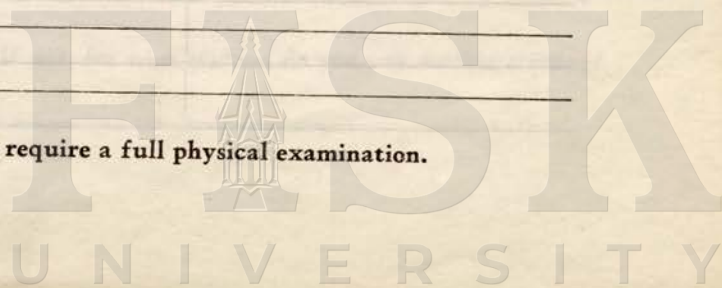

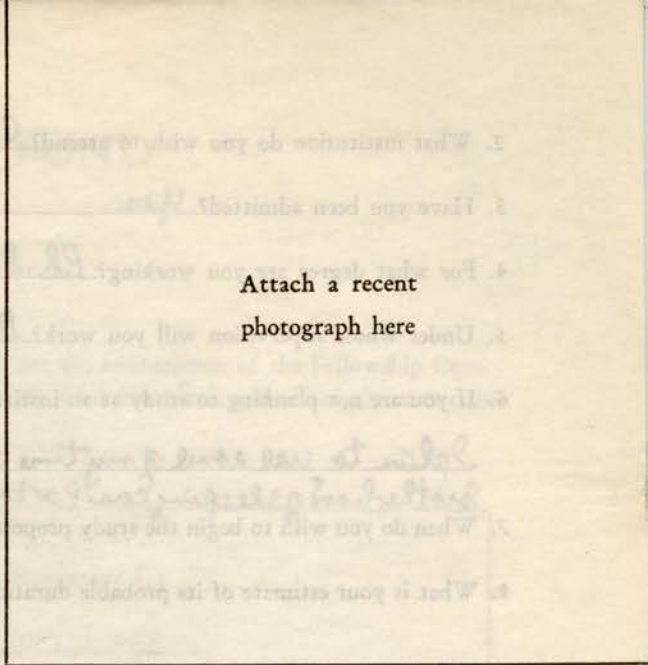

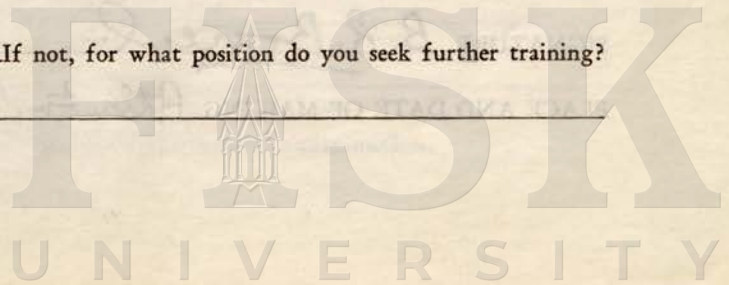

In 1933 I was selected by Dr. John Hope of Atlanta University to receive a grant of \$100.00 made by the Rosenwald Fund thru Mr. McQuiston. This enabled me to spend the summer at the Race Relations Institute at Swarthmore College of which Dr. Charles Johnson Plans for Work was co-director.
