year was estimated at 150 students. We had an enrollment of 215. You will note on page 3 that we have moved our estimate up to 175. This is to care for such shrinkage as may be expected between now and the end of the year. We believe this to be a conservative figure.

On page 6 you will note that we have estimated our income from the State of Georgia at only 60% of the \$34,000.00 allocated. To date the actual amount received has been 65.243% of this allocation. This would shown advantage in our final reckoning.

On page 52B you will note that we estimated expenditures of \$4,455.00 for office and classroom equipment, and \$10,545.00 for repairs and improvement. To date we have spent under \$3,000.00 of the \$3,500.00 of the special appropriation for repairs and other like purposes.

We may do a little better than indicated on our Dining Hall. However, this is contingent upon so many factors with present food prices being what they are that we hesitate to change this figure.

There are other places where if all goes well we might be able to chip here and there so as not to be obliged to call upon the special appropriation to any considerable degree as indicated for current expenses; or, at the least, use not more than half of it for the purposes indicated. New and unanticipated expenditures are constantly arising. For example, we had no item for medical examinations; and yet these were required in the University system. We are having rather thorough examinations done here. Incidentally, routine Wassermann's are being run on all of our students, and they show a very low rate by comparison with both general population figures and such college populations as I have the figures for.

I would be happy to answer any questions which you may have in mind.

It was explained at that time that the budget was more mearly a tentative one than a final one, as the lateness at which the Transfer of the institution to the State was affected required much planning and many

give a better picture of our operations. The names of all personnel are indicated, thereas the former budget submitted included, by necessity, the names of come persons who were not available, and of others for whos, in the interest of coopeny, it named better not to make final provision.

We believe that all personnel referred to in the budget has been

oleared by covering latters addressed to Chanceller E. V. Sanford.

You will note that our budget at this time, instead of a small surplus, envisions a deficit of \$10.806.15. This due to the fact that the former budget estimated income from the State of Georgia at the full allowation of \$34,000.00. The budget now subsitted estimates income from this allocation at the saws of 60% of the total allocation, or at \$20,400.00

We would also like to point out that this estimated deficit will be incurred only if the expenditures listed or pages 524 and 523 are made, which we have no intention of doing unless there is a radical improvement in the prespects of our revenue. However, it is also true that in order to escape a deficit we shall be obliged to call upon the special appropriation listed on page 5 of our budget, from the Julius Rosenwald Fund, of \$15,000. for "Capital and Extraordinary" expenditures, for current expenses.

Evan here it is our hope that we will be able to reduce expenditures and increase revenue in several departments so as to show a better plature before the end of the year. The uncertainties of the present interpational situation, however, and, as aforesaid, the desire to be conservetive, have led us to use the greatest saution in forecasting revenue and expenditures in all departments of the institution. You may also be assured that we shall continue to rely upon the advice of your officers in the Scard of Regents in all matters affection expenditures, and in other matters.

On pages 52A and 52B you list certain items of office furniture and equipment needed at Fort Valley. If orders have not been placed for these things, we might be able to furnish some of them from an excess which we have here, left over from the earlier days of a much larger Fund staff. Specifically, we could send you two desks, three filing cabinets (four drawers each), two typewriter desks, an adding machine, and some small desk filing boxes. From your estimates this would save about \$450, which I am sure you can use in some other way.

Dear Mr. Bond: After going over your revised budget again, I notice that you have carried our appropriation for special purposes at \$15,000 instead of \$16,000. I also notice that your total salary as it appears in the budget is \$3,800 instead of the \$4,800 agreed on with the Regents.

As I understand it, your present plan is to have us pay directly to you this extra \$1,000 to make up your total salary of \$4,800 for the 1939-40 year. The difficulty from our point of view is that our two appropriations for Fort Valley have been voted by our Trustees to the Regents of the University System of Georgia, and payments on these grants must be made through their office. (We follow this same method in making payments on our grants to West Georgia and Statesboro.) This being the case, I should think it would be necessary for you to revise your budget to the Regents showing our special appropriation at \$16,000 and an extra \$1,000 to you, either under the heading of salary or entertainment.
