Stonehill is a competitive, coeducational Catholic college located just south of Boston. Established in 1948 by the Congregation of the Holy Cross (founders of the University of Notre Dame), Stonehill continues the rich Holy Cross tradition of a rigorous liberal education. As a comprehensive undergraduate college of 2,100 students, Stonehill offers 32 major programs in the liberal arts, natural sciences and business. The College's programs, through an involved and engaging faculty and a commitment to hands-on learning, aim to foster effective communication, critical-thinking and problem-solving skills in all students.

Stonehill provides its students with a powerful environment for learning where students are safe, known and valued. The College has a beautiful campus, an enviable location and state-of-the-art facilities. More than 85 percent of the students are campus residents, living in first-rate housing and take advantage of social and cultural activities offered on campus or in nearby Boston.

Stonehill seeks to mark out a place among the nation's quality institutions of higher education. It is the mission of the College to provide education of the highest caliber, grounded in the liberal arts, comprehensive in nature, nurtured by Catholic intellectual and moral ideals and committed to the creation of a just and compassionate world.

The Merkert Gymnasium is home to the men's and women's basketball teams as well as the volleyball squad, while Chieftain Stadium is the 2,000 seat natural grass home to football as well as men's and women's soccer and women's lacrosse. James "Lou" Gorman Field is home to the Stonehill baseball and field hockey teams, while Father Gartland Field is the home of Lady Chieftain softball. The campus tennis courts are newly re-furbished and have served as the home of the Northeast-10 Conference men's and women's championships, and the Ames Sports Complex is the home of recreational and intramural sports activities throughout the year.

**Rev. Mark T. Cregan, CSC
President**

Rev. Mark T. Cregan, C.S.C., 45, is the ninth president of Stonehill. A 1978 graduate of the College, he took office in 2000. Since becoming president, Father Cregan has worked diligently on several key fronts.

He has enhanced the College's already strong academic profile and has actively engaged the faculty in this initiative. He has also modernized the College's governance structure, making it more responsive and effective. In addition, he has built on Stonehill's many ties to the community by reaching out to the College's neighbors and friends with renewed vigor. Active in all areas of college life, Father Cregan also teaches a course on non-profit law and writes a regular column for the College's student newspaper, *The Summit*.

Before being appointed president of Stonehill, Father Cregan served as the pastor of Sacred Heart Parish, a large inner-city parish in the Bronx, N.Y. In that position, he was the chief administrative officer responsible for schools, buildings, outreach programs, pastoral activities, finances and fund-raising. He helped to turn the parish's annual deficit into a surplus and created a school advisory board to help with fund-raising, special projects and curriculum and established an endowment for future projects. In addition, Father Cregan provided leadership to the Archdiocese of New York's community development efforts, which produced over \$100 million in affordable subsidized housing. While administering Sacred Heart Parish, Father Cregan also maintained a general practice law office, serving low income clients with immigration, family, estate and real estate problems.

Father Cregan holds a master of divinity degree from the University of St. Michael's College at the Toronto School of Theology and is a former member of the Board of Trustees at the University of St. Michael's College.

Father Cregan holds a juris doctor degree from Brooklyn Law School. He is licensed to practice law before the United States Supreme Court, in the State of New York, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the District of Columbia, the United States District Courts for the District of Puerto Rico, the Southern and Eastern Districts of New York and the United States Court of Appeals, First Circuit. From 1990 until 1992, he served as Law Clerk to the Honorable Jose A. Fuste, United States District Judge, San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Born in Jersey City and raised in Newark, N.J., Father Cregan graduated from Seton Hall Preparatory School in West Orange, N.J. in 1975. He joined the Congregation of Holy Cross in 1975 and was ordained a Catholic priest in 1983. He is active in the administrative life of the Eastern Province of the Congregation of Holy Cross.

In his free time, Father Cregan enjoys reading, music, sports and travel. In addition to English, he speaks Spanish fluently and has reading knowledge of Portuguese, Italian, French and Latin.



**Paula J. Sullivan
Director of Athletics**

Through three decades of outstanding service to Stonehill College, Paula Sullivan has brought excellence in all capacities she has handled. As one of the winningest basketball coaches of all-time, she turned a fledgling program into a national power, and now as the College's Director of Athletics, Sullivan is putting her stamp on the

overall excellence that Stonehill enjoys on the local, regional and national levels.

