HEAD COACH AUGIE GARRIDO

Eight seasons of intercollegiate baseball at Cal State Fullerton (1966-1972) failed to produce even one winning season. The Titans compiled an overall record of 145-267-2 in those eight seasons, winning just 35 percent of their games.

Enter one Augie Garrido--named head coach at CSUF in Sept. 1972.

Garrido's first Titan club in '73 finished with an undistinguished 19-33-1 mark. However, the tide had been turned.

In 1974 Cal State Fullerton compiled a 37-17 record, and won its first-ever conference championship in the California Collegiate Athletic Association. Garrido was named CCAA Coach-of-the-Year for his efforts (for the second time, as he was named CCAA Coach-of-the-Year in 1971 as head coach at Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo). The '74 club participated in the Far West NCAA Division II regionals, losing to eventual national champion UC-Irvine.

In the summer of 1974 Cal State Fullerton moved to Division I of the NCAA and switched conferences, joining the Pacific Coast Athletic Association.

The Titans responded by winning the PCAA title and moving into the Division I West Regionals. Garrido was again named conference Coach-of-the-Year.

Garrido, a native of Vallejo, Calif., received his B.A. from Fresno State University in 1961 following an all-star career with the Bulldog baseball squad. He joined the Cleveland Indian organization in 1961, where he remained until 1966 when he accepted a coaching position at Sierra Union High School in Tollhose, Calif. Garrido spent one year as head coach at San Francisco State (1969), then moved to Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo, where he compiled a record of 85-62.

His current overall collegiate coaching record reads 206-143-2; a winning percentage of 59 percent. Garrido is the head coach of the Anchorage, Alaska Glacier Pilots in the summer months.

ASSISTANT COACH DAVE SNOW

Dave Snow is in his third season as assistant baseball coach at Cal State Fullerton. Snow, 26, received his B.S. in physical education from Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo, where he played two seasons of baseball under Augie Garrido. He will complete work on his master's degree this summer at Cal State Fullerton.

Snow transferred to Cal Poly from Cerritos Junior College, where he captained the Falcon's 1970 California State JC championship team. At Cal Poly he was named 1st team All-CCAA as a third baseman his junior year, and captained the first-ever winning team in Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo's history (39-11) in 1971. The Mustangs were ranked third nationally that season (college division).

He was drafted out of high school by the Houston Astros, but suffered an injury his senior year in college to end his playing career.

Snow's main duties include working with the outfielders, recruiting and running a summer team for local collegiate players. He, his wife (Linda) and son (Casey) reside in Yorba Linda, Calif.

A product of Wally Kincaid's Cerritos Junior College program...won nine of 10 decisions last year at Cerritos...a second team All-Conference player. Played summer ball in Canada (1974). Graduate of Artesia High School...All-Conference player as a third baseman in high school. Hometown is Hawaiian Gardens, Calif. Born Dec. 13, 1953.

TONY FRANK BONURA, JR., Lefthanded Pitcher, 5-9, 165, 1V, Soph.

Varsity letterman as a freshman last season...won six of nine decisions, with a 2.83 ERA. Graduate of Bishop Amat High School...2nd team All-C.I.F...Most Valuable Player in the Angelus League...All-San Gabriel Valley 1st team...MVP and captain of team. Hometown is El Monte, Calif. Born Nov. 4, 1955.

DAN BOONE, Lefthanded Pitcher, 5-7, 138, JC Transfer, Jr.

Another Cal State Fullerton Falcon (which is to say Cerritos College product). 1974 California Junior College Player of the Year...1st team All-America...two-time All-State JC player...won 28 and lost 3 in two seasons at Cerritos JC. Graduated from Gahr High School...two-time Suburban League Most Valuable Player...2nd team All-C.I.F. Drafted by the California Angels in June 1973 and January 1974. Says Wally Kincaid of Boone, "He's the best lefthanded pitcher I've ever coached." Hometown is Norwalk, Calif. Born Jan. 14, 1954. 1st team ALL-PCAA in 1975.

