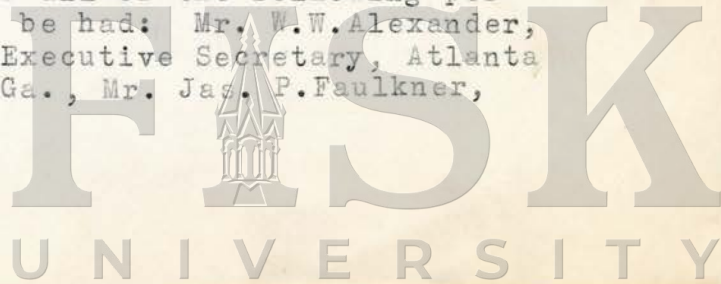
My dear Dr. Thomas:

I am writing you with reference to Dr. Thomas, present colored intern at the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium.

First; I should like to have his internship grant for six months or approximately that from March 21 to October 15-1934. Secondly; if possible, I should like to see Dr. Thomas receive a scholarship, through your organization, to some medical school that offers a logical graduate course in internal medicine, including a liberal amount of work in tuberculosis. Such a course seems to be offered by the University of Pennsylvania. I have before me catalogue of 1933-1934 graduate school of medicine in Medical & Chirurgical College, and believe that on page twenty-eight graduate course in internal medicine would no doubt offer Dr. Thomas a splendid course and one of tremendous benefit to him.

Since Dr. Thomas has been with us I have been very much impressed with the character of the man; his ability to learn and the amount of knowledge of tuberculosis which he has already gained. In the first place, Dr. Thomas has a good education; is quite well informed in medicine, and I believe for him future work among his own race in Atlanta would prove to be of tremendous benefit. Dr. Thomas is a tireless worker; is quite socially minded and in many respects is in position to serve his people to a much more liberal extent than the average colored physician. Dr. Thomas comes from a very good family of colored people. His father was connected with the Atlanta Post Office for a period of thirty-five years. His brother is now in the Railway Postal Service.

Dear Dr. Bousfield;

Some time ago I told you that I had fairly reliable information that things were not going well at Alto, Georgia and that as soon as the present Rosenwald Fund commitment expires I should not be inclined to renew it until I had an opportunity of looking into the situation that now exists. A letter from our state secretary, Mr. Faulkner, copy of which is attached, confirms the rumors which had reached my ears. Please treat this as confidential.

I am under the impression that Dr. Rankin is not a very efficient administrator but in view of the fact that he was appointed by Governor Talmadge there is a chance that he will be replaced early next year when Governor-elect Rivers takes office. There is at least a possibility that Dr. Haygood may return to Alto at that time.

Please let me know when your present commitment to the Sanatorium expires so that I can go into this situation carefully on my next visit to Georgia.

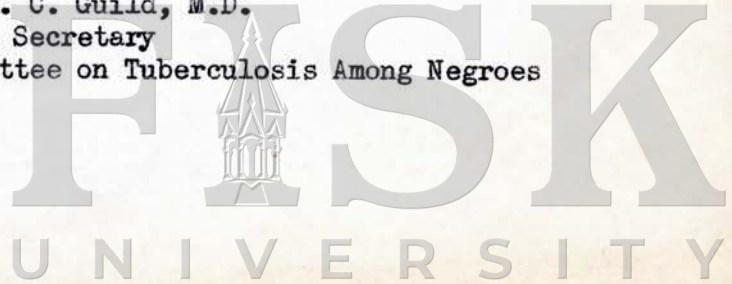
I am leaving Thursday for Nashville, Montgomery and North Carolina and expect to be back in the office not later than November 16th.

Dear Dr. Guild:

I have finally apparently cleared up matters with Dr. D. T. Rankin, Superintendent at Alto. I had a very pleasant visit with him a few days ago but did not take him to task for not having acknowledged any of my letters through the last several months and failing to cooperate in the selection of a colored intern after we had gone to the trouble of finding and pointing out to him probably the very best man in the state. It seems that he never communicated with this man but took another just as printers used to pick up any wanderer. The man he got I think was not a Georgian, had a serious case of tuberculosis himself and nearly wrecked the colored unit. It seems that he was exceedingly immoral and had no scruples in encouraging immorality among nurses and patients. He finally got rid of him and took another man that he says is doing quite well. I understand from him that he receives from the Rosenwald Fund \$500.00 per year to supplement the salary of this man and he hopes it will be continued. He says he is interested in getting some Negro that can stay with him and I told him it was my understanding that part of the purpose was to train men who could go back to their localities and help there to carry on the control program. He saw the wisdom of that and I believe will be willing to continue upon the original basis.

I wish if the plan is continued that it might be arranged so that our time in trying to secure proper personnel would not be absolutely wasted.

Dr. Rankin understood from me all along that we were only nominating the man and furnishing good recommendations for him and I think it ought to be impressed upon him that we should at least have the courtesy of a response to our offer and if that is not contemplated that we ought not to be called upon to interest ourselves at all.

I think it is a good scheme and, of course, you know we are anxious to help to see that it works all right.

The present man at the institution is Dr. J. A. Williams. He is receiving \$81.50 per month and his board and lodging. Dr. Rankin thinks he is a Georgian but he does not know just where he came from.