A resident of Falmouth, Mass., Sullivan was appointed as Stonehill's Director of Athletics on April 16, 1996, taking over the duties full-time after serving as Interim Athletics Director for six months. She oversees a program that offers 20 varsity sports as well as some of the top athletic facilities in the Northeast, including James "Lou" Gorman Field, which is home to both the Stonehill baseball and field hockey teams, as well as Merkert Gymnasium, one of the toughest places for basketball opponents in the nation.

A 1971 graduate of Bridgewater State (Mass.) College, Sullivan served as the Head Women's Basketball Coach at Stonehill for 25 years from 1971 through 1996. Over that time span, the Lady Chieftains posted an overall record of 478-159 (.750) and captured six Northeast-10 Conference championships. Paula's squads recorded winning seasons during all of her campaigns at The Hill, and 10 of those teams earned berths in the NCAA Division II Tournament. Sullivan's most successful years came from 1993 through 1995, as Stonehill earned a spot in the NCAA Division II "Elite Eight" in each of those seasons, advancing to the national semi-finals in 1995.

A five-time selection as Northeast-10 Coach of the Year, Sullivan was honored in 1994 as the Converse/Women's Basketball Coaches Association Division II National Coach of the Year. During her career, she coached a pair of 2,000 point scorers as well as 14 1,000 point scorers, and two Lady Chieftains earned Division II All-America accolades. Paula retired in March 1996 as the winningest Division II women's basketball coach in New England history.

Sullivan has served on numerous NCAA and ECAC committees, most recently as the Northeast Regional chair of the NCAA Division II Women's Basketball Committee. She has also served on the ECAC Women's Basketball and Softball Committees and is in her third year as the Athletic Director's chair of the Northeast-10 Conference.

Paula was inducted into both the Bridgewater State and Stonehill Athletic Halls of Fame in 1989, as she was a charter member of Stonehill's Hall of Fame. She has also been a recipient of the Easton (Mass.) Chamber of Commerce Community Award and was also inducted into the New Agenda/Northeast Women's Hall of Fame. Paula was also the recipient of the 2001 Pathfinder Award from the Massachusetts Association of Physical Education, Health, Recreation and Dance for her contributions to women's athletics.

Head Coach Rich Beal



You could say that Rich Beal has certainly turned things around since his arrival as Head Football Coach at Stonehill College in December 1998, and that turn around has gone in one direction-upward. Beal has taken a program that was low in both numbers and victories upon his arrival and last year turned an important corner in leading the Chieftains to four overall victories (the highest Stonehill win total in five years), including three in North-

east-10 Conference play. Beal's crew has truly taken on the identity of its head coach-hard-working, no-nonsense and aggressive, and those characteristics will once again serve the Chieftains well during the 2002 campaign.

During his tenure at Stonehill, Beal has gained the respect of everyone he has come in contact with, including student-athletes, opponents and observers alike. He collected his first collegiate head coaching victory on October 5, 2000 in Stonehill's 13-0 triumph over UMass Lowell, and the respect of his colleagues, peers and the media was duly noted on October 11th of that year when he received a special Gold Helmet Award from the New England Football Writers in recognition of that achievement. Over the last three years, Beal has coached a total of six all-conference performers, including four last year alone that included first-team all-Northeast-10 kicker Joe Crowley, and in 2000 he coached a pair of all-New England team members in star running back Tyrone Jefferson and offensive line standout Chris Asbell. The all-conference accolades have been accompanied by record-setting performances on both sides of the ball, as eight of the top 10 single-game rushing totals have been set during Rich's tenure to go with two shutouts recorded by a defense that has seen two individuals set school records for tackles and interceptions.

Beal was named as Stonehill's fourth head varsity football coach in December 1998 after serving for four seasons as an assistant coach at Tufts University, where he earned the reputation as an innovator on offense. Serving as the Jumbos' offensive coordinator, Beal helped Tufts record seven victories during his final campaign at the Medford, Mass. school in 1998, a victory total that marked only the seventh time in the century that a Jumbo squad had reached that plateau in the NESCAC.

Prior to his tenure at Tufts, Beal served as Assistant Football Coach at his alma mater, Wesleyan University in Middletown, Conn. During that time, the Cardinals broke or tied 15 school offensive records and earned the highest ECAC ranking in school history. Rich also served as Assistant Football Coach at the Colorado School of Mines in Golden, Colo. for three seasons, as his offense was nationally ranked in Division II in rushing, total offense and scoring while setting or tying 36 school records. Beal has also served as freshman football coach at Columbia University and as a graduate assistant at UMass Amherst.