MIKE CASAREZ, Shortstop, Righthanded, 5-6, 160, JC Transfer, Jr.

One of eight players from Cerritos Junior College (not including assistant coach Dave Snow and graduate assistant Don Sneddon)...won 2nd team All-State honors last season...batted .323 for Cerritos in '74...1st team All-League and All-Southern California. Graduated from Artesia High School...1st team All-League...team MVP. Hometown is Lakewood, Calif. Born Jan. 23, 1954.

DAVID (Dave) S. CHAVEZ, Leftfielder, Righthanded, 5-10, 170, JC Transfer, Jr.

Transfer from Chaffey Junior College...honorable mention All-Southern California...hit .356...6 home runs and 16 stolen bases last season at Chaffey. 1972 graduate of Fontana High School...won team's Most Improved award. Hometown is Fontana, Calif. Born March 12, 1954. 2nd team ALL-PCAA in 1975.

FRANK (Dr. J) ESTES, Rightfielder, Lefthanded, 6-0, 160, 1V, Sr.

Won first team All-Conference (CCAA) honors at Cal State Fullerton last season...hit .356 and drove in 38 runs...both figures led team. Transfer from Los Angeles City College in 1973...2nd team All-State...1st team All-Conference and All-Southern California...conference MVP in 1973. Graduated from Lutheran High School...won 1st team All-Conference honors. Hometown is Los Angeles. Born August 13, 1953. 1st team ALL-PCAA in 1975.

DANIEL (Dan) J. EVERTS, Righthanded Pitcher, 6-4, 200, 2V, Sr.

Leading winner on last season's Titan squad with a 9-4 record...ERA of 1.32...won All-CCAA honors in '74. Attended Rio Hondo Junior College one season. Graduated from California High School in 1971. Drafted by the Minnesota Twins in June 1971, and the California Angels in January 1972. Hometown is Whittier, Calif. Born Sept. 20, 1952.

GREGG ALAN FOSTER, Righthanded Pitcher, 6-0, 185, 2S, Fr.

Graduated last June (1974) from Marina High School where he won All-Orange County 1st team honors, after compiling a 0.33 ERA during the '74 season...named 1st team All-League...team MVP. Drafted by the Kansas City Royals in June 1974. Hometown is Huntington Beach, Calif. Born June 3, 1956.

STEVEN (Steve) K. HERZ, Catcher, Righthanded, 6-2, 200, HS, Fr.

1974 graduate of Lowell High School...won All-League 1st team honors two years...also varsity basketball and football player at Lowell. Hometown is Whittier, Calif. Born August 28, 1956.

GEORGE EDWARD HORTON, First baseman, Lefthanded, 5-10, 170, JC Transfer, Jr.

Captain of the 1973 Cerritos College championship baseball team...redshirt last season after transferring from the University of Hawaii. 1971 graduate of Downey High School where he won All-League honors as a catcher. Hometown is Downey, Calif. Born Oct. 5, 1953. 1st team ALL-PCAA in 1975.

JAMES (Jim) F. IRVINE, Third baseman, Righthanded, 5-9, 165, 1V, Jr.

Won All-CCAA and All-District 8 honors in 1974 at Cal State Fullerton after hitting .330...scored 35 runs in 49 games. Attended Buena High School...three-time All-League and team MVP...All-C.I.F. in 1971 and '72. Hometown is Ventura, Calif. Born Jan. 12, 1954.

GREGORY (Greg) S. JOHNSON, Righthanded Pitcher, 6-3, 185, 1V, Soph.

Won four of six decisions last year for Cal State Fullerton, compiling a 2.82 ERA...also saved one game. A '73 graduate of Miraleste High School...won All-C.I.F. honors in both baseball and basketball...team MVP in baseball and football. Played last summer (1974) in Anchorage, Alaska. Hometown is Miraleste, Calif. Born Jan. 5, 1955.