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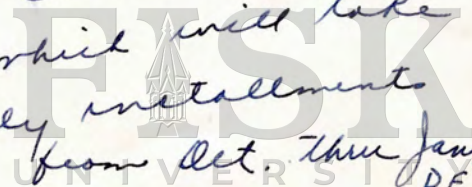

Dear Dr. Thomas: Thanks for your very interesting letter of January 8th. With reference to the NTA meeting in New Orleans, I have heard some very conflicting reports. One concerns the attendance of colored delegates.

Despite the Rice Hotel, the leading hotel in Houston, Texas, opening its meeting rooms to colored delegates, the Roosevelt Hotel of New Orleans has refused this privilege. For a short time there was some consideration given to changing the meeting place. This has not been done. I am, therefore, of the opinion that it would be useless to attempt to attend the sessions. As a sop to the colored people of New Orleans, a mass meeting is to be arranged at Dillard University. Unless you have information to the contrary, I think it would be useless to expect to gain anything from that meeting.

With reference to the Children's Bureau, I doubt that you could meet the qualifications for any of their specialized work, though I see no reason why you should not apply - unless it would be that the time for filing applications has passed. I do not know of any special work in tuberculosis which they are contemplating, and such other positions as may be anticipated have been in the highly specialized fields of pediatrics, obstetrics, and orthopedics. In nearly every instance, the qualifications have been so high as to exclude the majority of colored applicants who have not had the opportunity for specialized training in these fields.

I think you should not let my feeling that the State of Georgia will give scant attention to the desires of colored physicians to participate in their program, which results from the passage of the Social Security Bill, keep you from making application. There is no other recourse than through the state health officer. The brief conversation I had with Dr. Ambercrombie did not lead me to think that he would consider the matter very seriously. It might be an excellent reason for your attempting to make contact with him.

The reason my letters have been brief is because I have very little information to detail.

Dear Doctor Bousfield:

Your recent letter was received and the contents noted carefully. In regards to the Alto situation, I have since heard that a doctor went up there to take Dr. Davis's place but had to be put to bed on account of himself having the disease. It is only rumor so far as I am concerned. It is a fact that people with tuberculosis are often attracted to do that type of work. I remember that the doctors particularly asked me when I went to Alto if I had ever been a tuberculous patient. Fortunately, the only evidence I have is the positive skin test I got while working there.

I am not entirely discouraged over the present situation since I am hopeful that some progress has been made and will be made as a result of the training I received at Alto. The only thing is true that no opportunity has opened up in Georgia that would help care for the masses of these people who are in poor health ~~NOT~~ for the doctors to get experience while making a living. I mean particularly in this city.

To be sure we have done a good job at the Atlanta Tuberculosis Association with regards to one disease (tuberculosis) in the pneumo clinic 43 patients have received compression treatment. Five Negro physicians report regularly for this work and in the first ten months of 1935 held 51 pneumothorax clinics. We also do phrenics in our office or send the patients to Grady Hospital. I shall send you a copy of the yearly report if it is soon available.

Oh yes there are no white internes at Alto. There was a Jewish doctor working at the white hospital who received about \$150 per month. He is now working with the traveling x-ray clinic for the state of Alabama. Another white physician took his place and I suppose at about the same rate of pay. I mention these particularly because they were doing rather similar work as mine and with practically the same experience. There are two older white physicians working also but I do not know what compensation they receive.

With regards to the meeting of the National Tuberculosis Association which meets in New Orleans this year, I should certainly like to attend. I wish that we were all born rich or with enough money to go to essential meetings such as this but it is not always true. If there is any likelihood of any funds you control or could recommend, I should appreciate a per diem to New Orleans in the interest of the tuberculosis work we are carrying on in this city.

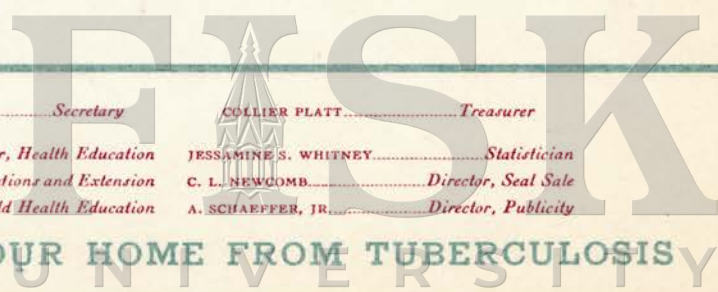

Following up our correspondence concerning an applicant for the colored internship at the state sanatorium, I am glad to announce that I am forwarding to Dr. Rankin recommendations for Dr. Edward A. Bryant, of 500 $\frac{1}{2}$ 9th Street, Columbus, Georgia.

Although I appealed to Savannah and Augusta no one has been suggested from either place. Dr. Rankin has seemed appreciative of our efforts to help him and I hope Dr. Bryant will prove satisfactory. He received his primary education at Eufaula, Alabama; his B. S. degree from Howard University, Washington, D. C. in 1927 and completed his medical course at Howard in 1932. In 1933 he had a year's internship at John A. Andrews Memorial Hospital, Tuskegee Inst.

It is Dr. Bryant's purpose, if he obtains the position to return to Columbus and engage in the practice there. Whether he will be acceptable at Alto, I presume, depends altogether on Dr. Rankin's appraisal of him.

