OPENING TIP

- ▶ Evangel Men's Basketball plays host to the Southwestern College Moundbuilders on Wednesday (Jan. 8) evening, looking to end their three game losing skid at 7:30 p.m.
- ▶ Evangel fell on the road to McPherson, 88-80, after being outscored by 12 in the first half of Saturday's game.
- ▶ Josh Mason scored 25 points for the Valor in the loss, joined by Garrett Davault (16 pts.) and Bryce Ware (14 pts.) for double digit scoring.
- ▶ The Valor have leaned on junior Garrett Davault in the first half of the season, as the Norwood native averages a team high 15.1 points per game.
- ▶ Seniors Josh Mason and Manrique Alvarado round out double digit scoring averages for EU at 12.7 and 11.5 ppg, respectively.
- ▶ The Valor were outrebounded on Saturday, 39-19, the largest margin this season.
- ▶ Evangel will take on Southwestern in their second all-time matchup, as EU trails all-time, 0-1. The Valor fell on the road last season, 78-86, back in January.
- ▶ The Valor currently sit in 12th in the conference standings while Southwestern is in fifth.
- ▶ Evangel opponents currently shoot 47.1 percent against EU, the highest mark allowed in the KCAC.

OPENING TIP

- ▶ Evangel Women's Basketball hosts the Southwestern College Moundbuilders on Wednesday (Jan. 8) evening at 5:30 p.m., as the Valor look to continue their four game conference winning streak.
- ▶ Evangel took an 80-68 win over McPherson on Saturday, using a strong fourth quarter to overcome the Bulldogs. Ali Kamies led all scorers with 21 points, scoring 17 in the final quarter alone.
- ▶ Micah Clayton (19 pts.), Carson Dillard (16 pts.), and Emma Mullings (11 pts.) rounded out double digit scoring in Saturday's win.
- ▶ The Valor shot 50 percent on Saturday, their second best shooting percentage of the season.
- ▶ Carson Dillard leads the Valor offensively so far this season, averaging 11.5 points per game, while Ali Kamies (11.3), Kamie Jenkins (10.8), and Micah Clayton (10.6) round out double digit scoring averages.
- ▶ Evangel will take on Southwestern in their fourth all-time matchup, as the Valor leads all-time, 3-0. In their last matchup with Southwestern, the Valor were victorious on the road, 96-68. Carson Dillard scored 23 points to pace the Valor in their road win last season.
- ▶ Evangel is currently tied for sixth in the conference standings while Southwestern is tied for 12th.

BERT CAPEL

Head Coach Bert Capel enters his fourth season at the helm of the Valor Men's Basketball team in the 2024-25 season.

Capel has enjoyed success in his first three seasons, leading the team to a trio of national tournament appearances, the first time making it to the national tournament in three consecutive years since the six year postseason run from 2009-15.

Last season, Capel led the Valor to their farthest finish since the 2002 national championship season, helping push the Valor to an Elite Eight finish where they fell to the number-one overall seed, Grace, by a slim margin, after a cinderella run as a 15-seed.

A member of Evangel's 2002 NAIA National Championship team during his standout playing career, Capel became the eighth head coach in the 64-year history of the EU men's basketball program after being selected to replace Hall of Famer Steve Jenkins, who announced his retirement at the conclusion of the 2020-21 season after 39 years at the helm.

Capel brings a wealth of coaching experience from multiple levels to the Evangel staff, including a total of six seasons spanning two separate stints on Jenkins' bench. Prior to his return to EU in 2019, Capel spent nine seasons at the NCAA Division I level on the coaching staffs at Florida State and Stetson, in addition to one year as an assistant coach at the junior college level with Jacksonville College.

Over the last two seasons, Capel has played a pivotal role in elevating Evangel's on-court success, including helping EU post a 10-win turnaround in 2019-20, marking its best single-season win improvement in 14 years. Evangel also earned its first postseason berth in five years in 2020, before garnering votes in the NAIA's Top 25 poll for the first time since 2015 this past season.

Prior to returning to Springfield, Capel spent six seasons as a full-time Division I assistant at Stetson, where he helped lead

the Hatters to improved win totals in four of his first five seasons, as well as their first Atlantic Sun Conference Championship game appearance in 2016. He also helped coordinate Stetson's recruiting efforts, pre-and-postseason individual workouts and conditioning programs and managed the Hatters' summer camps.

Capel made the move to Stetson after serving as an assistant coach at Jacksonville (Texas) College for the 2012-13 season. Prior to joining the Jaguars staff, Capel was a graduate assistant (2009-11) and the recruiting assistant (2011-12) at Florida State for a total of three seasons. During his time at FSU, he was a part of the school's first ACC Tournament

championship and three-consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances, including a trip to the Sweet 16 in 2011.