DENNIS MICHAEL (Mike) KEEGAN, Rightfielder, Lefthanded, 6-0, 190, JC Transfer, Jr.

Transfer from Sacramento Junior College...won 1st team All-State honors in 1973...All-League and All-Northern California. Graduate of Hiram Johnson High School...won All-City honors in '71. Hometown is Sacramento, Calif. Born Feb. 13, 1953.

DWIGHT CURTIS (Curt) LEWIS, Righthanded Pitcher, 6-2, 180, 1V, Soph.

Started only one game for CSUF last season and went the distance...1-0 record in '74 for the Titans...1.00 ERA. Graduated from Hueneme (wy-KNEE-me) High School...won All-League honors as a junior and senior as a first baseman. Hometown is Port Hueneme, Calif. Born Sept. 27, 1955.

TIMOTHY (Tim) JAMES MATZ, Righthanded Pitcher, 6-3, 180, 1V, Sr.

Posted a 2-3 record at Cal State Fullerton last season...4.91 ERA...two saves. Transfer from Cerritos Junior College...1st team All-Conference at Cerritos. Graduated from Artesia High School...team MVP. Hometown is Cerritos, Calif. Born Nov. 28, 1953.

JEFFREY (Jeff) L. NICHOLS, Centerfielder, Lefthanded, 5-9, 160, HS, Fr.

Hit .326 at Edison High School last season...winning All-Orange County honors...two-time 1st team All-League selection...team captain as a junior and senior. Hometown is Huntington Beach, Calif. Born Dec. 17, 1955.

JOSEPH ANDREW (Andy) PASILLAS, Catcher, Righthanded, 5-10, 170, JC Transfer, Jr.

Member of Cerritos Junior College's back-to-back state championship teams...won 1st team All-Conference, All-Southern California and All-State honors...hit .336 for the Flacons last season. 1972 graduate of Artesia High School. Hometown is Long Beach, Calif. Born Oct. 22, 1954. 1st team ALL-PCAA in 1975. PCAA MOST VALUABLE PLAYER.

DANIEL (Dan) L. PETERS, First Baseman, Righthanded, 6-0, 170, 1V, Sr.

A first team All-CCAA selection for the Titans last season...hit .328 in '74...fielding average of .986. Attended Long Beach City College where he won All-League and honorable mention All-Southern California honors in both baseball and basketball. Graduate of Millikan High School...All-League and 2nd team All-C.I.F. in baseball and basketball. Hometown is Long Beach, Calif. Born Sept. 15, 1952.

DAVID (Dave) JAMES ROBB, Second Baseman, Righthanded, 6-0, 180, 1V, Sr.

Hit .247 for the season last year at CSUF...fielded .985 playing 54 games...named Teammate of the Year by players following the '74 season. Transfer from San Mateo Junior College. Graduated from Aragon High School where he won All-League honors in 1970 as a shortstop. Hometown is San Mateo, Calif. Born May 12, 1953.

JOSEPH E. (Jody) ROBINSON, JR., Centerfielder, Righthanded, 5-7, 160, JC Transfer, Jr.

Transfer from San Diego Mesa Junior College...the team that finished second to Cerritos in the 1974 California State championships. Won All-League honors...team captain. Graduated from Morse High School where he won All-League honors in baseball...All-League and All-C.I.F. in gymnastics. Hometown is San Diego, Calif. Born Sept. 2, 1954. 1st team ALL-PCAA in 1975.

STERLING (Stu) SMITH, Centerfielder, Lefthanded, 5-9, 160, 1V, Sr.

Another Cerritos Junior College transfer, where he won All-Conference 1st team honors in 1973. Hit .294 in winning 1st team All-CCAA honors last season for the Titans. Graduate of Mayfair High School. Hometown is Cerritos, Calif. Born Oct. 25, 1953. 1st team ALL-PCAA in 1975.