With my letter to Dr. Rankin today my full duty seems to be done unless I am called upon for information or suggestions.

I am very glad to have been of some help in this matter and of course shall be pleased to continue my efforts in every way possible.

I shall be sending you in a few days the non-medical papers of the Southern Tuberculosis Conference held at Houston last fall. I am trying to properly edit them but it is a much more difficult job than I thought. Mr. Kranz has directed me to send the papers direct to you and he informs me that the matter of publication rests with you.

Dear Dr. Adams: For several years, the Rosenwald Fund has been contributing \$50.00 a month toward the maintenance of a Negro intern at the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Alto, Georgia. Unfortunately, I have never visited at Alto and cannot tell you much about the institution at first-hand.

A Dr. Davis who has spent one year there, with a large family, has been unable to spend a second year as was originally contemplated. He has recently resigned. Dr. M. A. Thomas of Atlanta, Georgia, 213 Ashby Street, Southwest, finished there last year and has been doing a most creditable piece of work in Atlanta. I have recently had a communication from Dr. D. T. Rankin, Acting Superintendent of the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium, asking if we were willing to pay toward the maintenance of a white intern for this colored department in case it is impossible to obtain a colored man for the place.

The purpose of this letter is to inquire whether you can make a suggestion as to a man to fill this position. As you probably know, there are now three such institutions in the South offering these residences, the other two being in the state institution of North Carolina and in Waverly Hills, Kentucky. I believe that with the increased interest in tuberculosis among Negroes in the South, which has been markedly changed in the last eighteen months, it would be a pity to lose this place in Georgia because of the value of Georgia in propoganda with reference to other institutions. It really means something when you say, "why the state institution in Georgia has a Negro intern!" The general inference is that if Georgia can do this, any place can.

Dear Dr. Rankin: Your letter of the 17th to Miss Elvidge has come to me. As you probably know, our interest in paying toward the up-keep of an intern in the colored department at Alto has been based on a desire to do two things, neither of which has precedence over the other:

1) To train a young Negro physician in the care of the tuberculous and thereby stimulate an interest among Negroes in tuberculosis.

2) To stimulate in existing agencies an increased interest in all phases of tuberculosis care among Negroes.

The use of a Negro intern at Alto is of real historic importance in an attack upon tuberculosis in the United States. It is one of the most important contributions which can be made at the present time.

I am sure that we have not exhausted all the possibilities for obtaining a satisfactory intern for you. I am hopeful of some favorable responses shortly. All this would indicate that it would be a keen disappointment if we were unable to fill this position with a Negro.

Let me write you again shortly when I hear from these inquiries which I have sent out.

Dear Doctor Bousfield: Your recent letter inquiring of the Alto vacancy was received. I have known of this vacancy through Dr. Rankin, the Superintendent and have already made efforts to fill it. I am enclosing you two sample letters which have greeted my requests. I shall sit down and write the medical school at Meharry perhaps for a May graduate.

I have already written or mentioned this matter to quite a number of doctors through the secretaries of local medical societies and so far have not had a favorable response.

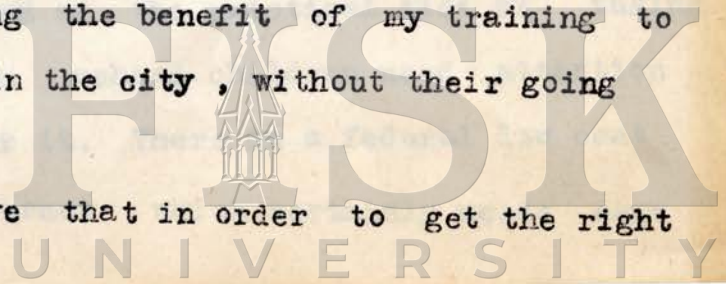
I can only fathom this lack of interest to these causes: (because certainly the doctors are not all making such huge fortunes out of their practice) To go over to Alto in my estimation is comparable to taking over a rural practice. If the doctor is making anything at all wherever he is, it represents a sacrifice to pull up and go away.

Personally speaking when I left Alto I had about enough to buy gas to Atlanta, and that is no exaggeration. My wife and I pioneered under conditions that other professional men, unless their health is affected, are not going to undertake. I do not blame them.

I do not regret my Alto experience. It was rich but I am and am giving the benefit of my training to six or seven doctors right here in the city, without their going away.

I believe that in order to get the right



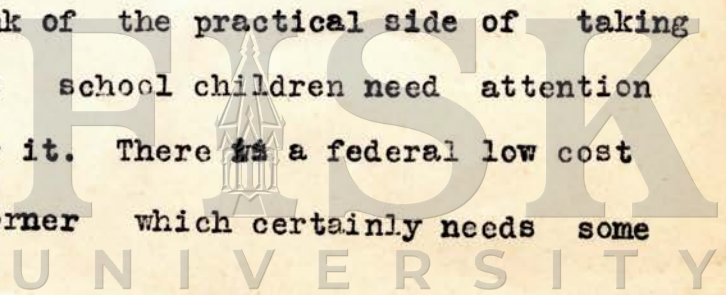
kind of men to take this place, that one man showing interest in the work by experience should be paid enough of a salary to hold him there as a regular physician. In my estimation this would take from \$150-\$200 per month. I think Dr. Davis would have remained on a regular basis of pay.

