OPENING TIP

- ► Evangel Women's Basketball opens the 2024-25 KCAC Conference Tournament Quarterfinals on Thursday (Feb. 27) evening at 7:00 p.m., taking on the #6 seeded Sterling College Warriors for the right to advance to the semifinals.
- ► Evangel took a 77-64 win at home against Sterling on Saturday, using a 19 point outing from Ali Kamies and a strong defensive fourth quarter to solidify the win and earn the three seed.
- ► Kamies leads the Valor offensively so far this season, averaging 13.8 points per game, while Carson Dillard is just below, averaging 13.1.

- ► Kamie Jenkins leads the Valor in rebounds per game, averaging 10.8 boards per game and leads the team with 29 blocked shots.
- ► Evangel will take on Sterling in their ninth all-time matchup, as Evangel leads all-time, 6-2. The Valor are 1-1 against the Warriors so far this season, falling on the road by a point and taking the win last weekend, 77-64.
- ► Kamies was named the Newcomer of the Year in the conference as well as a 1st team All-KCAC honoree. Dillard and Jenkins both earned honorable mention honors while Evin Montgomery was named to the KCAC All-Freshman team.
- ► The Valor currently hold the 11th longest winning streak in the NAIA with eight consecutive wins.

Head Coach Jim Middleton enters his second season leading the Valor Women's Basketball team in the 2024-25 school year.

Middleton put forth a big jump in just his first year at the helm, as the Valor went 16-10 in their first season under the Hall of Fame coach, qualifying for the conference tournament in his first season and nearly pulling off upsets of a pair of NCAA D-II teams.

The Missouri Sports Hall of Fame inductee returns to the basketball sidelines where he has experienced success for over 35 years. Middleton has enjoyed success in Southwest Missouri in women's basketball at the collegiate and high school levels starting at Missouri State under legendary head coach Cheryl Burnett that included a trip to the 1992 NCAA Final Four.

A native of southwest Missouri, Middleton was the head coach at Southwest Baptist University for 14 seasons where he was a two-time finalist for NCAA National Coach of the Year in 2001 and 2008 and named MIAA Coach of the Year in 2008. He guided the Lady Bearcats to six NCAA tournament appearances. He is

still the all-time winningest coach in SBU women's basketball and holds the highest career winning percentage while impressively holding a 100 percent graduate rate during his 14 years at SBU.

Middleton returned to the high school ranks in 2009, leading the Nixa Lady Eagles to the Class 5 Missouri State Championship. That same season, Middleton was named the Class 5 Coach of the Year by the Missouri Basketball Coaches Association and the Missouri Sports Writers. His teams were ranked in the top 10 of the final Class 5 poll in four out of five seasons.

In 2013, Middleton served as an assistant coach for the Drury Lady Panthers, winning a regional championship and finishing with a 27-4 overall record.Middleton has also coached at West Plains High School and most recently coached girls track and girls' tennis at Nixa.

Coach Middleton and his wife Ronda reside in Nixa and have two sons, James and Jared.





Jennifer Eidemiller joined the Evangel women's basketball staff during the summer of 2023 and brings a wealth of basketball knowledge to the sidelines for the Valor.

During her first season at Evangel, she coached a pair of all-conference athletes in the post with Kamie Jenkins and Micah Clayton. Jenkins was named KCAC Freshman of the Year after leading the Valor in scoring and rebounding.

Her collegiate coaching including serving as Assistant Director of Operations at Florida State. During her time

Eidemiller also has coached at the high school level for eight seasons and has worked in the AAU coaching circuit for four years. She has coached at a 5A high school in Knoxville, as well as one in Tri Cities, Tennessee

she also served as a sports program and facility director for four years. Eidemiller has also taought for seven years in the classroom

A graduate from Florida State, Eidemiller and her husband of 22 years, Chad, have a son, Ty, and a daughter, Kenley. In her spare time, Coach Eidemiller helps to lead worship at her church in Mount Vernon, Missouri.

The Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference, commonly called "The Kansas Conference," is a prominent intercollegiate athletics conference comprised of ten outstanding independent or private institutions of higher education in the state.