EDWARD LEE (Lee) WILLIAMS, Catcher, Righthanded, 5-10, 180, Transfer, Sr.

A transfer from Los Angeles State. Redshit last season. Attended Cerritos Junior College...won MVP honors in the Hancock Invitational Tournament in 1972. Graduate of Dominguez High School...team captain. Hometown is Bellflower, Calif. Born Oct. 6, 1952.

JAMES (Jim) M. McDONALD, Catcher, Righthanded, 6-0, 195, 1V, Soph.

Came to bat only nine times last season, hitting .222. A 1st team All-C.I.F. catcher at Hueneme High School in 1972...won 3rd team All-C.I.F. honors in 1971...two-time all-league selection. Won All-League honors as a football fullback. Played two years of varsity football at Cal State Fullerton (1973 and '74). Hometown is Port Hueneme, Calif. Born June 16, 1955.

GRADUATE ASSISTANT COACHES

DON EARL SNEDDON (Uniform number 1)

A two-year starter at shortstop at Cal State Fullerton...winning 2nd team All-CCAA honors in 1973 and 1st team honors in 1974...the Titans first All-America...winning the honor in '74 (2nd team)...won All-District 8 honors last season after hitting .367, with 43 stolen bases. Another of the Cerritos Junior College products. Attended Dominguez High School in Compton, Calif. Hometown is Bellflower, Calif. Born April 6, 1952.

MIKE (Toad) WILSON (Uniform number 30)

Came to Cal State Fullerton four years ago out of Troy High School in Fullerton, Calif. Since, has become responsible for all Cal State Fullerton baseball facilities and equipment.

BASEBALL, vs. COLLEGE WORLD SERIES

Cal State Fullerton is in Omaha, Nebraska this week for a shot at collegiate baseball's big time--the 29th annual College World Series, June 6-13 at Rosenblatt Stadium.

The eight-team, double elimination tournament will produce the 1975 NCAA champion. However, the team that eventually emerges as the '75 champ will have had to overcome some imposing obstacles--namely, the other seven teams in the field.

Included in the tournament are three-time champion Arizona State (winners in 1965, 1967 and 1969), the Titans' first-round opponent, who has compiled an overall record of 58-11 in winning the Western Athletic Conference and Rocky Mountain District titles. Cal State Fullerton and the Sun Devils split four regular season games (CSUF winning 7-6 in Tempe, and 10-8 in Fullerton, while losing 7-2 and 4-3, both in Tempe). The Titans are currently 36-14-1 on the season.

CSUF and ASU will square off in the College World Series opener, June 6 at 5 p.m. (Central Time, 3 p.m. Pacific).

Also included in the tourney are number one ranked Florida State (49-8), winner of the Southern District title and 1970 runner-up at the CWS.

Number two ranked South Carolina (47-4-1) won the Atlantic District crown. Texas (52-5) won the Southwest Conference and South Central District titles. The Longhorns won the CWS in 1949 and 1950 and are making their 18th appearance in the tournament--and their fourth in-a-row.

The University of Oklahoma (50-8) is the Big-8 and Midwest champions, and is also making their fourth consecutive appearance in the College World Series. The Sooners won the 1951 title.

Seton Hall University (31-8) of South Orange, New Jersey is the Northeast District representative, and is making its second straight trip to Omaha.

Eastern Michigan (36-18) won the Mid-America Conference and Mideast District titles. The Hurons, like the Titans, are making their first appearance in the College World Series. However, Eastern Michigan won the NAIA national championship in 1970.

As tough as the field is, the Titans' road to the Series was good training.

On May 16th CSUF lost their final conference game of the season, 4-3, to San Diego State, leaving the door open for the University of the Pacific to tie the Titans for the Pacific Coast Athletic Association title. However, the Tigers dropped the final game of a doubleheader to Fresno State, giving Cal State Fullerton its first PCAA baseball title in its first year as a member of the conference (with a 14-7 record), and qualified the Titans for post-season play their first season as a member of the NCAA's Division I.