On the other hand if the doctors who go and stay there and complete the work satisfactorily, it is only reasonable to ask that some help be given them upon return to get set up into practice again. Either through the boards of health, or by the initiation of public health work through private organizations. I have been to Dr. Abercrombie several times about this matter, in interest of the social security bill provisions but have not the slightest encouragement as a result of my talk with him.

I have had an opportunity to work with the Atlanta ^{Tuberculosis} Medical Association as a member of the medical staff. I have organized a pneumothorax clinic which appears quite successful, as evidenced by attendance of patients. But my own office is scarce of patients. Just now I am attempting ~~get~~ to get permission from the city fathers to examine the senior students at Booker T. Washington High School, another charity job. The city only supplies one part time physician to examine 23,000 children. It is my hope that I can show them the value of such an examination including skin testing etc. and that they will ask W.P.A. for a stipend.

To be sure one cannot go in forever giving free service. Since the F.E.R.A. closed down in Nov. I have been up against it to make current expense. I trust you may consider my explanation from many angles but I think that I am the answer to the Alto riddle.

There is much to think of the practical side of taking up such an experience. Right here school children need attention but nobody is willing to pay for it. There is a federal low cost housing project right around the corner which certainly needs some



kind of medical supervision but so far I can only hear vague rumors in this matter. It was about this project that I wrote Dr. Guild some time ago.

"The Outlook for Compression Therapy in the Treatment of Tuberculosis Among Negroes, by Negro Physicians."

Within the last two or three years Compression therapy in the treatment of tuberculosis has been very much emphasized. To me this is the echo of a note sounded some nine years ago when I first heard of this mode of treatment.

In Chicago in 1925 while attending The National Medical Association meeting, it was my pleasure to listen to a member of my group, Dr. Euralee Allen of Wausau, Wis. who was practicing this mode of treatment in one of the County institutions for children. He gave a lecture on tuberculosis, mentioning briefly lung Compression by Artificial pneumothorax, without stopping to explain in detail. Excluding one or two references in current literature, eight years had elapsed before I came face to face to a practical demonstration of Compression therapy in the treatment of tuberculosis. It was while attending The "Johnnie Andrew Clinic" held at Tuskegee Institute, that I saw Dr. C. N. Pitts Jr. do an Artificial pneumothorax and Drs. Kennedy and Lee do a phrenicectomy at N.S.

Veteran's Hospital #91.

The incidence of tuberculosis in the Negroes of the United States as compared with its incidence in the White Race, and Negro's opportunities for hospitalization as compared with opportunities for those of the Whites present a sad paradox. Localities differ in their findings as to the ratio of the mortality of this disease in the two races. In Pennsylvania the incidence of mortality in respect to Negroes and Whites is 4 to 1 respectively. While in Tennessee it is claimed that the proportion is 6:1. From the figures of many and varied localities, one is safe in taking a ratio of 6:1 to 4:1 as fairly representative. On the other hand, there are from $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 beds for White People to 1 bed for Negro People, those who have it most and resist it less, have fewer chances for adequate treatment.

At Alto Georgia the average waiting period from time of diagnosis and that of entrance into the sanatorium is about six months. Compression treatment in select cases is being administered to ambulatory patients with report of fairly good results in one city. This method affords treatment to many while they await admission into sanatoria, in the face of so great a shortage of chances for hospitalization among Negroes, this method certainly warrants a thorough trial.

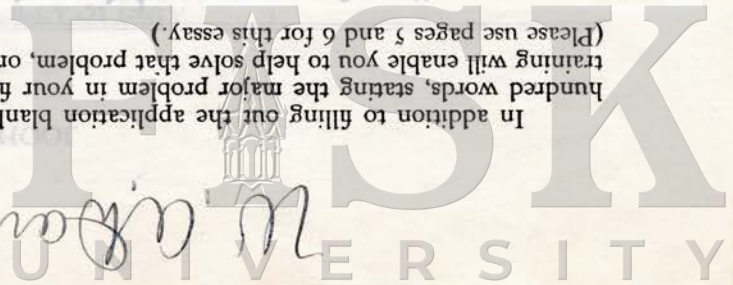
When, and if I become efficient in all phases of Compression therapy in the treatment of Tuberculosis, I hope to be able to help lower the mortality of this disease by efforts along the following lines: 1st To make efforts to have the people in my community become tuberculous conscious through education in this respect. 2nd As a result of this tuberculous consciousness to emphasize the necessity of introducing both preventive and diagnostic facilities in the schools and colleges. By means of the tuberculin skin Y

test many cases can be screened out and X-Ray examination made of the suspicious ones. 3rd With proper cooperation of the community, to set up health centers or clinics through which many of the non-school population could be reached. 4th By being especially prepared along a definite line, to so bring it about that efficient Negro Physicians will have a fair opportunity to practice their profession in public institutions.

"The Outlook for Compensatory Therapy in the Treatment of Tuberculosis among Negroes, by Negro Physicians"
Within the last two or three years compensation therapy in the treatment of tuberculosis has been very much emphasized. To me there is the echo of a note sounded some time years ago when I first heard of this mode of treatment. I have very grave doubts that very many are going to succeed and most likely Georgia will not be one of those states which will make much of a contribution.

