CREDLE ASSOCIATE Dear Mr. Stern: You will find attached correspondence from Superintendent C. M. Hirst and Doctor Nolan M. Irby of Arkansas, relative to some aid in making a survey of three to five selected counties in Arkansas. You will notice that they plan surveys which will result in model county programs, and recommendations ultimately affecting every Negro child in the state. They are asking for \$100 a county, but Fred and I feel that with \$200 for clerical expenses, materials, etc., they should be able to cover at least four counties, the Fund's share of the expense not to exceed \$50 a county. The state men would get none of this aid as they have their salaries and traveling expenses paid by the General Education Board. Since these new men are exceptionally qualified for this task and are ambitious to do it, it seems to us to be a fine thing to give them the opportunity. If you and Mr. Embree approve, you could transfer this amount from the \$425,000 schoolhouse construction budget. The General Education Board assisted them in surveying the white schools of several counties last year, but it seems that they were unable to take up the program for the colored at that time. I think it is necessary to have such surveys before the colored schools can participate fully in the State Fund for schoolhouse consolidation. Dear Mr. Smith: I talked with Mr. Embree regarding the above. We are very much interested in seeing the counties under state supervision make these studies. It will be an exception for us to give funds for them. Recently Mr. Newbold appealed to us for an appropriation for an extensive state-wide study which is the outgrowth of a conference in North Carolina pertaining largely to teacher training institutions. Mr. Embree turned this appeal down on the basis that the General Education Board is in a better position to interest itself in this type of study than we are.

In approving the request from Arkansas, we will do so on the basis that it pertains to the school-house construction program directly and is therefore an extension of the work to which we are at present committed. It would be best though not to have it disclosed where these funds are coming from as otherwise it might embarrass us with other states.

We are not clear as to what fund you plan to charge this against in the present budget. Possibly it could be best construed in connection with the \$5,000. appropriation to fellowships. In fact, Mr. Embree suggested that for next year this heading be enlarged to "studies and fellowships". Before finally deciding on where this item will be charged, I wish you would secure a statement from the Arkansas people as to the total amount in which we will be involved on the basis of the figures which you think are adequate to cover expenses as mentioned in your letter.

Dear Mr. Irby: I have looked over your survey of
Little River County with such interest
and feel that you have done a valuable constructive piece
of work and on the basis of data collected showing existing conditions, have outlined a progressive progress which
will be most helpful to Superintendent Willia and the various district boards of the county in charting their future
school progress and procedures.

I have taken the liberty on page 6 to add a column after total enumerations showing the average per copits wealth for each child. This is for my own use but I believe you would find it helpful to the districts to reduce it to a per cepits basis so that they can make comparisons easily. It is interesting to note that the lowest wealth in a district for each child enumerated is \$577, and the highest, \$8,286, while the average for all districts in the county is \$855. This certainly shows great inequality in opportunity since the tax rate is almost uniform. It would require over thenty times more millage for this district with the lowest per capita wealth than for the one with the highest if every child is to have equal opportunity based on per pupil income or expenditure.

As I see it, this study, as well as the other two which you have reported to this office clearly descripted to the office clearly descripted to the county-wide progres in order to give every child of the county equal opportunity. While the inequalities for all children, both white and colored, are distressingly great, no doubt the expenditures of the colored children compared with that of the whites are even at greater variance. I think you are attacking the problem in the right way, trying to enlarge or consolidate the districts first in an effort more

nearly to equalize opportunities for all as the first step; then, as a second step the objective should be to reise the opportunities for the colored children in a given enlarged unit as nearly as possibly up to the level of that of the whites.

I feel that the results of your studies have clearly demonstrated the wisdom of our appropriation to assist in carrying them on.

I was particularly struck with your agegrade table #8 showing that almost three-fourths of the children
are over ege according to their own classifications. In the
first, second and third grades it is both distressing and encours ing to see the large number of over-age children ranging
from eight up to eighteen years of age. No doubt an educational
test would reduce the normal very much lover. As 50% of all
children in the county are enrolled in the first two grades and
88% in the first eight grades it would seem that much stress
should be placed on the early elementary grades with continued
effort through the sighth grade. This does not mean that there
should be any lat-up in efforts to maintain at least one good
high school. It is necessary in the training of teachers and
in furnishing a stimulus to the upper elementary grades to remain on through until they reach high school.