Next up for CSUF was the NCAA West Regional hosted by the University of Southern California (the five-time defending NCAA baseball champions) at Dedaux Field. The Titans' first-round opponent, of course, was USC.

CSUF pitcher Dan Boone, a solid All-America candidate, shot down the Trojans, 3-1

on just seven hits, striking out seven and walking just one. Following the game Boone said, "It's the greatest feeling I've ever had after a game. All I've ever wanted to do is beat the Trojans."

Boone was a member of the two-time state junior college champion Cerritos College team, and was named California Junior College Player of the Year in 1974.

The Titans next faced Pepperdine University, getting what head coach Augie Garrido call, "Greg Johnson's best pitching performance as a Titan," beating the Waves 2-1. Johnson had Pepperdine batters grounding out 20 times.

CSUF, with a 2-0 record in District 8 play, then lost a 5-4 decision to Pepperdine. In the tournament's championship game, and the scored tied 3-3 in the top of the third inning, Garrido brought in the lefthanded Boone. Boone, with only one day of rest pitched 6 1/3 innings, striking out three and walking none. He never faced more than four batters in an inning in gaining his 12th win in 14 decisions, as the Titans won, 6-4.

"Coach Garrido asked me if I could come in early," Boone said, "and I told him I could pitch forever."

Following the regular season five Titans were named to the All-PCAA first team, led by conference Most Valuable Player, catcher Andy Pasillas. Pitcher Boone, first baseman George Horton, and outfielders Frank Estes and Jody Robinson were also named to the first team. Outfielders Dave Chavez and Stu Smith were named to the All-PCAA second team. Augie Garrido was named PCAA Coach of the Year. No PCAA team has ever represented District 8 at the College World Series prior to this season.

Seven CSUF school records have been broken or tied this season. Dan Boone's 12 wins and 12 complete games are records, as is his winning percentage of .857. Relief pitcher Curt Lewis' three saves has tied the school mark, as has Stu Smith's 34 walks, and Jim Irvine's 11 doubles. Andy Pasillas has been hit by pitches seven times, also a school mark.

This is the second consecutive season Cal State Fullerton has been involved in post-season play. Last year (1974) the Titans qualified for the NCAA Division II Far West Regionals at Tacoma, Wash., losing to eventual college division champ UC-Irvine, 4-2, and Sacramento State, 4-3. Thus, the Titans are 3-3 overall in post-season play.

In the eight seasons prior to Garrido taking over the Titans' baseball reins, CSUF compiled a record of 145-267-2. In the past three seasons (under Garrido) Cal State Fullerton is 92-64-2 (19-33-1 in 1973; 37-17 in 1974; and currently 36-14-1).

Should Cal State Fullerton win the match with Arizona State (June 6), they will face the winner of the Texas-Oklahoma game Sunday (June 8) at 5 p.m. (3 p.m. Pacific time). If the Titans lose, they will face the loser of the Texas-Oklahoma game at 1 p.m. Saturday (June 7). The loser of that game would return home.

DAN BOONE, CSUF ALL-AMERICA CANDIDATE

Cal State Fullerton pitcher Dan Boone could be considered a throwback to the legendary American frontiersman, Daniel Boone.

As a marksman Boone was said to be able to fire his rifle at a nail 100 paces away and hit the nail squarely on the head.

Pitcher Boone, with an assortment of curves, sliders, screwballs and an occasional fastball, consistently fires his pitches at the black edging of the plate with frontiersman Boone's accuracy.

The 5-7, 138-pound junior from Norwalk, Calif., who has compiled a 12-2 record this season for the District 8 champion Titans (winning his last 10 in-a-row), has walked only 25 batters in 135 2/3 innings of work--an average of 1.7 walks every nine innings. The diminutive lefthander has struck out 7.3 batters every nine innings (110 total strikeouts).