It seems to me far more important in your case and with your start (and with the increased interest in tuberculosis among Negroes) for you to remain at Alto, become well grounded in your work, and locate at Macon. I am sure you will make no mistake in doing this.

I am enclosing copy of a program from the medical section of the Southern Tuberculosis Conference which was held in Houston in September. You will see from this outline that much attention was given to the Negro.

I should strongly urge you to stay where you are.

Dear Doctor:-

I am writing you for certain information concerning an announcement, which I am informed, you gave out at New Orleans during the August meeting of The National Medical Association. The announcement (and there was literature given out with some details of same) to which I refer had to do with the health phase of the program of the Social Security Act of the Federal Government.

Please inform me if the program provides for the probable establishment of training schools for physicians in order to make them especially fit to render certain medical services, such as specialist in the treatment syphilis, tuberculosis, etc.

For the last sixteen months I have been working and studying in the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium of Georgia. I assisted Dr M.A. Thomas about five months prior to his leaving as Staff Physician to the Negro Unit of the institution, and since Nov. of last year I have served as Staff Physician for this unit. These facts you may know already, since \$500.00 a year for the financing of said position was furnished by the Rosenwald Fund of which you are a committeeman.

My term expires at the end of this month and probably the first of December will find me in private practice again. If such training schools are established by the government, as mentioned above, I am, or will be, interested to the point that I should like to make application for position on the training staff in the department of tuberculosis.

If you know of anything definite along this line or in any other connection where I might have opportunity to activate myself in making use of my recent training in this particular speciality, I should be grateful for any information that you might furnish.

Dear Dr. Rankin: Thanks very much for your letter of October 8. I think under the circumstances that all of us at the Fund agree that your plan of attempting to place well-trained Negro physicians in strategic positions about the state of Georgia is a good one. I regret, however, that you find it impossible to assume the full salary of Dr. Davis, because we must inevitably feel that the final test in the acceptance of these men lies in their being placed on a firmly recognized basis in the institutions in which they are working.

The Julius Rosenwald Fund will make a commitment of five hundred dollars (\$500) on an annual basis for the twelve months beginning August 31, 1934, with the expectation that the load will thereafter be carried by the state of Georgia.

Dear Dr. Bousfield:

I am in receipt of your letter of October 1 concerning the renewal of your aid for a colored intern for the ensuing year.

In your communication you raise the question as to whether it would not be more advisable to have more men taking training at this Institution and turning them out without such thorough knowledge of the disease. The condition in this State may possibly be rather peculiar. We have quite a number of negro doctors in the State and they handle fairly a large proportion of the negro practice - practically none of them have more than a smattering knowledge of tuberculosis. We feel that for the present at least it would be best to send one man out thoroughly grounded in the diagnosis and treatment of tuberculosis rather than to send out several who had little more than a sketchy knowledge of the trouble that they have been treating.

Dr. Thomas, the intern who was here before went from here to Atlanta, and since going there has been doing excellent work not only in his private practice but also in the Atlanta Tuberculosis Association Clinic. The man we have here now is from Macon, which is almost in the center of the State, and we believe that if he could go back there thoroughly trained he would be able to do a great deal of good. Our idea would be, however, to eventually have men who absolutely know their business located in all of the larger cities in Georgia, and for this reason we believe it would be advantageous to keep the present intern for another year by which time he will be able to speak authoratively on the disease no matter where he goes.



Dear Dr. Rankin: Because of my absence from the city attending the meeting of the Southern Tuberculosis Conference in Houston, and upon return my almost immediate departure for another meeting, I have not answered your letter of September 17 regarding Dr. W. A. Davis, who is serving as resident physician at Alto. We are of course very much interested in keeping these colored physicians in the institutions until they are reasonably well-trained. But may I raise the question as to whether it is advisable to keep the same man instead of putting another man in. In other words, instead of attempting to make specialists of them, why not run through a greater number? I am sure that your judgment in such a matter is of far greater importance than mine; yet this matter was discussed at the Houston meeting, and I think the general impression was that it is better to train the larger number.

I should like to raise another question. As to the possibilities of your getting the Negro intern placed in your budget, this is important to us, as after all, we desire mostly to place men in positions where they may prove their value, and support them long enough to give them an opportunity to do so. We then like to move on and assist them under similar circumstances in other institutions. This, of course, does not mean that there is any lessening of interest and certainly it does not mean that we refuse to consider your request with reference to additional aid for Dr. Davis. Your having placed and kept a Negro intern in your institution has been one of the most valuable levers which we have had to increase the medical knowledge of Negro doctors in tuberculosis. We are therefore very grateful to you for your interest in this matter.

I hope that you have had a chance to see the program which was presented at Houston, in order that you may note how

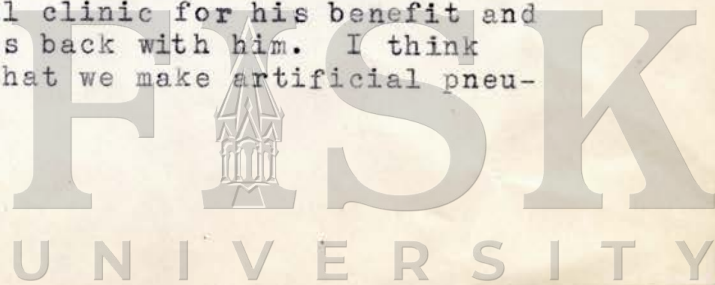
I have not as yet heard from you definitely with reference to the continuation of the colored intern project at our Institution. I am very hopeful that the Fund may see its way to continue this.

