

## "And Jesus told them many things in parables" (Matthew 13:3)

How do you answer questions of the heart? How do you describe things no one has seen? How do you speak truths too hard to hear? These questions challenged Jesus regularly as he sought to tell people about the nature of God, the Kingdom of Heaven, and the realities of life. And frequently, he would do this by telling stories, *parables* that invite the hearer to think on the deeper truths.

To describe what the "Kingdom of Heaven" is like, Jesus used examples familiar to his listeners in first century Palestine—farmers sowing seeds, weeds and wheat; a mustard seed, yeast, precious items, fishing nets, land owners and bridesmaids with candles. To illustrate what it means to love one's neighbor, he told the story of a Good Samaritan. To show the length that God goes to rescue even one person who has gone astray, he told stories of a lost sheep, a lost coin and a lost son.

These stories transcend time and place, and speak to people in greatly different places in life. The stories Jesus told still engage the heart and seep into the imagination. They still invite us into the mystery and revelation of God and the Kingdom of Heaven, if we have "ears to hear."

I offer the visual retelling of these stories as a meditation on the parables Jesus told. They are not intended to be definitive images of the stories; rather, my hope is that they will inspire you to think of how the parables of Jesus address the questions of our lives and times.