Capel began his coaching career at Evangel in 2005, joining Jenkins' staff as an assistant. EU posted four-straight 20-win seasons, appeared regularly in the NAIA Top 25 poll and made two NAIA National Tournament trips, including a Sweet 16 appearance in 2008.

As a player for EU from 2000-04, Capel helped usher in perhaps the most successful periods in program history as part of a banner career that saw the Kentucky native earn All-Heart Conference honors. In all, he scored 1,060 points and grabbed 456 rebounds to help EU claim two regular-season Heart titles. Most notably, he was a member of Evangel's 2002 national championship team that finished 35-1 and was consistently the NAIA's top-ranked squad throughout the season.

A graduate of Heritage Academy in Florence, Ky., Capel was inducted into the Northern Kentucky Sports Hall of Fame in 2012 for his accomplishments in both basketball and baseball. He earned his Bachelor of Science from Evangel in 2005, a Master of Arts at Evangel in 2008, and a Master of Science from Florida State in 2011.

Capel and his wife, Stacy—a former Evangel volleyball student-athlete and a 2005 EU alumna—are the parents of two daughters, Myla and Kinzli, and one son, Dru.

JACKSON CAPEL

Jackson Capel, the younger brother of the Evangel head coach, returned to his alma mater where he was a three-time NAIA All-American and remains the program's all-time leading scorer (2,337). A four-time All-Heart of America Athletic Conference selection, he still holds several Evangel records, including most three-pointers in a game, single-season, and career.

After earning his degree from EU, he played professionally for nine seasons in Spain, Germany, and Switzerland. He was part of a championship team in the Spanish LEB Gold League during the 2016-17 season and was named to Eurobasket.com all-league teams in Germany and Switzerland.

Most recently, he served as an assistant coach at NCAA Division II member Palm Beach Atlantic University during an abbreviated 2020-21 season.

Before heading to PBA, Capel spent two seasons as an assistant at Indiana University-East, where the Red Wolves went 23-10 and 26-9 with back-to-back trips to the NAIA National Tournament.

Prior to his time at IU-East, he coached one season at Cincinnati Christian in the River States Conference.

Capel has also been inducted into the Evangel Hall of Fame (2020) and the Northern Kentucky Sports Hall of Fame (2019).

He graduated from Evangel in 2009 with a degree in business management and earned his master's degree from the University of the Cumberland in 2020.

Newly named Evangel men's basketball coach Bert Capel wasted little time in selecting the first member of his coaching staff, announcing the addition of Jackson Capel as assistant coach.

"I'm excited that Jackson will be joining our staff, working alongside me to continue the tradition of excellence here at Evangel," Bert Capel said. "He's already had a significant impact on this program as a player, and I look forward to having him share his passion for EU with our student-athletes."

JIM MIDDLETON

Head Coach Jim Middleton enters his second season leading the Valor Women's Basketball team in the 2024-25 school year.

Middleton put forth a big jump in just his first year at the helm, as the Valor went 16-10 in their first season under the Hall of Fame coach, qualifying for the conference tournament in his first season and nearly pulling off upsets of a pair of NCAA D-II teams.

The Missouri Sports Hall of Fame inductee returns to the basketball sidelines where he has experienced success for over 35 years. Middleton has enjoyed success in Southwest Missouri in women's basketball at the collegiate and high school levels starting at Missouri State under legendary head coach Cheryl Burnett that included a trip to the 1992 NCAA Final Four.

A native of southwest Missouri, Middleton was the head coach at Southwest Baptist University for 14 seasons where he was a two-time finalist for NCAA National Coach of the Year in 2001 and 2008 and named MIAA Coach of the Year in 2008. He guided the Lady Bearcats to six NCAA tournament appearances. He is still the all-time winningest coach in SBU women's basketball and holds the highest career winning percentage while impressively holding a 100 percent graduate rate during his 14 years at SBU.

Middleton returned to the high school ranks in 2009, leading the Nixa Lady Eagles to the Class 5 Missouri State Championship. That same season, Middleton was named the Class 5 Coach of the Year by the Missouri Basketball Coaches Association and the Missouri Sports Writers. His teams were ranked in the top 10 of the final Class 5 poll in four out of five seasons.

In 2013, Middleton served as an assistant coach for the Drury Lady Panthers, winning a regional championship and finishing with a 27-4 overall record. Middleton has also coached at West Plains High School and most recently coached girls track and girls' tennis at Nixa.

Coach Middleton and his wife Ronda reside in Nixa and have two sons, James and Jared.

JENNIFER EIDEMILLER

Jennifer Eidemiller joined the Evangel women's basketball staff during the summer of 2023 and brings a wealth of basketball knowledge to the sidelines for the Valor.