I am sure you will be interested to know that at the meeting of the Sanatorium Committee of the Board of Control, held at this Institution last Friday, authorization was given for building and equipping quarters for the accommodation of visiting colored clinicians at the Institution. It is our endeavor, as you probably know, to secure the cooperation of as many of the physicians in the State as possible in our extension program. This, among other things, consists of a state wide case finding service and the holding of clinics at the Institution regularly as we do and offer to the physicians full advantage of whatever these clinics may be worth to them.

About fifteen months ago we launched the latter phase of our campaign and at that time there were about ten or twelve men in the State qualified to administer pneumothorax. Now we have sixty. Our intention is not only to secure from the practicing profession at least five hundred doctors, white and colored, capable of administering this measure, but to stimulate their enthusiastic support in the modern diagnosis and treatment of tuberculosis. More than eighty six per cent of our adult type patients are receiving some kind of surgical treatment - mostly pneumothorax, although a liberal amount of phrenic nerve interruption is done.

Dr. Thomas has proved most valuable in stimulating the colored branch of the profession. Yesterday in our midst was one of the leading physicians, colored, from Atlanta visiting Dr. Thomas. We held a special clinic for his benefit and he carried a pneumothorax apparatus back with him. I think may be you are aware of the fact that we make artificial pneu-

mothorax apparatuses here at the Institution and are able to furnish them to the physicians for about one third of the regular market price. We did this because we felt that most of the physicans even though they had been slightly trained would not invest \$55.00 to \$80.00 in a apparatus when all he could see at first was a few charity patients.

Three delegations of physicians from Alabama have visited us during the past several months. I understand that a group is coming up from Florida in the near future. Of course, we are primarily interested in the physicians of the State. - we wish to offer every advantage possible to the colored who will be called upon no doubt to treat many cases of pulmonary tuberculosis among the members of their own race.

Whatever you can do to help us in the continuation of our colored internship will be very much appreciated.

My dear Dr. Davis:

I have been delayed somewhat in responding to your letter of January 16 re: Dr. M.A. Thomas while he was preparing all of his papers to be submitted to you. It is my desire that my letter accompany these papers.

You mention specific dates of the beginning of the period of training of Dr. Thomas. The funds for this purpose became available on March 1, 1931. However, Dr. Thomas was not secured until the 21 of March, therefore, his salary has been adjusted accordingly.

I certainly do trust that it will be possible for you to continue the internship for Dr. Thomas for another approximate six months, beginning March 21, next.

I have asked Dr. Thomas to write in addition to his essay on a subject of his own choice, setting forth some of the things which occur to him as an aggressive young colored physician in connection with the field of service for the negro physician in the South. Dr. Thomas has done this, and I think that some of the fact and figures which he has exhibited are quite logical and interesting.

As mentioned in my letter of January 9 to you, Dr. Thomas contemplates private practice in the city of Atlanta. While it is my personal judgment that Dr. Thomas would continue to make a splendid public health worker; however, I do not know of any field in all of medicine where first-class men are more in demand than among the colored. Not only would Dr. Thomas be able, as I see it, to make himself self supporting in private practice, but I think he would be of tremendous value to his race and to his fellow practitioners should he engage in this type of work. I know he is most cooperative with the various organizations looking to the betterment of



human conditions, both white and colored. I have been very much pleased with his attitude as pertains to inter-racial problems. It is altogether possible that the granting of a fellowship, such as requested by Dr. Thomas, to a man who would go immediately into private work, may not be in line with the ideas of the Rosenwald Fund. However, I think Dr. Thomas has been entirely frank in this matter, and while I should like to see him continue in a public position, but I can see no reason why a great field of service does not lie ahead of him should he be granted the fellowship and then engage in private practice. He will always be in position to respond to public demands upon his time and talent.

If there are any other questions in this regard which are in your own mind debatable and upon which I can offer some enlightenment I should be very glad to have you call upon me in this connection.

Dear Dr. Haygood: In acknowledging your letter of the 9th regarding Dr. Thomas, let me say in the first place, regarding the extension of his internship, that we probably will do this. I do not understand why the specific dates are named in your letter, as I thought the grant ran from the first of the month.

As to the fellowship for post-graduate study, I shall need more information. I should like to have Dr. Thomas fill out the enclosed application blank. Part of this information we have already on record, but it will be a convenience for us to have it in this form. I wish also to ask you this question: supposing Dr. Thomas had the fellowship, what position could he get thereafter, and where, and how promptly could he become self-supporting following the conclusion of the fellowship?

Remarks:

In response to your letter of April 18th re: Dr. M. A. Thomas, Colored Intern, Georgia State Tuberculosis Sanatorium, please be advised that the adventure of employment of a colored intern in the Sanatorium, has, I think, been rather successful, although not without its problems to be solved. These, however, I believe, have found their solution in the careful handling of the situation.