The origins of the KCAC are traced to February 15, 1890, when the Kansas Intercollegiate Athletic Association became the result of the first successful attempt at organization among Kansas colleges, "to promote and regulate amateur intercollegiate athletics." At that time the association or conference included not only private

universities and colleges but also Kansas Agriculture College (now KSU), Kansas University, and Washburn University. Football seems to have been the major sponsored sport, and Baker University won the championship for the first three or four years.

In about 1902 this early association became allied with the Kansas College Athletic Conference, a group which was the first to adopt a definite set of rules and regulations. It also promoted an annual track and field meet which has continued yearly since, except for World War years. Basketball has been sponsored since 1904. Football was revived in 1907. Tennis began as early as 1912. Golf was added in 1923. By this time the name of the conference had been altered to the Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference; it had grown to 17 college members and two allied members: Baker, Bethany, Bethel, College of Emporia, Fairmount (now WSU), Friends, Kansas Wesleyan, KSTC of Emporia (now ESU), KSTC of Hays (now FHSU), KSTC of Pittsburg (now PSU), McPherson, Ottawa, St.Benedict's (now Benedictine), St.Mary's, Sterling (formerly Cooper), Southwestern, and Washburn, and with St.John's and Kansas City University (Kansas) as allied members. Kansas University and Kansas Aggies had dropped out earlier to join other conferences. In 1923 the College of Emporia, KSTC of Emporia, KSTC of Pittsburg, Wichita (formerly Fairmount), Southwestern, and Washburn withdrew to form the Central Conference.

The present legal entity comes from a reorganization of the conference when the predecessor Kansas Intercollegiate Athletic Conference formally disbanded on December 1, 1928, and a new conference was formed which again was called the Kansas College Athletic Conference. The members were Baker, Bethany, Kansas Wesleyan, McPherson, Ottawa, and St.Mary's colleges. At that time sportswriters quickly gave the KCAC league a nickname: the "Little Six," in contrast to the Big Six (which became Big Eight, now Big 12) which also was organized in 1928. St.Mary's College was discontinued in 1931. The College of Emporia returned to the fold in 1933, and Bethel was readmitted in 1939. Friends, a former member of the KIAC, was admitted in 1953. Sterling and Southwestern were approved for membership in 1958. In 1968 Tabor College and St. Mary of the Plains College were admitted to make twelve members in the conference, and the conference was organized into Southern and Northern divisions until 1970 -- when Baker, College of Emporia, and Ottawa withdrew to join two separate Missouri-based conferences. In the mid-1970s the formal name was changed again to Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference. In 1975 women's intercollegiate athletics were incorporated into programs of the KCAC. Ottawa was readmitted in 1981, bringing the conference membership to 10. In 1992 St. Mary of the Plains College in Dodge City left the conference and eventually closed. In 1999 Saint Mary College-Leavenworth joined to return the KCAC membership to 10 institutions. The conference increased to 12 institutions when it added Oklahoma Wesleyan University and York College to the lineup.

The KCAC is an affiliated conference of the National Association of intercollegiate Athletics with headquarters in Kansas City, Missouri. Today the KCAC sponsors conference intercollegiate athletics in football, volleyball, men's cross country, women's cross country, men's soccer, women's soccer, men's basketball, women's basketball, men's indoor track and field, women's indoor track and field, women's outdoor track and field, baseball, softball, men's golf, women's tennis, and men's tennis.



Playing to Win

Valor Athletics made a splash during the first full year in the KCAC, with multiple teams qualifying for postseason conference tournaments! Valor Football, Men's Basketball, Softball, Cross Country, and Indoor and Outdoor Track & Field all qualified for NAIA National Tournament appearances, with Men's Basketball achieving a Cinderella-story run all the way to the Elite Eight, the team's furthest finish since the 2002 national championship season.

Competing for Christ

In the middle of a historic undefeated regular season, Valor Football saw 40 players and three staff members baptized in water after a fall practice. This event led to a renewed desire for baptism across EU's campus that resulted in a special chapel service and a total of 69 baptisms in the Valor community.

Top Honors

Valor Athletics received several major recognitions in the 2023-24 season, with four Conference Coach of the Year honors, including Chuck Hepola (football), Jay Halbrook (softball), Brandon Staley (track and field), and Joshua Saak (track and field).