During her first season at Evangel, she coached a pair of all-conference athletes in the post with Kamie Jenkins and Micah Clayton. Jenkins was named KCAC Freshman of the Year after leading the Valor in scoring and rebounding.

Her collegiate coaching including serving as Assistant Director of Operations at Florida State. During her time

with the Seminoles women's basketball program, she also served as the camp director and booster coordinator for three seasons in Tallahassee.

Eidemiller worked under Coach Semrau and Coach Close at Florida State, helping to gain experience in how to manage a team, day-to-day collegiate operations, practice planning, breaking down film, and recruiting.

Eidemiller also has coached at the high school level for eight seasons and has worked in the AAU coaching circuit for four years. She has coached at a 5A high school in Knoxville, as well as one in Tri Cities, Tennessee.

In addition to her coaching,

she also served as a sports program and facility director for four years. Eidemiller has also taught for seven years in the classroom.

A graduate from Florida State, Eidemiller and her husband of 22 years, Chad, have a son, Ty, and a daughter, Kenley. In her spare time, Coach Eidemiller helps to lead worship at her church in Mount Vernon, Missouri.

The Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference, commonly called "The Kansas Conference," is a prominent intercollegiate athletics conference comprised of ten outstanding independent or private institutions of higher education in the state.

The origins of the KCAC are traced to February 15, 1890, when the Kansas Intercollegiate Athletic Association became the result of the first successful attempt at organization among Kansas colleges, "to promote and regulate amateur intercollegiate athletics."

At that time the association or conference included not only private universities and colleges but also Kansas Agriculture College (now KSU), Kansas University, and Washburn University. Football seems to have been the major sponsored sport, and Baker University won the championship for the first three or four years.

In about 1902 this early association became allied with the Kansas College Athletic Conference, a group which was the first to adopt a definite set of rules and regulations. It also promoted an annual track and field meet which has continued yearly since, except for World War years. Basketball has been sponsored since 1904. Football was revived in 1907. Tennis began as early as 1912. Golf was added in 1923. By this time the name of the conference had been altered to the Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference; it had grown to 17 college members and two allied members: Baker, Bethany, Bethel, College of Emporia, Fairmount (now WSU), Friends, Kansas Wesleyan, KSTC of Emporia (now ESU), KSTC of Hays (now FHSU), KSTC of Pittsburg (now PSU), McPherson, Ottawa, St. Benedict's (now Benedictine), St. Mary's, Sterling (formerly Cooper), Southwestern, and Washburn, and with St. John's and Kansas City University (Kansas) as allied members. Kansas University and Kansas Aggies had dropped out earlier to join other conferences. In 1923 the College of Emporia, KSTC of Emporia, KSTC of Hays, KSTC of Pittsburg, Wichita (formerly Fairmount), Southwestern, and Washburn withdrew to form the Central Conference.

The present legal entity comes from a reorganization of the conference when the predecessor Kansas Intercollegiate Athletic Conference formally disbanded on December 1, 1928, and a new conference was formed which again was called the Kansas College Athletic Conference. The members were Baker, Bethany, Kansas Wesleyan, McPherson, Ottawa, and St. Mary's colleges. At that time sportswriters quickly gave the KCAC league a nickname: the "Little Six," in contrast to the Big Six (which became Big Eight, now Big 12) which also was organized in 1928. St. Mary's College was discontinued in 1931. The College of Emporia returned to the fold in 1933, and Bethel was readmitted in 1939. Friends, a former member of the KIAC, was admitted in 1953. Sterling and Southwestern were approved for membership in 1958. In 1968 Tabor College and St. Mary of the Plains College were admitted to make twelve members in the conference, and the conference was organized into Southern and Northern divisions until 1970 -- when Baker, College of Emporia, and Ottawa withdrew to join two separate Missouri-based conferences. In the mid-1970s the formal name was changed again to Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference. In 1975 women's intercollegiate athletics were incorporated into programs of the KCAC. Ottawa was readmitted in 1981, bringing the conference membership to 10. In 1992 St. Mary of the Plains College in Dodge City left the conference and eventually closed. In 1999 Saint Mary College-Leavenworth joined to return the KCAC membership to 10 institutions. The conference increased to 12 institutions when it added Oklahoma Wesleyan University and York College to the lineup.

The KCAC is an affiliated conference of the National Association of intercollegiate Athletics with headquarters in Kansas City, Missouri. Today the KCAC sponsors conference intercollegiate athletics in football, volleyball, men's cross country, women's cross country, men's soccer, women's soccer, men's basketball, women's basketball, men's indoor track and field, women's indoor track and field, men's outdoor track and field, women's outdoor track and field, baseball, softball, men's golf, women's tennis, and men's tennis.