The question of housing of an intern, his attendance on staff conferences, his presence in the operating room during phrenic nerve operations on colored patients where white physicians and nurses were in charge were matters to be handled with extreme care. All of these, however, have been adjusted in such a manner as not to stimulate criticism, so far as I have heard. Then the question of having in our employ a colored intern, when a great many young, white, recent graduates were available, was a matter which, in the beginning, seemed to be capable of exciting considerable complaint, at least by certain types of politicians. I am glad to state that I have not heard of any such disapproval.

I feel rather certain, however, that the part the Julius Rosenwald Fund has played in making the project financially feasible has helped tremendously in this connection. Dr. Thomas has, to the best of my knowledge, exercised unusual diligence and caution in adjusting himself to the delicate situation. Moreover, by his sympathetic and rather efficient service the colored patients have found a rather warmplace in their affection for him. He is a good physician, careful, rather intelligent and so far as I have been able to determine, practices sound



morals. In the diagnosis and treatment of tuberculosis he has made quite satisfactory progress. He is now doing practically all of the pneumothorax operations on the patients in the colored unit, and there are about one third of the total adults of which are under pneumothorax treatment. Our Medical Director, Dr. F. C. Whelchel, and the other members of the medical staff seem to have confidence in his ability to learn and in his reliability to follow instructions. Therefore, I feel sure with an additional year of training Dr. Thomas will be quite beneficial and desirable.

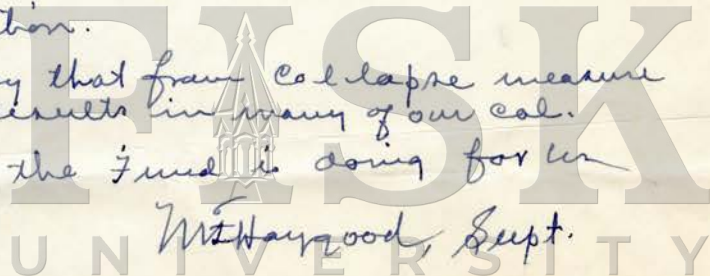

In reply to your letter of January 27th, let me say that Miss Mildred Manson and I have both gone over the questions you asked relative to Dr. M. A. Thomas.

For over a year Dr. Thomas has been a member of the Colored Branch of our Association and this has given us an opportunity to observe him. Even before that time he was one of the few colored doctors who touched our work by coming to us about cases. We agree that Dr. Thomas is intelligent and as far as medical training can be given at Mahara College in Nashville we feel sure that he is trained. He is also following up his studies in Atlanta.

He is one of two young colored physicians who have been interested in giving the Intradermal Test to children. He is working in a clinic for colored children and we believe is making this an opportunity for real study. Aside from this, this young man is social minded. That is a rather important factor in tuberculosis work. I would certainly say that I believe he is a hard worker and, as far as casual observation can determine, can say he has good judgement and is decidedly dependable.

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

My dear Dr. Frost:

It occurs to the writer, after reviewing carefully your letter of October 9, that your ideas are quite sound with reference to our project of placing in the Sanatorium a colored interne, later promoting him to a position of assistant resident, in the event he applies himself to the degree of diligence and intelligence which would warrant us in so doing.

It is altogether probable that your conception of the amount which he should receive is based on a more extensive experience than that possessed by the writer. We are very appreciative of any consideration, of course, which you might give us. I believe that if we find that we are unable to procure the type of person desired for the amount of the grant which you are willing to recommend, viz., \$300.00 per year during the first twelve month's period, \$500.00 per year for the second twelve month's period to be paid monthly, we can probably supplement that at least to a small extent.

As previously stated, we are very much indebted to you for your consideration of this project and trust that something will develop later that will help us in the problem of training this type of personnel for tuberculosis work, not only in Georgia, but probably in other states.

I am not quite sure I made myself clear in the brief discussion of the proposal to grant an interne stipend to Alto Georgia Tuberculosis Sanitarium under Dr. Haygood.

This is the type of thing the medical division could well adopt in a few well selected and strategic southern institutions. It may attract well qualified young Negro physicians to the South as well as encourage institutions to provide facilities and supervision, and in turn react to the benefit of the standard of medical service rendered to a community.

Dear Dr. Haygood: This will acknowledge receipt of your recent letter. I agree with you that there should probably be a small increase in salary for the second and third years respectively, dependent upon, of course, two factors, with due consideration of a third.

The first is of course satisfactory application, professional ability and interest. The second is a desire to continue in the field of tuberculosis, which implies both opportunity for further training and adequate supervision, as well as assumption of responsibility as skill and professional judgement are acquired.

The third, and of equal significance, is a recognition of the fact that oft times a young physician, after several years internship in a hospital, may become a little fearful of the rigors of starting a practice. He may avoid trying his wings, preferring to accept maintenance with a "conscious ^{or} easier of further training," when there is no longer the need, nor the facilities available in the institution. Because of this human tendency, not too often lacking in young physicians in these days of duress, it seems logical to arrange salary or remuneration scales so as to ~~place~~ ^{bring} a premium on individual or original effort rather than on the time basis. If a particularly apt and imaginative young clinician shows initiative and acumen, it is advantageous to both chief and institution to be able to offer an increased allowance. This, of course, implies succession, and such an individual is then no longer in the intern class. He might be graded as Assistant Resident. Such an arrangement offers an incentive, and when the young physician does inaugurate his practice he has more mature judgement and ability, and will no doubt render a better community service.

