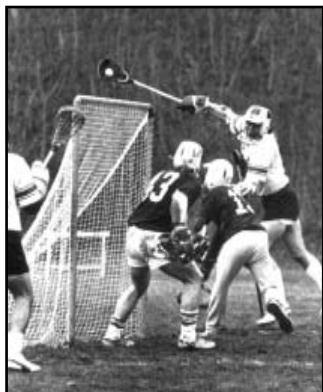


RETIRED JERSEYS

Richard #6 Graham



One of just two players in the history of the Roanoke College men's lacrosse players to earn First Team All-American honors three times, Graham completed his career with the Maroons with 212 points on 71 goals and a program record

141 assists. To this day, Graham still rates fourth on the all-time scoring list at Roanoke. Graham led the Maroons to the 1978 national championship, scoring two goals and adding five assists in the contest. He finished the 1978 national tournament with 20 points on seven goals and 13 assists. He earned First Team All-American honors in 1978, 1979, and 1980. He led the team in scoring in three of his four seasons in Salem and in assists in all four of his campaigns with the Maroons.

Paul #4 Goldsmith



A member of the Roanoke College Hall of Fame, Goldsmith is the seventh leading scorer in the history of the men's lacrosse program. He held the top overall spot from his graduation in 1983 until the 2003 season. In his career with the

Maroons, Goldsmith compiled 259 points on 119 goals and 139 assists. In 1982, Goldsmith was named the ODAC Player of the Year and a First Team All-American after leading the Maroons to a berth in the national semifinals. One year later, he did himself better in the honors column, earning National Attackman of the Year accolades after leading the squad to the national championship contest. Goldsmith remains one of the few players in team history to receive multiple First Team All-American honors.

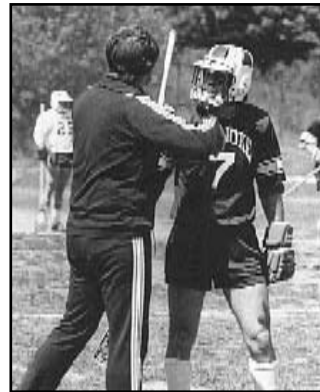
John #14 Pirro



Perhaps the best overall player in the history of the men's lacrosse team, Pirro was the first athlete in program history to be named a First Team All-American three

times. Also the first player to have his number retired, Pirro was a two-time winner of the nation's Most Outstanding Defenseman honors, receiving the award in both 1976 and 1977. After a brilliant playing career, Pirro returned to an active role in the program when he became the team's head coach in 1982. In just his second season, Pirro led the Maroons to the national championship game. In five years as the head coach, Pirro collected 48 wins and won five Old Dominion Athletic Conference championships. He was elected to the Long Island Hall of Fame in 1998.

Bob #7 Rotanz



Bob Rotanz is one of two players in the rich history of the Roanoke's men's lacrosse team to earn National Player of the Year honors. Several have earned an individual position award, but Rotanz's Player of the Year honor in

1978 remained the only such award in team until Keating's honor in 2006. Although his skill was best displayed on the defensive end of the field, Rotanz may be best remembered in Roanoke history as the player who scored the game-winning goal in the 1978 national championship contest. Rotanz, who is still a big supporter of the Maroon program, was a three-time All-American during his time in a Maroon uniform, was the 1978 Paul Griffin award winner and led the team in groundballs that season. Rotanz owns Mac & Bob's restaurant in Salem.

Bill #37 Pilat



Pilat has enjoyed tremendous success as both a player and a coach with the Maroons. The winner of the nation's Most Outstanding Goalie award in 1985, Pilat still holds the Roanoke College career saves record, having stopped 710 shots in his play-

ing career. As a sophomore, Pilat was a crucial piece to the team's advancement to the national championship game, a contest in which he made 27 saves. One of just three goalies in team history to lead the squad in saves for four consecutive seasons, Pilat was a three-time All-American and two-time ODAC Player of the Year. He holds the Roanoke record for career wins as head coach at Roanoke College.