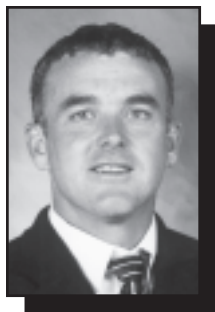
In addition to his football background, Beal served as the Head Men's Lacrosse Coach at both Tufts and the Colorado School of Mines during his tenure at each school, as he also held the position of Associate Head Men's Lacrosse Coach at Wesleyan. Rich chaired the American Football Coaches Association Division III Assistant Coaches Committee and was also a member of the United States Lacrosse Coaches Association.

A 1985 graduate of Wesleyan, Beal was a three-year starter in both football and lacrosse, as he was co-captain in the latter sport. Rich received the prestigious Thomas W. Eck Jr. Memorial Award from Wesleyan, which is presented for team spirit, sportsmanship and devotion to football. Beal went on to earn a master of science in sports management from UMass Amherst in 1988.

A noted camp counselor and clinician throughout the region, Rich and his wife, Erica, reside in Hingham, Mass. with their three children: Perry (12), Max (10) and Nicholas (2).

Recruiting Coordinator

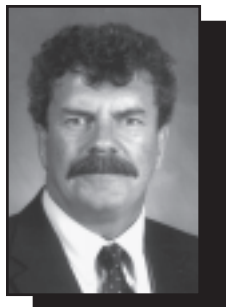

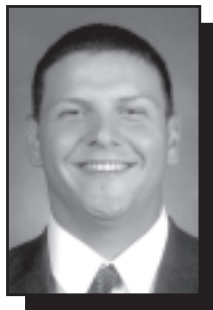

Equipment Manager

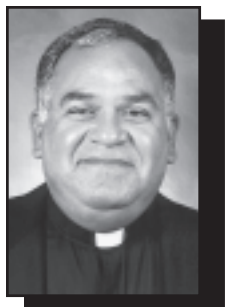

Senior Brian Scheidel (Bayshore, N.Y./Islip) is the most experienced signal-caller for the Chieftains, as he completed 15-of-34 passes for 206 yards and a touchdown last fall while recording 60 rushing attempts in the option set, the fourth highest total on the squad. A three-year veteran who has seen time both as a starter and back-up, Scheidel will be vying for the starting job along with junior Mike Schlittler (Needham, Mass./Xaverian) and sophomore Kevin Burke (Halifax, Mass./Coyle-Cassidy). Burke passed for 39 yards and also netted a rushing touchdown during his rookie season, while Schlittler appeared in all 11 contests last season primarily on special teams, recording six total tackles (four solo) in the process.

Sophomore J.T. Nickley (Rockland, Mass./Cardinal Spellman) and junior Rob Olivar (Reading, Mass./Reading) return to their starting roles in the backfield for Stonehill this fall, as this tandem forms one of the top rushing duos in the conference. Nickley led the Chieftains as a rookie with 545 yards and four touchdowns from his fullback spot, while Olivar has proven to be one of the speediest backs in the Northeast-10 over the last two seasons, as he rushed for 409 yards and five touchdowns in 2001 while leading the Chieftains with 26 receptions for another 314 yards and three scores. Junior Derek Mazza (Wilmington, Mass./Austin Prep) and senior Jeff Dias (Tyngsboro, Mass./Tyngsboro) also lend experience to the Stonehill rushing attack after amassing 356 and 322 yards, respectively, last season. Senior Peter Kiely (Swampscott, Mass./Swampscott) and sophomores Derek Sanchez (Taunton, Mass./Taunton) and Bob Powell (Weymouth, Mass./Weymouth) will also be vying for time in the Stonehill backfield, as Sanchez rushed for 90 yards and one touchdown during his rookie campaign.

While Stonehill only recorded 63 pass receptions as part of the option attack in 2001, 10 different Chieftains caught at least one pass along the way, as Dias finished second to Olivar's reception total with 13 of his own. Sophomore Matt Rainone (Cranston, R.I./Cranston West) notched seven catches from his split end position, including one for a touchdown, while junior Matt Carpenter (Ipswich, Mass./Ipswich) added six receptions after being converted to a tight end early in the season. Junior Jay Ricciardi (South Dennis, Mass./Dennis-Yarmouth) and sophomore Luke

Dawson (Hampton Bays, N.Y./Hampton Bays) are also looking to impact the Stonehill receiving corps.