As you will note, I have not considered in the discussion an older experienced clinician because of the salary involved, and because in the first place the number who might qualify is very limited. Secondly, they are usually less flexible, with families dependent and the cost thereof correspondingly greater, and third, such a type would not fall within the scope of our interests.

For these reasons I think perhaps it might be wise to begin with an allowance of \$300 for an intern year to be increased to \$500 the second year - as Assistant Resident - upon recommendation of the clinic chief. Such a scale, if applied to Assistant Resident, I do not believe need influence the general salary scale.

With these factors in mind, and of course with your approval, I am prepared to recommend to the Executive Committee, a grant of \$300 for the first year and \$500 for the second year, payable in monthly installments. It is understood that after the intern qualifies

My dear Dr. Frost:

I am very much inclined to agree with the sentiments as expressed in your letter of September 26, in regard to the stipend to be granted to a negro interne at the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium.

I really have no definite idea as to what it will be necessary to pay such a helper; however, according to the experience I have had up to this time, it will be rather difficult to secure an individual who will fit logically into this work. I really think that possibly for the first year \$50.00 per month, maybe less, will be all that is necessary.

We are endeavoring to economize in every department but I think our salary scale should not be reduced to the point of disturbing the high morale of our staff and other employees. When the economic conditions of the country assume normal health it would probably not be easy to adjust salaries upward to meet the increased cost of living.

My idea is that it possibly would be necessary for us to secure \$50.00 and probably up to \$75.00 per month for a period of two years so that I can prove to those who are, or will be my immediate superiors in office that the project is worth while. I am sure that the money can be raised through the legislature to continue this work; moreover, it is my idea to place a complete colored unit in the field as soon as I can. If I should procure the right type of individual and train him here, I am quite certain that he would be most valuable in the field enterprise.

Dear Dr. Haygood: I have your letter of the seventeenth before me. If, as you suggest, the professional supervision provided by the staff of the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium will be on a par with that received in regular teaching institutions, it is not reasonable to think in terms of stipends paid interns in class A teaching hospitals? Many institutions of this type, as you know, pay no salaries at all.

I do think, however, that because of the lower economic level of the Negro group, some remuneration will no doubt serve to make available a better trained man by attracting men from the better schools. I am inclined to believe that for a graduate one might think in terms of either Twenty-five or Fifty dollars a month, plus complete maintenance. I doubt whether the slightly larger amount would be of sufficient stimulus for one of longer training.

I am of course thinking aloud on this and using as a norm the usual plan in the white hospital group. I have also in mind the fact that this should prove a valuable training ground for one interested in tuberculosis. If the individual merits it, there should probably be an increase providing the responsibility as well as ability increases with training. For what period of time do you think outside aid will be necessary?

Responding to your letter of September 15, beg to advise that we desire a recent graduate for the position of interne for the colored unit of the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium if possible.

I believe that compensation to the extent of approximately \$900.00 a year in addition to full maintenance would be necessary in order to obtain the right type of individual. I am of the opinion that professional supervision here is sufficient to attract a rather ambitious man to the position in question. I think that after we have experimented with this idea and that if the project is as acceptable as I believe it will prove to be it will be a permanent part of our program. As above mentioned, I believe that we should pay at least \$900.00, possibly \$1,000.00 per year for the type of person desired. The Sanatorium is not in position to make a contribution to the extent of more than full maintenance for this person.

Please feel assured that we will deeply appreciate any consideration, however, that you may see fit to give.

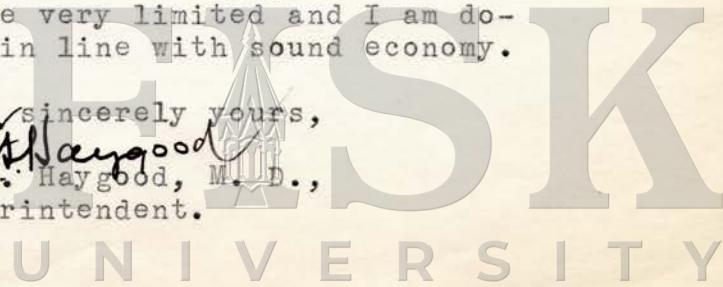
After the failure of our appropriation request to bring the desired results, I was somewhat embarrassed by reason of the fact that I had sent you a clipping from the paper. However, I did want you to know what type of publicity had been called for by the newspaper. The Atlanta Constitution, as you probably know, is a morning publication, having the largest circulation in the state, asked for the data included in the article and did everything possible to help us secure the \$70,300.00 requested. During the last hours of the Legislative Session, our appropriation request, along with many other items, were lost in the shuffle. However, I feel that we will be able to carry on a modified program in connection with the State Department of Public Health.

As you probably know the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium will not be under the administrative control of the State Board of Health after January 1. Said Board is to be abolished and a Health Department created. However, the present Health Officer holds office until January 1, 1932. This Institution is to be placed under the newly created Board of Control of eleemosynary institutions.

I am planning so far as I possibly can on putting in a complete mobile negro unit during the forthcoming biennium.

I am fearful that I will not be able to go to Montreal, although I should be very glad to be able to do so. Our funds are very limited and I am doing all I can to serve same in line with sound economy.
