- Santa Clara will go for its first season sweep of San Francisco since the 2015-16 season.

Season Notes

- Santa Clara is averaging 70.0 ppg on the season on 43.3-percent shooting from the field and 36.1-percent from downtown. The Broncos have a plus-6.0 rebound differential, averaging 37.3 pg and are dishing out 15.2 apg. Their 81.9 free throw percentage is No. 2 in the country.
- Defensively, they are holding opponents to 58.2 ppg while forcing 15.3 tpg with 7.2 spg.
- Tess Heal is the leading scorer, averaging 18.2 ppg on 47.6-percent shooting from the field and is adding a team-high 4.5 apg. She is fifth in the country with 135 made free throws and 11th with 152 attempts while 19th at 88.8-percent from the charity stripe. Olivia Pollard is second with 15.3 ppg and has added 4.5 rpg while knocking down a team-high 77 3-pointers, fourth nationally, for a 46.7-percent mark from deep, fourth in the country. Marya Hudgins' 6.0 rpg lead the team and she is scoring 8.6 ppg while Keeley Frawley is second with 5.9 rpg.
- Heal became the fastest player in program history to score 1,000 points when she accomplished the feat against San Diego February 8 in just her 57th career game.
- Heal was named to the 2024 Becky Hammon Mid-Major Player of the Year Midseason Watch List.
- The Broncos' 12 nonconference wins are their most since the 1990-91 season when they went 28-3 and won both the WCC and the WNIT.
- Their 19 wins are the most since winning 23 in 2015-16.
- Santa Clara collected seven wins in November, the most in program history in that month.
- With the win over the Sun Devils and one over Oregon earlier this year, the Broncos now have two wins over Power 5 schools for the first time since 2015-16. That year they went 23-9 and made the WNIT.

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Season Notes

- The wins over Arizona State and Oregon also give Santa Clara two wins over Pac-12 opponents in the same season for the first time since 1993-94 (then the Pac-10) when they beat UCLA and Washington State.
- Santa Clara's 13-3 start is the program's best since the 1990-91 season when they finished 28-3 and won the WCC and WNIT titles.
- The Broncos had back-to-back 30+ point wins against CSUN (71-39) and at Oregon (89-50). It was the first time they had done that against two Division I opponents since January 30 and 31, 1998 against Portland (95-65) and Gonzaga (98-58). That season they finished 23-8 overall and 11-3 in the WCC. They won both the conference regular season and tournament championships that season and made the NCAA Tournament.
- The plus-71 point differential in two games was the most against DI opponents since the December 13 and 15 at Cal Poly (85-61, plus-24) and at Sacramento State (88-31, plus-57) when they were plus-81.
- By beating Texas A&M Corpus Christi 75-54 in their next game, the Broncos had a winning streak of three games against DI opponents with all victories coming by 20 or more points for the first time since December 2001. They beat Temple (86-66), Portland State (73-49), and CSUN (103-58).
- They have six wins of 30 or more points this year, the most in a season since 1997-98 when they had eight. The first five were in nonconference, the most-ever in nonconference play.
- Santa Clara set a program record with 113 points scored against Lincoln on December 1. The Broncos also tied their program record with 46 field goals made. They previously reached that number vs. Simpson in 2015. That was the previous record for points scored at 112 as well.
- The Broncos shot 65.5-percent from the floor against Pepperdine on January 18, setting a new program record.
- The 39-point win over the Ducks was the Broncos biggest ever over a Pac-12 opponent.
- Oregon had lost just one of its previous 61 nonconference games at Matthew Knight Arena in Eugene.
- Santa Clara's 16 3-pointers made at Oregon were the second-most in a game in program history. The program record is 18 at Portland on January 8, 2006.
- Tess Heal recorded her first career triple-double at Pepperdine on February 3 with 14 points, 10 rebounds, and 10 assists. It was the 27th triple-double in the nation this season and she was the 19th player to do it.
- Heal was named to the Thanksgiving Classic All-Tournament Team after averaging 16.5 ppg and 7.5 apg in two games.
- Heal has won WCC Player of the Week four times this season, including going back-to-back (November 20, 2023, January 2, 2024, January 8, 2024, February 12, 2024).
- Ashley Hiraki is currently No. 4 in program history with 185 steals. Lisa Sacco (1994-98) is third with 186. The program record is 266 by Melissa King (1990-93).
- Santa Clara was picked to finish tied for third in the WCC in a poll of the league's nine head coaches. It is their highest placement in the preseason poll since being picked third prior to the 2005-06 season.
- Heal was named to the Preseason All-WCC Team after her historic freshman campaign.
- She scored 562 points, the fourth-most in a single season in Santa Clara history and the most by a freshman. She also landed on the single top-10 lists in made free throws (4th, 141), made field goals (t-4th, 200), and minutes played (8th, 1,031).
- Bill Carr picked up his 300th win as a head coach at Oregon on November 18. He picked up his 100th victory leading the Broncos vs. Boise State on November 24.