An experienced offensive line is also in place for Bealis crew in 2002, as Stonehill is looking to continue its rushing prowess that saw the Chieftains amass nearly 225 yards on the ground per game last fall. Senior Zack Hoover (Chelmsford, Mass./Chelmsford), juniors David Macek (Webster, Mass./Bartlett), Jeff McCormack (Plymouth, Mass./Plymouth North) and Ryan Glidden (Clinton, Conn./Morgan School), along with sophomores Don Lundin (Weymouth, Mass./Weymouth), Mike Egan (Norwood, Mass./Boston College), Craig Davis (Cohasset, Mass./Cohasset), Keith Greener (Weymouth, Mass./Weymouth) and Tim Vogel (Medway, Mass./Medway), will anchor a line that has helped shatter the Chieftain single season rushing record.

DEFENSE. As equally impressive as the Stonehill running game has been over the last three seasons has been the rise of the Chieftain defensive unit, which returns in tact in 2002 with all 11 starters back on that side of the ball. Beal welcomes back two of the region's best linebackers in Shaughnessy and junior Steve Sheeler (Gloversville, N.Y./Gloversville), as Shaughnessy established the school record for single-season tackles with 123 stops last year and was joined in the century club by Sheeler, who amassed 105 stops (67 solo) in nine contests. Walsh and fellow senior Tom O'Connell (Auburn, Mass./Auburn) team up as two of the best defensive backs in the conference, as Walsh posted 93 total tackles (60 solo) to go with four interceptions, 10 pass break-ups and three forced fumbles. O'Connell set a new Chieftain single-season interceptions mark with eight picks last fall, as he added 61 total tackles, 19 pass break-ups and four fumble recoveries to his all-conference totals.

That talented quartet is joined by additional experienced veterans on the defensive side, as seniors Jarad Vartanian (Londonderry, N.H./Londonderry), Ed Marshall (Readville, Mass./Boston Latin) and Jim Briggs (Sharon, Mass./Catholic Memorial) along with junior Kevin Degan (Marshfield, Mass./Marshfield), each made 40 or more tackles during the season. Additionally, seniors Joe Buiel (Duxbury, Mass./Duxbury), Jarrod Neff (Everett, Mass./Everett) and Brian Tully (Auburn, Mass./Auburn), along with junior Joe Mento (North Andover, Mass./Brooks School), return to help anchor a defensive line that played a key role in Stonehill's team total of 15 sacks in 2001.

Other stalwarts looking to shine on the defensive side include sophomore Carl Benbow (Boston, Mass./Hingham), who made 33 tackles in nine contests, and

fellow sophomore Chris Sadler (Trumbull, Conn./St. Joseph), who recorded 14 total stops. Sophomore Toyin Bamisile (Pawtucket, R.I./LaSalle Academy) is vying for a spot on the defensive line, while sophomore Kevin McDermott (East Bridgewater, Mass./East Bridgewater) is back after recording 20 total tackles and an interception in six outings. Senior Marcus Humber (Holyoke, Mass./Holyoke) and sophomore John Benoit (Medfield, Mass./Medfield) move over from offense to the linebacking corps, while sophomores Ryan Gadles (Pembroke, Mass./Silver Lake), Billy Rabbitt (Bayonne, N.J./St. Peter's Prep) and James Maloney (Milton, Mass./Boston College) are also vying for roles in the Chieftain defensive backfield.

SPECIAL TEAMS. Junior Joe Crowley (Fairfield, Conn./Fairfield Prep) returns to both the placekicking and punting duties for the Chieftains after earning first team all-Northeast-10 accolades in the former last fall, as Crowley shattered the school record for field goals in one season by connecting on 8-of-11 attempts while adding 23 extra points on 24 attempts in the PAT department. Crowley also set the school record for longest punt when he booted a 76-yarder against LIU-C.W. Post, as he averaged an even 37.0 yards per kick on 53 attempts during the year.

The data is in on the forecast for Stonehill Football in 2002, and the early reports are encouraging for Head Coach Rich Beal and his Chieftains this fall. Stonehill will begin its quest for the Northeast-10 crown on Saturday, September 7th by hosting perennial league power American International at Chieftain Stadium beginning at 1:30 p.m. EDT.

The Northeast-10 Conference



Now in its third decade, the Northeast-10 Conference has established itself as one of the premier all-around NCAA Division II conferences in the nation. The Northeast-10 is now the second largest Division II conference in the country and is comprised of 15 institutions, six from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, three each from New York and New Hampshire, and one each from Vermont, Connecticut and Rhode Island.

Founded in 1980 as the Northeast-7, the charter members were American International College, Assumption College, Bentley College, Bryant College, the University of Hartford, Springfield College and Stonehill College. Saint Anselm College was admitted to the conference in 1981 and Merrimack joined the fold in 1984, replacing Hartford, now a Division I institution.