Not bad for a player who has been told since he was eight years old that he was "too small."

Last week the "too small" Boone, who won 27 of 29 decisions at Cerritos Junior College on consecutive State JC championship teams, was named to the District 8 University Division All-District team. He is the Titans' candidate for All-America honors.

"I was always told I was too small to pitch," Boone says. "So every time I pitch I feel I have something to prove. I started pitching in Little League 13 years ago, and started working on my curve then.

"I was told it wasn't a good idea to throw a curve at that age, but no one stopped me. I felt I needed another pitch besides my 'fast ball' to win, so I watched the major leaguers on TV and picked up tips on how to throw it."

Boone describes his curve now as "my winning pitch."

"I throw a changeup, but I haven't been as effective with it as I have in the past. Maybe I'm not setting the batters up enough for it. I have a sneaky fastball, and throw a slider to lefthanders.

"Although I don't throw anything like him, Sandy Koufax was my idol when I was younger. I try to copy Jim Brewer's and Mike Marshall's changeups. I have to keep batters off balance to be successful."

Boone, 21, is a product of Gahr High School in Cerritos, Calif. He won All-CIF (California Interscholastic Federation) honors as a senior, and was two-time Suburban League Most Valuable Player.

Following his graduation from Gahr in 1973, Boone enrolled at Cerritos Junior College under the tutelage of Falcon head coach Wally Kincaid; junior college baseball's most successful mentor.

"I learned how to pitch at Cerritos," Boone says. "Coach Kincaid taught me a lot about the mental aspects of baseball. Trying to out-guess the batter and throw the right pitches at the right times."

Boone and Cerritos enjoyed much mutual success in 1973 and '74. Boone was a 1st team All-Conference (South Coast) selection both seasons, and Cerritos won back-to-back state junior college championships.

Boone's 27-2 two-season total included seasons of 10-1 in '73 and 17-1 in 1974. His career earned run average at Cerritos was 1.29, and he recorded 11 shutouts.

Following the '74 season Boone was named to the All-State team (along with teammate Andy Pasillas), was a 1st team All-America, and capped the whole thing off with his selection as California State JC Player-of-the-Year.

He was drafted by the California Angels twice--in June of 1973 and January '73.

Boone choose Cal State Fullerton over such collegiate powers as USC, UCLA and the University of Arizona.

"Several scouts told me Coach Garrido was a good coach, and I already knew a lot of players on the team (CSUF has eight Cerritos transfers)," said Boone in explaining his choice of CSUF. "It also meant having the same catcher at Cal State Fullerton as I had at Cerritos (Andy Pasillas), and it was close to home."

So far this season Boone has been honored as a 1st team All-Pacific Coast Athletic Association selection, and a 1st team All-District 8 team member.

"I'm very pleased I decided to come to Cal State Fullerton. The success we've had thusfar, and the quality of the players have made this a very enjoyable season.

"We have a fine team. We hit well and have one of the best defensive teams I've ever benn around."

Boone's point is well taken. During the four-game NCAA West Regionals at De-deaux Field in Los Angeles, the Titans' fielding percentage was .994.

When asked to relate the high point of his career, Boone unhesitatingly states, "Beating USC (3-1) in the district championships. All I've ever wanted to do is beat the Trojans."

Beyond helping Cal State Fullerton win the College World Series, Boone says he would like to pitch professionally.

"I think I can do it. I really enjoy competition, and I have the desire necessary to being a professional ball player."

Boone's coaches--past and present--feel he can make it.

"He's the best lefthanded pitcher it's been my pleasure to coach," said Wally Kincaid. "He's tough."

"What he does best," says CSUF head coach Augie Garrido, "is win."

Summing up Daniel Boone II, CSUF assistant coach Dave Snow says, "The biggest thing about him is his heart. If he weighs 138 pounds, 130 of that is in the middle of his chest."

