If you can help, or advise, me in any way I shall be deeply appreciative. I can furnish excellent references as to scholarship and character from faculty members of the Medical College of Virginia.

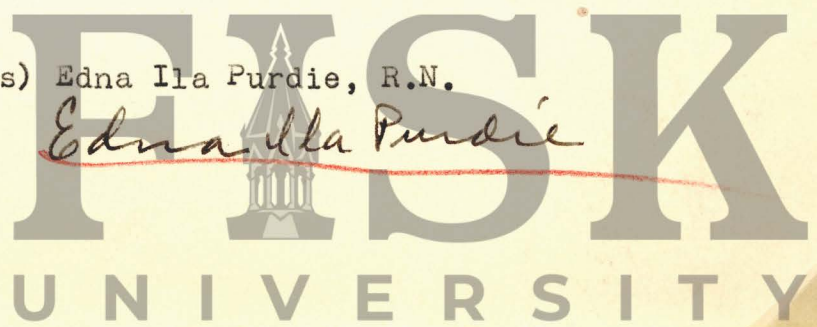