Dear Mr. Smith:

I am pleased that you took the time to go through the Little River County Survey as thoroughly as you did and accept your amendment to the table on Page 6. I shall attempt to add those figures in future surveys.

While we accept the ten year program as outlined by Mr. Mc Cuistion, it has seemed necessary to shift emphasis a bit. We have centered our efforts largely upon the elementary rural school needs. It may interest you to know that this year, the first year such an attempt has been made, we will have around eighty rated (standardized) negro elementary schools. We supplied the teachers with material showing what was necessary. The result was surprising. In most cases where the necessary changes were not prohibitive because of cost, the teacher saw to it that her school was rated, or has set up plans for securing rating next year.

This effort did not necessarily slow up our work with high schools this year. We will have more accredited schools this year than last. In order to protect the elementary school, we have used the same plan as is being used in white schools - no high school can be rated higher than its supporting elementary schools. This ruling effectively prevents the centering of all expenditures upon the high school.

Prof. R. C. Childress has been invaluable in this work. It was impossible for me to see all elementary schools and carry on other necessary work, so Brof. Childress has undertaken the brunt of the labor there.

The end of my first year finds me with definite plans carrying over into the future. One plan is to continue the survey work until all counties have a plan of consolidation. I have been unwilling to recommend buildings until a tentative survey of needs and future growth has been made. I am not certain that the surveys can be presented in mimeograph form for distribution. The State Department is having to retrench and our present clerical force is not sufficient to do the additional work. This, however, will not prevent a

UNIVERSIT

rough draft being prepared for the use of the county superintendent.

The average situation is deplorable. The causes are poor supervision, poor teaching, ill-adjusted courses of study, short terms, non-promotion without sufficient reason, and lack of physical equipment. Perhaps there are other reasons, but the above list gives a place for attack.

We are having no difficulty in securing consolidations. In fact we have reached the point where the setting up of larger units becomes a problem. We have very few negro principals well enough trained to assume such responsible positions. This situation has caused me to teach classes this summer at the A. M. & N. College, Pine Bluff, and at Philander Smith College, Little Rock. There are about eighty men and women - mostly men - taking the two courses which have for their purpose clarifying the duties of principals and setting up as nearly as possible rule of thumb procedure. I am glad to donate my time for this very necessary work.

We shall clear up our building inspections by June 20, and have reports reach you immediately afterwards. We have some buildings ready to start after new plans and blanks reach us.

I appreciate your letter of constructive criticism and interesting comment.



The meeting of the Juanes teachers was interesting and so were all of the other things that I saw, but the thing I enjoyed most was a chance to visit with you and to talk in a not too hurried fashion with you and others about matters of common interest.

teacher schools. I must confess that I was disappointed in the one near Fine Bluff, for, while the teacher was doubtless a stimulating personality and while the children were in a free and easy attitude of learning, the whole place was so unkempt and disorderly that I can but feel it is not a particularly good influence, at least in that aspect of living known as home making. On the other hand, I was completely pleased with everything that I saw in Spring Valley, even at the experience in the mud - since we got out of it. The hot luncheon is certainly an addition that must mean a good deal to the physical development and general welfare of the children and the whole atmosphere was so wholesome and eager that even without objective tests or a very long period of observation I am convinced that education of the first order is going on.

Just to prove that I was not speaking in the heat of the moment, I hereby record my offer to put up \$50 a year for each of three years to provide equipment in similar one-teacher schools conducted by "avarage teachers." As I have thought it over, I begin to believe that you may not have been as far off as I first thought in your claim that an average teacher can do the kind of job that is being done in the two schools I visited. I think the difference, however, is not so much in the equipment that is offered as in the stimulation and guidance which you and your associates give. This may be a very important point for us all to keep in mind. We might be able to improve greatly the average teaching if we could provide some stimulation, some supervision, and a feeling of being in an important adventure to more and more of the teachers.

I have also retained through the vicissitudes of ten days' travel after I left you my interest in the possibility of a journal aimed at southern rural schools, usable by both pupils and

teachers. This, of course, is a big project. No one would want to undertake it without a lot of thought and planning, but it still seems to me something well worth keeping in mind.