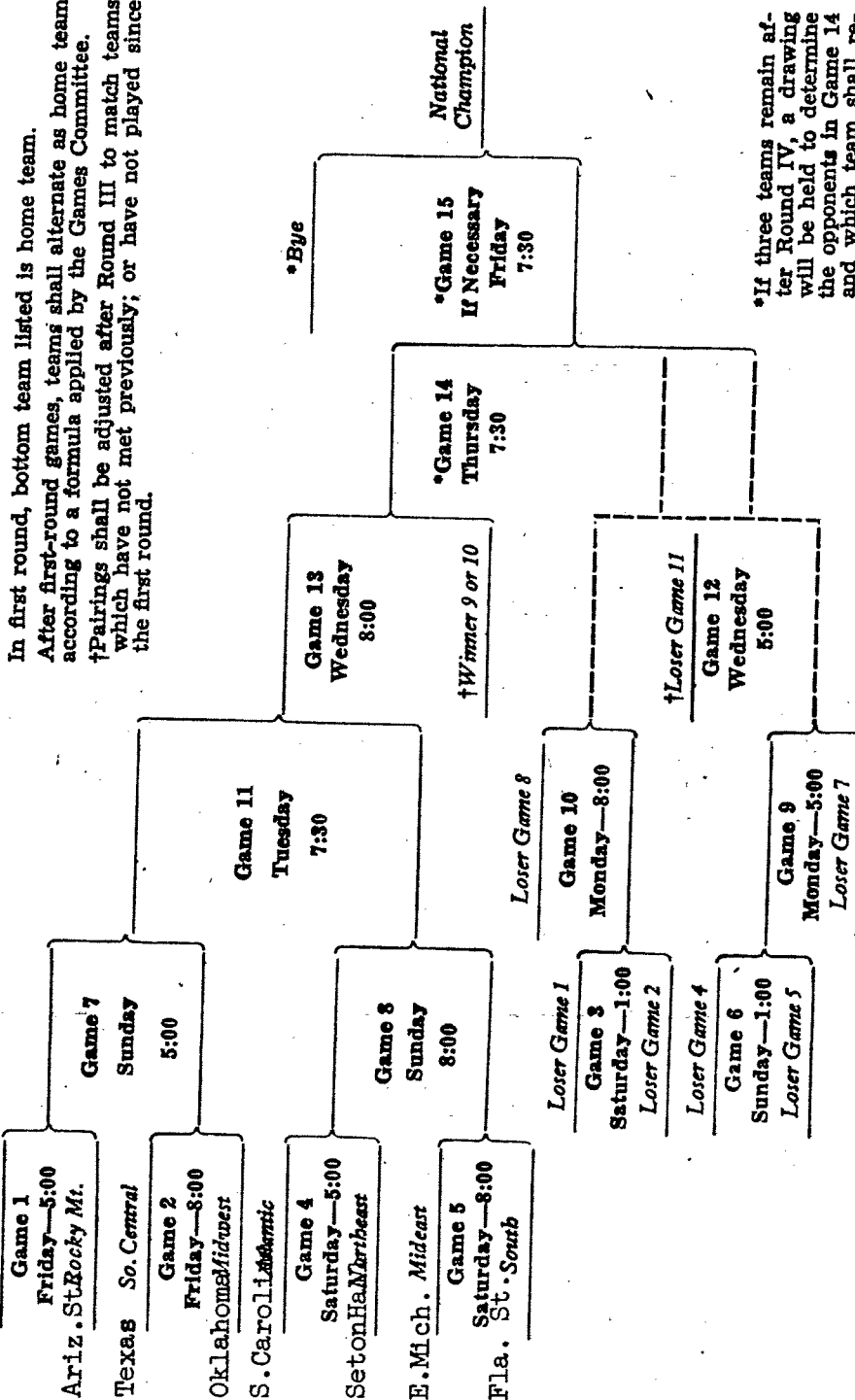