The conference expanded from eight to 10 teams with the addition to Quinnipiac College and Saint Michael's College in 1987. Springfield left the conference for Division III following the completion of the 1994-95 academic year. The conference returned to 10 teams in 1996-97 with the addition of LeMoyné College and then expanded to 11 in 1997-98 with the inclusion of Pace University. In 1998-99, the conference reverted back to 10 schools when Quinnipiac shifted its programs to Division I.

The Northeast-10 expanded to 15 institutions in 2000, as Franklin Pierce College, the University of Massachusetts Lowell, Southern New Hampshire University, the College of Saint Rose and Southern Connecticut State University all joined the fold.

The Northeast-10 currently sponsors 20 championships in the sports of men's and women's soccer, field hockey, women's volleyball, football, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's cross country, golf, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's indoor track and field, baseball, softball, men's and women's lacrosse and men's and women's outdoor track and field.

The History of Stonehill Football



From its inception as a club program in 1970 to its current status as a charter member of the Northeast-10 Conference, Stonehill football has found success at each level of competition it has taken on for over three decades. The excitement that football has added to fall afternoons on the scenic Easton campus has gone hand-in-hand with championships and individual glory that have left a truly distinctive mark on New England small college football.

From 1970 to 1987, Stonehill football existed solely as a club program, beginning action in October of 1970 with a 20-13 setback to Worcester State. After that inaugural campaign, the club team became a member of the New England Collegiate Football Conference, competing with the likes of current EFC members Bentley, Merrimack and Assumption, all of which joined Stonehill as national club powers during the '70's and '80's.

The old NECFC gave birth in 1988 to the newly formed Eastern Collegiate Football Conference, as Stonehill joined the ranks of the varsity by competing as an NCAA Division III institution on the gridiron. The Chieftains always played a major role in the conference throughout its participation, copping the first league crown in 1989 under Head Coach Cliff Sherman and adding another title in 1991.

But perhaps the shining moment for both the program and the ECFC came in November of 1995 when long-time rivals Stonehill and Bentley met for the league championship once again. Only two years earlier, the Chieftains swallowed a bitter pill with a 27-26 setback to the Falcons in the title contest, and revenge was on the mind of Head Coach Connie Driscoll's squad. After falling behind in the first half by 15 points (22-7), Stonehill rallied to take command by outscoring Bentley at one point by a 32-7 margin. The Falcons had one last gasp with the ball late in the contest, but Richard White's interception at the goal line touched off one of the wildest celebrations ever as the gun sounded on a 39-36 Stonehill victory, one which was chronicled by *The Boston Globe's* Bob Ryan as one of the best small college games in New England history.

Of course, lost in the shuffle of that memorable victory was the fact that the Chieftains claimed their third ECFC title in seven seasons and a first-ever berth in the ECAC IFC Bowl. Also lost in the shuffle was a school-record nine victory campaign as well as an ECFC Coach of the Year honor for Driscoll.

After three championships and three second-place finishes in the ECFC, Stonehill bade adieu to the conference in 1997 to become a member of the newly-formed Eastern Football Conference, which in turn has now become part of the Northeast-10 Conference. Comprised of Division II institutions from Massachusetts, New York, Connecticut, Rhode Island and New Hampshire, the Chieftains compete against the likes of Bentley, American International, Merrimack, Assumption, UMass Lowell, Southern Connecticut and LIU-C.W. Post. Other football-playing members of the league are Pace, Bryant and Saint Anselm.

Along with the team accomplishments over the years have come some outstanding individual accolades. Wide receiver Dan Cahill was tabbed as the ECAC IFC Player of the Year in 1995, and defensive back Kevin Broderick earned a spot on the GTE/CoSIDA National Academic All-America squad in 1992. In 2000, offensive standouts Tyrone Jefferson and Chris Asbell each earned all-New England and all-Eastern Football Conference accolades, and last year saw four Chieftains earn all-Northeast-10 Conference honors. The success that the Chieftains have attained over the years has certainly established a high standard of excellence, a standard that Head Coach Rich Beal has carried into the new millenium after posting Stonehill's highest victory total in six seasons last fall.

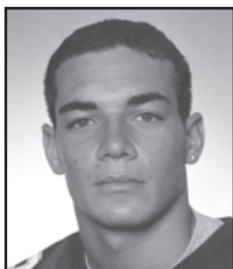

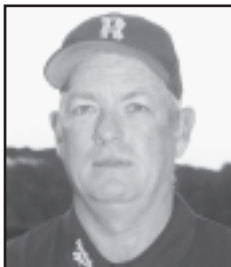
